TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Washington, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Washington on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for two years, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Auditor, Fire Chief, one member of Trust Fund Committee for three years, one member of Library Committee for three years, one member of Planning Committee for five years and any other necessary town officers.
- Article 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,410.00 and accept State Aid of \$2,820.00 for the construction of State Aid Construction highway in said town.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$484.84 and accept State Aid of \$1,939.37 for Town Road Aid in said town.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Shedd Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair and paint the Library fence.

- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
 - Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for construction of a town garage or take any action relating thereto.
 - Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for the purchase of highway equipment or take any action relating thereto.
 - Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve for a Town Hall water supply and/or kitchen facilities; or take any action relating thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to change the Capital Reserve Fund for a Town Hall water supply to a Capital Reserve Fund for a water supply and kitchen facilities.
- Article 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to withdraw all or part of the Capital Reserve Fund for a water supply and kitchen facilities, or take any action relating thereto.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a tool house at the Washington Center Cemetery, or take any action relating thereto.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town Planning Committee to replace the service honor roll with a monument to be placed in the same triangle in honor of those from Washington who served with the armed forces during World Wars I and II, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for that purpose, or take any action relating thereto.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to accept a piece of land known as the Charles A. Peasley mill lot and privilege at East Washington from the Hillsboro Fish and Game Club, with the provision that the town retain the property for the use of the general public for recreational purposes, or take any action thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be transferred to Capital Reserve to build a dament East Washington mill pond, or take any action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for band concerts.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to paint the town hall or take any action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to accept from Bernice Young Maynard a plot of land adjoining East Washington Cemetery.

Article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

These were followed by the Hillsboro Band, led by drum majorettes; children 4 to 8, children 9 to 15; costumed individuals, costumed groups; Washington Fire Department, Newport Fire Department, Washington Highway Department; floats including the Crane Farm, Washington Swimming Club, Purlingbeck Grange, Toby Jug Tearoom, Lovell Grange, Recreation Group, the "Paperhangers," the "Old Bath Tub," and the "Water Ski Girl." The last division represented Camp Morgan and included four floats and over one hundred boys and counsellors in costures and groups. As the parade passed the bandstand the judges, John Condon of Newport, Jack Reardon of Bradford, and George Boynton of Hillsboro, awarded prizes for the best float, best man, best woman, best boy and best girl. At noon a picnic lunch was held on the common.

At 4:00 P. M. the speaking program was held in the church. Frank O. Hartwell as master of ceremonies, welcomed visitors and guests, following the invocation by the Rev. Howard Burkle. Letters were received from Edwin

M. Crane, 78, of Florida, Mary Merrill Train, 89, of Massachusetts and Jennie M. Knight, 89, of New York, who could not be present. Music was provided during the program by John Newman, Mrs. Ruth Otterson and the "Old Village Choir," of young people. All the singers were garbed in old fashioned costumes. The main address was given by H. Maurice Fridlund of Tenafly, New Jersey, member of a New York law firm and summer resident of Washington.

At 5:30 more than 200 enjoyed an old fashioned Grange supper in the Town Hall. Later in the evening nearly 300 enjoyed round and square dancing in the Town Hall to the music and calls of Lawrence V. Loy, nationally known

square dance prompter.

On Sunday morning the Rev. A. A. Madsen preached the Old Home Day sermon in the Church. The program closed with a concert on the Common by the Hillsboro Band at 3:00 P. M., followed by a baseball game at Camp Morgan ball field.

During the festivities an exhibit of old photographs was on display in the schoolhouse, where 489 visitors from New Hampshire, New York, Massachusetts, North Carolina, Rhode Island, California, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, New Jersey, Vermont, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Virginia. Oklahoma and Swatow, China, registered at the desk in the same building. As many more who did not register were in attendance.

Nearly 700 four-page folders with the program and facts about Washington were mailed by the committee as invitations to friends and former residents. The Town Hall. Schoolhouse and Post Office were decorated with flags or bunting. Everyone had a part in making this celebration a success.

The Committee was responsible, in part, for many other activities during the past year. They appointed a Town Common Committee with Earl Cilley as chairman assisted by Wilfred Wheeler and James Pratt. They were to direct improvements of the common from funds appropriated by the town. A half a ton of fertilizer and lime was distributed, the common cleaned, mowed and seeded. The rail fence around the Soldiers' Monument and the town garage doors were painted. All work was done by volunteer workers. Accounts for expenditures by this group will be found in the town accounts.

With lumber from the Selectmen, funds from the School

Board, cement, pipe and paint from individuals, the labor by volunteer workers, the town well was cleaned, pumped out, a cement curb and cover constructed and a pump installed. The water was tested and found pure. This now provides a water supply for all to use and is conveniently located.

Mrs. Rodden and Mrs. Tweedy represented Washington at a Planning Conference held at the Weirs on June first.

The balance of the account of the Washington Old Home Association started in 1930 amounting to \$83.65 was turned over to the Planning Committee June 8, 1949. The report of the Treasurer follows and shows a balance of \$119.45 as of December 31st.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Washington:

Any report concerning progress in the Washington educational program during the past year must be reviewed with considerable pride at least by all those who have partici-

pated in it.

When we make out a report card or when we grade a farm product such as maple syrup, we have to have some kind of a standard to go by. Likewise when we make a report on our school program, we have to compare it to some kind of a standard. The standards for a school exist partly in the minds of the people in the community and the minds of other people who work on the school program such as the teacher, the School Board, and the superintendent. The ideas for such standards can come from seeing or hearing about other schools and from reading about the work of outstanding child development specialists who study ways to make our schools more effective.

From this we may conclude that a school will probably be no better than the standards established for it in the minds of all the people coming into contact with it, including the

boys and girls.

In Washington, the educational program merits great praises; first for the phenomenal growth it has shown in the way of getting up-to-date, and secondly because of the

excellent scholastic growth of its pupils.

The Constitution of New Hampshire reserves the right of organizing the educational program to the state. It is this way in all the states. The reason was that the purpose of education was to insure that all boys and girls would be

trained to become the best possible citizens.

A first responsibility of citizenship is to obtain and use all the knowledge needed by the citizen to fully do his job as citizen. To obtain knowledge requires ability to read. be a doctor, lawver, etc., requires much reading. Other occupations may require less reading. To many people, this requirement of learning to read, write and count was the only job expected of a school.

Then came the last war when democracy was started on trial against other ideologies of government. Since the war we have been busy discovering that many so-called intellectual people and many others not so intellectual didn't in the least understand the principles of democracy. The irony of it all is that our schools which were established solely to promote better citizenship had been so busy teaching reading, and writing for half a century that they had lost sight of their objective.

Educators have long warned that our boys and girls were not learning the meaning of democracy because they were not experiencing it in schools. A teacher behind a desk handing out assignments is strangely symbolic of a dictatorship rather than a democracy. Reading about glorious battles of the Civil War, etc., in history could not offset the dictator experiences of our pupils. Shall we at last allow pupils to learn democracy by classroom experience or shall we put it off until it's too late all over our land; is the problem confronting every citizen in our country.

PARENTS' AND TEACHERS' WORKSHOP

In November, parents and teachers from the whole area attended a workship in Henniker where they could work together to understand, learning problems of the pupils. At its conclusion, Miss Hoyt was unanimously chosen to be chairman of next year's workshop. Her deep understanding of the weaknesses and strengths of our schools coupled with her great understanding of the need of the democratic process in teaching easily made her the outstanding leader of the whole group. Many parents attended from Washington, and showed great enthusiasm for the studies of child development which were going on at the workshop.

THE LOCAL SCHOOL

Our pupils are making excellent progress in the work of the school. Parents will note that Miss Hoyt has so carefully planned the work that every pupil is learning every day. In other words she doesn't make a lesson plan for each grade but rather a lesson plan for each pupil. In certain classes, several pupils may be well able to work together on a certain project while the same group may be divided differently for another project.

The development of our pupils in democratic living is of tremendous importance in these times. Miss Hoyt is capably handling this phase of our program by committee work with the pupils in school and community affairs. This is where the co-operation of the parents has been of tremendous help. The importance of this work can not be over-emphasized, if we are to improve the democratic concept of community life.

The wonderful work of Miss Hoyt and parents who have helped, can not be fairly summarized in a report such as this. It will be thoroughly summarized however in the contributions to democratic living by these growing citizens of the community.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Our boys and girls attending high school are doing a creditable job and well deserve the interest and attention of every citizen. We have asked for continuance of the high school transportation aid. Unless a district provides sufficient transportation aid to make it possible for EVERY boy and girl to attend high school, it may well be accused of inviting a breakdown of democracy. Washington has wisely guarded its heritage of liberty by helping its boys and girls to attend high school.

THE SCHOOLHOUSE

Our important need in Washington now is renovation of the school to provide absolutely modern plumbing and heating. There is now \$2000 in the Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose. We do not seem to be certain just how much more is needed to do the job properly. The proper articles to enable the district to complete the job this year have been inserted in the school warrant.

Perhaps it would be wise to appoint a committee to work with the School Board for six or eight weeks at which time they could make exact reports to the district and the district could take appropriate action on the last articles in the warrant.

It is important to the welfare of the school that these improvements are done as soon as possible. In order that there will be no ill-will established towards the school, it may be well to have a thorough understanding of the needs and the nature of the changes to be made. If a delay of six weeks could help to promote a better understanding of the contemplated renovations, the needs of the school children would then be well served by such a study.

In any event, we are anxious for early completion of the renovations. It doesn't seem right to put it off much longer. People who ride in cars less than five years old shouldn't expect to force children in the school to put up with health facilities which were not modern, fifty years ago. We feel that nobody wants the situation to exist any longer, but are also cognizant that we need broader understanding of the problem.

Conclusion

The school year in Washington has been a most successful one. It has been a real pleasure to work with Mr. Rolfe, Mr. Fletcher and Mr. Bell, of the School Board. The work of Miss Hoyt and Mr. Jewett has been, of course, the real con-

tribution to the great progress in our school. The work of the nurse, Mrs. Griffin, has been well received as has the highly dependable transportation service of Mrs. Drew. To all of them, I offer great praise and thanks, in the hopes that we are all helping our boys and girls to become better citizens.

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fires but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the co-operation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PRE-VENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
