### Commissioners' Report.

To the Citizens of Sullivan County: The Commissioners of Sullivan County present their Annual Report for the fiscal year, ending April 30, 1887, together with the reports of such other County officials as the Statutes of New Hampshire require:

#### COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

Mr. Martin A. Herrick, Superintendent, and Mrs. Herrick, Matron, have had charge of this institution for the last two years, and, so far as we are able to judge, have filled their difficult positions with credit to themselves, profitably to the County, and beneficently to the inmates. They now enter upon the duties of their third year.

#### COURT HOUSE AND TOWN HALL.

The Court House and Town Hall, which was being constructed at date of our last report, was completed in season for holding the Courts last September, at a cost to the County of thirteen thousand, four dollars and one cent, \$13,004.01), besides the debris of the former one, destroyed by fire, the Town of Newport paying an equal amount; total cost to County and Town, twenty-six thousand, eight dollars and two cents (\$26,008.02). It is a plain,

substantial structure, and reflects no little credit upon both designer and builder, and, so far as we know, is well adapted to the purposes for which it was constructed.

#### FINANCIAL CONDITION.

On account of lack of appropriations to complete and furnish the Court House, and meet current expenses, we thought best to call a convention of the Representatives of the several towns of the County in June last, to supply the deficiency, amounting to something like five thousand dollars. The convention met, and raised the desired amount. Mr. Weed, the Treasurer, was able to effect a loan with the Citizens' National Bank of Newport for the amount, at four per cent. per annum, for a short time, which amount is included in his Warrant upon the several towns of the County, to be paid into the Treasury the first of September next.

Again, some time in March last, on account of unusual expenses, caused in part by the law passed at the last session of the Legislature relating to honorably discharged soldiers and dependents, and partly to the large expense of repairing and re-copying records of Register of Deeds office, the Treasury became nearly depleted. The Treasurer, agreeably to Chapter 26, Section 8, General Laws, borrowed five thousand dollars of some parties in Boston, on eighteen months, at four per cent. per annum, about three thousand dollars of which remains in the Treasury, most of which will be needed before the first of September next. The payment of the last named sum of five thousand dollars will have to be provided for by the County Convention, soon to meet, as the note becomes due sometime in September, 1888.

The Convention was called to order by the Chairman, and, after hearing a report by the Commissioners, on motion of Mr. Bowers, voted to raise the sum of fifteen hundred and eighty-two dollars (\$1,582.00), to complete the Court House and Town Hall.

On motion of Mr. Hall, voted to raise the sum of nine hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$965.00) to furnish the Court House and County offices.

On motion of Mr. Bowers, voted that the County raise the sum of two thousand, two hundred and twenty dollars (\$2,220.00), in addition to the amount voted in Convention at Concord, July 29, 1885, for current expenses of the County for the year 1887.

Voted to adjourn.

### Physician's Report.

To the Honorable County Commissioners of Sullivan County:

The undersigned physician in attendance upon the inmates of the County Farm presents the following report:

The health of the inmates resident there for some time has been good; no contagious diseases have occurred, except a slight attack of scabies among some children. Prompt and pains-taking attention was given, and it was soon alleviated and entirely eradicated without any of the others becoming infected.

The number of deaths was nine, the majority being old people, and dying from diseases incident to their age; their ages ranged from 65 to over 80. But one child died, and that from nephritis, and one still-born.

In all cases of sickness, from the slightest attack to the most severe, strict attention was given to cleanliness and hygiene, close watch was given them by those in charge, and the food was properly and carefully cooked and administered.

An unusual number of old people, and those on the brink of the grave were admitted during the year, thus increasing the amount of sickness and number of deaths; great care was given these and their sufferings mitigated as much as possible. In many of these cases complaints were raised by friends at home, claiming that poor atten-

tion was given them; whereas the fault rested on those in care beforehand, they having deprived them in a number of cases of the necessaries of life. Many of these cases on entering were pitiable-looking objects, and needed a large amount of patience and perseverance to make them look even semi-decent. More of such cases were added this year than in any other previous year of my attendance.

The halls, wards, and clothing of inmates and beds have been carefully kept clean, and great care is given to the frequent use of baths.

The introduction of steam has added greatly to the comfort, making an even temperature everywhere.

The insane are in good condition, and every comfort possible is given them.

There were three births during the year—two living and one still-born. The mothers in all the cases had all the necessary attention, and made good recoveries.

In submitting my annual report as Chaplain of the Sullivan County Alms House, would like to say that thirty-one services have been held there during the past year.

It has been my aim throughout to give a plain, evangelical view of the sublime doctrines of the Gospel, to make Christ prominent as the Great Redeemer of fallen man, the Author of eternal salvation. To present him as the consoler of mankind, and as the only one upon whom to rest the imperishable spirit for eternal life in the world to come.

We believe the inmates have enjoyed the services of the Sabbath, and that they have been made better by them.

We have also introduced on two or three occasions a "Service of Song," with good results. There being no musical instrument there it makes the singing part of the service rather idifficult, though greatly enjoyed by those present. We would, therefore, recommend the introduction of some kind of a musical instrument to be used at the Sunday services, it being well known that ""music has wonderful charm to soothe" and calm the troubled mind; "it would also help the preacher, like a battery planted to protect and encourage the soldier to advance.

In retiring from this position it seems only just that we should extend our sincere thanks to the Superintendent and his wife, for the assistance given, in not only making my Sunday visits pleasant, but in doing all they could to lighten the labor and burden, and earing for the body. We think them the right people in the right place.
