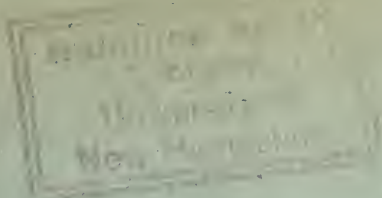
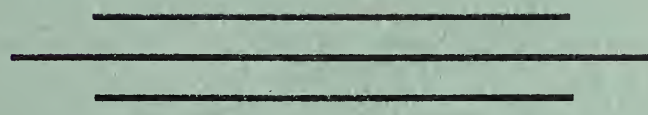

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years and two auditors for the ensuing year.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.

3. To see if the Town will vote \$200.00 and appropriate the same for the use of the Laconia Hospital Association.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the

division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$232.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$157.88 to procure Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$631.53.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to provide for additional fire, police and health protection during the war emergency.

10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the ensuing year.

12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

13. To choose any other officers or agents for the year ensuing.

14. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Forty-one patients were transported to Laconia for examination and treatment and two were taken to Franklin. Out of town trips have been decreased recently in an attempt to conserve gasoline and wear on the car.

The nurse served on the Red Cross Home Nursing Committee while thirty women completed the course. This chairmanship has since been resigned. The district nurse continues to serve as nursing representative for the local Civilian Defense.

A Child Health Conference and Toxoid Clinic were held at the Northfield Town Hall, July 15, 1942. Sixty-one children were examined and 28 were immunized against diphtheria.

Mrs. Clarice Fitzgerald substituted as district nurse during the month of August while the usual nurse had her vacation and Mrs. Alice French substituted at intervals while intensive school nursing was being done.

The continued interest and support of the officers and members of the District Nursing Association, of the officials of the towns of Tilton and Northfield and of the welfare organizations has made this work possible and is very much appreciated.

Air Raid Shelters Within Buildings

Without heavy expense, there can be no absolutely safe place provided for children during an air raid. The school officials have attempted to provide satisfactory places of shelter for the children and have developed an organization by which children can be readily directed.

Union School Basement as Report Center

The Tilton-Northfield Council of Defense secured the use of a portion of the boys' basement for

a Report Center, have moved in furniture, constructed opaque screens, installed telephones, and outfitted the space for this emergency use.

Fingerprinting

School officials were urged by the State Council of Defense to file pupils' fingerprints in the State Bureau of Identification. Postmaster Fred M. Boynton and Police Chief James Hussey recorded the prints of nearly all pupils last spring.

War Damage Insurance

\$100,000 coverage of War Damage Insurance has been placed on the high school building to protect the outstanding bonds.

The Agricultural Course

For the duration of the War, Agriculture is to be taught to those high school pupils who signify an interest in the study. This course is subsidized by the Federal Government to the extent of 60% of the teacher's salary in 1943-1944 and 50% of the travel allowance to \$200.

Pre-Flight Aeronautics

Pre-Flight Aeronautics is a subject-offering new to many New Hampshire schools and its introduction at the Tilton-Northfield High School is in response to the needs of the armed forces of the Nation.

DENTAL CLINIC

The Tilton and Northfield Woman's Club raised \$200 last spring for the Dental Clinic. Drs. E. D. Forrest and J. E. Nordholm are completing the dental operations and are giving the pupils certificates for dental perfection. A great service to the chil-

dren of Tilton and Northfield is being rendered by the efforts of the members of the Woman's Club and by the two dentists.

MUSIC IN THE SCHOOLS

At the Tilton-Northfield High School Mr. Ernest F. Fiske directs the orchestra and gives lessons on orchestra instruments. Miss Ruth F. Sawyer, Music Supervisor, has classes in singing for seventh and eighth grade pupils, a Treble Clef Club of over fifty voices, a small mixed chorus, and various small ensembles, of which the best known is the Girls' Sextette. A course in Art and Music Appreciation for juniors and seniors is taught by the supervisor.

At the Union School there are nine groups in the music periods and two chorus classes. Individual and small group lessons on orchestral or band instruments are available after school hours on Thursday or Friday. The Union School is developing into a real "singing school" and the aim of our music program are being rapidly achieved through the efforts of the teachers under the direction of the music supervisor, Miss Sawyer.

Headmaster's Report

I am pleased to submit my report on the activities of Tilton-Northfield High School for the calendar year, January 1 to December 31, 1942.

WAR-TIME ADJUSTMENTS

We realize the importance of giving our boys and girls the best training possible here in preparation for their service in this "all-out" war either on the war front or on the civilian front.

Air raid protection services have been organized and air raid drills practiced. All pupils have received training in first-aid.

A course in Aeronautics, pointing towards war-time service in aviation, was introduced in September and has been enthusiastically received by a large class of boys and girls.

Following the recommendations of a Federally-advocated Physical Fitness Program, two hours of physical exercise a week are given to the pupils.

Our teachers are studying war-time programs in mathematics, science, social studies, shop, home economics, and commercial work and are modifying their courses in these subjects. Pre-induction training courses in shop work, electricity, and machines may form a part of our program during the last half of the school year.

The High School Victory Corps program is being adapted to our school.

WAR-TIME SERVICES

Our boys and girls have been contributing both

time and money to a variety of war-time services: War Stamps, Red Cross War Fund, the U. S. O., Junior Red Cross, the N. H. Tuberculosis Association, observation post observers, Red Cross bandages, rationing aides, selective service registration clerks.

As a fitting climax to Armistice Day, pupils and teachers loaded a car of scrap.

Pupils have been released from school to help harvest crops and to work in stores.

AGRICULTURE

When sufficient interest was shown by parents and pupils in a course in Agriculture, one was started. The addition of Federally-aided Agriculture to home economics, shop work, and commerce rounds out a strong vocational program in our school.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

With a six-hour school day, it has been possible to provide one hour of extra-curricular activities each day in the senior high school, and four per week in the junior high school. High school gym classes are in progress. Ten weekly lessons in dancing have been taught by a very competent instructor. Other senior high activities are: Treble Clef Club, orchestra, handicrafts, dramatic club, The Tattler, Future Farmers of America, and the Student Council. The Junior high school activities include: gym, dancing, sports club, dramatic club, library club, boys' cooking club, airplane modelling club, and music club.

The activity periods within the school day permits all to participate. These are financed by twenty-five weekly contributions of ten cents by pupils.

LUNCH PROGRAM

The school cafeteria serves a well-balanced lunch at noon on a non-profit basis. The low-cost meal is made possible by the use of supplies from the Surplus Commodities Distribution, the vegetables raised in the Victory Garden last summer, and the canned foods prepared by mothers and pupils in the summer and the girls in the Home Economics classes in the fall. The assistance of those who worked in raising vegetables and in canning is much appreciated.

REPORTS TO PARENTS

There have been three marking periods established at which reports are made to parents on prepared forms, one for each course a pupil is taking. In the middle of each marking period, mid-term reports of either unusually good work or of unsatisfactory work are made to parents. This plan should make more personal the reports from teacher to parent on the progress of a pupil.

NATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK

Our observation of National Education Week featured an excellent evening program in which several seniors summarized our endeavors in the war effort. There was music by the Treble Clef

Club and the orchestra, and a stirring pageant, "Cavalcade of Freedom", by the Dramatic Club. Our musical organizations presented a radio broadcast over WLNH, and pupils' work was on display in a store window on Main Street.

Report of School Nurse

1941-1942

During the school year 500 hours were spent in school nursing, approximately 300 hours of which were used on routine daily work, clinics and paper work, and about 150 hours were devoted to posture work, eye tests and medical inspection. The remainder of the time was used for hearing tests, weighing and measuring, and home visits. In addition to this, two Red Cross nurse's aides gave $16\frac{1}{2}$ hours and Miss Glenice Chase contributed $20\frac{3}{4}$ hours assisting at inspections.

The High School inspection this year was unusually thorough, attempting to find and later correct any remedial defects which might prevent our pupils from doing their share in the war effort.

Special emphasis has been placed on the teeth this year. The Woman's Club raised sufficient funds for the care of the teeth of those children in the Union school whose parents were unable to finance the cost. The school department is paying for the dental inspection. The two local dentists, Dr. E. D. Forrest and Dr. J. E. Nordholm, have been very generous with their time, moderate with their fees and helpful in every way. Last May the teeth were inspected and now they are being put in order.

The whole hearted cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the teaching staff, the parents and the school children is very much appreciated.
