TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kingston, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at 9:30 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for books, and \$50 for repairs on Nichols Memorial Library.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$943.92 for street lights.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for State Aid maintenance. (State will pay the same.)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for Trunk Line Maintenance. (State will pay the same.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid money for road construction. Town will raise and appropriate \$1,002. The State will give the same, said money to be expended on the Exeter Road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000 to continue grading the main road between Great Pond bridge and Plaistow. The State will pay the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6,000 to purchase a snow plow.

11. To see if the Town will accept the road built by George M. Bakie on the Powow Road, open the same as a public highway, and raise and appropriate money for railing the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for repairs on the road from the residence of Alphonso Dominick to Little River Bridge.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300 for repairs on Scotland Street.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for permanent repairs on the highway beginning at Roy Gove's and extending towards So. Kingston, as far as said sum will permit, and under the supervision of Eugene C. Kimball, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500 to assist in extending the electric line and installing one or more electric lights on the road from the residence of Harry C. Atkinson to the residence of Charles Giramaire, and pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$800 to assist in extending the electric line from the corner near Mrs. Stella Cheney's residence, to the residence of Charles Jasper, and establish one or more street lights on said line, and pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended in co-operation with the State for the control of white pine blister rust.

18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to observing Old Home Week, and raise money for the same.

19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to proper licensing of dogs and electing a dog officer to collect dog taxes.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Note.

The Town at its last meeting voted to purchase a \$3,000 chemical fire truck; to pay \$2,000.00 for construction on the South Kingston road, and to pay \$1,140 more than that in the treasury, for straightening the road below the residence of G. M. Bakie.

The Selectmen were instructed to levy one-third of this amount each year for three successive years. The selectmen have no choice in the matter but to place two-thirds (\$4,000.00) of this amount in notes and increase the town debt, and had we not saved nearly all of the snow money until after settlement and received larger revenues than expected from some sources, the town debt, would be increased the full \$4,000.00 instead of \$1,878.51 as it now stands.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE MARCH TOWN MEETING
1925.

At a legal Town Meeting duly warned and holden at the Town Hall, Kingston, New Hampshire, County of Rockingham, on Tuesday the 10th day of March, 1925, the checklist having been sworn to by the supervisors, the moderator, Mr. Perrin W. Nichols, called the meeting to order at 9.50 A. M., and read the warrant.

Proceeded to ballot for the Town Officers.

TOWN CLERK.

The Moderator was instructed to cast one vote for Albert E. Nichols to serve as Clerk for the ensuing year, and Albert E. Nichols was declared elected by the Moderator and took the oath of office, as prescribed by law.

SELECTMAN (THREE-YEAR TERM).

and was declared elected by the Moderator.

The Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Warren H. Tucker to serve as Town Treasurer for the ensuing year, and Warren H. Tucker was declared elected by the Moderator.

Motion that Albert F. Nason be elected by one vote, not carried.

Motion that Frank W. Foster be elected by one ballot cast by the Clerk, not carried.

Voted that a committee of three be appointed, said committee to retire and nominate candidates for the remaining town offices, not elected by ballot.

The chair appoints Allen G. Collins, Frank W. Foster and Edward Kimball.

Voted to lay Article 1 on the table and take up Article 2.
(Town Charges)

Voted to lay Article 2 on the table until later on in the day.

Article No. 3. (Library)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the Library to be expended as called for in the Warrant, That is, \$100.00 for books, etc., and \$50.00 for repairs.

Article No. 4. (Memorial Day)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for flags, etc., for Memorial Day.

Article No. 5. (Street Lighting)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$943.92 for street lighting for the ensuing year, as per contract with the Exeter & Hampton Electric Light Co.

Article No. 6. (State Aid Maintenance)

Voted to lay this article on the table and take up Article No. 2. (Town Charges.)

Article No. 2.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00, the current expenses of the town for the ensuing year, this to include the snow bill.

Voted to return to Article No. 6. (State Aid Maintenance and Tarvia)

Article No. 6.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. The State to contribute a like amount to continue work on maintaining the State Highway with the use of "Tarvia" for another year.

Upon motion of Mr. Levi S. Bartlett, Mr. Poore of the Tarvia Co. was given permission to address the meeting.

Article No. 7. (Trunk Line Maintenance)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00, the State to contribute a like amount, for Trunk Line Maintenance for the ensuing year.

At 12.10 p. m. voted to take a recess for one hour.

Moderator called the meeting to order at 1.15 p. m.

Voted to return to Article No. 1 and hear the report of the committee appointed to nominate candidates for the remaining town offices.

HOG REEVES.

Article No. 8. (State Aid Road Construction)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$979.50, the State to contribute the sum of \$391.60, for road construction, and use such part of the above appropriation as may be needed to complete the work on the highway from Mr. Kaulback's to the Congregational Parsonage on Main St.

Article No. 9. (Haverhill Road)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to rebuild the highway from Great Pond bridge to the Plaistow line, providing the State will contribute a like sum, a bill being considered in the State Legislature at the present time to render this aid to the Town.

Article No. 10. (Great Hill)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to re-surface the highway leading over Great Hill, which is badly washed out on the hill.

Article No. 11. (Newton Junction Road)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be expended on the highway from the house of Mr. Platukas extending toward South Kingston, the work to be done under the supervision of Mr. Eugene C. Kimball.

Article No. 12. (Powwow Road)

Motion to lay on the table for two years not carried.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,140.00, which is to be added to the appropriation of last year, to straighten the road below the residence of Mr. George M. Bakie. Mr. Bakie agrees to complete the work of straightening the road for the amounts appropriated. It was also voted that the work is to be done under the supervision of Mr. Eugene C. Kimball.

Article No. 13.

Voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article No. 14. (Chemical)

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 to purchase a Fire Chemical Truck, and a committee of three, consisting of the chairman of the Board of Selectmen and two of the Fire Department to be appointed by the chair, to have charge of expending this appropriation.

The chair appoints George B. Stevens and Andrew Christie to serve on this committee.

Article No. 15. (Snow Plow)

After hearing the report of the committee appointed last year to investigate the snow plow situation, it was voted to indefinitely postpone action on this article.

Article No. 16. (White Pine Blister Rust)

Voted to postpone this article.

Article No. 17. (Discount on Taxes)

Voted to postpone action on this article.

Article No. 18. (Hampton Memorial Green)

Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$35.00 for a boulder for the Hampton Memorial Green as is being done by the other towns which were at one time a part of Hampton or were settled by Hampton people. It was voted that we refuse to join any association.

Article No. 19. (Electric Light)

Voted to indefinitely postpone this article.

Article No. 20. (General Business)

It was voted that the raising of the money for the Powwow Road, Chemical Truck and the Haverhill Road be extended over a period of three years. That is, one third of the above appropriations each year.

The committee appointed last year to investigate and see what can be done to improve the new cemetery on the Danville Road suggest that the town furnish cement markers for the lots, also further that cement or granite pillars at the entrance would be an improvement. The report was accepted and a committee composed of Warren H. Tucker, Levi S. Bartlett and Edward B. Clark appointed to carry out the proposal.

Voted to reconsider the vote taken last year to let the churches and school have the use of the Town Hall free. They are to pay for the use of it.

Voted that the Selectmen and Treasurer, be, and they are hereby authorized to borrow a sum of money, not to exceed \$10,000.00, in anticipation of the taxes to be collected, if necessary, and give notes of the town therefor.

Voted to accept the report as printed.

At 3:20 P. M., voted to adjourn the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

February 9, 1926.

To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

Herewith I submit to you my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

HOW MUCH EXPERIENCE HAVE KINGSTON TEACHERS HAD?

Since the summer of 1919 twenty-one new teachers have been engaged in Kingston. The average previous teaching experience of these teachers was **2 years, 1 month**.

This lack of experience is a big handicap to these teachers in their effort to accomplish as much in their schools as do the city school teachers of this state whose average experience is **6 years**.

Kingston Teachers 2yrs. 1 mo.

N. H. City Teachers 6 yrs.

Experienced teachers cost more, are worth more, and they increase the amount of state aid that the district receives.

HOW LONG DO KINGSTON TEACHERS REMAIN IN THEIR POSITIONS?

The fourteen teachers that have given up their Kingston positions since 1919 averaged to have taught for Kingston **1 year, 5 months**. This idea is expressed by saying that the average tenure was 1 year, 5 months.

Tenure in Kingston 1½ yrs.

Tenure in N. H. Cities 4½ years

Good salary schedules, desirable boarding places and pleasing social opportunities help in increasing the tenure.

THE SCHOOL NURSE QUICKLY PROVED HER WORTH
TO THE COMMITTEE.

Previous to the coming of the school nurse, Miss Lillian S. Mackintosh of Chester, last September, only 13% of the physical defects of the pupils reported by the examiners in this union were given treatment, and head-lice was an oft appearing nuisance.

Miss Mackintosh has already:

1. Encouraged many parents to secure treatment of their child's defects.
2. Accompanied several children to the hospital or doctor.
3. Secured payment of the charges of the hospital, doctor or oculist from some special funds in cases where payment would be a financial burden to the family.

In the first **half** of her year's work nearly as many defects have received treatment as were previously treated in a **whole** year's time.

Every month the nurse examines the pupils, especially their heads, and weighs them. Weight reports are occasionally sent to parents of under-weight pupils.

She has made 347 visits to the homes of pupils for consultation with the parents during her first half-year. She is a capable, industrious and pleasing school nurse.

WHO PAYS FOR THE SCHOOL NURSE?

The school nurse is employed by a union of eight towns. To seven of these the State gives \$1.50 per pupil for this health work and this pays the major part of the salary and expenses of the school nurse.

ARE OUR SCHOOLS COSTING MORE THAN ELSEWHERE?

Comparative costs per pupil for elementary schools are as follows:

This supervisory union	\$64
New Hampshire	\$69
Some states	\$81

WHAT TO TEACH A CHILD BEFORE HE ENTERS THE FIRST GRADE.

It will help the progress of your child in school if he can be taught as many of the following things as possible:

1. Be able to tell colors.
2. To say the alphabet.
3. To count up to ten, or higher.
4. To say the days of the week.
5. To say the months of the year.
6. To tell time by the clock.
7. To know a cent, nickel and dime.
8. Know how to hold a pencil. It is natural for a child to hold a pencil as adults do chalk. He must be taught the right way.
9. Be able to draw crudely a pig, man, cat, etc., and also be able to color the drawing with crayons, not coloring too much outside of the lines.
10. Know a few little tunes, and be able to follow a tune with others.
11. To keep step with music or keep time by clapping with something.
12. Know several nursery rhymes by heart.

All beginning pupils are required by law to be vaccinated. The best time is during the summer before they enter school.

ARE KINGSTON PUPILS LEARNING AS MUCH AS THEIR
MENTAL ABILITY PERMITS?

An **intelligence test** measures a pupil's **ability to learn**. Tests in arithmetic, spelling, etc., are **educational tests** and measure **how much the pupil has learned**.

Intelligence tests given last month to the pupils of the two grammar schools in town show that all together they have the ability to learn of the average child 11 years 11 months old; hence, the average **mental age** of those pupils is 11 years, 11 months.

Standard Achievement Tests, which are educational tests, showed the pupils to have learned as much as the average child 12 years, 10 months of age; hence, their average educational age is 12 years, 10 months.

Mental age 11 yrs. 11 mos.

Educational age 12 yrs. 10 mos.

This is probably due to industry on the part of the pupils, good health and good teaching.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION OF KINGSTON.

Interest and enthusiasm are running high in our community over the Parent-Teacher Association which was formed here recently.

For the benefit of those who are not familiar with the aims of this association, I quote the following articles from the By-Laws of the same.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT.

The objects of this association shall be:

(1) To promote Child Welfare in the home, school, church and community; to raise the standards of home life; to secure more adequate laws for the care and protection of women and children.

(2) To bring into closer relation the home and the school that parents and teachers may co-operate intelligently in the training of the child, and to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, moral and spiritual education.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP AND DUES.

Sec. 1. Any person in the community who is interested in the objects for which this association is organized may become a member upon the payment of dues, as provided in Section 2 of this article.

Sec. 2. The dues for membership in this association shall be 25c per member per year.

While we do not expect that this organization will cure all the evils pertaining to our schools, its influence is already beginning to be felt, and we are very much gratified with the results obtained to date.

We sincerely trust, therefore, that more parents and other citizens will take advantage of the splendid opportunity this association offers, to eliminate existing and future misunderstandings in our school district.
