**TENTATIVE TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carróll in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Tamworth Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries. \$2500 is approved by the Finance Committee.

4. To see if the town will vote increase the salary of the Tax Collector by \$150.00 per annum, the same amount to be included in the total amount raised in article 3.

5. To see if the Town will vote to allot to the Treasurer one percent of the seven percent derived by the town from the yearly collection of the State Head Tax.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' expenses. \$800.00 has been approved by the finance committee.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for election and registration expense. \$200.00 has been approved by the finance committee.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for expenses Town Hall and other buildings, including \$25.00 for the Garden Club and painting the Town Hall. \$500.00 has been approved.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Police Department. \$200.00 has been approved.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Fire Department, including firemen's insurance and forest fires. \$2000.00 has been approved.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for printing. \$500.00 has been approved.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Insurance and Bonding town officers. \$500.00 has been approved.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense. \$150.00 has been approved.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Health Department, including \$1500.00 for the Community Nurse association, \$300.00 for the maintenance of Town Dump, and \$100.00 respectively for the Laconia Hospital, Huggins Hospital, and Memorial Hospital. \$2100.00 has been approved.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Vital Statistics. \$50.00 has been approved.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase of forest fire hand tools. These tools will be bought from the State Forestry and Recreation Department and will be sold to the town at $\frac{1}{2}$ wholesale cost. Approved by Finance Committee.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance including bushes \$600.00, tarvia \$5000.00, bridges \$2000.00, summer \$4500.00 and winter \$8500.00 — a total of \$20,600.00. Approved by Finance Committee.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting. \$1700.00 has been approved.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Highway expenses. \$2000.00 has been approved.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for TRA. \$851.46 is the town's share and has been approved.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the town Library. \$400.00 as a whole has been approved.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Needy. \$4000.00 has been approved.

23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance families. \$100.00 has been approved.

24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day. \$50.00 has been approved.

25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for aid to Soldiers and their families. \$100.00 has been approved.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Parks and Playgrounds, that is, \$300.00 for the Tamworth Outing Club and \$350.00 for transportation for the Red Cross swimming instruction at White Lake. Approved by finance committee.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Cemeteries. Approved by finance committee.

28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal expenses including damage by dogs. \$75.00 has been approved.

29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$219.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town for the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Not approved by Finance Committee.

30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Social Security. \$150.00 has been approved.

31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Interest of all kinds. \$500.00 has been approved.

32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4654.03 for the new Whittier Bridge, this being the sum which, with the Capital Reserve Fund makes up the Town's share of \$16,500.00 on the bridge. Approved by Finance Committee.

33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 as yearly payment on the long term note of \$12,000.00 borrowed as a result of the Special Town meeting for washouts. This has been approved by the finance committee.

34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8500.00 to defray the County Tax. Approved by Finance Committee.

35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to be spent for improvement of the White Lake road, this improvement to be a continuation of existing new construction at the West Ossipee end of the road. Not approved by Finance Committee.

36. To see if the town will vote to accept as a gift the unreserved part of the Chocorua Cemetery.

37. To see if the town will vote to accept as a gift a certain tract of land lying between the old Chocorua School House and the present Cemetery wall. This lot has not been surveyed, but would run approximately from the state road, back as many feet as may be required. If the town votes to accept this land there will be available a certain sum of money to extend the present cemetery wall paralleling the state road, making for a continuous front wall for the old and new

cemeteries. Both articles 37 and 36 approved by Finance Committee.

38. To see if the town will vote to let the West Ossipee Precinct use the town dump for a charge of \$25.00 per annum as recommended by the Board of Selectmen.

39. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for perambulating town lines in the current year.

40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purchase of a new adding machine.

41. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

42. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any town property acquired through tax collector's deed.

43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of assessment on April 1st.

44. To transact any other business that may come legally before the meeting, and to see at what hour the people will vote to close the polls of said meeting.

Secretary's Report

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association presents a report of continued Public Health work in school and service to the Town, during the year 1953.

The Association received from the estate of Mr. S. B. Collins: 1 hospital bed, 4 walkers, 1 commode chair and smaller articles for the sick room. Added to what we have this sick room equipment has been much appreciated by patients throughout the year. The 2 beds, alone, have been in use 19 months out of a possible 24, serving five patients. Bathroom scales have recently been acquired for use in weight control.

The Association is appealing to dental schools in the hope of obtaining a dentist who would be willing to practice in our town. We have been offered a dental chair by Dr. Reynolds of Conway.

A new car was purchased this year by the Association for the nurse's use in her work.

The program of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association is made possible by annual town appropriation and the generous contribution of work and money of our summer residents.

New headings have been added to this report in an attempt to make it more comprehensive and interesting to the reader. It still does not reveal the emotions encountered and shared from day to day: the joy of the mother with her newest baby (and what a lot of them there are getting to be!); the seriousness of the school child with a sliver in his finger; the pathos

and patience of old age; the courage of the pre-operative; and the utter relief and cheer of the child who has just had that awful tooth pulled!

In June, attendance at a "Living in the Later Years" Conference at U. N. H. brought into clearer focus the many new problems, largely social, attendant upon old age, and offered some suggestions on how to cope with them. Since N. H. has the largest percentage in the country of persons over 70 years, and since the public health nurse is so frequently called upon in these cases the material presented there has been of utmost value, and stimulated further study.

Emphasis in the Public Health Field is turning to disaster preparedness. Perhaps our first act of preparedness here in Tamworth is to think, "It can happen here." We look forward to more education in the form of home nursing classes, that more may be equipped to take this burden from professional sources in time of stress.

Lastly, may I urge: buy lilies and Crippled Children's Seals. This service has been most helpful to us here in Tamworth.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

The fire season of 1953 was not a very pretty picture. It started out in fine shape with plenty of rain during the spring months. The month of June was the end of the rains and then a period of dry weather. During June we had quite a few lightning storms without any rains. On June 21 and 22 we had one of these storms that started over 43 fires in this state including the Mt. Shaw fire.

People burning without a permit or burning in unsafe places or at unsafe times were the cause of our largest number of fires. It is hard to believe why people do this when they have the expert advice of their town warden who is as close to them as their telephone. Your town Forest Fire Warden is not going to stop you from burning your rubbish or your old fields, but he wants you to burn in a safe place and at a safe time. You must remember it is unlawful to burn without a permit from your Forest Fire Warden.

We have inherited a tremendous responsibility in the priceless treasure of our natural resources. To keep these natural riches we must guard them from all destructive agents. The foremost among these agents is Fire — man's best servant but worst enemy.

To the Inhabitants of the School district of the Town of Tamworth qualified to vote in district affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 3rd day of April 1954 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensung year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for salaries of school district officials and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, the Budget as

printed, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for use for payment of the salary of the cook for the school lunch program.

10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept in the name of the School District for school purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or the United States government or any other agency or department thereof, or any other source.

11. To see if the district will vote to build and equip a new elementary school building.

12. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the school board to select the site for the new school building and acquire such real property as may be necessary.

13. To see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee consisting of three persons, to be appointed by the moderator, to advise with the school board in selecting a location for the new school and to supervise the construction of said building, providing that the plans and specifications and the selection of a site for the new school shall finally be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law, and to further authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection

with the construction and equipping of said school.

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$130,000.00 for the construction, equipment and furnishing of such new elementary school and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; and whether the district will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72, and any amendments thereto.

15. If article 14 is adopted, to see if the district will vote to use any capital reserve funds previously voted and to further authorize the trustees of trust funds to pay over these accumulated funds together with any accrued interest to the school board as agents of the school district to be used in the construction of the new elementary school building.

16. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to place any surplus that shall have accrued at the close of the fiscal year of 1953 - 1954 into a contingent building fund.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

During the school year 1952 - 53 the teachers in the Tamworth School were: — Principal Richard York, grades 7 and 8; Mr. Arvine Miller, grades 5 and 6; Miss Margaret King, grades 3 and 4; Mrs. Dorothy Remick, grade 2, and Mrs. Ethel Berry, grade 1. Tamworth was fortunate to have such a competent and conscientious staff.

For the current year Mr. York was succeeded by Mr. Harold Gibbs who was, in turn, succeeded by Mrs. Elizabeth Brady of Silver Lake, N. H. Mr. Miller was succeeded by Mr. Aaron Barnard of Center Harbor, N. H. Mrs. Brady is a graduate of Wheaton College, holds the Master of Arts degree from Radcliffe, and has had several years' teaching experience. Mr. Barnard is a veteran of World War II, and was graduated from Plymouth Teachers' College in June 1953.

Total enrollment for the year was 158 pupils, which was a slight decrease from the previous year. Enrollment for the current year is 167, with the principal increase in the first grade of 33 pupils. Enrollment in grade one was 22 last year. The present large entering grade made it necessary to rent a room outside the school building for the second grade.

The number in the third and fourth grade group and the fifth and sixth grade group will be so large next year that it will be necessary to rent another room and add one teacher to the staff. Census returns

indicate that the total enrollment will approximate 180 pupils.

Enrolled at Kennett High School were 44 pupils, and one at Brewster Academy. Seven were graduated last June. In September of the current year 47 were enrolled at Kennett High School and two at Brewster Academy. Only eight are seniors. With the present eighth grade of 18, the high school enrollment next year will be approximately 58. The greatest increase in high school enrollment will begin in 1956 and reach a total of 80 or more pupils by 1958. Current tuition rate is \$270.00. Announced rate for next year is \$285.00.

The health program under the supervision of Mrs. Rosalind Nystedt, R. N., has been carried on in a very efficient manner. During the early winter Mrs. Mary Carter, Dental Technician, returned to the school to repeat the fluorine treatment given last year and treat the new pupils. This valuable service is provided by the state Department of Health.

The recreation program, designed to promote sound physical development and good citizenship is carried on under the handicap of insufficient space and inadequate facilities. However, it is creating a lively interest in healthful activities and preparing pupils to participate in similar activities in high school.

Since the last report was written, additional lights have been installed in two of the rooms to bring the lighting up to acceptable standards. Correction of the sewage disposal problem was made, and the primary grade rooms were painted during the summer.

The school lunch program under the sponsorship

of the P. T. A. continues to provide warm, nourishing, and balanced noon meals during the entire year. Federal reimbursement dropped this year from six to five cents per meal per pupil.

The report of the building committee should be given serious consideration. The need of more space for classrooms, and space for learning activities of a highly desirable nature is urgent. Tamworth teachers are working under great difficulties, and the boys and girls are attending school in such crowded rooms as to be under a severe handicap.

The continued cooperation of members of the school board, teachers, pupils, parents, and citizens is earnestly appreciated.

After so much discussion of the dental situation among our children, we are glad to report some progress on corrections. The Fluorine Clinic conducted last winter gave momentum. The startling report of the number of cavities present, which was returned to us from the State Health Dept., and which we published in the local papers, awakened parents and others alike to our situation. A good number of parents had corrective work done of the children during the summer. This Fall, Drs. Matus of North Conway, Reynolds of Conway, and Denault of Meredith have cooperated in dental work at clinic rates. Your nurse has trans-

ported the pupils to the dentist, and this will continue as long as necessary.

The figures are heartening, but we must realistically face the fact that next year the cavity figure could be the same again. The basic problem is nutritional. Therefore we must work from both the educational and corrective angles to achieve permanent results.

Two posture films were shown during the Spring; to bring graceful and healthful postures to the attention of the pupils. A few of the more pronounced cases attended an Orthopedic clinic for treatment.

A great improvement in the office properties was effected, when all old health records were copied onto the newer style forms now in use throughout the State, and these forms filed in convenient, portable Postindex Files provided by Supt. Everett Brasier.

We are pleased that such a large proportion of the school is taking advantage of the hot lunch program. These meals are carefully planned and most delicious.
