COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

TO THE TAX PAYERS AND CITIZENS OF COOS COUNTY:

We herewith submit our annual report for the year ending April 30, 1888, and connected with it reports of the County Treasurer, Supt. of County Farm, Clerk of Supreme Court, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor and Physicians. The report shows the financial condition of the county as well as details of all receipts and expenditures. The expenses at the County Farm, owing largely to the excellent and prudent management of the Superintendent and wife, Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Hannaford, have decreased from \$1.34 per week to \$1.28 and in other respects expenses have slightly decreased. The County Convention appropriated the sum of one thousand dollars to enlarge the water supply and put in modern vaults at the County Farm. This has been done in the most perfect manner at a cost of only \$692.19 and the sanitary arrangements of that institution are now perfect. The court house at Lancaster has been completed, the County paying therefor the exact amount of the appropriation, \$15,000 and citizens of Lancaster contributed the balance, about \$1,600 to make up the necessary cost. It is perfect and complete in all its appointments and the people may well be proud of so nice and convenient a building. All the county buildings are in good order and condition except the county jail which is unfitted for its purpose, and as long as crime will be committed and prisoners be sent to jail, some steps ought to be taken to have the place of detention decent for occupancy.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

STEWARTSTOWN, N. H., APRIL 14, 1888.

To the Board of Commissioners of Coos County:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit my annual report of the number of deaths which have occurred in the Coos County Alms House during the past year, together with the cause in each case.

It will be observed that the majority of deaths which occurred were confined to the aged, who for some time past have been the subjects of chronic diseases.

The typhoid case was far advanced when brought to the institution and was in bad condition when admitted.

So far as the sanitary condition of the buildings is concerned, I am glad to report further progress during the year.

1. The water supply, (a matter of the highest importance in such an institution), has been increased ten fold, so that at all times, in case of fire, etc., there will always be an abundance.

2. The old-fashioned vaults in the outbuildings have been done away with and a lead-lined tank has been substituted. A large amount of water passes through his daily, carrying all refuse a suitable distance to the river.

The faultless management of the institution under Mr. and Mrs. Hannaford the efficient superintendent and matron, cannot be too highly commended. Experience and good management, the outcome of a life-long service, can be seen on every side, while their kindness towards the inmates, their consideration for the sick and feble, must, I feel confident, be ever gratefully remembered.

For their kindness to me personally, and to the board of Commissioners I beg to tender my sincere acknowledgements.

The County Convention, convened at Concord July, 1887, voted to raise \$30,000 per year for the next two years as a county tax, to be applied on the ordinary expenses of the county, and toward the payment of a county debt. It was also voted to expend of this amount \$1000 to restore the Probate Records, and a sum not to exceed \$1000 for sanitary improvements at the County Farm.
