2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. 1127.50

3. To see how much money the town will appropriate for the town hall and other town buildings. 2000

4. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Fire Department. 220.20

5. To see what action the town will take on raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town. 200

6. To see how much money the town will raise to construct and maintain sewers. 34600 + 100

7. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for Town Road Maintenance. 3500.00

8. To see how much money the town will raise for street lighting. 225,00

9. To see how much money the town will raise for Libraries more than the law requires. 695,40

10. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor. 2500,00

19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to raise money on town notes if necessary.

To raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$907, based on 1-100 of 1% of assessed valuation, to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the state known as the White Mountains Region, of which this town is a part, in cooperation with the state of New Hampshire and other towns in said region, to be paid by the Board of Selectmen to the treasurer of the White Mountains Region. 907

21. To see if the voters of the town of Monroe will vote to adopt Zoning ordinances or elect a Zoning Committee with power to adopt Zoning rules, subject to the authorization of the Selectmen of Monroe, or both.

22. To see if the voters of the town of Monroe will elect or appoint a committee to make a study of water systems and recommend a system that would be most appropriate for the Town of Monroe, and raise a sum of money sufficient to cover costs of surveying local sources.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1500.00 to be used to pay extra transportation expenses of the New Hampshire Music Festival, who would be invited to Monroe for the 1940 State Music Festival.

24. To hear reports of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.

9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to pay the Penacook school district \$75 a year for high school tuition.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Because of Monroe's fortunate condition it has been easily possible to keep the building in perfect condition, and to provide books, supplies, and such equipment as seemed desirable. The new additions to the school library have furnished the pupils with much pleasant and valuable reading material while the radio, recently installed, has opened up new fields of instruction.

It has been gratifying to see so many parents and friends present at the special exercises given by the school. I should like to urge parents to visit the regular sessions when they could see some of the daily work. Conferences between parents and teachers regarding the children's problems are very helpful and often times enable the schools to render more effective service to the community.

As a help and a matter of interest I would like to call your attention to the rules of the State Board of Health as to the periods of isolation required for those suffering from some of the communicable diseases.

Chicken Pox: Until every crust has fallen off. This is two, three, or even four weeks.

Whooping Cough: A child may go to school in six weeks from the commencement of the "whoop," provided the paroxysmal cough has ceased.

Scarlet Fever: Four weeks from the appearance of the rash, and then to be dependent on the cessation of all peeling and discharge from ears, eyes, and nose.
