SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Goshen:

In all my experience in school never have I seen school start better than this year. This not only applies to the Town of Goshen but the other schools of the School Union. I am pleased to note in every school a spirit of industry. Under these conditions pupils will come to their more advanced work better prepared. This, in the final analysis, is the purpose for which schools exist.

NUMBER FIVE

There have been enrolled at this school for this year nineteen pupils. The remodeling of the school house has made it very comfortable for this number of pupils. I was pleased to have had my suggestions carried out as to the new arrangements at this schoolhouse. I feel we have a very adequate school plant now. I am hoping the playgrounds will be properly graded during the next summer.

The happy and contented attitude at this school is largely attributable to Mrs. Brown's manner and way of directing the activities of the school. I am sure that the end of the year will see a good year's work done with many well earned promotions.

MILL VILLAGE

Some repair work should be done at this school during the summer. A rearrangement of the blackboards will be advantageous. The pupils at this school seem to have an omnivorous thirst of new knowledge. They are never satisfied with new materials for any length of time. This is commendable as it shows they are alert and hungry for new knowledge. I am sure that when the end of the year arrives they will have made the desired progress for the year.

CENTER

I feel that some repairs are due at this school during the next summer. The underpinning should be repaired. In its present condition, the floor is kept cold during the winter months. New steps should be built.

The helpful attitude of the pupils at this school enables the teacher to attempt many lines of work that are not noticed in other schools. On my last visit to the school I noticed some paper cutting landscape work that would have done credit to the most capable pupils in a large school system where a director of Art is employed. After seeing these pictures I knew the children were seeing the beauties of Nature which abound on every hand around this mountainous part of the town. Miss Tate and the pupils of this school are a group in which the one aim is enjoyment in work.

Sometime ago an expert mechanic told me he thought a good rule concerning machinery was "when it runs well, let it alone." As I have visited the schools this fall, I have been impressed with the fact that the school work was going well. Consequently most of my visits have been devoted to observation without much regulation.

I wish again to express my appreciation to all who are letting the schools run without trying to trig the wheels in any way but quite otherwise in helping to oil the wheels. I appreciated the cordial response from the citizens in attending our last day of school entertainment and picnic. Let us have another occasion like it when this year ends on June third. It will be necessary to hold this event on next to the last day this year as I cannot be in two places at once. The teachers and pupils may have Friday to clean up all work for the year.
