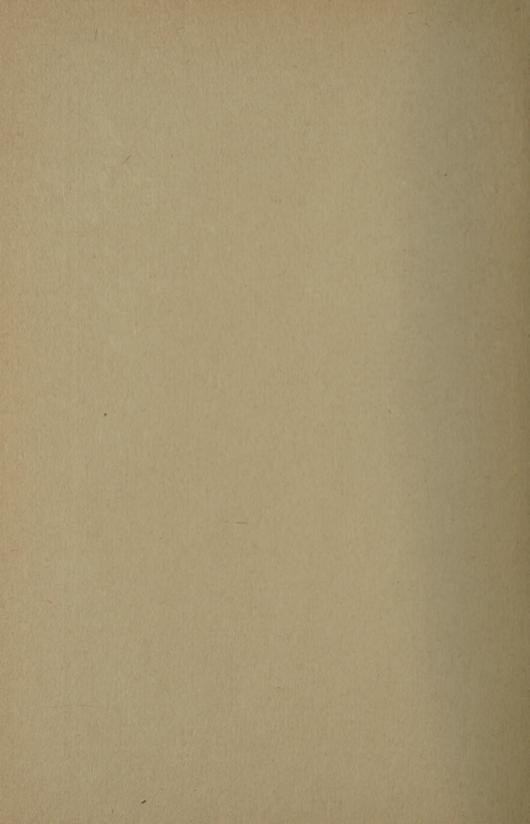

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Westmoreland in the county of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the town will vote to raise for the support of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the Revised Statutes on a section of the Monadnock road so called, and raise and appropriate or set aside from the amount raised for highway work the sum of \$250 for this purpose.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for state road maintenance and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for trunk line manitenance and raise money for the same.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to apply for state aid for trunk line construction and raise money for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$800 to gravel a certain section of the road between Westmoreland Village and East Westmoreland.

- 9. To see if the town will vote for snow removal on the main highways and raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$500 for the same.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400 for the purpose of eradicating white pine blister rust.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100 for the support of the library.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 for a publicity fund to benefit Westmoreland.
- 13. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the income from the Jothan Lord fund.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of \$100 from William J. Hall, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the Joshua Hall, Jr., burial lot in East Westmoreland cemetery.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a certain highway beginning at its intersection with the road leading past Bertha Chickering's to Christian Hollow, said highway leading past the old Winchester place to its intersection with the London road so called, near Albert Maslen's.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

Throughout the Westmoreland schools there are evidences of fine work started by Mr. English. I have tried to continue his policies while I have been getting acquainted.

TEACHERS

Westmoreland is fortunate in the quality of the teachers who are in charge of its schools. As a whole the value of their services is far above the salary received.

Following is the organization for 1925-1926.

Miss Charter was given leave of absence for 9 weeks during the winter to complete her Normal School Course at Keene. Her place was taken by a Keene Normal School Cadet.

The sad death of Mrs. Coulter in December of 1925 brought to an end the fine work she was doing in the East Westmoreland School. Mrs. Coulter's place was taken by a cadet teacher from Keene Normal School.

BUILDINGS

The building at Westmoreland Village, an excellent two room building is in fine condition. Through the efforts of the teachers money has been raised and a new sink purchased to facilitate the work of getting a noon lunch.

The Depot School is in rather poor condition. There is need of chemical toilets and more window space.

The building at the Corner needs chemical toilets and a jacketed stove.

The East Westmoreland School is in fairly good condition although in need of improved toilets. The foundation for this building was repaired during the summer.

HEALTH

A large number of pupils have lost school time this year through sickness, notably an epidemic of whooping cough at the Corner School. It has been the custom to have a medical examination of each pupil once during the year and any defects found reported to parents and teachers. This is an excellent arrangement in so far as it goes but, to my mind, is inadequate to take the best care of our children. I hope there may be some arrangement made, by joining with other towns, to have a school nurse for part of the next school year.

There are 18 children in the Westmoreland schools who have not been vaccinated or excused by a doctor. This should be attended to in the near future.

NOON LUNCHES

All the schools have been serving hot noon lunches for the children who bring their dinners to school. Canned vegetables and soups were purchased in quantity and distributed to the different buildings. These lunches have been an added burden on the teacher's time and much credit is due them. I believe something hot for the children at noon in the winter is very important and I hope the noon lunches may continue.

FINANCES

For the last few years there has been a steady increase in the number of Westmoreland pupils attending high school. This fact with a considerable increase in the tuition charge at Keene and Brattleboro has steadily increased the amount of money which must be voted at the district meeting for tuition (statutory obligation).

At the beginning of the year 1925-26 there were 24 pupils attending high school. This fact with the increase in the cost of transportation will cause a deficit for the year. This deficit should be provided for at the District Meeting.

The additional amounts necessary to spend for tuition and transportation will without doubt continue for another year and should be provided for by adopting an increased budget.

Other school costs are stable as far as they can be estimated at present.

May I say a word of appreciation for the cooperation of the teachers and the hearty support of the schools by the citizens of the town. The aid and advice of the School Board have been of great help.
