**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the eight of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the following listed Real Estate at Public Auction, said Real Estate having been acquired through Tax Deeds. This authorization to remain in effect until the Real Estate so listed has been disposed of:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the Moderator with the advice and consent of the Selectmen and the Board of Appeals to (a) appoint a Zoning Commission of five (5) residents of the Town to study the present zoning regulations and to recommend revisions in boundaries of districts and the regulations to be enforced therein as may appear needful for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the Town and the inhabitants thereof, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Revised Laws and amendments thereto, said recommendations to be submitted to the next annual Town Meeting and (b) raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$300.00 to be used as may be deemed necessary in carrying out said study.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote (a) to transfer the sum of \$1,500.00 from the unencumbered Surplus of the Town as of December 31, 1954 to the "Reserve For Fire Truck Purchase Account," (b) to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,500.00 to be deposited to this same account and (c) to authorize the Selectmen to disburse funds from this account at the request of the Fire Engineers when they are ready to purchase a Fire Truck, said authorization to remain in force until rescinded by vote of the Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as annual compensation for the Building Inspector cancelling thereby a similar action of the Town a year ago voting for annual compensation of \$75.00.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be deposited to the War Memorial Fund.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the continued construction of sidewalks, from which \$150.00 will be used for the repair of existing sidewalks.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to acquire

Broad Form Money and Securities Insurance for one year, indemnifying the Town and its Officers against the loss of Town Funds due to Hold-Up, Burglary, Damage or Destruction caused by Fire, Flood and/or other manner of loss not now covered under present Town Officers' performance Bonds.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the purchase of a Rotary Lawn Mower for the Elm Street Cemetery.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the purchase of a set of Chain Falls for the Elm Street Cemetery.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Civil Defense.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.00 for the repair or replacement of the present heating system of the Town Hall Auditorium.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the repair or removal of damaged or diseased Town-owned trees and the replacement of same where possible. (By Petition.)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the control of Dutch Elm Disease.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept Kelleher Avenue and Laurel Avenue which are located off the East Road opposite the Holy Angels Church. (By Petition.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Article 18. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano

be adopted in this Town.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as submitted the reports of Agents, Auditors, and other Officers and Committees heretofore appointed.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN


### Statement of Condition

The Town of Plaistow closed the year with an unexpended balance of the 1954 Appropriation amounting to \$2,645.59. This figure is, however, more than offset by expenses resulting from Hurricanes Carol and Edna amounting to \$3,420.92.

Your Board of Selectmen are happy to report, none-the-less, that because of the receipt of \$526.00 from the sale of Tax Title land and other Revenues not previously estimated when calculating the 1954 Budget, virtually all of the hurricane expense was taken care of with 1954 income so that we dug into the surplus only \$214.64 during 1954.

The Town Surplus at December 31, 1953 was \$9,991.76 from which \$2,000.00 was transferred by vote of the Town into a Fire Truck Purchase Account leaving a balance in the Surplus account of \$7,991.76. The Town Surplus at December 31, 1954 was \$7,777.12, representing a decrease in surplus funds from a year ago of \$214.64. This Surplus is composed of (a) \$3,438.48 Cash, (b) \$4,113.71 Unredeemed and Uncollected Taxes and (c) \$284.93 Other receivables.

The following chart details the breakdown of your 1954 Tax Dollar as appropriated for 1954:

The following Ordinance as amended was enacted during 1954 and duly recorded in the books of the Town Clerk.

“Effective October 20, 1954, it shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of sixteen years to be upon any public street, or in any public place, after the hour of nine o’clock in the evening unless accompanied by a parent, guardian, or other suitable person.

“Any child so found will be escorted home, and repeated offenses will subject the parent or guardian to a \$5.00 fine.”

This ordinance was not enacted to harass any law-abiding youngster in the pursuit of his or her normal evening recreation but rather to give the Town Officers some legal means of restraining the activities of those few children who have persisted in their invasion of the rights and property of others.

### Elm Street Cemetery

Because the demand for burial lots would appear to exceed the existing supply and to raise funds for the future development of the Cemetery, the Selectmen voted to cut down to a four foot foot path the unused Right-of-Way running westerly, southerly thence easterly from the street

entrance of the cemetery and to parcel the remaining land therein into fourteen lots of varying capacities.

These will be sold to bonafide legal residents of the Town and the sale price of each will include a perpetual care fund to be held by the Town in trust. Price schedules may be had from the Board of Selectmen.

### Valuation

Your Selectmen feel that an explanation of the 1954 increase in valuation may be in order to set to rest some of the ill-founded rumors that it was increased to avoid a high tax rate.

New Hampshire law requires that all taxable property be assessed at its full and true value.

Plaistow in common with most New Hampshire communities had a double standard of valuation. We valued Real Estate at some arbitrary percentage of Market value meanwhile valuing Stock-in-trade at a full 100% of Market value.

The City of Claremont and the Town of Farmington were taken to Court last year by manufacturing concerns who charged that their Stock-in-Trade was unfairly valued in comparison with other types of taxable property in the respective communities.

In the case of the Bemis Bag Co. vs. the City of Claremont, the Court reiterated the law as it exists, namely that all taxable property must be valued at its full and true value. They further conditioned their findings by saying that if taxable property was not valued at its full and true value, all types of taxable property within a given City or Town must be at the self-same percentage of Market value.

Stock-in-Trade and Livestock in Plaistow represented 111½% of the total valuation in 1953 so that the above Court finding was of paramount concern to us.

We claimed in 1952 and 1953 that we were on a 50% valuation, which now meant that Stock-in-Trade and Livestock would have to be cut in half, decreasing our taxable property by \$168,000.00.

It was decided to test the valuation to determine its percentage of market value by the same formula the State Tax Commission uses to investigate wholesale alleged over-valuations in a given Town. We compiled a list of the 169

pieces of property transferred from one owner to another in the period April 1, 1953 to March 31, 1954. We totaled up all these sales prices and divided this total into the sum total of the Town's valuation of these same pieces of property. From this we determined that the Town was not on a 50% valuation but on a 40.003% valuation. This now meant that we had to cut Stock-in-Trade and Live-stock to 40% and were to lose \$202,000.00 in taxable property instead of the \$168,000.00 as previously estimated or almost 7% of the taxable valuation of the Town.

Inasmuch as we were advised by the Tax Commission that they were recommending to the Legislature that the law be revised to read 50% of market value, we raised the Town valuation to approximate 50% of market value. (This 50% of market value bill is now before the State legislature.)

By increasing the overall valuation, we were able to save 10% of the Stock-in-Trade and Livestock valuation or a Town-wide average of \$2.26 per \$1,000.00 of taxable property, so that the 1954 tax increase over 1953 was kept to approximately \$5.14 per \$1,000.00 instead of the \$7.40 per \$1,000.00 it would have been without the increase in valuation.

The following table is presented to show the 1954 tax rate (a) as computed, (b) as it would have been computed from valuation on the 1953 basis and (c) as it would have been computed from valuation on the 1951 basis:

The net Real Estate valuation (Land and Buildings less Veterans Exemptions) has increased from \$1,612,565.00 in 1951 to \$3,172,738.00 in 1954 or 96.84%. This means that the average piece of Real Estate valued at \$1,000.00 in 1951 is now valued at \$1,968.00 (\$2,000.00) for taxing purposes. However, the \$1,000.00 of 1951 would cost \$78.70 in taxes in 1954 while the \$1,968.00 (\$2,000.00) would cost \$74.00 in taxes in 1954 or a saving of \$4.70.

We respectfully submit, therefore, that the increase in valuation due to revaluation since 1951 has saved the

### REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

The development of good citizens is a great undertaking—good books, and good reading make an important contribution. The Plaistow Public Library is able to provide this contribution to good citizenship by the purchase, each year, of new books and magazines. Our aim is to satisfy the needs of our citizens to keep abreast with the events of an ever changing world situation.

As in previous years, we have, in our Library the latest books and magazines for Reference Readers Guide, Time, Newsweek, Science Digest, Current Biography, and our New Hampshire magazine, Profile, are most used, especially by our students.

Book prices are still high, especially Non-Fiction. Current Romance, Westerns, and Mysteries are popular at the present time, but the Non-Fiction, although high in price, will be an asset to our book-list for years to come. Books for our Library are carefully selected from the best lists.

The Book-mobile visited Plaistow four times during the year, leaving over four hundred books. Special books were sent to us from the State Library for use at the Pollard School, as well as for Adult Readers. Over six hundred books were loaned during the year to the Pollard School.

A service much appreciated, is the time allowed the Bus children, each Wednesday, to visit the Library for books. The Librarian wishes to acknowledge the help given by the girls of grade 8 at this hour. Two girls come to the Library to help check books, thus giving the Librarian time to assist the children in the choice of books.

Fifty-three children enjoyed the "Story Hour Time" during vacation. The Librarian was helped in this project by her assistant, Patricia Judson, and by Janet Cook. Certificates were given to fifty-five children for reading ten or more books during the summer.

Circulation of Adult books and magazines has increased during the year.

Special notice was given this year to: Book week, with new books on display, and book-marks given out during Book-week. Catholic-Book-week, with books loaned by State Library, Catholic Parish, and by our books. These books and posters were on display for two weeks.

Sanborn Seminary Art Class work done by students. Forty-five pictures were exhibited for two weeks—a fine showing of talent.

Posters for several holidays were made by Pollard School Students.

Girl Scout Troop, with their leader, Mrs. Fred Smith, worked at the Library on the Card Catalogue, for Reading Badges. This work was supervised by the Librarian.

The Librarian wishes to thank the Custodian of Town Hall for his fine interest in the care of the Library.

The outstanding ability of the Library Assistant, Patricia Judson, and her splendid work during the year, has made our year a better one.

**REPORT of the PLAISTOW FIRE DEPARTMENT**

---

I submit the following report for the year 1954:

There were forty-four calls answered.

Five of these were building fires; two chimney fires; two forest fires; ten calls of assistance due to hurricanes and heavy rains; the remainder were grass and brush fires.

Our fire loss was one hundred fifty thousand dollars.

We were called once out of town to assist Kingston.

In June the department answered one of the most disastrous fires in our history when approximately 50% of the Russell Heel Company burned. We were assisted at that fire by help from Haverhill, Atkinson, Newton, Hampstead, Kingston, and Danville. It was with their help and the fine cooperation of our own men that we were able to save the main plant of the company. Our department stayed on duty for 24 hours. Engine I pumped continually for 20 hours through two 2½ inch lines of 1500 feet apiece.

I wish to express my thanks to the organizations and the women who stayed through the emergency at the Russell Heel fire serving hot coffee, doughnuts and sandwiches, and also to Mr. Carl Raders who stayed by with First Aid equipment.

**REPORT of the PLAISTOW BOARD of HEALTH**

---

During the past year, December 31, 1953 to December 31, 1954 there have been several complaints; 10 in number; which have required investigation. These have been sanitary nuisances, public health problems.

It has been my duty to report the following cases of contagious and infectious diseases to the State Department of Health, as follows: Chicken Pox, 7; Dog bite, 9 German Measles, 3; Mumps, 9; Measles, 11; Tuberculosis, 2; Tinea Capitis, 12; and Whooping cough, 3. We have been fortunate that there has not been an outbreak of any serious type. A suspicious case of Anterior Poliomyelitis was reported by the Mother but I am yet wait-

ing for a report from the Doctor involved, therefore this case was not directly reported to Concord but I did make contact with the State Department relative to this case. It is therefore requested that any Doctor or Householder, knowing of any case of a reportable disease, get in touch with the Board of Health of this town, reporting name, age, sex and residence of such a case.

The Board of Health of this Town has requested that none but written signed complaints relative to nuisances; or requests for information can be accepted for investigation according to the revised Laws.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March 1955, at six o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8 To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance be-

tween the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes, as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**


---

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

This, my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Plaistow, deals briefly with the following subjects: Personnel, School Building and Enrollments, the Curriculum and Teaching Aids, Health, Finances and Community Organizations.

**PERSONNEL:** The Plaistow children are fortunate to have the continued excellent leadership of Principal Robert Dolph and of other personnel who returned to their respective positions last September.

Three of the changes in the personnel for the current school year were caused by the retirement in June 1954 of Ada Longley, Hazel Witherell and Mabel Smith, after having served the Plaistow School District faithfully and effectively for 28, 32 and 33 years respectively. The large attendance of past pupils, professional associates and townspeople at the public testimonial afforded these tea-

chers at the Plaistow Town Hall May 15, 1954 certainly expressed the gratitude and great respect of their school district, town officials and citizens.

To fill vacancies caused by the above mentioned retirements and by the resignations of Barbara Bara and George Hamilton, the school board selected the following teachers: (Listed on page 92)

Assignments of teachers by grades is shown in a tabulation following this report.

Miss Gwendolyn Curtis continues her excellent work as school nurse in the Plaistow, Newton, Atkinson and Hampstead school districts.

To replace Mrs. Grillo as a Music Supervisor in Plaistow, Atkinson, Hampstead and Newton the school boards of these districts employed Kenneth Jewett of Kingston, N. H. Mr. Jewett formerly directed programs in Art and Music in the Hillsboro and Hopkinton, N. H. Supervisory Unions. He attended the New England Conservatory of Music, The Cambridge School of Art, Boston University and the University of New Hampshire.

All teachers continue membership in their local, state and national professional teachers organizations. They are constantly attempting to improve their knowledge of the most up-to-date teaching methods and philosophies by attending conferences, teachers meetings, conventions, by reading current literature pertaining to their work and by attending special courses when possible. Four are now taking a course in the Teaching of Reading in Salem under the auspices of the Keene Teachers College and three others are currently taking other courses.

George Peabody with the assistance of Wayne Mercer continues as school custodian.

All personnel continues to exert every possible effort for the improvement of our educational program.

For the 1955-56 school year, it appears advisable to employ an additional teacher and to utilize the last classroom in the old part of the building which has not been used since the opening of the new addition in 1953 except as an extra room for such purposes as audio-visual use. The school board has included money in the budget for

an additional teacher and a set of movable furniture for that classroom for next year.

**SCHOOL BUILDING AND ENROLLMENT:** The new four room addition which was first used in the spring of 1953 has been used to capacity. Your school board has continued with its program of maintaining and improving the physical condition of the school property. Some of the major improvements during the past year have consisted of hot-topping around the new addition, grading and leveling the school yard, and interior painting. A sink has been installed in the eighth grade classroom to provide for science demonstrations and a new cabinet sink was provided for home economics.

The 1954 census of all children from birth to 19 years of age indicates that the total school enrollment will continue to increase for the next few years. The present number of 190 children in the five age groups 9-13, as compared to 250 in the five age groups 1-5 shows a total increase of 60 children that will increase our total enrollment to approximately 400 in the near future. This does not allow for additional numbers that may move into the community in that time. As new homes are occupied, considering that new homes are likely to have more pre-school and school age children, more school facilities will be needed in Plaistow within a short time.

Transportation of children has continued very satisfactorily under the present contract with Ellsworth Reed of Plaistow.

**THE CURRICULUM AND TEACHING AIDS:** Natalie Hopkins, our Elementary Consultant has clearly stated the following comments in regard to tests, individualized instruction, books and special activities: "The aim of elementary schools today—to make sure that each child develops his capacities to the fullest extent so that he will develop into the best possible citizen of tomorrow—is the objective of our teachers and is being achieved.

Upon entering the Pollard School, you will find big, little, fat, thin, serious and playful children. Children are not only different from each other in appearance but they vary greatly in mental ability and learning rate, in subjects which attract their interest and in the effort

they will put forth. No single design will fit every child and neither will one teaching program.

To help the teachers better understand the children and individualize their instruction, achievement tests were given to all children, except first graders in November. Strengths and weaknesses of the pupils' academic skills in reading, language, arithmetic, science, spelling, geography and history are shown in this type test..

To further understand the pupil, mental maturity tests are given. The results of this test helps us to determine whether or not a child is working up to capacity.

Once this information has been established a program for meeting the needs of each child is developed; our teachers are carrying out this program well.

New text books are many and varied this year. Greatly needed reading books to supplement the basic readers are finding their way into the hands of the children as finances permit. The local town library cooperates to every possible extent in providing miscellaneous types of reading books for the Plaistow children.

It is important to have a variety of books in order to meet the interest and reading levels of all children. It must be understood that there may be in one classroom children who read above or below the actual grade placement from one to five years.

We do not have as large classroom libraries as is desirable but the Bookmobile from the State Library helps to supplement our offerings.

Varied activities such as field trips, films and creative activities are carried on in the classroom. These activities are not taking the place of drill on the skill subjects but are in addition to drill so that learning may be more meaningful."

The funds allotted for books and supplies during recent years have continued to provide for great improvements in this area and the Plaistow children now have the advantages of some of the most recent and excellent books that can be purchased. In addition to increasing numbers of books because of increased numbers of pupils, we are securing the latest edition of our basic reading series and

have replaced old editions of singing books for grade 5, social studies textbooks for grade 6, health and physical development books for grade 4, have purchased new readers for grades 3 and 7, number books for grade 1, miscellaneous supplementary readers at all age and interest levels, as well as various other basic texts to increase the numbers necessary in each grade. Teachers continue to make effective use of the movie projector, the filmstrip projector and other teaching aids as the needs arise.

**HEALTH:** Under the supervision and direction of Miss Curtis, the school children of Plaistow receive health services as follows: Medical examinations by Dr. Peter Wheeler of Plaistow for grades 1, 4 and 8; vision, hearing and color perception tests; pre-school immunization clinic; home visits; health movies and talks.

The teachers show excellent cooperation in directing and supervising playground activities.

The Federally aided school lunch program, operating under the direction of Mrs. Mildred Libby, adds much to the welfare of the children. This program continues to offer a complete meal to over 200 of the 338 pupils in Plaistow at a weekly cost of \$1.25 per pupil. Government contributions of five cents per pupil per meal, totaling \$793.65 for the 1953-54 school year, and of large

amounts of various foods, makes this complete meal possible at such a low price. Foods received from the Federal Government at a cost to the program of only handling charges, have consisted of butter, canned vegetables and fruits, canned and frozen beef, cheese, fruit juice, shortening and salad oil. The financial value of these foods during the past year is estimated at \$2,135.00.

**FINANCES:** The American Association of School Administrators has stated that "school support in each community is geared quite directly to popular demand and usually will be obtained in adequate measure only when the public has had a legitimate share in formulating the program, determining its cost, and planning the way to finance it. If the public is given the facts, there is little reason to fear any lack of support for good schools, financially or otherwise. But it is the people's choice; they alone will decide."

Present indications of possible action by the 1955 State Legislature point toward the probability of increased state financial assistance for Plaistow in the future.

**COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS:** The Pollard school children and faculty are fortunate to have such continued excellent support by the Plaistow Parent Teacher Association and the Lions Club. The P.T.A., in addition to providing excellent programs for the continued and improved understanding of the school program, has successfully carried on such projects as the summer playground and donations of playground equipment and supplies. The Lions Club has made possible the provision of several pairs of glasses and tonsillectomies to children when needed.

Again I wish to thank the members of the School Board, the faculty and all others who have helped to make our work enjoyable and successful.
