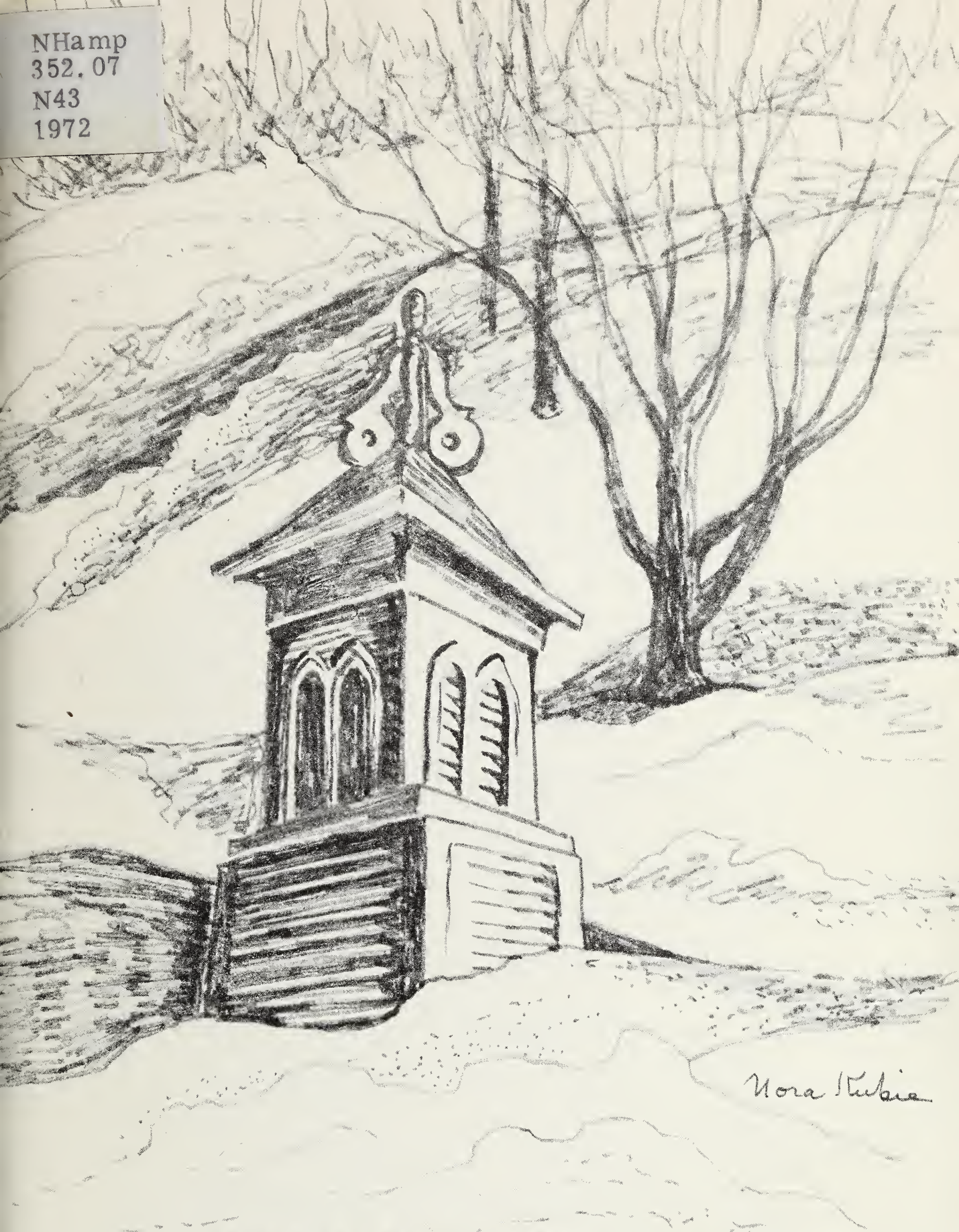

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

At their 1972 Town Meeting the people of Harrisville voted not to renew their agreement which permitted Nelson residents to use the Harrisville dump. We were unable to find anywhere in Nelson a site for the dump. In August we made a year's agreement with Mr. Bergeron, the owner of the land used by the City of Keene, to use his dump. That contract expires in July 31, 1973.

This year the Selectmen decided to use some of the TRA money to widen the road from the East Sullivan line to the Apple Hill Music Camp. We also had to reopen and repair the road from the Teppema property to the property bought by Mr. and Mrs. Russell Thomas. This occurred after the Town Meeting of 1972. This unexpected expense meant that we had to curtail some of our planned roadwork.

This year, at the strong urging of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission, we increased the assessed value on land and lake and pond shore frontages. The following notice was included in each taxpayer's bill:

For some years land in Nelson has been selling at much higher prices than its assessed valuation. This has resulted in severe penalties by the State Tax Commission 1.2. 69% evaluation in 1971 vs. 100% valuation voted by the Town at the 1967 Town Meeting.

This year, at the strong request of the New Hampshire State Tax Commission, the following changes were made:

The Selectmen would like to thank all the other Town Officers who have worked long and hard with very small pay for their services. And for all those who have served on committees or who have otherwise spent their time and energy on Town business, we say "thank you."

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

NELSON TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 6th day of March, at 7:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following Articles:

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$27,222.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1973.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.
5. To see what action the Town wishes to take concerning the use of monies received through Federal Revenue Sharing.

ARTICLES IN SUPPORT OF VARIOUS OBLIGATIONS

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$329.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$100.00 for the same purpose for Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$223.00 for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Town Library and \$375.00 for necessary repairs to the Library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1973.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PROTECTION

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing protective equipment.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the rental of the dump.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 for repairs to the Fire Station.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$13,635.18 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$5,000.00 shall be for summer work and \$8,635.18 for winter work.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for general highway expenses, repairs, and supplies.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$503.91 as its share of TRA construction costs, the State's being \$3,359.37.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

NOTE: The Committee consists of the Selectmen, the Road Agent, the three others persons: Messrs. Barry Tolman, Arnold Miner, and Frank E. Upton, Jr.

20. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department.

21. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding monies received from the State under the Highway Grant.

ARTICLES OF A SPECIAL NATURE

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00, said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the ultimate replacement of the Town's present dump arrangements, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the Fund except by vote of the Town for new dump facilities.

NOTE: While the vote of this Article applies only to the year it is adopted, it is intended that a similar Article be inserted in the next Annual Warrant.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment.

24. To see if the Town will vote to require written notice of intent to build to be furnished and delivered to the Selectmen, together with a copy of any required permit or other evidence of approval from the State Water Supply and Pollution

Control commission or other state agency **before** any construction is begun, if such permit or approval is required by state statute or regulation; and to provide that any person who violates the foregoing requirement of written notice and accompanying documents shall be fined not more than \$25.00 for each day of such violation.

25. To see if the Town will vote to designate one Town Road as a "scenic road" as authorized under RSA 253 (amended). Said road is known variously as the Old Nelson Road or Lead Mine Road, and for the purposes of this Article runs the Nelson-Sullivan Town line past Apple Hill Camp and meets the Nelson-Harrisville by-pass near the Cemetery.

NOTE: RSA 253 provides protection for roadside trees and stone walls. It permits use by the Town of TRA funds for maintenance and repair of such roads without imposing former State restrictions and specifications.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Region Humane Society.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$177.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the North Cheshire County Visiting Nurses' Association.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$354.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses' Association.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

30. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 as a trust fund from Arthur and Elsie Porter, the interest therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Cemetery.

31. To see if the Town will vote to establish a study committee, said committee to work with other Town officers and similiar committees which may be established in neighboring towns, and to report the results of its deliberations to the Town periodically by whatever appropriate means are available, and no later than the 1974 Town Caucus and Meeting.

NOTE: The committee shall be specifically charged with:

1. Exploring, with other towns, the responses which can be made to changes in state law respecting public dumps.
2. Exploring, in conjunction with other towns, the feasibility of hiring a professional Town Manager to serve several towns, and further research the feasibility of all forms of joint or collaborative action with other towns.
3. Exploring, in conjunction with other towns or independently, the feasibility of letting town road maintenance be open to bids from private contractors, or any other method of maintaining town roads which appear worthy of study.

This committee shall include five members: one member of the Board of Selectmen, chosen by the Board; one member of the School Board, chosen by the Board; and three members chosen by this meeting.

32. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Regional Planning Commission, now organized and named the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of a particular town.

The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statute Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Nelson.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240.72 as the Town's share for the study and operation of the South-western New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance, and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.

34. To see if the Town will vote, section by section, to adopt the proposed changes in the Nelson Land Use Plan.

To authorize upon appeal in specific cases such variance from the terms of the ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the conditions of the ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship, and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done. REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

On July 1, 1972, I started my job as Librarian and have found this to be very rewarding and enjoyable. I wish to take this opportunity to thank those who helped get me started. Katherine Upton was most helpful in familiarizing me with the job before she left her duties in June. My thanks to the Trustees who were always available to pick out books when the Bookmobile came and to help me shelve them after; to Carol Steuart who was there to answer my many questions, and Frances Tolman, who kept busy writing letters of thanks to those who gave books to the Library. My very special thanks to Dorothy and Winston French who have been the most helpful of all in my times of need, and to my assistant, Vera Balch who has helped to get many of our books catalogued and in circulation. We have put fifty-five books in circulation since July.

In April there was an Open House in celebration of National Library Week. About forty people attended.

During the summer a reading program was held every Monday morning for the children. The older children also took part in a reading program whereby every book read brought them closer to the Moon and back home.

The summer also brought us many visitors, especially on the nights of the Monadnock Music Concerts. We had visitors from Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Brooklyn, New York, Ohio, and Massachusetts, as well as parts of New Hampshire.

The flagstone walkway was put in, in memory of Elizabeth Hatch, and a memorial plaque was placed on the Library near the walkway.

I completed a course given for Librarians at Keene State on reference materials, and have also attended the Book Meetings held at the District Office in Keene every two months.

Carol Steuart, Marion Bingham, Sandra Brown, and Dorothy French have been most faithful in taking books to the school every two weeks. A total of 1,471 books were taken to grades one through six. To celebrate National Book Week in November, the children portrayed a character they read about by dressing the part and reporting to the class on the book read. Refreshments were served after.

I wish to thank the Conservation Committee for their gift of eleven books on Ecology. Also my thanks again to the people who have given books to the Library.

Since May, the Librarian has carried books to three of the ladies in the Town. It has been a joy to meet these ladies and keep them supplied with books. If I may provide this service to anyone else in town, please let me know.

Displays have been put up in the Library each month, and ideas from the children are always welcome.

Cemetery maintenance problems of 1972 have been somewhat greater than average and largely due to weather and frost conditions.

The Revolutionary Soldiers' monument of fieldstone was much damaged by ice. This required considerable masonry work and waterproofing of its top to prevent further erosion. Several trees were either blown down or broken off by severe windstorms which required cutting and removal. Many stone lot markers were either pushed over or badly tilted by ground frost. These required extensive repair. Also the extremely wet summer meant more frequent mowing in addition to the usual work of brush cutting, removal of leaves, and the application of loam where rock had been removed.

Total expenses include the cost of labor, rental equipment and materials.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year just passed has again been an active and busy one for the members of this department.

It will be noted that the incidence of complaints relative to breaking and entering have decreased over the past years; whether this is due to the increased patrols in the area by the department and the State Police or because of the increased vigilance of residents is not known; we hope this pattern will continue.

As always reports by residents of unusual activity or suspicious actions by strangers in the area will be most helpful. Identification by description of vehicles with registration plate information serves to aid in the apprehension of subjects suspected of committing a crime.

It would be difficult for this department to operate without the assistance of other law enforcement agencies; and special thanks are due the State Police, Sheriff's Dept., Keene Police Dept., and the Mutual Aid Center.

Your Police Officer attended an eight week course sponsored by the Sheriff's Dept., at which lectures were given by the F.B.I., U. S. Army, and local law enforcement officials.

The monitors, whose purchase was approved at last Town Meeting, have been ordered and will afford car to car communication with all State Police cruisers in the area; these will be installed shortly.

The motion was made by Bernie Pierce that the reading of the Articles be waived. Motion was seconded and carried.

The Moderator appointed Rodger Tolman, Karen Tolman and Neil Coughlin as Tellers for the meeting.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers:

Town Clerk: Mrs. Charlotte H. Pratt was elected Town Clerk, one vote being cast by the Moderator, and sworn into office by the Moderator.

Selectmen: Bernie Pierce was elected Selectmen, one vote being cast by the Clerk, and sworn into office by the Moderator.

Tax Collector: Mr. Sidney Partridge was elected Tax Collector, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Treasurer: Mrs. Florence Tolman was elected Treasurer, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Road Agent: The following were nominated for the office of Road Agent:

Motion was made and seconded to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove at its discretion new subdivisions, and plats thereof showing streets or the widening thereof or parks. Upon the adoption of such ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of Cheshire County a certificate or notice showing that said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization as provided in Section 19 and Sections 19 through 29 inclusive and Section 34, Chapter 36.

Motion lost.

Article 2. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,212.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.

Article 3. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1972.

Article 4. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.

Article 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$332.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$100.00 for the same purpose for Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$212.00 for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

Article 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Town Library.

Article 9 It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1972.

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to support the work of the Munsonville, Pre-School.

Mr. Pierce explained that \$100.00 of this amount was for 1971.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

Article 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

Mr. Balch gave an oral report from the Police Department.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$663.00 for the purchase and installation of two new police radios.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Mr. Huber gave an oral report for the Fire Department.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,425.00 for the purchase of 500 feet of 4 inch fire hose.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the rental of the dump.

Article 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,635.18 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$5,000.00 shall be for summer work and \$8,635.18 for winter work.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for general highway expenses, repairs, and supplies.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$509.16 as its share of TRA construction costs, the State's being \$3,394.42.

Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by the vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

Motion was made and seconded to take up the election of a member of the Town Road Equipment Committee. Motion carried.

It was announced that Claude Hutchins resigned, having been elected Road Agent. This left a vacancy for a one year term, also.

REPORT OF NELSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission's work since March 1972 was concerned with completing the volunteer-taught environmental course at the Munsonville School, continuing to collect survey maps of land within the Town, preparatory to making an official map of the Town, assisting with the Granite Lake Basin Study, and preparing methods of disseminating the information obtained from the soil study due to be completed by the U.S.D.A. by the spring of 1973.

The Commission's survey of parents indicated satisfaction with the program of environmental studies. Eight 5th and 6th graders spent four days at Camp Union in Greenfield, N. H. in advanced nature study the latter half of May. Their progress and that of the other pupils was demonstrated in an Eco-Expo held at the school on June 15th and viewed by many parents and other townspeople. A great debt of gratitude is owed to Cornelia Iselin, Gail Tatham and Karen Tolman for the many hours they devoted to this work.

This past fall, these volunteers being otherwise engaged, the Commission secured the services of John Kulish of Hancock for one day a month at the school. The Commission donated 11 books on nature study to the Olivia Rodham Library.

The Commission is being urged by Conservation Commissions in neighboring towns to concert efforts to meet the growing needs for cooperative waste disposal, protection of wetlands and lakes and training of youth in environmental matters.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary school district officers :

A moderator for the ensuing year.

A clerk for the ensuing year.

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer from July 1, 1973. for the ensuing year.

An auditor for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Munsonville School in said District on March 2, 1973, at 8:00 p.m., to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3. Shall the School District accept the provisions of R.S.A. 195-A (as amended) providing for the establishment of an A.R.E.A. school in Keene to serve grades seven and eight from the school districts of Harrisville, Marlow, Nelson and Stoddard in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the District Clerk.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

March 3, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by the moderator, Raymond G. Huber, at the Munsonville School House.

The check-list was handed over to the Clerk and signed by the Clerk and the Supervisors.

The Moderator read the School Warrant through Article I, and opened the polls for persons wishing to vote for officers of the school district, listed by non-partisan ballot, as required by law. He announced that the polls would be open until 9:00 P.M. and that Article II would be taken up at 8:00 P.M.

At 8:00 P.M. the School Warrant was read by Mr. Huber and the Articles were acted upon as follows:

Article II Motion was made by Mrs. Ruth Staples that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, be accepted as printed in the Annual Report.

The motion was seconded and prevailed.

At this time a motion was made that the Officers of the Supervisory Union be allowed to speak on the Articles before the meeting. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article III Motion was made by Mr. Donald Bennett that the District accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) and appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under said Federal Act, and any amendments thereto, for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board, with the further power and authority vested with said school board, to cooperate with other school districts and/or supervisory unions. Further, that the District authorize the school board to make applications for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Mr. Cass, Business Manager for the Supervisory Union, explained this article. The motion was second and prevailed.

Article IV Motion was made by Mrs. Ruth Staples that the District authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state or private agency.

The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article V Motion was made by Mr. Bradley Pratt that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,749.00 to install a fire alarm system as provided by Granite State Alarm, Inc., said system to have the State Fire Underwriters' approval and to include automatic heat detectors, pull stations, evacuation alarms, building temperature devices and connection of all warning devices to Southwestern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid for twenty-four hour protection. Further, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.00 for the first annual operating cost of the system. The motion was seconded.

Following questions and discussion the Moderator called for a standing vote:

Further, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$452.00 for the first annual rental and maintenance of the system. The motion was seconded and discussed.

The Moderator called for a standing vote.

The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article VII Motion was made that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$69,635 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

The motion was seconded. Questions and discussion of teachers' salary increases, transportation costs and payments followed and Mr. Cass offered an explanation of the Budget for the school district.

The motion prevailed and Article VII was adopted.

Article VIII Motion was made and seconded that the District vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of the construction, reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, said fund to be held in custody by the Trustees of the Trust Funds for the Town of Nelson.

ADMINISTRATORS' REPORT

1972-1973

The quality of education offered the students at the Munsonville School continues to be most desirable. Reports from Keene Junior High School and Keene Senior High School indicate that Nelson students are performing up to expectations.

We continue our efforts to assure a program of instruction at Munsonville School which will provide our students with similar experiences and backgrounds as those of other elementary school students as they enter the Keene Junior High School. The program developed by a citizens' group relating to the study of ecology was well received by the students and made a real contribution to their education. The art program offered by Mrs. Tolman to our students has been a positive experience. The new program in music will be evaluated as the activity continues. We are grateful to the personnel at the Public Library for the assistance provided in exposing our pupils to the services of the Public Library. The services of our Resource Aide, provided jointly by the District and Federal funding, are making an impact and will continue to do so. New directions for math instruction (an individualized approach) will continue to be explored and implemented.

In summary, the program of instruction at the school is and must be constantly evaluated and updated to provide realistic educational experiences to the students within the limitations of space and tax dollars.

A report submitted to the State Department of Education relating to the Minimum Standards for New Hampshire Elementary Schools indicated the following would be needed for full compliance with the Minimum Standards:

1. To upgrade library services.
2. To strengthen our health curriculum.

3. Part-time instructors in art, physical education, and guidance.
4. Program for those students with learning disabilities.

The School District has provided a part-time person to assist those students with learning problems. It has begun its program of upgrading library services by providing additional funds for library and media materials.

The School Board has committed itself to an annual review of the needs of the school and to present its priorities to the District via its annual budget. It is possible, as we look ahead, that several Districts might well combine to employ some of the specialists suggested by the Minimum Standards.

The A.R.E.A. Plan for Grades Seven and Eight has been prepared by the Planning Committee and will be in the Warrant for your consideration at the District Meeting. The proposed plan will provide the Nelson School District with a guarantee that there will be educational space provided for the students from Nelson and that the educational program offered will be at least at the level of educational standards of the State of New Hampshire. The administrators urge your support of this plan.

The school building is maintained at a high level of efficiency. A competent professional staff is hard at work in providing a sound educational program and the pupils seem to be applying themselves to the task at hand and are relatively happy. Education is alive and well in Nelson, New Hampshire.

REPORT OF THE MUNSONVILLE PRE-SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

For the Year 1971-1972

The Munsonville Pre-School was granted its license to operate for the school year 1971-1972 and began classes October 4. Classes were held Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9:00 to 12:00 noon. The Pre-School observes the same vacations and days off as the Munsonville School. Classes concluded with the graduation June 9.

The Pre-School holds classes in the Munsonville Methodist Church, paying the church for a share of the heat and electricity.

Tuition was kept as low as possible in order to make Pre-School available to all Nelson Pre-School age children: \$3.00 per month for four year olds who attended once a week and \$7.00 per month for five year olds who attended three times a week. Children from Stoddard and Sullivan have been accepted, when space allowed, to add additional tuition income.

In order to meet expenses it was necessary for the Association to supplement the tuition through money raising projects held throughout the year, and it gratefully accepted private donations and the \$100.00 voted by the Town at Town Meeting. This money is used to improve classroom supplies and for operating expenses which include the teacher's salary, heating, electricity and general expenses.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's Division Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.
