TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.

Article 2. To see what action the town will take upon the budget submitted by the budget committee.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of moneys as may be necessary to defray the following town charges for the ensuing year:

- a. Town officers' salaries.
- b. Town officers' expenses.
- c. Election and registration.
- d. Expenses of Town Hall and other buildings.
- e. Parks and playgrounds.
- f. Legal fees, scales and misc.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal and sanding.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for oiling and general maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$352.46 for same, to which the State will contribute \$1,409.84 if appropriated.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a rubber tired tractor with front end loader, and mowing machine attachments.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell the Cletrac tractor.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a hard surfaced road namely Richmond Road from a point off High street to the top of Fife Hill, a distance of about six tenths of a mile.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to prepare to oil South Street from where it ends now to the Lampinen Farm.

Article 11. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor and old age assistance.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation and maintenance of three additional street lights on East Hill between the residences of Harland Mitchell and Rodolph Letourneau.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation of a few street lights on the Marlboro Road from the residence near Andrew Crown's to the residence of Fred Patria.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Fire Department.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Police Department.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the water system.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to pay water bonds at maturity and \$225.00 interest.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,099.20 in conjunction with other towns of Cheshire County and the City of Keene, in support of the Elliot Community hospital, the figure named pro-rated on the number of days treatment administered by the hospital to residents of Troy for the year 1949, or act in any way relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to have the members of the budget committee elected, with the exception of the moderator, one selectman and one member of the school committee, or act in any way relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the town dump.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of shade trees.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the continuation of the White Pine Blister Rust Control Program underway in town, in cooperation with the State Forestry Commission, or act in any way relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion the use of the Town Hall one night each month without charge.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the support of the Public Library.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$164.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 33. To hear the reports of agents, officers, or committees heretofore chosen. and take any action relating thereto.

During the summer of 1949, an attempt was made to develop a summer program for the boys and girls of Troy. In this initial undertaking, the land and water known as Sand Dam was used with permission of the Troy Blanket Mills.

A considerable amount of equipment was obtained for use such as: two volley ball nets and balls, several rubber play balls for use on land and in the water, a diving board, two steel slides one of which permitted the child to slide into the water and the other allowed the child to slide into a sandy base, three sets of rubber quoits, a football, softball and basketball equipment, three pairs of swim fins, swings, and a small steel ladder for climbing.

A bathhouse was built with a section for boys and one for girls. Toilet facilities were also made available. Still further, a well which provided good drinking water was constructed a short distance away.

The services of two of the local school teachers were obtained in the morning so that proper supervision could be given the younger set while the older children took part in other activities. A senior life guard and a water safety instructor were on hand at all times so that further activities could be presented properly.

A section of the beach was roped off for the non-swimmers.

The number of children who reported depended to a large extent upon the weather, however, the number who made use of the playground reached one hundred and thirty on some days but averaged about sixty per day for July and August.

Thirty-one children received cards which certified them as "Beginners" in swimming. Eleven more took the "Intermediate" tests. Classes were also held in Junior Life Saving.

It is hoped that another year might bring forth more equipment in the form of jungle gyms, swings, and see-saws, and even greater interest on the part of the children.

During the month of August, seventeen local boy scouts spent a week camping on the upper part of Sand Dam and based their activities on our program.

Business organizations and individuals too numerous to mention contributed valuable materials and services toward the success of the playground and to all of them, the committee wishes to express its sincere thanks for without their cooperation the summer playground could not have been so successful.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Troy qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1950, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equilization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand two hundred (\$4,200) dollars for the tuition and transportation of the Freshman class of 1950 to Keene High School.

10. To see what sum of money, not to exceed 5% of the assessed valuation of the district, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing and equipping an addition to the present elementary-high school building, said building to include classrooms, a basement cafeteria and other facilities, and for necessary alterations to the present elementary-high school building; and for this purpose to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of and on the credit of the district, under and in accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Bonds statute, as amended, and of chapter 55 of the 1949 session laws of New Hampshire; and to see if the district will vote to delegate to the School Board authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal and interest of said bonds or notes, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each bond or note, and to sell the bonds or notes, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary and advisable.

11. To see if the district will appoint a building committee of three to work in conjunction with the School Board in determining the construction authorized in article No. 10.

12. To see whether the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600) for plans and specifications for an addition and alteration to the present elementary-high school building.

13. To see if the District will vote its approval of the transportation of school children in the north part of Troy, starting from a point $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the school, on the Marlboro Road.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Each year after the health examinations have been completed, parents are informed of the health problems of their children. Normal vision and hearing are essential for successful school work; yet only about one third of the cases reported receive treatment. New Hampshire has the worst dental record in The United States. Out of 70 children needing dental work in Troy, only 19 received it. Parents in Troy should remember the farmers saying, "You can't make a good hen out of a poor pullet."

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my fourth report as headmaster of the Troy High School.

At the present time the facilities of our high school are being strained. The various courses which are offered seem to be popular enough but there is increasingly more evidence to show that something must be done in the near future to alleviate the crowded conditions which are presenting themselves.

In our present condition, we can accommodate the classes for one and possibly two years more. However, in three years we shall have more pupils than there are seats available. Something will have to be done.

There seems to be several alternatives which should be given very careful consideration:

1. The attic space could be utilized but this seems to present obstacles as it entails a third floor in the present building which would necessitate fire escapes.

2. An addition to the back of the present school building would give ample space for the increased enrollment.

3. The entire high school enrollment could be sent to the Keene High School.

4. The two upper classes could be sent to the Keene High School.

5. An area or consolidated school could be constructed with Troy assuming a proportional share of the cost.

6. Upon the completion of the present school year, the eighth grade graduates could be enrolled as freshmen at the Keene High School. In the following year, the present seventh grade could be sent and then the sixth grade. This practice would continue until all high school classes were attending the Keene High School.

7. A double session could be inaugurated whereby grades one through six would continue as usual. Grades ten through twelve would attend in the morning and grades seven through nine would attend in the afternoon.

My only suggestion during these deliberations is to remind the citizens that the school exists primarily for the children and we as adults are apt to forget this. The child spends his whole day working, playing, and living in the school building. Practically his whole life is centered about his school. Your decision should be in the interests of the pupils and the community in which they will become the leaders of tomorrow.

The following reports are from the Teachers who instruct your children. They should be carefully considered.

Grade One

Emphasis in the first grade should be upon the following objectives:

1. Health
2. Wise use of leisure
3. The fundamental school skills (reading, writing, and arithmetic)
4. Good citizenship
5. Moral character training

Grade Two

The Main objective in the second grade is to teach the greatest possible numbers of pupils the pleasure of reading. There must be confidence in attacking new words and understanding of easy material. If these two skills are achieved in a friendly, happy class room, the desire to read will come naturally.

RUTH GRAY.

Grade Three

Conference with the individual child has an important place among the means of evaluating learning. It may be necessary to have a child "think aloud" to disclose methods of work not revealed by observation alone, and to give help ac-

cordingly. It may be necessary to study some attitude which is interfering with the child's progress and to offer the sympathetic guidance needed by him alone.

The above may be applied to all subjects in the third grade.

Grade Four

The curriculum of the fourth grade is a series of guided learning experiences in which arithmetic, spelling, geography, history, reading, and other subjects are used to advance the pupils skill in problem solving, and their use of geographic principles; to add to their knowledge of their social heritage; to give them understanding of other peoples of the world; and to make better each child's daily living in his relationships with his home, school, and community.

Grade Five

The development and improvement of habits, skills, attitudes, and knowledges essential to effective study in the various school subjects.

Grade Six

One of our main objectives is to carry on a well balanced reading program by which each boy and girl may develop a better understanding of everyday living and future leadership.

English

In our English classes we seek to develop the use of correct oral and written English, an appreciation and understanding of peoples and places through a knowledge of the various types of literature, both classical and modern, and to enable students to select worthwhile magazines, newspapers, radio programs and movies to enrich their daily lives.

JANET C. JOSLIN.

Social Studies

The Department of Social Studies attempts to point out the problems which are set forth by our national and community life and through a study of other nations, as well as our own, to arrive at possible and practical solution to those problems.

The term "government" is important to us inasmuch as we study the various organizations from local, through state and federal to the United Nations. The object of our study is to determine: (1) which are the characteristics of the various organizations that work for the good of the people, and (2) which are the characteristics which must be classed as falling short of democratic principles. Having thus classified the many aspects of government, we attempt to strengthen those which most closely and clearly adhere to our democratic principles and to suggest possible solutions for those that may be included in the second classification.

By instilling in the students an interest in present-day problems and a realization of the important role which each individual will play in their solution, we try to prepare the students for the increasing responsibilities which a democracy affords to and demands of its citizens. The overall results should yield a better type of citizen. This is our plan, and our hope.

ROBERT W. PRATT.

Science

We attempt to acquaint the pupils with the basic principles and concepts in our scientific world so that they may better understand and utilize the various developments for better living.

The pupils gain an appreciation of science and its ways. They are exposed to the various careers opened to them in the science fields.

Mathematics

The pupils are given drills in various methods of problem-solving. Attempts are made to develop the practical values of

mathematics which are necessary in every well-managed home where planning, figuring, and measuring is done. We stress mathematics for everyday living.

Woodworking

In our shop courses, we attempt to develop manipulative skills with the various hand and machine tools. The pupils are encouraged to repair broken articles and make various new projects which may be purchased at the cost of the materials used.

C. ELMER PIERCE.

Domestic Arts

The purpose of the courses in Domestic Arts is to develop an interest in home-making activities. This includes developing ideals of cleanliness and orderliness, as well as teaching facts in the preparation and serving of meals. The sewing work is designed to teach the beginning work in sewing and care of clothing. It is also hoped to teach the girls to work together and to share responsibility.

VERA GILPATRICK.

Commerce

In the commercial department the main objective is to enable a student, who has completed the entire commercial course, to earn a living by the skills and knowledge acquired. After graduation a commercial student should be able to get a position as bookkeeper, stenographer, typist, secretary, or clerk.

Another objective of this department is to have all students master the four fundamental arithmetic processes which will be essential all through life, and to provide an understanding of sound business practices which is necessary in personal living and which makes better citizens.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Members of The School Board and Citizens of Troy:

After only five months as your superintendent of schools, it is difficult to point to any past achievements, for the time has been too short for these and it is not wise to promise too much in the future. Therefore; I will mention mostly things concerning school conditions at the present time.

I feel that the community is fortunate, in this time of teacher shortages, in having a capable, well-trained headmaster in charge of a progressive, experienced and professionally capable faculty. During the present year over two-thirds of the staff took college extension courses, something which no other town in this section of the state can match.

First steps have already been taken by the faculty toward the establishment of a guidance program for each pupil, with an individual guidance folder. This folder will have a photograph of the pupil and will contain information on marks, attitude toward work, results of intelligent, interest and aptitude tests; the health record, activities record and family data. The folder will follow the pupil from grades one to twelve and will be an important device in making school work more meaningful and useful.

A stronger emphasis is being placed on visual education and a film strip projector will be available to classroom teachers soon; with a complete library of film for use in all grades and subjects.

The school union has purchased an audiometer. This is a highly accurate and scientific machine for testing the hearing of our pupils. Action has been taken for the purchase of The Massachusetts Visual testing equipment for Union 38. This is the best known device for detecting faulty vision. Since defective hearing and eyesight is often a cause of poor school work; we feel that the purchase of this equipment will be of real benefit to our pupils.

A problem which will re-occur each year until definite action is taken to solve it; is that of adequate room for a steadily increasing enrollment. In an effort to present this problem fairly to the citizens of the community, the school board has presented round-table discussions to many town groups; and has answered all questions to the best of its ability and the facts available. The solution to the housing problem lies in the hands of the townspeople, who may make one of several choices:—

1. Build an addition to the present building.
2. Send the Freshman class of 1950 to Keene High School.
3. Be willing to have classes held in the school corridor within three years, for then no rooms will be available.

President Truman, in his State of The Union Message on Jan. 3, 1950 said, "We must take immediate steps to strengthen our educational system. In many parts of the country, young people are being handicapped for life because of a poor education. The rapidly increasing number of children, coupled with the shortage of teachers, makes this problem more critical each year."

These census figures show that in three to four years, it will be necessary to have two first grade classes and that we will have to house sixty more pupils than now enrolled. It is important to point out here that any building program, from its authorization by the townspeople to its completion, takes about three years.

SCHOOL PLANT

As a whole, the school building is in good condition and shows signs of a good repair and maintenance program. Some alterations will be necessary to provide a study hall in part of

the home economics room, so that pupils do not have to try to study in the rear of a room where regular classes are being held, as is now the condition. The custodian, Mr. West has done a capable job in keeping the building clean and warm.

HEALTH

The Union recently purchased an audiometer for determining the hearing disabilities of our pupils and action has been taken to obtain The Massachusetts Visual Testing Equipment for testing vision. Many times, poor work in school is due to poor hearing or vision. We will now be able to offer our pupils proper service in this area.

This figure indicates that 5.6% of all school time was lost due to absences. These lost days cost the community \$2,568.72; and the children lost 13 years of classroom instruction. Studies show that generally less than 2% of lost time is justifiable. Only parental cooperation can solve this problem.

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With the cooperation and help of parents, this can be raised to 98%.

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste".

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- (1) Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- (2) Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (3) Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- (4) Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
