

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## MINUTES OF THE TOWN OF LINCOLN ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 5, 1974

Held at the Lin-Wood High School Auditorium At 7:00 P.M.

The Town Meeting was opened by Moderator Fred Branscombe who then recessed for the purpose of having the ballot clerks finish counting the ballots. The meeting reconvened at 7:20 P.M. at which time the Chair recognized David Mayhew for the purpose of offering the following motion:

That this meeting be recessed at 10:15 P.M. this evening upon completion of all necessary actions on the proper Article on the floor at that time, and further move that said meeting be reconvened in this hall at 7:00 o'clock in the evening on Friday, March 8, 1974 at which time all Articles not previously acted upon on this warrant will be taken up and all necessary actions completed.

Motion was seconded by George McGee

R. Alger stated that Friday was a difficult night and suggested Tuesday.

The Chair stated that the school would not be available to us on next Tuesday.

W. Rennie requested that the motion be brought up later in the meeting to see how many matters could be taken care of, since too few people might come to a second session.

The Moderator noted it was because of the number of Articles to be covered that a second session was desirable.

- G. McGee stated we had a substantial warrant involving substantial sums of money with many important ones near the end which should be given careful consideration, and Friday was chosen because the school would be available to us.
- D. Mayhew explained that the school was open to us only on Tuesdays and Fridays because of the fuel shortage.

A unanimous vote in the affirmative.

The Moderator announced results of the vote.

The Chair recognized Mr. Henry Waldo for the purpose of making the following motion:

That we pass over Article 2 in the warrant temporarily until we act on Article 33, and then take up Article 2.

Mr. Waldo explained that the reason for this motion is that under Article 2 the Budget Committee had made provision for the funds to pay the salary of an administrative assistant to the selectmen, and Article 33 gives the town an option to authorize this particular position.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

A motion was made by George McGee and seconded by Robert Alger that the Moderator be released from reading the whole warrant at this time and each article be taken up and read separately.

A unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 3:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for District Court Expenses.

The Budget Committee recommended that the sum of \$9,000.00 be raised and appropriated for District Court expenses.

Motion by George McGee

Seconded by David Mayhew

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 4:**

To see how much money will be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building.

The budget Committee recommended that the sum of \$10,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building.

Motion made by David Mayhew

Seconded by Edmond Gionet

- R. Alger asked if the costs other than fuel had increased by \$4,000.00 in the Town Building over the past year?
- D. Mayhew explained that there was a substantial fuel cost which has been offset by spending \$3,900.00 to revamp the heating system which will hopefully save half the fuel, using individual thermostats.

Affirmative vote. One nay.

#### ARTICLE 5:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security taxes.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet

Seconded by Laurence Gilman

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 6:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Contingency Fund.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Contingency Fund.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet

Seconded by George McGee

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 7:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

The majority of the Budget Committee, with Messrs. Parker and Waldo dissenting and being so recorded, recommended that the sum of \$38,850.00 be raised and appropriated for the Police Department.

Motion was made by D. Dutilly

Seconded by Roland Bourassa

Mr. Waldo explained that when the selectmen submitted the budget, there was some confusion in the discussion regarding one portion of the expenditures. Two police radios are involved, which would cost \$2,100.00 of which the Town would pay \$400.00. The actual figures were not known until after the Budget Committee hearing. In addition, \$200.00 is to be replaced into the police budget, which will be for cleaning of uniforms.

An amendment was offered by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo that the Police Budget be amended and a \$600.00 increase be added to the appropriation, making the total \$39,450.00.

The amendment was carried with a majority vote.

W. Rennie asked for a hand count. The results were Affirmative—55 Nay—10

The motion was carried with a majority vote.

#### **ARTICLE 8:**

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

The Budget Committee recommended that the sum of \$6,400.00 be raised and appropriated for the Fire Department.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 9:**

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to cover payment of premiums for all forms of insurance.

The Budget Committee recommended that the sum of \$13,000.00 be raised and appropriated to cover payment of premiums for all forms of insurance.

#### ARTICLE 10:

George McGee explained that the small amount for the ambulance was due to the fact that it would be operated by the Clinic, to which \$7,800.00 will be contributed.

R. Alger wanted to know if this included the article referring to the old Town Ambulance.

Mr. McGee explained it was not. This was to pay the cost of operating the ambulance until the new Clinic takes over, at which time the old ambulance would be asked to be turned over to the Clinic for ownership.

Mr. Alger wanted to know how soon the Clinic could assume the ambulance, and was \$100.00 a sufficient amount.

Mr. McGee explained that they now have custody of it and are doing all the billing and paying the expenses.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 13:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to operate and maintain the Sewer System.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Sewer System.

Seconded by Robert Alger

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

The Chair recognized Mr. Waldo who moved that we pass over Article 14 temporarily and take it up near the end of the recessed Town Meeting which will be held on Friday night. The Budget Committee understands the problem faced by the Dump Committee. We don't presently have a figure to present, but will by Friday night.

R. Alger asked if long term notes included promissory notes made on the Town building which are payable on demand by the holder and, if so, requested that this one note in particular be paid five days on or before the day it is due so there will be no complications in the future.

The Moderator explained that the total included seven separate notes on the Town building payable annually.

Mr. Alger offered a resolution to the Article that the promissory note issued for the Town building for the total sum of \$80,000.00 be paid five days on or before the date it is due for this year at least so that the bearer will not call it, due to the unstabilized situation of the economy at the present time.

Moderator explained a resolution was not in order; it would have to be an amendment.

Mr. Alger offered it as an amendment

Mr. McGee explained that we have never been in default on any obligations authorized here, and he was certain these payments would be made prior to the due date.

Mr. Alger requested it as a mandate to the Town Selectmen that this be recorded, and that there be no fault on the part of the Town.

pressor from a construction company working locally, and it is no longer available.

John MacDonald wanted to know if it included a pavement breaker and Jackhammer.

Mr. Mayhew explained that it does include a 60 lb. pavement breaker, a 40 lb. hammer, 50 feet of hose and three drills.

Mr. MacDonald mentioned that it is costly to operate the compressor and accessories and suggested that we continue to borrow one unless we have a great deal of use for it.

Mr. Mayhew explained that there is considerable need for one, especially for emergencies, and when there is no construction company in town.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 35:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for a Four Inch Trash Pump.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for the purchase of a Four Inch Trash Pump.

Motion was made by Earl Rannacher

Seconded by James Beaudin

Leo Savoy asked for a definition of a trash pump.

Mr. Mayhew explained that it is a pump which will pass solids.

Mr. Alger supported the motion.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 for purchase of State Land for use of an Airport if constructed.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 for the purchase of State Land for use of an Airport if constructed.

Mr. Waldo explained that the land in question lies generally parallel to Pollard Road and I-93, and the State has agreed to sell it to the Town at the rate of \$75.00 an acre, but if it isn't used, it will revert to the State, and the Town will have its money refunded.

Jean Hogan asked where the land is.

It was described as between the graveyard and I-93.

R. Alger spoke in favor of the motion, particularly since the State is offering the land at Last year's offered price in spite of increased land values.

Jim Beaudin mentioned that Mr. Waldo neglected to say it had to be used for an airport, or it reverts to the State.

Mr. Rennie wanted to know if there was a time limit on the use of the land.

Mr. Gionet said there is not, but if we do not use it as an airport they are strict about ordering it back.

Vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 37:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for Sewage Treatment Expansion Studies.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 for Sewage Treatment Plant Expansion studies.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 38:**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$70,000.00 for construction of a new 2,000 foot, 14 inch Sewer line from a manhole in front of David Mayhew's house on Main Street to the Profile Paper Company parking lot.

The Budget Committee recommends that the Town Vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$70,000.00 for construction of a new 2,000 foot, 14 inch Sewer Line from a manhole in front of David Mayhew's house on Main Street to the Profile Paper Company parking lot.

Mr. McGee explained that this is necessary to accommodate the anticipated growth at Loon and a project across from Loon, and some expansion of ponds and lakes might also be necessary.

Mr. Alger wanted to know the anticipated revenue to offset the \$70,-000.00.

Mr. McGee explained that there is a conceptual plan that could reach into several million dollars over a five year period. They're considering developing land all the way on the mill side of the property up to and including the lands across from Loon.

David Mayhew explained that in the original plan presented to the selectmen, this was approximately a \$144,000,000.00 project.

Mr. Alger spoke in favor of the motion since this would be an advantage to the town in two or three years.

Murray Clark asked if it was the intention of the Board of Selectmen to let this job out on a contract basis, or do it with the Town Maintenance crew.

Mr. McGee said he hoped to do it cheaper than a contractor would.

Mr. Clark asked if a rule had not been passed a few years ago that any job in excess of a certain sum would have to be put up for bid.

Mr. McGee explained that the vote had been rescinded by vote of a Town Meeting.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 39:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for a feasibility study and research and development for future Town Water Supply.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for a feasibility study and research and development for a new Town Water Supply.

Motion made by L. Woodward.

Seconded by J. Beaudin

Mr. McGee explained that with the anticipated growth in Lincoln, our water will be in short supply, especially during heavy impact times, due to our lack of recovery capabilities. Secondary supplies will become necessary.

Roland Bourassa asked if a local firm had been approached for the engineer study.

Mr. Mayhew explained that three "well" people have given estimates and a State biologist has made recommendations to the Board of Selectmen.

Among suggestions offered were a reservoir on Little Loon and a siphon system to the present one; the possibility of going underground.

- Mr. Bourassa offered suggestions and was asked to attend some Selectmen's meetings with his views.
- Mr. Rennie asked if the feasibility tests are being made basically for Boyce Brook.
- Mr. McGee explained that the Loon Pond supply has been studied. Going into the ground requires an acre of land for every well you create. They are looking for capabilities to pump fast during busy hours.
- Mr. Rennie wanted to know if we are, or anticipate, supplying North Woodstock with any water and, if so, would they be willing to participate in the study.
- Mr. McGee said there is no present plan, although our systems are connected on the Lincoln side.

Vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 40:**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for a Tax Map.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for a Tax Map.

Mr. Waldo explained that a requirement made by the Legislature will require every town to have a map within a few years.

Dale Smith asked for a definition of a tax map.

Mr. Sargent explained that it is a map showing every parcel of taxable property within the township. The figure given is a quotation from one of the best map concerns in the northeast and is considerably less than some others. Much information is available from the Parker Young Company maps.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 41:**

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 for the Town share of necessary repairs to the Loon Mt. Bridge.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 for the Town share of necessary repairs to the Loon Mt. Bridge.

Motion made by R. Alger

Seconded by J. Beaudin

David Mayhew explained there is a possibility this may not have to be spent. The Board of Selectmen have applied for Federal disaster assistance as a result of the damage done to the bridge in December. The velocity of the river going under the bridge, without the dam, has caused erosions to the footings. State is doing the work under a participating program with the State and Federal Bridge Program, which is a matching fund 50% program. Hopefully, we will qualify.

Ed Clark, Jr. asked if a Selectman could explain how we gained ownership and responsibility of the bridge.

Mr. McGee explained that legislation was introduced to have the State participate in gaining access to the privately owned ski area. The Selectmen were authorized to lay out an access road. The Town traded a parcel of land acquired from the Martin Brown Co., the library and the bandstand lot for the land going over the bridge. Linwood Development Corporation borrowed \$119,000.00 from the Industrial Park authority to construct the access including the bridge. This includes 1,-100 feet of access road. The Act passed provided for redemption of the loan after an area had been constructed and proven its public necessity and convenience. After classification of the road as a highway, the Town assumed the responsibility of maintaining it.

Vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 42:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 for a new Police Cruiser.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser.

Motion made by George McGee

Seconded by Edmond Gionet

The reason for the reduced figure is that one low bid was received.

J. Beaudin wanted to know if the low bid was from a local firm.

Mr. McGee advised it was Meredith Motors.

Dale Smith asked if it was a 1974 or 1973.

Mr. Branscombe stated it was a current model.

Edward Clark, Jr. asked if the Town would take the energy crisis into consideration and have a more moderate engine in this cruiser.

Mr. McGee stated the specifications are those used by the State for similar vehicles.

Vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 43:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 to build a Chlorinator for the Loon Mountain Water Line.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purpose of installing a chlorinator in the Loon Mountain Water Line.

Motion made by Earl Rannacher

Seconded by Roland Bourassa

Mr. Waldo explained that this is the water line that feeds Loon Mountain as opposed to that which comes down through the village.

Dan Bourassa asked why Loon could not use the same chlorinator as the town.

Mr. McGee explained that Loon must have its own because it is on a much higher elevation, and the State requires that they have one for future development since their supply is untreated. The proposed development across from Loon might be tapping their line for a limited time. It's a Town line and they're entitled to it.

Dan Bourassa wanted to know why this couldn't service the Town too.

- Mr. McGee explained that we would have to tie this in up at the reservoir. If we could do it near the ski area there would be easy accessibility for daily maintenance.
- W. Rennie wanted to know if, on the original bonds for sewer construction to the Town, any monies were appropriated for chlorinators.
  - Mr. McGee answered in the negative.
- Mr. Beaudin asked if we are obligated to the Town or if Loon has asked for it.
- Mr. Branscombe explained that the State has ordered it because we are obliged.
- Mr. Rennie mentioned that according to the State it should have been in last October.

Gene Lehouillier asked if the tax burden would be too heavy for us

with the expected increased population coming at Loon.

Mr. Branscombe stated that this did not pertain to the motion, and should be raised at another time.

Mr. Marceau stated that he has had land for five years and has not received service from the Town.

Mr. Mayhew explained that since his property is a sub-division of Goodbout's property, water and sewer are provided to the Town line.

Mr. Mayhew stated that up to this point we have received \$177,-000.00 from Loon and expended \$30,000.00.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 44:**

To see if the Town will vote to join the North Country Council.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to join the North Country Council.

Mr. Sargent made a motion that the Town of Lincoln join the North Country Council, as organized in July 1973, the Council having been designated by the State Office of Comprehensive Planning as the official planning commission for New Hampshire Planning Region One.

Seconded by James Beaudin

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 45:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$968.00 as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1974. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses, regional planning studies, technical assistance to member communities, coordination with local, State and Federal agencies and other programs of the Council. These funds may be used in conjunction with State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$968.00 as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for one year, beginning July 1, 1974. These funds will be used for financing staff, office and general operating expenses, regional planning studies, technical assistance to member communities, coordination with local, State and Federal Agencies, and other programs of the Council. These funds may be used in conjunction with State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. It also recommended that the sum of \$500.00 be raised and appropriated under this article for the use of the Town of Lincoln Planning Committee.

Mr. Sargent explained that they are in the process of developing a map which shows the current use plan of the town. Before the master plan is adopted it will come before a public hearing for acceptance. Any sub-division would come before the community for a vote.

Mr. Smith thought it is time we do make regulations.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### **ARTICLE 46:**

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and receive Federal Disaster Assistance Funds through the State Disaster Coordinating Office and to expend the funds so received to repair the damage to town roads, and/or bridges and such other flood damage that may be declared eligible in the use of such funds.

Mr. Beaudin spoke in favor of the amendment.

Mr. Clark stated that he only wanted to know if we were in favor of a refinery in the state, so that he could report our recommendation to the State House. He, too, supported home rule.

Mrs. McLaren suggested that Mr. Clark take the amendment back as a variation of the original resolution.

Vote in the affirmative on the amendment.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative on the resolution as amended.

Motion made by Leo Savoy, seconded by David Mayhew that the meeting be recessed at 10:15 P.M. to be reconvened at 7:00 P.M. on March 8, 1974.

Earl Rannacher asked what salary would be involved.

Mr. McGee said \$300.00.

Mr. Waldo explained this would make the maintenance work easier. Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 49:

To see what sums of money the Town will ask the Selectmen to appropriate from Revenue Sharing Trust Funds to apply against any eligible items advertised in this warrant.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town withdraw the sum of \$10,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Trust Funds to be applied against the Police Department Budget.

Mr. Mayhew said if industry would employ 150 people he would forego the airport.

Mr. Clark asked what we have done to help the floundering mill.

Mr. Mayhew explained we have had discussions with Mr. Normand and let him know the Board of Selectmen is prepared to support him 100%.

Mr. Clark asked if a new industry would be offered a franchise, rent free, etc.

Mr. Mayhew said that land is available and the State Development Authority would construct a building and we would deed whatever portion was available to the industry if they would give us a ten year commitment.

Mr. Bourassa asked if we own the land occupied by the Copeland plant, and if the building would be demolished.

Mr. Clark thought since everything is centralized on Main Street that would be the logical place for industry.

Mr. McGee stated that industry had looked at that land but the price was too high.

Mr. Waldo objected to industrial use of the airport, based on home rule.

Vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 51:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for, receive and expend matching funds that may be available from Federal, State and/or other sources for Recreational purposes.

Motion was made by Robert Leclerc and seconded by Earl Rannacher that the Town authorize the Selectmen to make application for, receive and expend matching funds, including VOR funds, that may be available from Federal, State and/or other sources for recreational purposes.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 52:

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue any claim in that portion of roadway commonly known as Old Route 3, situated between Indian Head proper and Parker's Motel, and that said property abutters share and share alike from the center point of said roadway.

Motion was made by David Mayhew and seconded by Henry Waldo that the Town discontinue any claim in that portion of roadway commonly known as Old Route 3 situated between Indian Head proper and Parker's Motel, and that said property abutters share and share alike from the center point of said roadway.

Dick Schlaefer asked how much land was involved and who owned it.

Mr. Mayhew said Indian Head.

Mr. McGee explained that when a highway is discontinued it reverts to the Town who, upon request, deed it back to the abutters at their expense.

Mr. Sargent wanted to know if this is the property the Town sign is on.

It is not.

Dale Smith asked for the dimensions on the old road.

Mr. McGee advised it was a 33 foot right of way.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 53:

To see if the Town will vote to print annually in the Town Report a complete list of all real estate and valuation placed upon each parcel by the Selectmen.

Motion was made by Leslie Sargent and seconded by Dick Schlaefer that the complete list of all real estate and the valuation placed upon each parcel by the Selectmen be printed each year henceforth in the Annual Report of the Town of Lincoln.

Murray Clark asked the cost for printing and wondered if it could be done less often than annually.

Mr. McGee explained that all properties must be assessed at value every year in order to establish the tax rate.

Dale Smith offered an amendment stating that all delinquent tax payers be reported by name.

Amendment seconded by Murray Clark

Vote in the affirmative on the amendment.

Vote in the affirmative on the original motion.

#### ARTICLE 54:

To see if the Town will transfer ownership of the 1964 Oldsmobile ambulance to the Linwood Medical Center.

Leslie Sargent made a motion, seconded by Mr. Ward that the Town transfer ownership of the 1964 Oldsmobile ambulance to the Linwood Medical Center.

Bob Leclerc thought this ambulance had once been given to the Town to be used without charge for any townspeople who needed it.

Mr. McGee explained it had been given to the Town without stipulations. People who couldn't pay were excused, and if they can't pay now it would revert to the Town.

Mr. Ward explained it is being used as a back-up vehicle, and is now producing revenue by leasing it to Loon. People who can't afford to pay will have their fees abated.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 55:

To see if the Town will vote that the Town of Lincoln not adopt the provisions of RSA36-C entitled EMERGENCY TEMPORARY ZONING AND PLANNING ORDINANCES.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by Leslie Sargent that the Town of Lincoln not adopt the provisions of RSA 36-C entitled EMERGENCY TEMPORARY ZONING AND PLANNING ORDINANCES.

Mr. McGee spoke in favor of the motion so that we could adopt emergency zoning regulations.

Dale Smith asked what would happen if we adopted.

Mr. McGee explained that development would be stopped and we would have very stringent zoning laws.

Mr. Sargent said the zoning regulations are highly restrictive and the Planning Board recommends not adopting them.

Mr. Alger recommended supporting the Planning Board in view of their efforts.

Mr. Rennie spoke in favor of having Planning Board meetings open to the public. He agreed that RSA-36C is drastic, but stated we do need planning and zoning and it should be done very soon.

Martha Patterson requested information regarding the size of the development opposite Loon.

Mr. Mayhew explained that in five or six years their ultimate program would include 600 condominium units and would represent a 44 million dollar investment. The developers would like to meet with the townspeople to present their proposed plan, and he would gladly arrange a meeting for us.

Murray Clark suggested that the Selectmen make public any negotiations with new industry or new development in the Town, thereby furnishing townspeople with factual information.

Mr. Sargent said there are regular meetings of the Planning Board scheduled for the second Friday of each Month at 7:00 P.M. in the Selectmen's Office.

Mr. Smith agreed RSA-36C is too restrictive but recommended immediate adoption of some sort of emergency action.

Mr. Mayhew explained that the Planning Board is working very hard, but it will take time because it must be right or it will be worthless.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

A motion was made by Mr. Waldo and seconded by Mr. McGee that we pass over Article 56 until after we have acted on Articles 57 and 58.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 57:

To see what sum of money the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer from Surplus to a Capital Reserve Fund created in 1973 under RSA 35:1 and as authorized under RSA 35:5.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer \$40,000.00 from Surplus to a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purchase of equipment.

Motion made by David Mayhew

Seconded by Les Sargent

An amendment was offered by J. McInnis, seconded by Robert Alger that the Selectmen be authorized to draft the necessary specifications and solicit bids on a new fire truck and further move that they be authorized to withdraw such sums of the appropriation as may be necessary for the purchase of said fire truck.

Murray Clark asked if the \$40,000.00 in the article was specifically for a fire truck only, since it was his understanding a front loader was also under consideration at a later date.

Following further discussion Mr. Mayhew explained that the underwriters have directed the Fire Department to replace the old fire truck in order to retain our ratings, and delivery date is approximately 12 to 18 months after placement of an order.

Mr. Sargent explained that the money would still be going into the fund until the fire truck is delivered.

Martha Patterson wanted to know if one of the fire trucks would be turned in.

Mr. McInnis explained it would be of little trade-in value.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative on the amendment.

Mr. Alger said the Town Meeting last year had mandated the Selectmen to put \$20,000.00 aside last year to collect what interest was forthcoming and wanted to know why it wasn't done.

Mr. Mayhew explained that it was \$10,000.00, not \$20,000.00, and apologized for the oversight on the part of the Selectmen. It had been put into surplus, and is now being taken out.

Mr. Alger spoke his disapproval because when a surplus is known to exist it should be transferred into a capital reserve fund.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative to the motion as amended.

#### ARTICLE 58:

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer from Surplus to apply against appropriations in this Warrant.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Selectmen be authorize to transfer from the surplus the sum of \$140,000.00, \$40,000.00 of which is to come from the General Fund Surplus and \$100,000.00 to come from the current bank surplus deposits to apply against appropriations authorized and voted under this Warrant.

Motion made by George McGee

Seconded by Leo Savoy

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 56:

To see what action the Town will take to authorize the Selectmen to invest, allocate or disburse such sums of money from present bank deposits as may be authorized by approval of the Budget Committee and by vote of an annual Town Meeting or any special Town Meeting that may be called.

The Budget Committee recommended that of the remaining bank surplus deposits, \$220,000.00 of such deposits be set aside and earmarked solely for the purpose of amortising the bonds which apply to the Industrial Waste Treatment phase of the Industrial and Municipal Waste Treatment facilities, as they become due.

The Budget Committee further recommended that the balance of \$384,836.00 be left on deposit at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

Motion was made by David Mayhew

Seconded by George McGee

Murray Clark asked if the \$384,836.00 would then be available toward helping new industry come into town, and help construct a building for them?

Mr. Mayhew said it would if the Town voted it.

Mr. Alger suggested that some of that money could be used for a new fire truck or payloader.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

#### ARTICLE 14:

To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the Town Dump and see if the Town will vote to continue a study committee appointed to report at the next Town Meeting on relocating the dump and/or other disposition of town wastes.

The Budget Committee recommended that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to maintain the Town Dump.

Motion was made by David Mayhew that the Town of Lincoln raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray costs of operating the Town dump and to authorize the continuance of the study committee as appointed last year to complete the dump study and report its conclusions and recommendations to the voters.

Seconded by Leo Savoy

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Edward Clark, Jr. offered the following resolution:

May it be resolved that the Town of Lincoln, at its Annual Town

Meeting, showed by a unanimous decision its disapproval for the needless and dangerous corner where the west spur on the connector road, so-called, meet. And may it be further resolved that our Board of Selectmen petition the State Highway Department to extend this road to Route 3 over land previously purchased by the State, as we feel that this would be in safety's best interests.

Seconded by George McGee

Murray Clark suggested that the Highway Department be admonished for creating such a dangerous situation.

Dale Smith thought that if the resolution is adopted, it should be put in the papers.

Mr. Sargent advised us not to upset the Highway Department to an extent which might result in closing that section altogether.

Mr. McGee mentioned that the survival of the airstrip was considered, and advised us not to publicize it in the papers, but rather to reason with the Highway Department.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Murray Clark offered a motion, seconded by Robert Alger, that this Meeting give a standing vote of thanks in recognition of services by Mr. Edmond Gionet as Selectman of this Town for the years he served, and that it be recorded in the minutes of this meeting.

Unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Mr. Waldo mentioned that many people think the Police Department is overstaffed, but spoke in their support, particularly in view of today's drug addiction problems, and urged parents to do everything in their power to prevent their children from becoming victims.

Lottie Goodbout asked to have the proper signs erected to prevent cars from erroneously using Franklin Street, which is a dead end street.

Mr. Mayhew said it would be taken care of.

Dick Schlaeffer asked about a "held harmless" clause.

Mr. Sargent suggested that at the next special meeting a definite effort should be made to get that in because it is so important, to prevent Board members from being sued.

Leo Savoy asked if we couldn't group some of the articles for Town Meetings.

Mr. Branscombe explained that had been suggested, but the opinion was each member of the Town would know where the money was going if they were listed individually.

Mr. Schlaefer observed that if there was the attendance at the Budget hearings that there should be, two-thirds of the Annual Meeting discussion would be taken care of at that time. Mr. Alger suggested that we have elections one day and have the Town Meeting another, and leave the poles open until 8:00 P.M.

A motion was made by Mr. Mayhew, seconded by Mr. Waldo that the meeting be recessed until Tuesday, August 13, 1974 at 7:00 P.M. to hear the report from the Dump Committee at that time.

Vote in the Affirmative.

Meeting adjourned at 8:45 P.M.

## RECESSED TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 8, 1974 AUGUST 13, 1974 AT LIN-WOOD HIGH SCHOOL

The recessed Town Meeting called for August 13, 1974 to hear and act on the report of the Dump Study Committee, was called to order by the Moderator at 7:35 PM. For Historical purposes the Town Clerk wishes to insert into the minutes that this meeting was held our of doors at the Picnic Tables on the School Grounds. There was a very small attendance and the weather was perfect; thus, to my knowledge this is the first Town Meeting for Lincoln to be held out of doors.

Henry Waldo, Chairman of the Study Committee, proceeded to give his report on the findings and recommendations of the Committee. The only recommendation at this time is for the Selectmen to request an extension of the July 1, 1975 Deadline as at this time there seems to be no immediate solution to the Dump problem. The feasability of Land Fill for the Woodstock-Lincoln area seems to be nil for the lack of a suitable site. The soil and drainage must meet certain standards which is not available in these two Towns.

The possibility of incineration was thought to be to expensive and uncertain as to being able to meet the Government Standards. The Town of Plymouth is considering the construction of an Incinerator and the Chairman, Henry Waldo, has talked with these people and they have indicated that they would be willing to have our Towns make use of the Incinerator and pay a users fee. It seemed to be the consensus to wait and see how Plymouth progresses with the Incinerator and in the mean time request an extension of the July 1, 1975 deadline.

N. Bartlett moved, the Selectmen be instructed to ask for an extension of the July 1, 1975 deadline relative to the maintenance of our present Dump. George McGee Sr. seconded the Motion. The Motion was unanimously adopted.

Ernest Rannacher moved the Town Meeting be adjourned. The Motion was seconded by David Mayhew. The vote was unanimous. The Meeting adjourned at 8:00 PM.

#### LINCOLN PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The Lincoln Library completed another year with increased usage by residents. Total circulation of all material; books, magazines, cassettes, talking books and records was 12,418. We also provided film programs for the Day Camp, Senior Citizen's group and the Cub Scouts.

Thelma Branscombe, librarian, completed two courses of instruction at Plymouth State College. Children's literature in the spring and Introduction to Public Libraries in the fall. Mrs. Avalve Avery, Assistant, also completed the course in the fall.

Mrs. Mary McMorran is continuing her work as Traveling Librarian bringing material to the elderly and handicapped residents of the area. Plans were being made in December to ask help from Community Services Program to acquire extra help to keep the library open daily.

This year, for the first time, the Trustees voted a non-resident fee of \$5.00 per family for residents of Woodstock and \$10.00 for all others who might wish to borrow materials. Money received from this is used to purchase books and magazines for the library.

The Bookmobile made three visits to Lincoln at which time 1,758 books were loaned to us for a period of four months. The Bookmobiles and District Office of the State Library provide invaluable aid to local libraries in many other ways. Ms. Cynthia Miller, new consultant for the North Country, has been to Lincoln to inspect our facilities and offer her help in any project we might need.

New additions for the year were 352 books. At this time we would like to thank all residents who gave memorial books. Also to the many who helped on the Bookmobile visits. The cooperation and help of all and the backing of the Trustees in our work make it most rewarding.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT—1974

During 1974 the Lincoln Police Department investigated 263 recorded complaints and as many or more unrecorded complaints concerning things as varied as burglary, theft, juvenile delinquency, stray dogs and cats, prowlers, drunkenness, family disturbances, criminal mischief, fraud, illegal parking, cruelty to animals, trespass, emergency illness or injury, lost or missing persons, hit and run and other motor vehicle violations, truancy, unlawful use of fireworks, mentally disturbed persons, snow traveling and other off highway traveling vehicle violations, illegal use of airguns, child molesting, abandoned vehicles, assault, bad checks, disorderly conduct, drug and alcohol offenses, criminal threatening, arson and unlawful fires, depositing trash unlawfully, indecent exposure and horses running at large.

96 misdemeanor and felony arrests were made in 1974. 188 summons were issued for motor vehicle violations, including 30 arrests for drunken driving. 64 motor vehicle accidents were investigated, including one double fatality.

112 persons were incarcerated in the Lincoln Jail for short periods of time—usually not more than 24 hours. Our jail is utilized, in addition to the Lincoln Police Department, by the N.H. State Police, the Woodstock Police Department, the Grafton County Sheriff's Department and, occasionally, by federal law enforcement agencies such as the FBI.

To further more efficient law enforcement the Lincoln Police Department periodically enrolls one or more officers in law enforcement courses made available without cost by the N. H. Police Standards and Training Council. The department also utilizes a Breathalyzer and a radar unit which were obtained several years ago through the N. H. Highway Safety Agency at a minimal cost to the town. The Breathalyzer is also used by other law enforcement agencies, such as the Woodstock Police Department and the N. H. State Police.

In November, 1974 a Communications Center was approved by the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency for the Lincoln Police Department at a very minimal cost to the town. This has enabled the department to furnish more efficient service to the community, not only as regards law enforcement, but also in emergency situations requiring ambulance or medical service, the Fire Department, wrecker service, etc. The national crime rate increased 16% between January and September of 1974, as compared to 1973. This is an alarming statistic, especially when you consider the fact that Lincoln is fast becoming more accessible due to the extension of Interstate 93. Tourist attractions, the Kancamagus Highway, etc. also draw many people into the area. All of these things increase the demands upon law enforcement.

I wish to state here that without the continuing active interest and support of the community it would be infinitely more difficult, if not impossible, for the Police Department to cope with the steadily worsening crime situation.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 Forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State, no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973, which was made by this Division, in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent records.

#### **Scope of Audit**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Trustees of Trust Funds and Public Library.

#### **Financial Statements**

#### **General Fund:**

Comparative Balance Sheets — As of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets disclosing the financial conditions of the general fund as of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus of the Town increased by \$718,409 from \$47,542 at December 31, 1972 to \$765,951 at December 31, 1973.

## Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

# Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures-Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. as indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$727,730 plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$9,672, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$737,-402.

#### **Capital Project Funds:**

Comparative Balance Sheets — As of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets disclosing the financial condition of the Capital Project Funds as of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, there were long term notes authorized-unissued at December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973 in the amount of \$17,500 on account of the Public Medical Facility appropriation. This appropriation was approved by the voters at the September 11, 1972 special Town meeting. In this regard, inasmuch as the project has been completed and the appropriation is no longer required, an article to rescind this authorization should be adopted at a subsequent Town Meeting.

## Statement of Appropriations, Expenditures and Fund Balance:

A statement of Capital Project Fund appropriations, expenditures and fund balances, is included in Exhibit A-6.

# Long Term Indebtedness: Comparative Balance Sheets:

(Exhibit A-7)

Comparative Balance Sheets, showing the outstanding long term indebtedness of the Town, as of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973 are contained in Exhibit A-7. As indicated therein, the long term debt decreased by \$252,400 during the year. Of this amount, \$12,850 represents long term notes due the Granite State Trust Company in 1973. However, payment was not made until fiscal year 1974. This amount, along with the interest due, is reflected in the bills outstanding on the general fund balance sheet as of December 31, 1973.

#### **Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### **General Comments**

#### Net Budget Surplus \$737,402:

(Exhibit A-4)

As a result of 1973 fiscal transactions, the Town ended the fiscal year with a net budget surplus of \$737,402. The significant factors contributing to the budget surplus were as follows:

- (a) Proceeds of treatment Plant settlement (Net of Accounts Receivable of \$168,695) \$364,501
- (b) Proceeds from Sale of Copeland Plant 306,000
- (c) Property Taxes Committed in Excess of Budgetary Requirements 44,397

\$714,898

The amount of property taxes committed in excess of budgetary requirements (item (c) above) resulted from the following errors and omissions in preparing the 1973 Statement of Appropriations, which form is used by this Department in approving the annual tax rate:

(a) \$48,000 to be expended from Emergency Manpower Funds was listed as an appropriation, but was not offset by a like amount in estimated revenues.

- (b) \$2,500 appropriated for ambulance service (Article #13) was not included on the statement of appropriations.
- (c) \$13,500 was appropriated for street lighting. (Article #17). However, only \$12,000 was listed on the statement of appropriations.
- (d) \$15,000 of revenue sharing funds was voted to be spent towards the police department budget. Only \$7,500 was listed in the budget as an estimated revenue.
- (e) \$16,700 was appropriated for the Health department (Article #12). \$16,677 was listed on the statement of appropriations.
- (f) A special school district meeting held October 10, 1972, resulted in a supplemental assessment against the town in the amount of \$7,080. This amount was remitted to the School District in 1973, but was not included in the 1973-74 school tax.

A summary of the aforementioned discrepancies and resultant effect on the amount raised by property taxes, is provided below:

It is evident from the foregoing illustration that greater care should be exercised in the preparation of the various budget forms which are submitted to Commissioner of Revenue Administration for approval of the annual tax rate.

#### **Application of Municipal Budget Law:**

The 1973 Town meeting, under Article #37, authorized the establishment of a \$10,000 Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing Town equipment. Apparently through oversight, this authorization was not included on the 1973 statement of appropriations used to compute the tax rate. Consequently, the said sum was not raised by taxation, and is not reflected as an appropriation in this report inasmuch as, in our opinion, the vote of the annual meeting on this matter was invalid as explained below. In this connection the pertinent provision of the Municipal Budget Law is quoted herewith:

"R.S.A. 32:8—no appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget provided, however, that the budget committee may also submit, without approval items which they do not wish to recommend but which they believe the voters should be allowed to consider and act upon . . . "

With this in mind, the Town Clerks' minutes of the 1973 Town meeting stated that no recommendation was made by the budget committee. Furthermore no amount was mentioned in the posted budget to indicate that this article was submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee.

Except for purposes included in special articles submitted under R.S.A. 39:3 (Articles by Petition), the fact that a purpose or proposal is made in the Town warrant, is of no consequence unless the matter is also mentioned in the budget for the meeting.

It was also noted during our examination, that the Town purchased an automobile for the visiting nurse employed by the North Country Home Health Agency. The Town supports this agency through the annual assessment approved by the voters at the annual Town Meeting.

The total cost of the vehicle was \$2,975 which \$1,668 was reimbursed from this agency to assist in defraying the said cost. This amount, excluding interest, was originally transferred from the Linwood Home Health Agency to the North Country Home Health Agency in 1972, as a new car fund.

This transaction is in direct violation of the Municipal Budget Law, Chapter 32 Section 10, which provides that no Board of Selectmen shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditure of money for any purpose for which an appropriation has not been made. Furthermore, inasmuch as the visiting nurse serves localities other than the Town of Lincoln, costs incurred should be shared equally by all municipalities benefiting from the services.

#### **Unexpended Non-Revenue Appropriations:**

#### Town Building Acquisition—\$4,420:

It was noted that under Article 4 of the March 1973 Town meeting, the Town voted to apply \$4,000 of the above unexpended non-revenue appropriation towards the operation of the Town building.

This vote was improper, inasmuch as the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (R.S.A. Chapter 33, Section 3) prohibits the use of the bond or note proceeds for the payment of expenses for current maintenance and operation, except as otherwise specifically provided by law.

Chapter 33, Section 3—A covers the use of bond or note proceeds and the disposition of unexpended balances remaining after a project is completed. We recommend that this statute be followed in disposing of the balance in the Town Building Acquisition appropriation at December 31,1973.

#### **General Books of Account and Town Treasurers' Records:**

We spent a considerable amount of time in reconciling the General Fund cash balance as of December 31, 1973.

The financial report submitted to this Division as of December 31, 1973, indicated a cash balance of \$1,549 and a current surplus of \$70,265. As stated in this report, there was actually a cash balance of \$707,260 and current surplus of \$765,951 as of that date.

The factor which caused the discrepancies was the failure of the Treasurer to record in the cash book all monies received by the Town during the year. Receipts which were not deposited directly to the General Fund checking account were not recorded in any cash receipt records. These deposits included monies received from the sale of the Copeland plant, court settlement, revenue sharing funds and interest earned on invested funds. Consequently, we deemed it appropriate to assist the Treasurer in reconciling the General Fund cash as of November 30, 1974 and have advised him as to the proper procedures to be followed with respect to the recording of incoming cash.

#### **District Court:**

Our examination of the District Court records revealed that the docket book is not being maintained properly in that receipts of fines and bails are not always recorded therein and the book is not being reconciled to the bank statements on monthly basis.

We have discussed this matter with the Clerk of Court and have made specific recommendations to correct the stated in-adequacy in accounting procedures.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71—A, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.
