## REPORT OF SELECTMEN

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This coming year we are anticipating a considerable change in our tax structure due to the passage of HB 307, the "open space" bill. The main objective of this bill is one of "current use" assessment vs. that of "potential use".

There are general criteria which must apply to all tracts of land for which current use assessment is requested. If you feel that your land might qualify, you may request an application by letter from the Selectmen before March 30, 1974.

One particular requirement for land for which current use assessment is requested is that "the tract shall be marked with easily identifiable boundaries on the ground". We are hopeful that this may be a considerable help in compiling the town's tax map which is due to be completed by 1980. Meanwhile, if you do have any property maps available that you feel will help us, we would appreciate seeing them.

On another matter, we are exploring the possibilities of qualifying the old Nelson School House as an historic landmark. We are hopeful that, if it does qualify, federal funds may be available to help restore the building. We will keep you advised of the progress.

We have studied extensively the everlasting discrepancies over "thrown up" roads, "discontinued" roads, and roads "closed subject to gates and bars". We have sought legal counsel in this matter, and will post Mr. Goodnow's written advice. We will include with it a list of roads, compiled from old Town Reports by Robbins Milbank, that have been "thrown up", "discontinued", or "closed subject to gates and bars" since 1914.

Finally, we would like to say "thanks" to all those people who have helped Nelson through another year, and especially, we'd like to thank Sally Skinner and Bernie Pierce for their help and patience in explaining the "town procedures" to three fairly green Selectmen.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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NELSON TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, at 7:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following Articles:

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$21,862.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1974.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Nelson.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$340.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Cheshire Hospital.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$150.00 for the same purpose of Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,360.00 for the support of the Town Library.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1974.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$257.72 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$235.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association.

#### ARTICLES DEALING WITH PROTECTION

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Maintenance of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$600.00 for a new Pump for the Fire Department tanker.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for rubbish disposal.

Note: There are presently local persons who are willing to contract privately for rubbish collection.

#### ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$14,000.00 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$6,000.00 shall be for summer work and \$8,000.00 for winter work.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8,500.00 for general highway expenses, repairs, and supplies.

19. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 to crush gravel.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$502.97 as its share of TRA construction costs, the State's share being \$3,353.16.

Note: Work to continue on Old Stoddard Road East from top of City Hill.



21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

Note: The Committee consists of the Selectmen, the Road Agent, and three other persons: Messrs Frank E. Upton, Jr., Lawrence McClure, Jr. and another member to be nominated at the Town Meeting 1974.

22. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding monies received from the State under the Highway Grant.

Note: Previously the monies have been used to supplement maintenance of roads (Article #17)

#### ARTICLES OF A SPECIAL NATURE

23. To see what action the Town wishes to take concerning the use of monies received through Federal Revenue Sharing.

Note: Amount received in 1973 - \$8,071.00

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the

ultimate replacement of the Town's present dump arrangements, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the Fund except by vote of the Town for new dump facilities.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment and Administrator of the Nelson Land Use Plan.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Region Humane Society.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$181.50 as its fair share of the operating costs of the North Cheshire County Visiting Nurses Association.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$152.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

29. To see if the Town will vote to plow the driveways of the following Town Officials: Fire Chief, Police, Constable, Tax Collector, and Town Clerk.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove at its discretion new subdivisions, and plans thereof showing streets or the widening thereof or parks. Upon the adoption of such ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of Cheshire County a certificate or notice showing that said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving date of such authorization as provided in Section 19 and Sections 19 through 29 inclusive and Section 34, Chapter 36.

31. To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen, before disposing of tax-defaulted lands, to submit to both Conservation Commission and Planning Board a listing and description of such properties. One or both, separately or jointly may then make written recommendations to the Selectmen as to whether such lands or parts thereof should be kept for public purposes by the town for recreation, conservation, protection of wildlife habitat or retention of Open Space.

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$2,500.00 for the purpose of putting an addition on the Nelson Fire Station. Said addition to be for the purpose of establishing an office for the Board of Selectmen enabling the

Board to have a place in which to hold their meetings for the conduct of the Town's business as well as a place to store Town records necessary for the conduct of the business of the Town. Said addition would also be used by the members of the Fire Department for their meetings and training sessions.

33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint an ad hoc committee of no less than three persons to study the feasibility of incorporating a recycling program into the Town's solid waste disposal plan, said committee hereinafter to be called the Recycle Feasibility Committee. The Recycle Feasibility Committee shall report its findings to the Selectmen on or before June 1, 1974.

34. To see if the Town will vote to require written notice of intent to build to be furnished and delivered to the Selectmen, together with a copy of any required permit or other evidence of approval from the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission or other state agency before any construction is begun, if such permit or approval is required by state statute or regulation; and to provide that any person who violates the foregoing requirement of written notice and accompanying documents shall be fined not more than \$25.00 for each day of such violation.

Note: Said article requested for the Warrant by the Long-Range Study Committee of the Granite Lake Association, and endorsed by the Nelson Conservation Commission.

35. To transact any other business or discuss other Warrant proposals as they may legally be brought before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

---

Nineteen seventy-three was a very busy year at the Olivia Todham Memorial Library.

There were new displays each month and the purchasing of many fine new books for the adults and children.

I attended a Book meeting at the Keene District Office in January, the Library Week meeting held in Nashua in April, the Fourth Annual Library Council Conference held at the Sheraton Warfarer in Bedford in May, the District Advisory Council meeting held in Marlborough in October, and a workshop on Library Laws held in Newport in November.

I completed a Library Science course on Reading and Evaluating Children's Books at Keene State in the Spring.

The first of May, in compliance with the State Library, we increased our library hours from four to eight hours a week.

I also went to the Munsonville School in May and June to help the fifth graders set up their own library.

The Library received a face lifting this last summer with a new coat of paint, the repairing of the chimney, the floors washed and varnished, and an addition of new lights.

A new organization called the Friends of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library started in June and has been most helpful in raising money for both children's books and the Adventure Time Project. I wish to thank all of them for their hard work.

A story hour and reading contest were held during the summer. Mrs. James Lape, Mrs. Florence Tolman, and Mrs. Jack Bingham were judges for the reading contest. A cookout was held at my home in Chesham for all of those taking part in both programs. Nine children attended, and Miss Patricia McMahan planned the games and entertainment. Awards were given to Dianetha McClure and Kelly McMahan for most books read, and Shari Struthers for the most artistic cover.

Books are being taken every two weeks to the School and Pre-School. I want to thank those who are helping to make this possible.

I am also taking books to several shut-ins in Town.

Visitors this last year were from Maryland, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Ohio, Washington, D.C., Virginia, Canada, Pennsylvania, Vermont, and several parts of New Hampshire.

I have catalogued 155 books this past year, and am now in the process of bringing our current collection up to date with shelf cards, book pockets, and date slips.

## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

---

Reviewing last years report to the Town prior to reporting the activity of the department for 1973 it was noted that complaints relative to breaking and entering had decreased-certainly following the rash of such incidents in October and November of the past year this situation has worsened.

Following the series of breaks and at the request of the Selectmen daily patrols over the town roads were instituted by this officer in the hopes that the car was visible at unexpected times and over different routes that potential thieves would be discouraged.

This past year this officer drove his car 2,708 miles on police business. It is hoped that the voters of Nelson appreciate the cost of this operation especially with the ever increasing cost of gas and will approve the request for additional funding for the department as reflected in the 1974 budget.

As always the cooperation of other law enforcement agencies was greatly appreciated. The State Police, Sheriff's Department, Keene Police, and the Mutual Aid Center were always available for physical help and advice.

Again may we stress the importance of our residents in noting unusual activity by strangers in our town or suspicious vehicles on our roads. A report to any law enforcement agency of your suspicions with a description and a registration number might be just the break needed to apprehend a wrongdoer.

VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

---

The Fire Department acquired an Army six-wheel drive vehicle from the State of New Hampshire Forestry Department. It is now being remodeled into a 1600-gallon tank truck which will replace the present tanker.

Southwestern District Fire Mutual Aid System was instrumental in securing an E5 Rating. This means that all property within 5 miles of any approved fire station qualifies for the same reduction in fire insurance premiums as do those living within 3 miles.

Ten new personal protective units were purchased with funds provided by a special article at last town meeting. Repairs to the fire station have been completed.

There were no major fires in our town this past year. Several chimney fires, one rescue of missing person and two Mutual Aid calls were responded to.

Mr. Tolman was declared elected and sworn into office by the Moderator.

Tax Collector: Mr. Sidney Partridge was elected Tax Collector, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Treasurer: Mrs. Florence B. Tolman was elected Treasurer, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Road Agent: Mr. Claude W. Hutchins was elected Road Agent, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Police Officer: Mr. Kenneth B. Balch was elected Police Officer, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Constable: Mr. Frank E. Upton, Jr. was elected Constable, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Health Officer: Mr. Bradley C. Pratt, Sr., was elected Health Officer, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Fire Chief: Mr. Raymond G. Huber was elected Fire Chief, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

The Moderator explained that for Article 34 a printed ballot would be necessary, of which none had been prepared. Motion made and seconded to pass over Article 34. Motion carried.

Motion made and seconded to take up Article 24 at this time. Motion prevailed.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to require written notice of intent to build to be furnished and delivered to the Selectmen, together with a copy of any required permit or other evidence of approval from the State Water Supply and Pollution Control commission or other state agency before and construction is begun, if such permit or approval is required by state statute or regulation; and to provide that any person who violates the foregoing requirement of written notice and accompanying documents shall be fined not more than \$25.00 for each day of such violation.

Motion made and seconded to pass over Article 24. Written ballot requested: Yes 68

Motion prevailed, and Article was not adopted.

Article 2. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,222.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.

Article 3. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1973.

Article 4. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.

Article 5. To see what action the Town wishes to take concerning the use of monies received through Federal Revenue Sharing.

Barry Tolman made motion Article 5 be brought up after Article 16. Motion seconded and prevailed.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$329.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital. Motion made and seconded to accept Article as read:

Amendment: Motion made to change the name to Cheshire Hospital. Motion seconded and prevailed.

Motion made to accept Article as amended, seconded and prevailed.

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$100.00 for the same purpose for Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

Article 8. Motion made, 2nd, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$223.00 for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association. Motion lost.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Town Library and \$375.00 for necessary



repairs to the Library.

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1973.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

Article 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing protective equipment. It was motioned to accept as read. Seconded.

Amendment: Motion made to add the words "for the Fire Department," Motion seconded and prevailed.

Motion made to accept Article as amended, seconded and prevailed.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the rental of the dump. Motion made and seconded to accept as read:

Amendment: Motion made to change word dump to solid waste disposal. Motion seconded and prevailed.

Motion made to accept Article as amended, seconded and prevailed.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$500.00 for repairs to the Fire Station.

Article 5. To see what action the Town wishes to take concerning the use of monies received through Federal Revenue Sharing.

Barry Tolman made Motion to use the Federal Revenue Sharing as follows:

Article 16a. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,635.18 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$5,000.00 shall be for summer work and \$8,635.18 for winter work.

Article 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for general highway expenses, repairs, and supplies.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$503.91 as the Town's share of TRA construction costs, the State's being \$3,359.37.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

Lawrence McClure, Jr. was elected to the Town Road Equipment Committee, one vote being cast by the Clerk. He replaced Barry Tolman.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a new dump truck for the Highway Department. Motion made to accept Article as read, seconded.

Amendment: No truck to be purchased without first having sealed bids submitted against a specific set of truck specifications and to be opened only at a Selectmen Meeting, the lowest bid to be the provider of such a vehicle. Article 21. To see what action the Town wishes to take regarding monies received from the State under the Highway Grant. Bernie Pierce said this amount would be \$6,336.74 and made Motion this be added to Article 16a. Motion seconded and carried.

To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the ultimate replacement of the Town's present dump arrangements, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the Fund except by vote of the Town for new dump facilities. Motion made and seconded to accept Article as read:

Amendment: Motion made by Helen Milbank to strike out words "dump facilities" and add solid waste disposal. Seconded and prevailed.

Motion made to accept Article as amended, seconded and prevailed.

Article 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to designate one Town Road as a "scenic road" as authorized under RSA (amended). Said road is known variously as the Old Nelson Road or Lead Mine Road, and for the purposes of this Article runs the Nelson-Sullivan Town line past Apple Hill Camp and meets the Nelson-Harrisville by-pass near the Cemetery.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$354.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses' Association.

Motion made and seconded to pass over the Article, Prevailed.

Article 29. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Article 30. It was voted to accept \$100.00 as a trust fund from Arthur and Elsie Porter, the interest therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Cemetery.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to establish a study committee, said committee to work with other Town officers and similiar committees which may be established in neighboring towns, and to report the results of its deliberations to the Town periodically by whatever appropriate means are available, and no later than 1974 Town Caucus and Meeting.

NOTE: The committee shall be specifically charged with:

1. Exploring, with other towns, the feasibility of hiring a professional Town Manager to serve several towns, and further research the feasibility of all forms of joint or collaborative action with other towns.

2. Exploring, with other towns, the responses which can be made to changes in state law respecting public dumps.

3. Exploring in conjunction with other towns or independently, the feasibility of letting town road maintenance be open to bids from private contractors, or any other method of maintaining town roads which appear worthy of study.

This committee shall include five members: one member of the Board of Selectmen, chosen by the Board; one member of the School Board, chosen by the Board; and three members chosen by this meeting.

The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of a particular town.

The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36: 45-53, Revised Statute Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Nelson.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary school district officers:

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer for the ensuing year from July 1, 1974.

An auditor for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Munsonville School in said District on March 1, 1974, at 8:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

# ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

---

March 2, 1973

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by the moderator, Ethan C. Tolman, in the Munsonville School House.

The checklist was handed over to the Clerk and signed by the Clerk and the Supervisors.

The Moderator read the Warrant through Article 1.

The Moderator opened the polls for persons wishing to vote for the officers listed by non partisan ballot as required by law. He announced that the polls would remain open until 9:00 p.m. At 8:00 p.m. the Articles were acted upon as follows after the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator.

The Moderator announced his error on the voting on the A.R.E.A. (Authorized Regional Enrollment Area) issue. The Ballots cast during the balloting of School District Officers would not be valid because Article 3 concerning A.R.E.A. had not been read before the balloting. The official balloting was taken during the meeting when Article 3 was discussed.

Mr. Donald Bennett introduced Mr. Day, Mr. White, and Mr. Cass of the Supervisory Union and moved that these guests be allowed to speak at the meeting when asked. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 2. Motion was made by Mrs. Mildred Huber that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers be accepted as written in the Annual Report. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 3. Motion was made by Mr. Donald Bennett that Article 3 be accepted as read: Shall the School District accept the provisions of R.S.A. 195-A (as amended) providing for the establishment of an A.R.E.A. school in Keene to serve grades seven and eight from the school districts of Harrisville, Marlow, Nelson, and Stoddard in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the District Clerk. Motion was seconded. After a brief discussion and explanation the printed ballot was taken with the following results:

No: 3

The Article prevailed.

Article 4. Motion was made by Mrs. Betsy Tompkins that Article 4 be accepted as read: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to enter into tuition contracts for the school year 1973-74 with the Union School District of Keene at a rate not to exceed Nine Hundred Fifty-Nine (\$959.00) Dollars per pupil for Junior high instruction, or with other approved junior high schools. Note: this article is necessary in case the new A.R.E.A. plan is not approved by all districts involved. (Reference Article 3.) The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 5. Motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce that Article 5 be accepted as read: To see what action the District will take to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established at the March, 1972 District Meeting for "the purpose of the construction, reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes." The motion was seconded. Mr. Raymond Huber moved that the Article be amended to read "that no funds be withdrawn without the vote of the duly constituted District Meeting." The Amendment was seconded and prevailed. Mr. Bernie Pierce moved that the article be amended to read "that Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars be raised for the Capital Reserve Fund." The amendment was seconded and prevailed. The Article was passed as amended.

Article 6. Motion was made by Mrs. Ruth Staples that Article 6 be accepted as read: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars to purchase and install a fence on school district property. Said fence to be located between the Munsonville School driveway and Route 9. Further to see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to take necessary action to effectuate the purpose of this article. The motion was seconded. Some discussion followed relative to the area to be fenced in, cost, and safety of the children.

The motion was seconded. Discussion followed and the suggestion was made that the town officials and the school board look into coverage of all town officials.

The Motion was seconded. Mr. Donald Bennett moved to amend the Motion to specify that the Committee be made up of the School Board, a Selectman, and three members appointed by the moderator. The amendment was seconded and passed. Article 8 was adopted as amended.

Article 9. Motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce that Article 9 be accepted as read: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 10. Motion was made by Mr. Donald Bennett that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$81,631.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. The motion was seconded. Questions and discussion of teachers' salaries, oil prices, outgoing transfer accounts, Social Security, and transportation costs followed. Mr. Cass offered an explanation of the budget for the School District. The motion prevailed and Article 10 was adopted.

Article 11. Mr. Joseph Skinner moved that Article 11 be accepted as read: To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. The motion was seconded and prevailed. Mr. Bernie Pierce moved that the trans-

portation committee be nominated from the floor. The motion was seconded and prevailed. The following were nominated:

Betsy Tompkins  
Bradley Pratt  
Barry Tolman

Nominations were closed. Motion was made that the clerk cast one ballot for each of the three nominees. The Clerk cast one ballot for the election of the above named committee.

Motion was made that last year's Budget Committee be re-elected to serve for the ensuing year, with Karen Tolman replacing Mrs. Iselin who had been unable to participate. The motion was seconded and prevailed. The following members were re-elected to the Budget Committee:

The Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for the election of the above Committee and did so.

The polls were declared closed at 10:00 o'clock p.m. by the Moderator.

Article 12. Mr. Edward Schillemat moved that the School Board be instructed to receive bids from three sources whenever the price of an item or service be in excess of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars. The motion was seconded. The motion was defeated.

Mr. Maurice Collins suggested that the School Board take into careful consideration the asthetics of the school fence and try to provide a nice looking barrier.

Mr. Donald Bennett invited all to come to the caucus and hearings prior to the school meeting.

Mrs. Betsy Tompkins suggested that a budget hearing be called in January by the School Board at such time to meet legal requirements for the school meeting.

The Moderator expressed his appreciation to those present

for their patience.

The meeting was adjourned and the ballots for School District Officers were counted by the Moderator, Supervisors of the Check-list, the School Board, and the Clerk, with the following results:

# ADMINISTRATORS' REPORT

1973-1974

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As your present superintendent retires in June, and a new team takes over the administrative and leadership responsibilities, it is a good time for reflection.

In 1967, the State Board of Education decided that Supervisory Union 29 should be enlarged to serve the five other districts adjacent to Keene--Chesterfield, Harrisville, Marlborough, Nelson, and Westmoreland. The purpose was to bring districts of similar economic and social interests together into one educational enterprise. There was reluctance on the part of the smaller districts, feeling that their needs would be overlooked. And Keene displayed some resistance, too, probably believing that it was large enough to provide the desirable educational services. The few remaining board members, Mr. Donald Bennett and Mrs. Mildred Huber of Nelson, Mr. Alphonse Despres of Marlborough, Mrs. Clara Wellington of Chesterfield, Mrs. Lois Delano of Westmoreland, Mr. Howard Wheelock of Keene, will remember our early problems--finding office space, equipping, staffing and getting acquainted. After a year or two of suspicion and distrust, the attitude has changed to cooperation and confidence.

We have been joined even more strongly by the formation of two Authorized Regional Enrollment Plans, one for grades nine through twelve, the other for grades seven and eight. Now, truly Keene High School is our high school, and Keene Junior High School serves most of our secondary children.

In fact, we are more frequently asking: Why should geographic boundaries of our communities established in the 18th century determine educational boundaries? The six governmental bodies that manage our schools directly may have outworn their original advantage. Some of us hope that in a few short years, Supervisory Union 29 may become one governmental entity with the single purpose of providing quality education at an equitable cost from its citizens.

Ordinarily, one would expect that our little school in Munsonville would have a very limited program for children because of its size. However, the opposite is true. With two concerned and well-qualified teachers, there is a strong educational program. Our teachers are acquiring intimate knowledge of each child and his needs. Additional experiences are offered in music. Recently

federal money from Title I for so-called compensatory education, together with local funds has made it possible to provide specialized services to help children with problems. We are a full participant in the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center which identifies difficulties and prescribes educational remedies. You provide an abundance of educational materials and equipment.

Your boys and girls of grades seven and eight, sixteen of them, attend Keene Junior High School. The broad program of the school and its experienced staff provide quality education; probably second to none in New Hampshire. At this time seventeen of your children attend Keene High School. Again you provide the resources of a quality high school with 135 courses, more than 100 experienced staff members, and a varied program of extra-curricular activities. The tuition may seem high, but compared with secondary schools of similar programs, it is less than many. Remember, too, that we are always paying the last year's cost of Keene, for this year's tuition.

Your school board believes in keeping our building in top-notch physical shape. Each year additional repairs and improvements are made. From time to time we have considered expanding the playground. In the not too distant future, we would like to see a drainage and fill project started to improve the land we own adjacent to the school. A portion could be done each year to avoid heavy impact on your taxes.

Many people feel that the school budget is the culprit which causes high taxes. It cannot be denied that a community which gives high priority to the welfare of its children will have to pay for it. In reality, budget increases are a reaction to general business conditions. As you know so well, inflation is producing adverse affects. Each item in your budget has been studied carefully and justified. We have estimated that the cost of fuel will triple (from \$850 to \$2,273), electricity will increase about twenty percent. Gasoline, parts and labor costs push transportation costs up sharply. Though instructional supplies and equipment in some instances have doubled in cost, they are being budgeted at about the same amount by reducing the quantity. The proposed increases in salaries of teachers and custodian are just barely equal to the increase in cost of living, through the end of 1973.

A special committee has held meetings to determine whether or not there is a better and/or more economical way of handling transportation.

The Public Hearing of recent date about the town and

school budgets was worthwhile. It helped town leaders and interested citizens to understand the problems and the plans for the coming year.

After two recent studies; one by a retired business man of high repute, and the other by the New England School Development Council, the conclusion was reached that the central office needed an additional administrator. The Supervisory Union 29 budget for 1974-1975 includes an additional assistant superintendent and a secretary. Your present superintendent and his three assistants have tried valiantly to cope with the increasing problems of the union. Your board has been consistently a strong supporter of the union organization and its administrators.

Your administrators are proud of our school system in Nelson, and we hope all of its citizens are, too. It has been a pleasure to serve you.

REPORT OF THE MUNSONVILLE  
PRE-SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

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For the Year 1972-1973

The Munsonville Pre-School was granted its license to operate for the school year 1972-1973 and began classes September 11. Classes were held Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9:00 to 12:00 noon. The Pre-School observes the same vacations and days off as the Munsonville School. Classes concluded with the graduation June 8, 1973.

The Pre-School holds classes in the Munsonville Methodist Church, paying the church for a share of the heat and electricity.

Tuition was kept as low as possible in order to make Pre-School available to all Nelson Pre-School age children: \$3.00 per month for four year olds who attended once a week and \$6.00 per month for five year olds who attended three times a week. Children from Stoddard and Sullivan have been accepted, when space allowed, to add additional tuition income.

In order to meet expenses it was necessary for the Association to supplement the tuition through money raising projects held throughout the year, and it gratefully accepted private donations. This money is used to improve classroom supplies and for operating expenses which include the teacher's salary, heating, electricity and general expenses.
