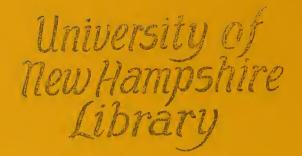

TOWN OF STRATFORD

To the inhabitants of the Town of Stratford, in the County of Coos in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of North Stratford, on Tuesday the Eighth Day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects: Article No.

AITHCIE INU.

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise and appropriate money for same. If not, to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 2. To elect two auditors for the ensuing year or see if the Town will vote to petition the State Office of Revenue Administration to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting or to authorize the Selectmen to hire a private auditing firm of accountants to audit the Town Books and to make an appropriation to cover the cost of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law, not elected by Non-Partisan Ballot.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in order to defray the expenses of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to help defray the expenses of the Town nurse.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money (\$503.50) in support of the White Mountains Region Association.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$375.00 for operating expenses of Ambulance District A-1.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise as a contribution for the support of services of Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service, Inc.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$729.00 for the support of the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue a Quit Claim Deed to the State of New Hampshire for an additional parcel of property measuring 150' x 250' located adjacent to the Connecticut River near the Maidstone Bridge, for purposes of a public boat launching area.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Curfew Ordinance, whereby a youngster 16 years of age or younger be off the streets by 9:00 P.M. unless accompanied by a parent or legal guardian, effective April 1, 1977.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to impose a penalty of \$10.00 on the parent or legal guardian if a youngster is found in violation of the Curfew Ordinance, effective April 1, 1977.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money \$532.00 in support of services from the North Country Council, Inc.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and expend a sum of money (\$154,302.00) for the demolition of the so-called "granary" and construction of a municipal building as funded through the Local Public Works Employment Act of 1976.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,744.00 to ABC Rubbish, Inc. for the use of the sanitary landfill located in Norton, Vermont, or to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for support of the Town Dump.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to offer to the highest bidder and convey a Deed for land and buildings at Stratford Hollow known as the Laura Johnson Library Building.
- 17. To see what action the Town wishes to take with the sum of money derived from the sale of the Laura Johnson Library Building.
- 18. To see what action the Town wishes to take in granting water privileges for the use of the Town Well at Stratford Hollow.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept any federal or state funds as might be available during the year.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to lower the Elderly Exemption Age from 68 years to 65 years.
- 21. To see what action the Town wishes to take in reference to a "Dog Ordinance."

- 22. To see what action the Town wishes to tale in reference to the delinquent water rent.
- 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the account indicated; and, to further authorize the Selectmen to make prorata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:
 - A. Police Cruiser\$4,600.00B. Cemetery Fence\$1,000.00C. Office Equipment\$3,000.00
 - D. Sewerage Treatment Project (Town Share) \$1,113.00
 - E. Water Pump, Equip. & Installation \$ 809.00
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 204-A of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and the provision of Section 8 of the U.S. Housing Act of 1937, as amended.
- 25. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital to help defray the cost of extra Staff and Stand-By pay for others.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Anti-Recession Fiscal Assistance Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 (Title II) for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Summer and Winter Maintenance \$301.

- 27. To hear reports of Agents, Officers and Committees hereto-fore chosen and take action on same.
- 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 29. To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot the following Town Officers:
 - A. Town Clerk-One Year
 - B. Selectman for ensuing three years
 - C. Selectman—One Year
 - B. Town Treasurer-One Year
 - E. Trustee of Trust Funds for ensuing three years

2. Approach the Planning Board for consideration of the parcel.

3. Planning Board considers request. If approved, maps will be signed. A letter, if necessary will follow approval. If denied, the applicant may appeal the Planning Board's decision.

Report of District Fire Chief and Town Forest Fire Warden

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three-year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

Last year the Agency provided services to 28 Stratford people for a total of 162 direct service hours on either an out-patient or hospitalized basis. In addition, consultation and testing were provided to the schools to assist them in designing suitable academic programs for individual students.

Starting January of this year, we have been mandated to provide a 24-hour-7 days a week Emergency Service. There are no special funds provided for this service.

As in the past, we are asking the towns to help us in maintaining these essential services within our local area.

Town Report for 1976 From North Country Council, Inc.

The Council provided a significant amount of technical assistance in helping the town prepare its successful application for \$154,300 for a Fire Station/Town Hall under the Local Public Works Act. The Economic Development Administration approved the application in December, 1976. Proposed activities consisted of demolition of a town-owner garage located on "the common" in North Stratford and construction of a combined fire station and town office facility. The Council met with local officials on five occasions.

The Council will continue to provide necessary information and assistance in order to help the town to successfully implement the project. The Council has identified the improvements of Beecher Falls rail line as a top priority and will be assisting the N.H. Public Utilities Commission in preparing an application for federal Economic Development Administration funds.

During 1976, the Council provided technical assistance and information to member municipalities on local planning matters such as subdivision regulations, zoning, Comprehensive Plan, and mobile homes. The Council assisted numerous communities in preparing applications for assistance of a developmental nature.

In helping communities with their planning, the Council attends approximately 200 night meetings a year.

The Council prepared a report entitled "Model Subdivision Regulations," as a guide for local planning boards. A series of four lectures on planning board activities was sponsored in the spring; the Council co-sponsored a series of five municipal law lectures in September and October. Both were well attended. "Guidelines for Municipal Tax Mapping" provides communities with information on the preparation of a tax map.

The North Country Council, Inc. completed the Overall Economic Development Program, a blueprint for increasing the region's economic potential. Steps were taken toward implementation as the Council assisted several communities in making progress with the development of their Industrial Parks. With the passage of the Local Public Works Act in 1976, the Council provided some form of technical assistance to 26 potential grant applicants. The Council progressed with its work on the land use and housing programs. **Planning News**, the Council's quarterly newsletter, disseminates useful information on community planning, economic development, state legislation, court decisions, and general activities to interested persons in towns.

In 1977, the Council will continue to provide community planning services to member municipalities. The Council will complete work on a Land Use Program and Housing Program. Efforts to help communities augment their economic base will continue. The Council sincerely appreciates and thanks the town for its support and participation.

Superintendent's Report

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Our efforts during the past two years to develop programs to meet the individual needs of children who require special help is functioning very well. At the same time we have spent a great deal of time and effort to strengthen our basic language arts and math programs.

The staff has developed an integrated curriculum for grades one through twelve in reading and language arts skills. Students benefit from an organized, sequential reading program and a sound foundation in basic skills. The elementary staff prepared a sequential curriculum guide in math from the Readiness Program through grade six. The emphasis is on basic skills and the preparation of students for secondary school. The large sixth grade (38) this year was organized with a team teaching approach using one teacher and an aide.

At the junior high level, a functional program of studies has been implemented to assist students who might become potential dropouts. Emphasis is given in those areas that demand basic competence for an individual to function effectively in society. Individualized instruction plays a major role in this program under the supervision of Mr. Morgan who helped develop the program.

The ESEA Title I program, for the eduationally disadvantaged, has been expanded and involves the work of a teacher and two aides.

The staff, administration, and the school board have made a real effort to see that the school better meets the needs of all its students. Recent test results show that progress is being made in raising the levels of achievement, particularly at the lower grade levels. The continued emphasis on curriculum development and good basic skills should improve scores at the intermediate and secondary levels.

Stratford students are participating in the joint Building Trades Program with Groveton and they are working on their second house. All of you are invited to visit the site and share in the pride demonstrated by the students working on the construction.

When the Area Vocational Center opens in Colebrook many more of our students should have an opportunity to participate in vocational training.

We believe that our efforts have been successful in raising the general standards of behavior of our student body and we intend to continually work to help them recognize their responsibilities and to respect the rights and property of others.

A report of the Experimental Schools Project can be found in the separate report by Dr. Peters, the Director. The project will be in its final year during 1977-78.

Visit your school, talk with the staff and see the programs in operation.

Once again, I extend my thanks and appreciation to the school board, the staff, the students and the citizens of Stratford for your cooperation and support during the year.

Federal Aid to Education

During the past year, the Stratford School District received direct aid from seven different federal programs. The largest of these was Title I. You received a total of \$18,306.69 (\$2,805.85 from Vermont funds). These funds were used to pay the wages and benefits for one teacher and one teacher aide as well as to provide monies for the Summer Recreation Program. In addition, Title I funds were used to purchase materials (\$1,363.76) and provide field trips (\$1,929.00).

Three other programs provided smaller amounts of money for materials and equipment. Title II provided \$473.39 for library materials, Vocational Education provided \$1,470.97 for Home Economics, and NDEA-III provided \$77.25 for general equipment.

In addition to these, we received the services of a Guidance Counselor through the Job Opportunity Program. The Community Action Program provided aides for the summer program.

Another important source of revenue from the federal government is its support of the Lunch Program. Last year Stratford received \$17,707.16.

Career/Vocational Education

During the course of 1976, Kindergarten through grade 6 and grades 7-12 teachers were involved in program development. By September 1976, K-6 students were being exposed to prepared lessons and purchased materials, as well as taking field trips, having guest speakers visit classrooms, and learning more about diverse careers and jobs. At the grades 7-12 level, lessons are being developed in specific career cluster areas: Communications and Media, the Environment, and Manufacturing, and implemented in classrooms.

In September, teachers received updated copies of the CAREER EDUCATION TEACHER RESOURCE GUIDE (containing lessons and lists of materials and community resource people).

Instructional materials resource rooms have been established at the Groveton Elementary School and the Stratford School. Purchased materials have been made readily available for pupil/teacher use.

Mini courses offered to secondary school students included:

Building Trades	Health Occupations
Cake Decorating	Gun Safety and Usage
Fly Tying	Small Engine Repair

During the course of 1976, approximately 241 K-6 and 197 grades 7-12 students were involved in project sponsored field trips. Approximately, 45 students were placed at area worksites during the course of the year. N.H. State Labor Department personnel have toured and inspected worksites, and have granted approval for student placement.

Language Arts

The Scott Foresman leveled reading program is in use in all Union 58 elementary schools. During the course of 1976, ESP staff members have visited classrooms and observed the use of Scott Forsman materials with students.

In the Fall of 1976, ESP purchased supplemental Scott Foresman materials and teachers were introduced to these materials at workshops.

The Groveton Elementary School has developed a grades 1-6 language arts skills list. Other schools in the union are also working on similar lists, the purpose of a skills list is to identify those basic language skills needed to be mastered by students, so that they can progress smoothly from grade to grade and develop skills related to oral and printed communication.

ESP has sponsored remedial reading for selected students in grades 7-9 at Groveton High School and Stratford High School. In the Fall of 1976, ESP also sponsored a communications skills mini course at Groveton High School. A similar course will be offered at Stratford in early 1977. In 1976, a total of 66 students were enrolled in remedial reading, and eight students enrolled in the communication skills mini course at Groveton High School.

Kid's Corner and Bits and Pieces were published. Students contributed original stories, poems and puzzles and shared their talents with others in the Union.

Environmental/Outdoor Education

In 1976, there was a transition of responsibility for weekend day trips and overnight camping trips from the ESP project to the high schools. In the Spring, ESP sponsored weekend activities, and in the Fall of 1976, outing clubs were organized at the building level. Ms. Shireen Lefebvre was the outing club advisor/leader at Groveton High School and Mr. Donald Wiedenheft was the club advisor/leader at the Stratford School. A total of 31 students (grades 7-12) were involved in the weekend outings.

Elementary teachers (K-6) have developed and implemented EE lessons. Beginning in the Fall, secondary teachers (7-12) have been developing environmental education lessons. Implementation will follow.

Two EE outdoor lab sites have been acquired for student/ teacher use, one in Groveton (Fisk Pasture) and one in Stratford (Greg McDonald's pasture land). These sites provide opportunities for student EE research projects outside the classroom.

In September, 1976, teachers were given updated copies of the Environmental Education Teacher Resource Guide (containing lessons and lists of materials and community resource people).

Level I Evaluation

During the course of 1976, the local ESP project was involved with the design and implementation of two short term research projects as part of its research responsibilities.

Two reports were developed and centered around The U'ilization of Natural, Social, and Human Community Resources in the Process of Student Career Awareness Development and A Process for Affecting Students Career Maturity Development in a Rural Schools System. In April, 1976, the student career awareness development study was presented to the membership of the American Education Research Association (AERA) membership in San Francisco.
