

## TOWN WARRANT

## The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Windham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town

[L. S.] Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Windham on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear the reports of Auditors, agents and other Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any votes relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Tax Collector's deed.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' salaries.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' expenses.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Election and Registration.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Dog Officer and Damage by Dogs.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Vital Statistics.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lighting.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Damages and Legal Expenses.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for Interest owed by the Town.
- 13. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriation for same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to apply for T.R.A. for Class V. roads.

15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for tar for Town roads.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate to sand Class V. roads

17. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for winter road maintenance.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to remove some of the diseased trees which are a hazard on public roads.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the Town Hall, or to take any action relating to the rent of same.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair the second floor ceiling in the Town

Hall.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of new chairs and tables for the Town Hall.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the grounds around the Town Hall, Fire House, and Library.
- 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
- 24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 25. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be matched by a like amount from the State, for fire fighting equipment.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase land for a dump, or take any action relating thereto.
- 27. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the Town Dump maintenance.
- 28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of needy persons and old age assistance.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Library maintenance.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for grading and general care of Cemeteries, and for the acquisition and maintenance of equipment.

31. To take the wishes of the voters on the following proposition, viz: Shall the election of cemetery trustees be dispensed with and all funds raised by taxation for the care and maintenance of the public cemeteries in the Town, together with the income of any funds held by the Trustees for such purposes and for perpetual care of lots in such cemeteries, be held and expended under the direction of the Selectmen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

32. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and four other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 53, Revised Law of New Hampshire 1942, as amended.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$150.00 for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

35. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

36. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the Treasurer, and if voted in the affirmative, to raise and appropriate money for the same.

37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Windham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Cemetery Committee and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

#### General Comments

### Appropriation for Town Charges:

It has been the custom in Windham for the Town Meeting to make an appropriation for "Town Charges" to cover the following expenditure items:

Town Officers' Salaries
Town Officers' Expenses
Election and Registration
Damage by Dogs
Vital Statistics
Street Lighting
Damages and Legal Expenses
Interest

Inasmuch as each of these items is a separate classification account in the town budget and the town accounting system, it is recommended in the interest of improved budgetary and accounting procedure that a separate appropriation be made for each item rather than a lump sum appropriation for "Town Charges."

### Tax Collector's Records:

The Tax Collector is to be commended for the accuracy and adequacy of the tax records.

#### Conclusion:

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Windham for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Windham, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March, 1953 at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following:

By vote of the school board, the polls for this meeting will remain open from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the School District, at the opening of the meeting may vote.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money—said sum to be placed with the trustees of trust funds to be in addition to the fund to be used for hot lunch equipment and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to erect an addition to the Center school and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 10. If the vote on the preceding article is in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to issue serial notes or bonds of the school district in an amount not exceeding \$68,000 for the purpose of defraying the cost of an addition to the Center School consisting of two classrooms and an auditorium, said notes or bonds to be prepared, issued and sold in accordance with the terms of the Municipal Bond Statute and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 11. If the vote on Article 9 is in the affirmative and on Article 10 is in the negative to see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to issue serial notes or bonds in an amount not exceeding \$30,000 for the purpose of defraying the costs of an addition to Center School consisting of two class rooms, said notes or bonds to be issued in accordance with the terms of the Municipal Bond Statute and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 12. If the vote on either of the two preceding articles is in the affirmative to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,800 to equip and operate aforesaid class rooms and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. If the district votes the addition to the Center School, to see if the district will authorize the school board to use the monies in the hands of the trustees of trust funds to install a hot lunch area and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 14. By petition: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed \$10,000 to remodel a portion of Searles Chapel, to be used as a classroom, equal to the present classroom, and install an adequate heating system for this room.
- 15. By petition: If this article is voted in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to outfit such a classroom.
- 16. By petition: To see if the District will vote to remodel a portion of Searles Chapel, to be used as a classroom, equal to the present classroom, and install an adequate heating system for this room.
- 17. By petition: If the vote on the article to remodel a portion of Searles Chapel is in the affirmative, to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to issue

serial notes or bonds of the School District in an amount not exceeding \$10,000 for the purpose of defraying the cost, said notes or bonds to be prepared, issued and sold in accordance with the terms of the Municipal Bond Statute.

18. By petition: To see if the district will vote to instruct the School Board to change the toilets at Searles School to conform with the vote of the School District meeting of 1952.

19. By petition: If this article is voted in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to take care of the added expense.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come

before said meeting.

### Enrollments

The proximity of the town to urban industrial centers has created an unusual situation in the growth of school population. In last years report the statement was made that the district would be faced with a housing problem in a year or two. Present enrollment figures indicate that the statement was correct. In 1947 an attempt was made to estimate enrollments based on Life Insurance Co. statistics which ordinarily are reliable enough to use with some degree of accuracy. The geographic location of the town and its accessibility has proved that this usually reliable source of statistical information can be in gross error. The following tables indicate how seriously in error statistics can be. In addition they reveal the seriousness of our housing problem.

In the first table the school enrollment has more than doubled and in no single year has the total enrollment decreased. The actual enrollment figures indicate, when compared with Life Insurance Co. figures, how little reliance can be placed on large scale statistics as applied to a local situation where unusual circumstances distort the general picture.

The second table indicates the trend that has had much to do with the distortion. Increase in enrollments in upper grades above the increases noted for the same group in the lower grades indicate that it is due to the mobility of our population and the accessibility of Windham to urban centers.

Using generally accepted standards of floor space for classrooms we find that the population has already reached the peak of the schools' physical facilities.

Another factor that must be considered is teacher pupil load. To teach effectively the curriculum that modern living

demands pupil load should not be in excess of 35 from Grades 4 or 5 up and optimum results are obtained if the pupil teacher ratio is nearer 1 to 30. In the primary grades where individual attention to pupil needs in every area is almost mandatory a ratio of 1 to 25 is desirable. Our present situation is as follows:

Four of the 5 teachers have pupil loads in excess of good standards. With space available an increase of 10 pupils would require two additional teachers. The figures used are as of Jan. 31 but at the peak of our enrollment we had 184 children in school which created an impossible situation with only 5 teachers. There are definite possibilities that our enrollment will increase by 10 in 1953 and 20 additional in 1954. These enrollment figures indicate why the problem of housing is so serious.

#### Instruction

There were two vacancies to fill in Windham. The district was fortunately able to secure competent professionally trained teachers, Mrs. Eunice Lacheman and Mrs. Elizabeth Smith. Again, in spite of teacher shortage, geographical location enabled the district to obtain professionally trained teachers. When so many districts faced the opening of school without teaching personnel or with temporary teachers, the fact that Windham schools were staffed by competent teachers was indeed fortunate.

The progress of pupils is enhanced when this condition prevails. Stability of a good staff can insure steady progress due to a knowledge of the children of available school and community resources, and a relationship with parents that is based on these knowledges and a mutual desire to advance the interests of the child.

Instruction by specialists in the fields of handwriting and music continues to pay good dividends. The daily work of the students is neater and more legible. The general praise for the public performances of the children in the music field is indicative of the acceptance of the work in the music department.

Text book purchases continue in two ways. The orderly replacement of subject matter field as books become obsolete or worn out is one of the methods of preparing children to cope with problems of modern living. The other method of purchase is a matter of expediency. This method takes care of increased enrollments by adding to the books already in use the required number of additional texts.

The testing program was expanded by testing in the fall as well as in the spring. The purpose of this expansion is to provide the teacher with an inventory of individual and class strengths and weaknesses. In this way methods of teaching and allotment of time can be geared to the needs of the individual and the group. By retesting in the spring, an appraisal of individual and class progress can assist in planning the work of the next year.

Any innovation such as this expansion of the testing is designed and introduced with one purpose, better and faster progress of children. They are the ones for whom the whole educational system is supported and all activities should be measured in terms of their progress.

Educational services for the children of the district should be expanded to provide guidance and physical education. A good program of guidance will pay for itself in preventing retardation and guiding boys and girls into the curriculum at high school which best fits their interests and needs. Physical education will make possible the correction of remedial defects. Anything that promotes good health in the group will be a sound investment. In the face of rising educational costs such expansion is perhaps unexpedient. If our economy and population stabilize so that long range planning can be effected, then expansion of educational services can be planned.

#### Finance

The proposed operating budget exclusive of any special articles indicates an overall increase of \$5,944.76. An analysis of the budget reveals the areas and amounts of increase.

### Auxiliary Agencies

Two items, transportation and high school tuition are responsible for practically all the increase in this area. Of the total increase of \$5,944.76, \$4,060.00 occurs in this area. Increased costs, plus the necessity of increasing the number of miles travelled occasioned the increase in this item. The increase in tuition rate for high schools plus an increase in the number of pupils attending high schools accounts for the increase in this area. Both these items are statutory and must be met. There is a small increase in health supervision, which is also statutory.

### Instruction

The next largest area of increase is in the area of instruction. The whole increase is in the area of teachers' salaries. The increased demand for teacher services with a short supply is operative in this as in any other economic area. The salaries of teachers must be comparable to similar situations if the district is to obtain and retain competent, professionally-trained teachers.

### Operation of the Plant

The only increase in this item is in the area of repairs and replacements. The increase is included to adequately light the two original rooms at the Center School.

### Administration

Small increases in all five items in this area, three of which are statutory, account for the increase in this area of \$168.91.

The tax levy for the proposed budget exclusive of articles in the warrant is \$3,696.76 more than last year's appropriation. Part of this increase is attributable to the fact that cash on hand (\$500) will not be available as income. Purchase of additional seating and other unanticipated expenditures make it impractical to estimate any cash balance.

There are several articles in the warrant that will leave policy decisions in special areas entirely up to the voters of the district. The voters then have the final decision as to the way in which the schools shall go.

There are several special articles in the warrant:

Article 8 is presenting the opportunity to continue to build a reserve fund to initiate a hot lunch program with proper equipment.

Articles 10 and 11 present alternate plans to meet our housing situation.

Article 13 permits the use of funds in conjunction with the building program, if voted, to initiate the hot lunch program earlier than planned.

It is a pleasant task to serve as superintendent of schools where all are so genuinely and sincerely concerned with the educational well being of children. I appreciate deeply the opportunity to serve under such conditions.
