TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Ninth Day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years and Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

- ART. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply of the principal and interest of the town debt.
- ART. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be applied on the salary of the district nurse.
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on Holman St. from Henniker St. to a point opposite the residence of George Barrett, raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mrs. Almira Martin Sargent the sum of \$100.00, the income of said sum to be used for the care and maintenance of the Samuel K. Martin lot in Deering Cemetery.
- ART. II. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of Band Concerts the coming season.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town of Hillsborough, N. H., will accept from C. A. Flint, the sum of \$100.00 as a trust fund, the income of said trust fund to be used for the care and maintenance of the Luther Flint lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.
- ART. 13. To see if the Town will accept the Old School Association Educational Fund to be held in trust and the income administered by the School Board and associates in accordance with the deed of gift for aiding pupils of the Hillsboro schools to obtain a higher education, or what they will do in relation thereto.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will accept and hold in trust any gifts which may hereafter be made to it by George W. Haslet, and expend the net income thereof for educational purposes in such way and manner as he may direct, either during his lifetime or by his will.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to purchase a strip of land eighteen feet wide, running from the state road to the dump lot, across the Smith lot so called, the same being now used as a road to the dump, raise money for same or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 or any part of it, to be expended under the direction of the Publicity Committee of the Hillsboro Business Association, during the year 1926, toward advertising the natural advantages and the resources of the Town.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to buy a tractor snow plow, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The old cement lined pipe in Hoyt Lane was replaced by 247 feet of 2-inch Byer pipe at a cost of \$271.93.

\$74.10 being charged to renewal account and \$197.83 charged to excess renewal.

This amount, \$197.83. being the cost over and above the cost of the old line.

An old line of pipe extending from Main street up Central street to a point near the Precinct building was renewed with 2-inch Byer pipe at a cost of \$143.81. The cost of this infprovement was divided as follows: Renewal \$45.00, excess renewal \$98.81. 150 feet of pipe was laid on this job.

An extension of 59 feet of Byer 2-inch pipe was laid on Whittemore street, the cost of which was \$66.13.

Another extension of 219 feet of 2-inch Byer pipe was laid from Park street along a proposed highway leading to the residence of Philip Jordan, at a total cost of \$189.00.

An improvement was also made on the Water Works store house in the rear of the Precinct building. This building was fast deteriorating on account of not being painted or properly protected from the weather. This building was shingled and painted and put in proper condition. The cost of \$168.47 was charged to building account.

TOWN SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board of the Hillsboro Town District:

The sixth annual report of the present superintendent of schools is hereby respectfully submitted.

We began the year with two of our seven teachers new to the district. Mrs. Lyda Yeaton with more than five years teaching experience in other districts took the Bear Hill school, and Mrs. C. Elizabeth Barker, without any teaching experience taught at the Center. Miss Edythe Crooker began her 27th year of teaching in this district, Mrs. Georgianna Gile returned to the Merrill school, Mrs. Gladys Murdo to the Flat. Miss Rowena Werden was transferred to the Lower Village, and Miss Elmar Shedd was elected to teach the Goodell school, but she was unable, because of ill health to begin the year, and Miss Susie Pierce substituted until she could begin her work, and later on Mrs. Nellie Mellen became the regular teacher, at that school. We were among the many to regret that Miss Crooker did not feel able to finish the year, because of sickness at home. Mrs. Doris Davis finished out the year in her school. Miss Crooker gave the district faithful and capable service for more than 26 years, and no tribute we could pay her would indicate the extent of her influence over the young people of that district during that time. Miss Ruth Brown, who taught at the Center, during the year 1923-24, left to teach in a nearby town. Mrs. Bennett left the Bear Hill school to take up an office position.

Last year Miss Crooker was the only one of our teachers holding the highest form of State certification, while this year Miss Crooker and Mrs. Murdo have the certificates. We trust that other teachers will prepare themselves to receive this professional recognition. We have only one inexperienced teacher. The experience of all averages about 8 years, about 70 percent of which was gained in this district. Last year, each teacher except one without experience, received \$720, while the inexperienced teacher received \$600. This year the Lower Village teacher received \$900, and the others receive \$720.

The Grade enrollment was: First, 22; second, 20; third, 20; fourth, 22; fifth, 12; sixth, 14; seventh, 13; and eighth, 10.

There were 295 cases of tardiness in the district which was just a fair record, but it would have been much better than a fair record if the Lower Village pupils had been as prompt as they should have been. All the other schools had excellent records in that particular, especially the Goodell school, where there were no cases of tardiness for the whole year. Of the 295 cases of tardiness 233 were in the Lower Village school. We hope for an improvement there and must remember that each of the three parties, pupils, parents and teachers have a part in this matter, the teacher most of all. One school in this Union has had no cases of tardiness for two years, and the pupils lived as far away from school as the Lower Village pupils do. Last year the school with the poorest record, had the best record this year, so that improvement is possible.

The same schools having the highest percentage of attendance last year hold the record this year. Flat 97.9 per cent, Bear Hill 97.1 per cent, Goodell 94 per cent, Merrill 92.7 per cent, Lower Village 92.6 per cent Center 89.9 per cent, Upper Village 89.2 per cent.

The Honor Roll of perfect attendance for the year is: Doris Hoyt, Alice Ryley, Fletcher Ryley, Leonard Ryley. Alice and Leonard had their names on last year's Roll of Honor also.

The Medical Examiner's report shows a decided improvement in conditions over last year. The number of cases of hypertrophied tonsils decreased from 30 to 16, defective vision from 14 to 7, while there was only slight improvement in the care of the teeth. Last year there were 29 cases of defective teeth, and this year 27 cases.

The teachers' records credit the school board members with six visits, and the Supt. with 160, slightly more than two visits to each teacher every three weeks. This large number of visits was made possible because he could use an auto during all but two weeks of the winter. The number of visits by parents and friends has fallen off from 260 last year to 210 this year, ranging from 11 at the Center school to 54 in the Merrill school which was also the banner school in this respect last year.

The Maine Club of Hillsboro again offered three prizes to the pupils of both Hillsboro districts for proficiency in arithmetic, and this year all three were won by the Town District pupils.

First prize, \$5.00, Dorothy Dunlap, Bear Hill. Second prize, \$2.00, Francis Dodge, Flat. Third prize, \$1.00, Lester Myers, Upper Village.

Bids were received on the plans as designed but all were higher than your committee felt justified in accepting. They were finally worked down to a reasonable price and a contract for the building has been signed. As soon as the conditions will permit, work on the foundation will begin.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education of the Hillsboro Special School District:

The report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year 1924-1925, is herewith respectfully submitted.

The number of new teachers for the year was three. Miss Esther Lord, a Normal graduate, and college graduate as well as teacher of two years' experience took Miss Millets' place as teacher of Latin, English and History. Miss Estella Shedd, a teacher with several years' experience took charge of the third and fourth grade room as Miss Eva Brown resigned. Mrs. Esther Colby resigned in April and her place was filled by the election of Miss Grace Crosby, a Normal graduate and experienced teacher.

We had a total enrollment of 303, divided as follows:

This table indicates an increase of 18 over the total enrollment of last year, and a high school increase of 4. 250 of these 303 live in the district, and in our high school there are 52 local pupils and 41 tuition pupils.

The percentage of attendance was 96.4 percent compared with 95 percent last year. It varied from 93 percent in the lowest grades to 96.7 percent in Mrs. Flanders' room. Our tardiness record is still good, although it is going in the wrong direction, as it was 190 last year while we had 239 cases this year. Miss Shedd's room made the best record in this respect.

Following is the Roll of Honor of perfect attendance:

First Grade—Alverino Goes, Kostentey Poluchor.

The record shows three visits by members of the Board of Education and 300 by parents and friends. The Supt. made 317 visits, approximately one per week to each teacher.

The Scholarship was awarded to Miss Margaret Connor, who entered the University of New Hampshire. The Maine Club prizes in arithmetic all went to Town District pupils this year.

Miss Gile followed up the Medical examination very carefully, and made a detailed report of her work. Below are given some of the important items of that report.

Cases of defective teeth 59, of whom 50 had some dental work done.

Cases of malnutrition 37, of whom 34 gained in weight.

Tonsils removed 9.

Of 9 cases of defective vision only 4 cases were treated.

In the last report the results of the tests given by the State Department to the Sophomore classes in all New Hampshire High schools were stated. The Hillsboro High school scored 66 out of the 69 problems correct while the average for the state was 57.8, and no other school scored as high as 66. This year the State Department gave tests in Arithmetic to all Sophomore classes, and the present class upheld the honor of the school. The scores in the state ranged from 50.4 up to 68. The standard score for the whole country was 62.6, for New Hampshire the average was 63.0, while the Hillsboro High school scored 68, again the highest in the state. Spelling tests were given to all high school classes. Calling the standard which should have been attained 185.3, the New Hampshire score was 189.1, and our score was 202.7. The state has now given these tests three times and each time the Hillsboro High school score in Arithmetic has been the highest, and in spelling we have each time been above average for the State, but have been excelled in this subject by a few schools.

Much interesting information is found in the annual report on Secondary Schools, made by the State Board of Education. The Hillsboro High school had 179 days of school, while the average was 175 days. 12.9 percent of all high school pupils in the state dropped out during the year, and 12 percent of ours were lost. Our percentage of pupils failing was less than the average and more of our graduates attend college. The average in the state for such attendance is 48 percent, while our percent is 65; and although a larger percent of our pupils go to college or normal school, yet they do very well when they get there. In a list showing the ranks of high

school graduates in such schools, our school is among the leading of a total of 87. In this report an honor roll is given, of those schools in which the teachers send in the most detailed and satisfactory work report, and our school is on that list.

The Grammar School graduation exercises were held on Friday, June 19, in the High school room, the honor pupils being Ethel P. Smith, Alta V. Danford and Marguerite Nelson. The High school commencement exercises were held in Child's Opera House on Thursday evening, June 18, Lawrence Worth being the Valedictorian, and Margaret Connor the Salutatorian.

At the annual School District Meeting on March 14, 1924 the following votes were passed: "Voted to raise the sum of \$1950 for the purchase of land for a high school building. Voted that the School Board be authorized and empowered to procure plans for, and construct a school building at a cost not exceeding \$75,000, and said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to raise such an amount as is necessary for said purpose, not in excess of \$75,000 by pledging the credit of the Special School District, and giving its notes or bonds for the necessary amount, which notes or bonds shall bear such interest and be for such term or terms as to the said Board may seem advisable, providing there is a compliance with the requirements of the law."

In accordance with these votes, a lot was purchased, and plans have been procured, and we are assured of a much needed and up-to-date school building.
