





Report of the Annual Town Meeting Held Mar. 9, 1909

At a legal town meeting duly notified and holden at Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March in the year ninteen hundred and nine, and called to order by John F. Marston, the moderator of said town of Hampton, the legal voters of said town by vote and by ballot:

Chose—Horace M. Lane, Town Clerk, who took the oath of of-

fice as prescribed by law.

Chose—Joseph B. Brown, Frank E. James and Christopher S.

Toppan, Selectmen, who took the oath of office for the faithful performance of their duties.

Chose-Howard G. Lane, Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Chose-John W. Mason, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Voted—That the Selectmen be chosen Assessors.

Chose-Abbott Norris and Charles Francis Adams, Auditors.

Voted—That the appointment of Constable be left with the Selectmen.

Voted—That the Library Committee be appointed by the Selectmen.

Chose—Warren M. Batchelder, Clarence M. Dearborn, Frank B. Brown, John W. Towle, Charles F. Mace and William E. Lane, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

Voted—That the Selectmen appoint Surveyors of Highways.

- Chose-Ne'son J. Norton, Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- Voted—That the Health Officers be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Voted—That the town raise and appropriate such a sum as the law requires for Highway Purposes.
- Voted—That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) be raised and appropriated for the benefit of the Hampton Library.
- Voted—That the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1200) be raised and appropriated for incidental expenses of the town.
- Voted—That the town raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700) for the benefit of the High School.
- Voted—That the sum of seventy five dollars (\$75) be raised for Memorial Day.
- Voted—That the sum of eight hundred dollars be raised and ap propriated for electric lights.
- Voted—That whatever sum the law requires be raised and appropriated for the suppression of the Brown Tail and Gypsy Moths.
- Voted—That article 9th of the warrant be laid on the table until some subsequent town meeting and that the Committee on the building of a new Library be continued.
 - The Committee to whom was referred the matter of better fire protection submitted their Report when it was:
- Voted—That one thousand dollars (\$1000) be raised and appropriated for fire apparatus and as soon as possible to establish a fire precinct which shall contain all of the territory of the town except that part included in the Hampton Beach Fire Precinct and that the said Committee be continued with power to carry this vote into effect.
- Voted—That a Committee be appointed to take up the matter of the protection of White Island, also of checking changes in

Hampton River at, or below, the bridge and report at some subsequent meeting.

Lemuel C. Ring, A. Willard Gookin, Joseph B. Brown, Randolph P. DeLancey, Horace E. Bond and Charles W. Moody were appointed as that committee.

- Voted—That the above Committee be instructed to correspond with the New Hampshire delegation in Congress with a view of getting National aid if any should be needed.
- Voted—That the Selectmen be instructed to expend five hundred dollars (\$500) of the highway tax of the Beach Highway district on the roads and sidewalks of said district.
- Voted—That six new Electric Lights be established, one in each of the corners of Dumas Avenue at Boar's Head and one on each of the three streets south of the Casino.
- Voted-That an Electric Light be established at the Five Corners, so called.
- Voted—That article 12th of the warrant be indefinitely postponed.
- Voted—That a discount of five per cent. be allowed on all taxes paid on or before the first day of August.
- Voted—That the town pay over to Hampton Cemetery Association, from funds held in trust by the town for the care of Cemetery Lots, the accrued interest or such part of said interest as will put the lots of the devisors of said funds in proper condition.
- Voted—That the several town Cemeteries be put under the care of the Hampton Cemetery Association and that the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) be raised and appropriated for the care of the same.
- Voted—That the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to protect the rights of the town in the tract of land lying between the Causeway and North Hampton town line; also that they

be instructed to survey and lay out said land into lots and streets before the first day of August, 1909.

Voted—That the abutting owners be given the first chance to lease said lots which may lie in front of their land.

Voted—That the Selectmen be instructed and empowered to borrow the necessary funds to pay the running expenses of the town until August 1st, 1909.

Voted-That the meeting adjourn.

Report of a Special Town Meeting Held May 24, 1909

At a meeting of the legal voters of the town of Hampton, held in the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 24th day of May, 1909, at two o'clock in the afternoon, and called to order by John F. Marston, Moderator of said town, who read the warrant, when the following Resolution was introduced and passed:

Resolved—That the Selectmen and the Surveyors of the several highways or any other persons acting under them, are hereby instructed and forbidden not to take any soil, gravel, sand or any material from a certain tract of land situate in the town of Hampton, bounded and described as follows:

Northerly by land of Jeremiah G. Mace, easterly by land of John C. Blake, southerly by the highway leading from North Hampton to Hampton Beach, and westerly by land of John W. Mace.

Voted—That in the Regulations in relation to the diggirg of c'ams passed at the annual meeting held March 10th, 1908, the second Resolution be amended by substituting the word "peck" for "bushel," so that the said Resolution will read as follows:

Resolved—Furthermore, that it be unlawful for any person, not a resident voter of Hampton, to dig, take or carry

away more than one peck of clams on any one calendar day from the flats, creeks or rivers situated within the boundaries of said town of Hampton.

Voted—7 hat it shall be unlawful to dig clams for shipment outside of state.

Voted—That the Selectmen establish the boundary line between Hampton and Hampton Falls.

The Committee on the new Library Building reported that plans were out for said luilding, which were satisfactory to the donor and the entire membership of the Committee, when it was:

Voted—That the Report of the Committee be accepted and adopted and that the same Committee be continued.

Voted—To adjourn.

sum of seventy five dollars for Memorial Day.

6th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of nine hundred dollars for Electric Lights.

7th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum required by law for the extermination of the Brown Tail and Gypsy Moth.

8th. To hear the report of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen.

9th. To see what action the town will take in regard to building the new State Highway and raise money therefor.

10th. To see what action the town will take in regard to building and repairing Breakwater at the Beach and raise money therefor.

11th. To pass any other vote or votes that may be legal before said meeting.

Miss Josephine Joplin is a most efficient teacher, and holds the sincere respect and love of her pupils. The result is a wide awake progressive school.

Miss Maud Smart resigned from the East Primary School and Miss Ethel V. Stevens of Amesbury was secured to teacl in

her place. Miss Steven's work has been thorough and practical, and steady advancement has been made.

In the North Primary School, Miss Etta C. Blake is a very faithful and painstaking teacher, and her capable work is shown in the good progress made by her pupils during the past year.

The interest and enjoyment in the vocal music still continues. The School Board is much pleased with the progress that has been made in this study for the past year, under the able instruction of Mr. Carl Akeley.

GENERAL REMARKS

We ask the assistance of the parents in this matter, and trust that they will send their children regularly to school on time. We are endeavoring to keep up the high standard of our schools in every way, and we want and need your hearty co-

operation in the matter, that your children may become good citizens. We ask and urge the parents to visit the schools as often as possible, thus obtaining an insight into the school work, and by their interest and presence encouraging both pupils and teachers.
