THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the report of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and take any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class IV and V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$630.31, the State to contribute \$1,669.69.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.

- 9. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of trees.
- 11. To raise and appropriate money for town welfare, old age assistance and soldiers' aid.
- 12. To raise and appropriate money for parks and playgrounds, including band concerts.
- 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$81.93 for the White Mountain Region Association.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the benefit of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Hall and Municipal Building.
- 16. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 18. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117A of the Revised Laws relative to playing beano be adopted in town.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to trade the town highway truck on a bid basis and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of purchasing other equipment for highway purposes.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 22. To see what action the Town will vote to take in planning for the bi-centennial celebration of the Town in 1963.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to make any upward adjustments in the salaries of Town Officers who were not affected by the adjustments made at the 1960 Town Meeting.
- 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to increase the capital reserve account for the purchase of side-walk snow removal equipment.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1961 and determine the date and the percentage of same.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

CAMP RESIDENCE

The Caverhill barn fire was the major conflagration this year, but fortunately the barn has been replaced with a new one and the livestock replaced, and the house repaired.

The number of calls remains few in number, chimney and grass fires being the major cause.

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PREVENTION IS YOUR BUSINESS

Carelessness, HUMAN CARELESSNESS, causes nine out of 10 forest fires. Each year 200,000 fires burn over 30 million acres in the United States. This represents five per cent of our nation's woodlands being wasted each year. Every fire takes its toll. Floods follow; stream flow is affected; timber, buildings, grazing and wildlife are destroyed — all because MANY are CARELESS with fire in and near woodland. This can be remedied. YOU can put an end to this shameful waste; PREVENTION is YOUR business!

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First — by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second — by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD out before leaving it.

- 4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles make sure they are out use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

The financial condition of the South Main Street Water District improved during the past year. Repairs and replacements were kept extremely low and in fact lower than we might reasonably expect in any average year. We have paid the final installment on the note made by the district in September, 1956, when the present pumping station was built. The reason for paying \$300.00 on this note instead of \$250 was that we were unable to pay the full amount due in September, 1959, and \$50 had to come out of 1960 Revenue.

The care of the pump house and labor on the system should not be imposed upon any one without some compensation. The proper functioning of the system is expected at all times and yet this does require time, effort and thought on the part of some one. It might be well to consider paying one of the Commissioners, or some other person in the district, \$50 per year plus their water rent for the year or \$75 a year without free water rent. Some plan should be considered seriously at the annual meeting of the district in March.

The following is a report of the activities of the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing, for your town for the year 1960. Please have

printed in your town report.

Home visits have been made in the town on mothers, babies and preschool age children. Arrangements were made for children to attend clinics at Hanover and Littleton for diagnosis and treatment as necessary. Applications have been made to the N. H. Sight Conservation Program and glasses obtained.

The Warren and Glencliff employees at the State Sanatorium have received their Salk Vaccine shots through the cooperation of Dr. Francis Kasheta, Su-

perintendent of the State Sanatorium.

Miss Ellen Clough, veteran nurse with the N. H. Tuberculosis Association, retired as of September 1st, 1960. The work is now covered by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing. Chest clinics will continue to be held at Plymouth twice a year. Dr. Robert Kerr and Mr. Alden of the N. H. Tuberculosis Association will be in attendance, chest x-rays and examinations will be given. The Public Health Nurse will be in charge of the clinic.

This is a clinic for the public and Warren resi-

dents are welcome to attend.

We regret the closing of the Moosilaukee Medical Center leaving Warren without a resident physician. It is hoped that another doctor will soon be obtained for this much needed area.

LOCAL DEVELOPMENT AND ISSUES

The annual Town Report means a variety of things to many people. The information contained in it is of interest to most everyone who resides in the town or who owns a summer home here. Each person probably has a particular interest in some certain section of the report. Essentially, however, the report is a review of how appropriated monies were spent. Once a year we meet to review what was done with public funds and to decide what shall be done in the year ahead. One criterion of a valuable report is accuracy, and another is detail. As in past years, your Town Officers have tried to spend money as directed by the citizens of the Town. Sometimes we are called upon to make decisions where amounts of money beyond those appropriated are demanded. In these cases it is not practical to call a Town Meeting, so a decision must be made, having in mind that some people will approve the move and others will disapprove. What is reasonable then becomes the main factor in making a decision. This situation developed in relation to our tennis court. It was a relatively sudden decision which resulted in an appropriation which was not sufficient to do the work. The Town voted for the court under the article calling for an appropriation for Parks and Playgrounds. The vote called for \$750 for construction of the court, \$75 for general care of parks and playgrounds and \$150 for equipment. The actual cost of construction exceeded the total appropriation by \$253. We also paid for installation of posts for the net and also bought the net. Since the court would not be usable unless completed, we had the work completed. It is now hoped that young people and older ones will use this court to the maximum. In that way the expense can be justified.

The upper part of the common received some loam and should get more attention this Summer.

The Town Hall heating system was installed by Hartley and LaMott of Piermont. This has already proved to be convenient and clean. Fuel oil to February 1st 1961 has cost \$175.91. The extreme weather of December and January has doubtless taxed the system as much as could be expected during any winter period. The heating committee assisted the Selectmen very greatly by continuing its valuable work and advice until the system was installed and operating. We should see increased use of our Town Hall the year round.

The year witnessed the passing of Mr. Ira Herbert Morse. Mr. Morse will always be remembered for his continuing love for Warren and for his interest in local problems. The picture on the cover of the Town Report is evidence of Mr. Morse's concern for his boyhood hometown. His many kindnesses and acts of helpfulness will long remain in the hearts and minds of all who knew him. His many small personal acts of kindness and charity remain as a memorial to him.

The Town will complete payment in August on the Beech Hill road project. Next year we will be in a position to select another accelerated T. R. A. project. Within the next year we will prepare cost figures on all possible projects. The Selectmen welcome suggestions in this matter.

An increase in our Police Department appropriation is being recommended because there are definite indications that more police activity is needed. When vandalism occurs, people want immediate action and certainly we cannot ignore the fact that such acts do occur. In some surrounding towns, there is a small group of young people who feel they can go to Warren and "get away with anything." We don't want that reputation, A little police action can keep undesirable actions at a minimum. The properties of our Summer people should be checked once in a while. This should not be left entirely to the State Police.

Our tax rate was reduced in 1960 due to an increase in taxable property and to some reduced expenditures effected in the School budget. It appears now that our taxable inventory this year will be some less than last year, but there may be some upward adjustments made to partly compensate for an apparently reduced inventory.

The Selectmen were pleased that Mr. Roderick Lamothe volunteered to assume the work of Civil Defense Director. He has reorganized the staff and is prepared to carry out whatever demands the national program of civil defense requires. This work was given great attention by Dan Stowell and we are grateful for Mr. Stowell's efforts and interest in this, as well as other areas of community life.

The possibility of adding a small road maintainer to the highway department's equipment is quite fesible. If substantial savings can be made in the present department budget, the equipment could be purchased with no increase in appropriation. Such a purchase would eliminate hiring of a grader and some extra labor, but should depend to some extent upon the ability of the present highway budget to absorb most of the cost.

It is hoped that the Town will decide to elect or appoint an over-all planning committee to begin plans for the bicentennial celebration. The committee could report its progress and perhaps tentative plans at the 1962 Town Meeting, and seek further action at that time.

It is gratifying to note the continuing interest, cooperation and sense of responsibility among our Town Officers.

The elementary enrollment remains quite constant, with 93 registered in September 1960, while in 1959 there were 96 and in 1958, 99.

William Hagner was employed as principal and teacher in grades seven and eight. Warren is most fortunate to have an instructor of Mr. Hagner's ability as its administrator.

Principal Hagner is a 1959 graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, holds a B. of Ed. degree, and previously taught at Conant High School, in Jaffrey, New Hampshire.

Mr. Charles Young replaced Mr. Wright as building custodian. The best wishes of the staff go to Mr. Wright in his retirement. Mr. Young is doing a fine job as his successor.

We in America enjoy the highest standards of living and productive employment in the world. Although our people form only 6 per cent of the world's population and occupy only 7 per cent of the globe's surface, we consume 34 per cent of the world's goods and produce about 50 per cent of the world's manufactured products.

This material progress must be accompanied by moral and intellectual growth. It is a supreme function of education to see that humanistic studies and social sciences are kept abreast of technological progress so that man remains the master, rather than the slave, of the machine.

When the Russian sputniks went into orbit around the earth, a storm of apprehension rolled over our country. How did it happen that Russia should lead the way in fashioning artificial moons to course in space? The country was told that our schools were neglecting science and mathematics. As Barzun put it, "The moment a satellite appears in the sky or a rocket fails to go off . . . nothing but science and engineering seems to matter."

More, not less, math — The fact is that more boys and girls of high school age are taking mathematics and science than at any other time in the United States. A study made by the National Education Association points out that the majority of public schools offer a full program in mathematics and science, and that those lacking a major course in these subjects are small schools with small enrollments. Furthermore, leaders in school administration have been urging state legislatures to establish larger school districts for years, in order to discourage high schools too small to provide an adequate curriculum. Lack of teachers, funds, and equipment makes it impossible for small schools to offer a full program of studies.

In times of such public excitement, it is necessary for leaders of public education to maintain clarity and control in thought and action.

But as American satellites now circle the earth, and as mathematics and science take on a new popularity among our growing armies of space cadets, we can see the radical crash programs of 1958 in proper perspective. Tornadoes, cyclones and hurricanes blow themselves out. Sound principles never die, but we cannot perpetuate democratic principles without daily and uncompromising effort.

Such effort is futile without the continued interest and understanding of the layman as well as of the school administrator.

The loyalty of the teaching staff, the executive action of the school board, and the support of the community are gratefully acknowledged.

Routine vision screening tests were done on grades 1-8. Hearing tests were done in Grades 1, 4, and 8 plus new pupils in school and pupils having hearing difficulties.

Dr. Masry examined 31 pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7 on November 19, 1960. When defects were noted, referrals for correction were sent to the parents.

One pupil attended the Orthopedic Clinic at Hanover, December 18, 1959.

One pupil was examined by Dr. Hume at the Pediatric Diagnostic Clinic in Littleton, March 4, 1960, and tested by Dr. Harmes at the June 3rd Clinic in Littleton.

Because Dr. McCarthy moved away, we were unable to schedule a Fall Dental Clinic. Dr. Philip Munson of Bradford, Vermont, was able to offer three mornings (9-12) on May 18, and 25, and June 1, 1960. We were happy to have this time available and used it to the following good advantage:

29 pupils were examined; 24 pupils were treated. Treatments included 4 cleanings, 52 fillings, 25 extractions of temporary teeth, and two extractions of permanent teeth. Due to lack of time, we had to limit the Clinic to the first four grades and were unable to complete these grades. Plans are being made for a Fall clinic.

I want to express my appreciation to Mrs. Pike for arranging transportation for the dental clinic, through the P.-T. A. The following parents furnished transportation: Mrs. Dorothy Libbey, Mrs. Marjorie Shortt, Mrs. Mae Heath, Mrs. Hazel Bemis, Mrs. Avis Cushing and Mr. John Currier.

My sincere thanks to Mr. Bennett, Dr. Masry, Mr. Mawson and his staff, the parents and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in the School Health Program.
