ANNUAL INTERCOLLEGIATE GEOLOGICAL EXCURSION

Waterville, Maine

October 9th and 10th, 1925.

PROGRAM FOR FRIDAY, OCTOBER 9th

8:00 Party will leave Elmwood Hotel

- 8:15-8:45. Location I. Bed of Kennebec River at Ticonic Falls. Exposures of limy slates showing miniature Appalachian structure, syenite intrusion, and pot hole erosion.
- 8:45-9:00. Location II. Abandoned clay pit showing post glacial marine clays overlaid by dune sands. Between locations II and III the route will be over the marine clay and sand plain at the 140-160 foot level.
- 9:20-10:00.Location III.Benton Railway cut. Silurian slates containing Nereites trails and sea weed impressions.
- 10:30-11:00.Location IV. Waterville Slate Quarry. Silurian slates. The type locality for Monograptus colbiensis.
- 11:30-12:00.Location V. Pooler Gravel Pit. Esker gravels overlaid by fossiliferous clays and dune sands. This location gives a very good record of the post-Pleistocene events.
- 1:00-2:00. Lunch at Camp Hope, Great Pond, Belgrade. At this point the topographic expression of the Belgrade granite batholith as modified by glacial erosion may be seen. Members of party are requested to bring lunches.
 - 2:00-3:00. During the afternoon the great eaker system of the Belgrade region will be studied. The features shown will be a series of deltas marking halts in the ice retreat, connected by well developed eaker ridges, an exceptional development of kettle hold ponds, ice-rafted deposits, and high-level (320 feet) marine clays.

The party will return to Waterville in time for dinner at the Elmwood at 7:00 o'clock.

PROGRAM FOR SATURDAY. OCTOBER 10th

The party will leave the Elmwood Hotel at 8:00.

Locality I. Augusta. Quarry in gneissic Hallowell granite.

Locality II. Spear's Corner, Litchfield. Nephalite syenite (litchfieldite), cancrinite and sodalite.

Jocality III. Mount Apatite, Auburn. Quarries in gem-bearing pegmatites. Localit, IV.

Lewiston. Quar.y in metamorphosed l.mestone cut by trap dikes.

Members of the party are eshed to bring lunches which will be eaten at some convenient place on the route.

Those of the party who do not wish to return to Waterville may take trains from Lewiston.
