#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote at Town meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Pittsburg on Tuesday the ninth day of March at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget and raise money for same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to meet any public funds that might be appropriated by the State or Federal Government .for public work.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to lay out on the Hill Road between Perry Stream bridge and Clifton Clogstons; To be laid out by the Road Agent.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$700.00 for purpose of straightening, widening, and gravelling road from top of hill, above Forrest Covill's house to Atlee Mousseau's.

- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for improvement at Back Lake Beach.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$300.00 in addition to the salary already raised in the budget for the Nurse.
- 9. To vote on the following question: Is it necessary to revise the Constitution?
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 11. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

During the nine years that the Pittsburg Nursing Association has been functioning many patients have availed themselves of the nursing service.

The pre-natal work is free. Expectant mothers may have regular urinalysis and blood pressure service, also helpful advice and literature as early in pregnancy as they may wish. Serious complications may be avoided by knowledge of trouble gained early thereby safeguarding health and life during this period.

Each year during the summer months the State conducts a Child Welfare and Toxoid Clinic. A Tuberculosis Clinic is usually sponsored at the same time, made possible by the sale of Christmas Health Seals. These clinics are free and provide physical examinations and advice for both adults and children.

At the beginning of the school year all school children receive a health examination. This is not as thorough an examination as a physician gives in his office, but it is sufficiently thorough to discover any outstanding defects from which a child may be suffering. The defects found and reported to parents are much more serious if not corrected than many parents realize. Failure to correct physical defects engenders heavy penalties and the earlier the correction is made the less serious damage is done.

Few of us ever give thought to the diseases we have escaped or the diseases from which we have been protected by the developments of medical and sanitary science. We should not fail to appreciate the benefits we have derived from the discoveries that control disease.

Good health, long life and happiness are not just accidents but are definitely the result of a wise choice of good health habits. If he would live a healthy life we should be alert to any deviation from the normal.

I extend thanks and appreciation for the loyal cooperation received from the Nursing Committee, Superintendent of Schools, Teachers and Parents.

### Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Pittsburg:

### General

School is democracy's greatest gift to civilization. Throughout the world, among upward struggling people, wherever parents share in the aspirations of their children, schools flourish. But let us not think that an education is acquired only in schools. Education is a part of life—a continuing process.

Children grow up but once. Today's children must start their education in today's schools. Ours is the responsibility of supplying a school that can respond to the needs of the times.

You have locked in your heart your secret hopes and ambitions for our boys and girls. Someday you will find expression for your desires, then the boys and girls, as well as the rest of the community will know your feelings by the support that you give to your own schools.

The next time that you pass a school house pause a moment to think what school means to humanity.

### **Buildings and Equipment**

Considerable work has been done during the past year upon the school property. A new woven wire fence was installed at the Danforth School and the front of the Village lot was also fenced. The water pipe at the Danforth School was completely relaid and the interior of the building partially redecorated. The Indian Stream School was repainted inside, and the concrete steps were patched. New metal ceilings were

added to the two lower rooms of the Village school. A wood burning stove was installed in the Domestic Arts room. Other minor repairs were also made.

I hope that it will be possible in the near future to redecorate the high school building. The building is badly soiled inside. It would be nice if new student desks could be installed at the Village School, perhaps one room a year. The district may feel that it would be advisable to continue the work already started in fencing the school-lots.

### **Teachers**

The following changes occurred in the teaching personnel of the district: Gwendolyn Martindale of Boston University was selected to fill the vacacay as teacher of English and French; Doris Baker, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School was elected to fill the Commercial Department vacancy and Doris Gray of Perry Kindergarten Normal School filled the vacancy in the Primary Room. Both the former and latter have had teaching experience.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The total enrollment is exactly the same as for this time last year. There are 46 in the Junior-Senior High, 43 in the Village Elementary, 49 at the Danforth and 14 at Indian Stream. There are two attending Pittsburg from Clarksville and five from Pittsburg attending school at Canaan or West Stewartstown.

The records show Indian Stream made the best record for the year in percentage of attendance (97.12) and number of tardinesses (4).

### Notes on the Budget

The total of the School Board's 1937-38 Budget is \$18,947.00 which decreased by the estimated income would leave \$18,737.00 to be raised by taxation if the budget is approved as printed. The district raised last year \$18,710.00. The budgets for the past four

years have varied but very slightly from year to year.

### Health

The following report will give you some idea of the work that has been carried on by Mrs. Sturgis, the school nurse.

The value of correcting the physical defects is far more important than many parents realize. It is so much easier when times are hard to assume that the child may outgrow his difficulty or that no harm may come from waiting until times are better than it is to find some way of remedying the evil at once, yet it is during this interval that the defects may increase to such an extent that the child is crippled for life.

From decayed teeth poisons seep into the system causing weariness and mental exhaustion also affecting the joints and heart. Eating is painful therefore the child gets less nourishment. In the same manner poisons from infected tonsils may enter the body, causing anemia and loss of appetite. One defect causes many, many others and should be attended to at once.

To the parents we stress the importance of preventing diseases through immunization. Those who have seen Diphtheria need no urging to have a safe method of prevention given to their own children. Practically all small children who have not been immunized are susceptible to Small Pox and Diphtheria regardless of how strong they are or how good their home conditions are.

Many parents have a fear of the reaction following immunization. Such inoculations on or into the skin are practically painless. Thousands of immunizatins are performed on children each year throughout this state and others with no ill results.

During the summer months the state sponsors a Child Welfare and Toxoid Clinic all children are welcome. They receive a physical examination and Diphtheria immunization free of charge. The Toxoid is given to children from six months to nine years of age.

### Conclusion

I wish it might be possible for everyone to visit the schools at least once during the year, and become acquainted with what the school is trying to do for your children.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and citizens for the countless courteousies and hearty cooperation during the past year.
