Art. 9. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the installation of electric lights at the village school.

Art. 10. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to repair the foundation at the Center school.

Art. 11. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the installment of fences at the Village and East Alstead schools. Art. 12. To see if the district will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for painting the East Alstead school.

Art. 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I herewith submit my first annual report as superintendent of schools, for a period of twenty weeks.

When I entered upon my duties, I found the work exceedingly well planned and organized by former Superintendent Slade. This has been a great help to me in my work.

TEACHERS

The teachers are doing excellent work, and are eager to co-operate in every way. Two of the teachers, Miss Elizabeth Amidon, at the Village advanced school, and Mrs. Celia Metcalf, at the Center School, are serving their first year in the system.

A September enrollment of 36 pupils at East Alstead made it advisable to engage as assistant teacher. Accordingly a Keene Normal School cadet was engaged for the work. During the fall, however, several families moved away, reducing the combined enrollment of the two schools to 23. As a result, at the end of the eleventh week, it seemed no longer practicable to continue the extra room, and the two schools were combined into one.

BUILDINGS

The situation at East Alstead necessitated repairing the extra room in that building. The walls were papered, the woodwork painted, and new shades installed. In addition to the desks already there, it was necessary to secure several extra desks, as well as a section of blackboard, from the Forristall school.

A much needed addition has been built on the woodshed at the Mica Mine school. This affords plenty of room for the winter's supply of fuel. The roof at this school was shingled during the summer.

In the Village Primary room, the front window, which admitted glaring light into the faces of the pupils, has been closed by wall board.

I believe our most urgent needs to be electric lights in all the schools, chemical toilets and jacketed stoves in those schools not already supplied. The East Alstead school is in need of painting. The desks at the East Alstead and Mica Mine schools are rather badly battered. I believe it practicable to resurface and refinish these.

The grounds at the Alstead Village and East Alstead schools would be improved if they were enclosed by a fence.

The foundation stones at the Alstead Center school are rather badly heaved. It would be an economy if this were repaired during the coming year.

HEALTH

During the present school year only the minimum requirement of two weeks health supervision is alloted to Alstead. In this brief period there is time for little more than examinations of the children. There is no opportunity for follow-up work or for clinics.

The future success of our school children depends, to a great extent, on the condition of their health. The foundations for health, good or bad, are laid in childhood. It is the function of the school nurse to detect the various menaces to health, and to encourage and advise the parents in regard to their treatment. I believe it would be an advantage if the district could see fit to extend the present period by several weeks.

Through the generosity of Dr. B. R. Allison, of Alstead Center, ten dollars in prizes were offered, in May, 1928, to the pupils making the most marked improvement during the last few weeks of the school year.

A friend, who wishes to remain unknown, has offered a two dollar and fifty cent gold piece to the pupil at the Village school, who makes the most improvement in written work.

Appreciation is expressed also to the unknown friend, who, at Christmas, contributes five dollars to each of the two rooms at the Village school.

In conclusion, may I express my appreciation of the fine co-operation which I have received from the citizens, school board, and teachers of Alstead.
