#### DISTRICT No. 1.

Summer Term. Ada M. Carr, Teacher. This school was visited near its commencement, and both school and teacher appeared well.

Winter Term. Sam. K. Paige, Teacher. Mr. Paige is a hard worker in the school-room. His instructions are of a practical nature, which render his services very useful; a good school, ornamented with perfect order.

#### DISTRICT No. 2.

Summer Term. Ella F. Whitcomb, Teacher. This was Miss Whitcomb's first attempt at teaching, and when the school was visited, after it had been in session a few days, everything appeared nicely and satisfactory.

Fall Term. Ella F. Whitcomb, Teacher. A small school, but under care of Miss Whitcomb the pupils manifested a deep interest in their studies. Good progress made. The teacher is worthy a larger school.

Winter Term. Dennis R. Chase, Teacher. School appeared well at both visits, and the examination was conclusive evidence that the labors of teacher and pupils had been well directed.

#### DISTRICT No. 3.

Summer Term. Clara J. Bickford, Teacher. This school was fortunate in having such an intelligent and refined teacher. The best of order prevailed when the school was visited.

Winter Term. Clara J. Bickford, Teacher. Miss Bickford is one of our best teachers, a fine scholar, and every way calculated to interest and encourage the pupil. Order and recitations perfect, evincing unusual advancement in every branch

#### DISTRICT No. 4.

Summer Term. Elvira J. Buckman, Teacher. This was Miss Buckman's third term in this district, and the school indicated that the faithful labors of the teacher had not been in vain. The best of order was manifest.

Winter Term. Kate J. Presby, Teacher. Both teacher and pupils labored well, and the examination denoted good progress. Order and recitations excellent; vocal music and the large number of parents present added much to the exercises.

Summer Term. Frances H. Perry, Teacher. The appearance of the school, when visited, proved that Miss Perry had not mistaken her calling. Her high reputation as a teacher was not in the least tarnished by her management of this school.

Fall Term. Frances H. Perry, Teacher. Miss Perry is well qualified for a teacher, and it is hoped that the citizens of Henniker may be favored with her services in the school-room for years to come. Her method of teaching cannot be classed second to any.

Winter Term. Walter T. Sargent, Teacher. Mr. Sargent's first attempt at teaching, and in his native district. His scholarship entitles him to the respect of every pupil. Labors hard to advance the scholars, and with proper attention on their part, good progress could be expected.

#### DISTRICT No. 8.

Summer Term. Carrie L. Morse, Teacher. This school was visited twice, and, although this was the first effort of Miss Morse as a teacher, the school appeared well, and showed a marked improvement under her faithful instruction.

Fall Term. Elvira J. Buckman, Teacher. Miss Buckman has had long experience in teaching. Untiring in her labors, and attentive to the wants of her pupils. Some scholars in this school seem inclined to be disorderly; a strong arm is required to govern them.

Winter Term. Ada M. Carr, Teacher. Good progress was made in some branches; in others, want of attention, on the part of the pupils, seemed to make advancement impossible. Better order would have been an improvement.

#### DISTRICT No. 10.

Summer Term. May Fox, Teacher. This school appeared

finely, and Miss Fox labored hard to advance her pupils, and she was encouraged by the whole district, who are still bound

to keep it the banner school of the town. Fall Term. May Fox, Teacher. Teacher and school ap-

peared well at the commencement. Not being notified of the close we were not present, but have no doubt everything was satisfactory.

Winter Term. Serena P. Whitney, Teacher. Miss Whitney understands her business, and attends to every duty; advances step by step in perfect order, and we can safely report: A good teacher, fine scholars, and model school-room. The exercises at the close were of the highest order, with twenty-five parents and friends present to witness them.

### DISTRICT No. 11.

Summer Term. Abbie F. Straw, Teacher. This school was visited twice, and appeared well each time. Miss Straw labored with her usual fidelity, and the scholars made a marked improvement.

Fall and Winter Terms. Abbie F. Straw, Teacher. This is a large school and hard to govern, but at each visit of the committee, Miss Straw appeared equal to the task. Good progress made in every branch; and we cannot refrain from saying the examination was one of the most successful we ever witnessed. Miss Straw was assisted in the winter term by May Fox, a good

#### DISTRICT No. 12.

Fall Term. Jane Hemphill, Teacher. Miss Hemphill's labors were attended with a degree of success, notwithstanding the want of order in school. Part of the pupils made good progress.

Winter Term. Mary E. Hathorn, Teacher. School still in session; appeared well at our visit, and report says prospering

### DISTRICT No. 13.

Summer Term. Edna F. Connor, Teacher. Although a

small school and the teacher's first attempt at teaching, everything was pleasant and much good was accomplished.

Winter Term. Nellie S. McAlpine, Teacher. School in good order; particular attention given to the rules of reading, with profit to the pupils. Good progress made in the several studies. Miss McAlpine labored diligently and successfully.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

A marked improvement has been made in some of the districts, in the building of new and repairing of old school-houses, within a few years. A few instances yet remain where much needs to be done. It is not necessary to mention the districts, for the people of these districts know the condition of their school-houses. With an increase in the school fund, suitable accommodations ought to be given the children; then parent, teacher, and pupil will all feel interested, and our schools will all be nearer what they ought to be.

Districts Nos. 3 and 10 are good patterns for the whole. The money for schooling comes from the hard earnings of the people, and each and all should be interested in securing from it the greatest benefits. Provide suitable accommodations, and then stand by and encourage both teacher and pupils.

As the amount of Literary Fund money which the town receives is based upon the report of the S. S. Committee, and the committee's report is taken from the school register, in which children attending school less than two weeks are not reckoned as scholars, parents can see the necessity of each child over four years of age attending school over two weeks, so as to be reckoned a scholar and draw a portion of the money. Quite a sum is lost to the town by neglect of those having children to send to school. It is hoped the matter will be made right.

We are glad to report that the schools have generally been under the care of competent and well-qualified teachers. We believe that much care should be taken by the prudential committees in securing good teachers, as very much depends upon the teacher. It is not only necessary that the teachers should


