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STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (TOWN WARRANT)

Cheshire, ss.:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1935, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary officers.
- Article 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- Article 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to accepting state aid for highway construction, and appropriate money therefor.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,000 to oil the streets of Walpole Village, North Walpole, and town roads.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$30 for Memorial Day.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 to improve and gravel the Valley road, so-called, beginning at the end of last year's work and continuing toward Keene.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to improve and gravel the road beginning at the corner near Steve Rober's and going toward Charles Whitney's, on the Drewsville road.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to improve and gravel the River road.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to gravel the main highway beginning at the top of the Harry J. Jennison hill, and continuing toward Surry line.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve the road from Fletcher's corner toward the site of No. 6 schoolhouse.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300 to improve the road to E. J. Stevens, beginning at No. 6 schoolhouse.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the construction of the County road, provided the State shall appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the same purpose, it being understood that if said appropriation is made by the State and the town accepts said special aid, that the town shall not be entitled to state aid for Class II roads.

Article 15. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as County road and raise and appropriate or set aside for that purpose the sum of \$1.971.75; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$763.70.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to protect the shade trees in town, and raise money therefor.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to except the Mousley hospital from taxation for a term of five years.

Article 18. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collectors' deeds.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget act.

Article 21. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Changes in the teaching positions were made as follows:

Mr. Gordon Ayer was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Bernard. Mr. Ayer is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and Keene Normal school. He taught for one year before coming to Walpole.

Miss Elizabeth Sawyer was elected to teach in the elementary grades of the village school. Miss Sawyer graduated from the elementary department of Keene Normal school.

Miss Helen Binkunski, a graduate of Brown University, was elected to teach French, English, and history at the North Walpole High school.

Miss Helen Perkins has returned to her former position at Walpole High school after receiving a degree from the University of New Hampshire. Because of a decrease in enrollment, the school at Christian Hollow was closed this year. The pupils from this section are being transported to the school in Walpole village.

Instruction in music has been extended to the pupils in the Number 14 and Drewsville sections.

Manual Training in the junior high school is being taught this year by Mr. Ayer. This arrangement permits the teacher of agriculture to devote more time to the development of the activities of the agricultural department. It will also entitle the district to an increase in the amount of reimbursement from the Smith-Hughes fund.

School work is being accomplished in accordance with the standards for the State. Standard achievement tests are being given and reports are required relative to the work completed in each grade.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Minor repairs to the school property have been made as the need has arisen. A number of very substancial permanent improvements were made during the year. The improvement project at North Walpole included the following work:

Concrete foundations — both buildings, grading school grounds, new fence, covering entrance to basement of John Kilburn building, new electric pump for water system.

The high quality of workmanship in the completion of the above project is a credit to the district.

The interior of the buildings at Number 14 and Drewsville were redecorated. The work at Number 14 included: whitening ceiling, painting walls, painting woodwork and desks, and grading school yard. At Drewsville the ceiling was whitened, walls and desks were varnished, flag pole repaired and painted, and playground apparatus was repaired.

Special work at Walpole village included the following:

A change was made in the water supply system. The water supply for the three buildings was found to be inadequate and limited by the size of the supply pipe entering the grounds. A larger pipe was laid and connected with the water main on School Street. All the water for school purposes now enters through one pipe and is recorded in one meter. The supply is now adequate for the toilets, laboratory, and for fire protection.

A fourteen section radiator was added in the sewing room. A new sink has been placed in the boys' basement of the high school building.

The pupil desks and seats from the Christian Hollow school have been transferred to the village school to take care of an increased enrollment.

The total registration has remained about the same as in the preceding year. The percentage of attendance, although slightly lower, is commendable. The large increase in the number of cases of tardiness is due to a new State ruling governing the attendance of pupils who are transported. There is a substancial increase in the number of pupils having a perfect record of attendance. This is commendable especially in consideration of the ruling with regard to the tardiness of pupils on transportation routes.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF NORTH WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

North Walpole, N. H. Feb. 10, 1935.

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Supt. of Schools, Walpole, N. H. Dear Sir:

I submit herewith my report on the condition and work of the North Walpole school.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment by grades is: Grade 10, 14; Grade 9, 15; Grade 8, 26; Grade 7, 20; Grade 6, 25; Grade 5, 18; Grade 4, 19; Grade 3, 18; Grade 2, 21; Grade 1, 20; Sub-Primary, 15. Total, 205.

Miss Helen Binkunski of Manchester, N. H., a graduate of Pembroke College of Brown University is our only new teacher this year. She was chosen to fill the vacancy in French and Grade 8 subjects, caused by the resignation of Miss Marion Doucette.

SCHOLARSHIP

Achievement tests have been given in Grades 4, 5 and 6. Results have been uniformly satisfactory. As the main purpose of these tests is to discover how well pupils have learned lessons previously taught without any special drill beforehand, the weaknesses revealed in test work serve to indicate to the teacher where review, drill and personal help can be given to the pupils in order to overcome their deficiency.

Individual help in reading is being given to slow pupils in Grades 1, 2 and 3 by Miss May Hartnett, supplementary to her regular Sub-Primary work.

Mr. Russell Leavitt, Agent of the State Department of Education has made his annual inspection of the work and teaching of the High School. A favorable report was received.

COURSE OF STUDY

Two rhetorical periods have been provided in our weekly program. Also periods for drill in penmanship, spelling, and correct forms of speech have been arranged in the higher grades. These particular periods have been set aside, not because these subjects have not been taught before, but in order to provide individual help for pupils needing it.

A course in Business Practice was installed in Grade 9 this year. This counts as an annual credit toward graduation.

The study of Science has been taken from Grade 9 and placed in the Grade 8 subjects. Previously, Science 8 had been given in a short course of two periods a week. This was followed by a five-period a week course in the same subject in Grade 9.

Commercial Accounts also has been taken out of Grade 8. In changing the Science arrangement we find that the same material can be taught in one year that had been previously spread over two years. The material of the Commercial Accounts course in Grade 8 is contained in the Business Practice Grade 9 course with other beneficial matter included.

ATTENDANCE

Records for attendance for the first twenty weeks of the school year have been high in most of the grades.

In some of the lower grades during the Fall there was a large number of absences due to sickness. The records follow: Grade 10, 97.33; Grade 9, 99.79; Grade 8, 97; Grade 7, 98.20; Grade 6, 97; Grade 5, 95.38; Grade 4, 98; Grade 3, 95.12; Grade 2, 95.16; Grade 1, 93.32; Sub-Primary, 93.38.

An inspection of the number of tardy marks will show the need for improvement in punctuality by many pupils. I request the cooperation of the parents in our efforts to correct this condition.

Tardy marks: Grade 10. 1; Grade 9, 4; Grade 8, 16; Grade 7, 19; Grade 6, 29; Grade 5, 9; Grade 4, 11; Grade 3, 5; Grade 2, 14; Grade 1, 9; Sub-Primary, 7. Total, 124.

The record for tardiness should be very low when one considers that the school is not too far distant to reach conveniently from any section of the town.

DISCIPLINE

Classroom conduct throughout the grades is, in general, satisfactory. There have been no serious cases of misbehavior. The general attitude of the pupils is obedient. Thus, conditions for teaching are, on the whole, such as are necessary.

LIBRARY

Our reading equipment from the reference and collateral standpoints is very small. High school pupils require a well filled shelf of reference books in order to have sufficient material for study in English and History assignments. These pupils are required to read a certain number of books a year in fiction, travel, historical, or other instructional fields. The complaint is made continually that there are very few books of this nature available from our present school and village library equipment. The collateral reading supply can be in-

creased by adding to our village library. Our High school budget for books and supplies might set aside a certain amount for reference books until this deficiency is relieved.

ATHLETICS

During the spring of last year an interesting series of baseball games was played between teams composed of boys in Grades 7, 8, 9 and 10. Supervision for this pastime was under the direction of Mr. Dube of our High school faculty. A banquet was enjoyed by the winning team. Prizes were awarded to individual leaders. Footballs and volley balls were bought for the boys and girls last Fall from money in a small school fund. Basketball is being played this winter at the court on the school grounds.

HEALTH

A dental clinic was held at the school last Fall. The annual health inspection has been conducted by Miss Frances Edgett, School Nurse.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

I herewith submit my annual report as headmaster of the Walpole High School.

REGISTRATION

Compiled from a summary of the school registers for the first twenty weeks of school, 1934-1935.

Last year our percent of attendance was 95.5%. This year, so far, we have nearly reached the honor roll with 96.99% attendance. To be on the State honor roll we have to have a percent of attendance of 97. Our number of pupils not absent or tardy increased fifty percent as there were only eighteen last year at this same time. The number of visits by citizens and others is double last years, but is still low. Our non-resident enrollment is only two-thirds as large as last year. As our present enrollment is four times greater than last year this would indicate that nine more Walpole pupils are in attendance than last year. Also that our income from tuition has decreased.

SCHOLARSHIP

We are attempting to maintain high scholarship standards while differentiating our assignments for the pupils. Many outside activities engage the attention of the pupils today and it takes much moral courage, character and judgement to know where to stop. I notice that places like Nashua are dropping pupils from the rolls if they get behind due to indifference or

lack of attempting to succeed. We need the assistance of all the parents in helping the pupils to budget their time properly.

We are attempting to maintain the fundamentals by constant weekly practice.

Arthur Watkins, of the Class of 1933, has been appointed as a principal candidate for the Naval Academy at Annapolis. He has already passed the exacting scholarship examination required of all.

ORGANIZATION

The Walpole Warbler, under the direction of Miss Dorothy Sewell of the English department, was a splendid production with literary value. It was not very prosperous financially however as the sales of the magazine were very low.

The Dramatic Club has been holding many worth while meetings in studying the proper method of play production.

Our assembly programs have been under the direction of the several teachers and have been nearly entirely pupil productions.

Our school socials have been conducted by each class and have been free to the pupils. The money to conduct these socials was obtained from sales at the Walpole fair. The Junior High socials have been held separately and have been largely attended. Much value in proper social conduct is derived from these affairs.

The High school girls have been playing intramural basket-ball under the direction of Miss Helen Perkins. The Junior High boys have been playing basketball under the direction of Mr. Gordon Ayer. The boys have played with the schools of Charlestown, Bellows Falls and Kurn Hattin. The High school baseball team had a very fine season under the able coaching of Mr. Walter Bernard. The High school boys basketball team has shown much improvement in fundamentals and understanding of the game and are under the guidance of Mr. John Whittemore.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

During the Fall term screen doors were hung and were much appreciated.

There are many places in much need of repair in the High school building. The manual training groups are helping to clean up the boys' basement.

We still have a great need of adjustable desks and chairs to care for the growth of children from the seventh grade to the twelfth grade.

AGRICULTURE

The total enrollment in the Agricultural Department numbered twenty-seven, eighteen in the Freshmen-Sophomore group and nine in the Junior-Senior group.

Earl Westcott representing Hooper Chapter Future Farmers of America won the state prize speaking contest sponsored by the State Association. This is the first time Walpole has won this contest. Representing the state at the regional contest held at Eastern States Exposition Earl did a very creditable job.

Last spring three thousand white, two thousand red pine and one hundred spruce transplants, furnished by the State Forestry Department were set out on the Hooper estate. A total of thirty-five thousand pine have been set to date. Most of these trees have made good growth.

The new power sprayer has aided materially in disease control of the school orchard. Several orchards and shade trees in the community have been cared for by the agricultural classes.

Valuable experience was gained in greenhouse management, planting and disease control of plants through our greenhouse work. The marketing of plants was carried on as a project by the Future Farmers Club.

Each boy in the department carried on a suitable project in either poultry, dairying or crop production during the year. Records are kept on all phases of the work.

Through the interest and generosity of Walpole Grange and several townspeople three boys were given the opportunity to enjoy a ten-day vacation at the State Future Farmers Camp.

Walpole High entered teams in poultry and dairy cattle judging at Hopkinton fair. The teams placed second and third respectively.

Twenty members of the combined classes visited the Eastern States Exposition held at Springfield, Massachusetts. A portion of the time was spent as class work in viewing the agricultural exhibits.

The Tenth Annual School Fair was held on October 4th in the Town Hall. Exhibits of project and school work were displayed. This was in its entirety a school function, ably managed by the superintendents of the various departments. The interest and cooperation given us by many townspeople and Mr. Buss of Alstead added much in making this a most successful fair.

During the fall many farmers aided our work considerably by their fine cooperation in allowing the agricultural classes to judge poultry and dairy cattle at their farms and donating fruit for judging.

Twenty-five boys participated in the annual Interscholastic Judging Contest held at the University of New Hampshire on October 20th. Walpole High placed second in state competition with individual teams placing first in wood chopping and second in fruit.

Class work has centered around the farming conducted in the community and projects carried on by the individual boys. Several feeding rations including home grown feeds have been worked out by the Junior-Senior group. Two successful herds in town are being fed rations computed by the class. Four boys rating high in their poultry projects were presented day old chicks by Hubbard Farms. This interest in our work was much appreciated.

HOME ECONOMICS REPORT FOR 1935

The Home Economics courses open to the High school girls this year are Foods and Nutrition for Freshman and Sophomores and The Family and Its Members for the Juniors and Seniors.

The Freshman and Sophomore classes have completed units in food preservation, nutrition, and the kitchen—its arrangement and care. The work on food preservation included the canning of vegetables and fruits, the making of jellies and marmalade, and pickling. These were all exhibited at the School Fair. Blue, red and white ribbons were given for prizes. The girl obtaining the highest score for her work received the cup.

The composition and digestion of foods has given the girls a knowledge of what foods should be eaten. They have learned how the human system reacts to all kinds of foods and the amount of energy used in the various forms of activity. This enables them to plan carefully and economically the food for themselves and the members of the family depending on the type of work they do.

Through a study of how to maintain a kitchen, its equipment, and the utensils used they have learned how to select the most satisfactory materials. Also a knowledge of the cost of such materials for upkeep and replacement has given an appreciation of the value in the home. The study of plans for kitchens has brought before the girls the value of planning a kitchen for economy of time and space.

The unit on meal planning is being studied at the present time. This includes the actual planning, preparing, serving, and buying of foods. The project work for this unit is preparing hot lunches. For this the girls plan all the menus, buy all the food, do all the cooking and serving, and keep all accounts of money spent and received. This gives them excellent practical experience. We are working out receipes of our own for serving fifty people. After these have been completed and successfully used, they will be arranged in permanent form. The sub-units connected with meal planning are being taught by the contract method. The project work related to the kitchen included making draperies for the school kitchen, painting a breakfast set of four chairs, a table, and a tea wagon, and thoroughly cleaning a kitchen or closet, either at home or at school.

The Junior and Senior classes have completed units in Home Membership, Use of Leisure Time, Infant and Child Care and Training, Home Nursing and Emergencies, and Clothing For Infants and Children.

Home Membership gives the girls an understanding and appreciation of the responsibility for the family health. As members of the community they learn what they can do to help raise the standards of health through cleanliness, care of contagious diseases, and sanitation.

By choosing proper recreation for themselves and planning it for others they have learned the advantage of using leisure time. The selection of an avocation has been considered with a great deal of interest.

Home Care of the Helpless gives training theoretically and practically in the care, feeding, and clothing of children for all ages; the care of the sick person in the home which includes the daily treatment, the diet, symptoms, and the general care of the patient; and the first aid gives excellent experience in bandaging, emergencies, and general treatment for the common injuries.

A great deal is being learned about the special diets for the sick from the unit on Feeding the Sick which is now being studied. This gives a thorough understanding of nutrition as well as the opportunity for planning and preparing special diets that will be useful in caring for illness in the home.

Home projects have been completed in relation to each unit. A trip was taken to see the operating room at the Mousley Hospital.

The Junior High School classes have work in cooking and sewing. The cooking has included canning, jelly making, and the preparation of foods for breakfast, luncheon, and dinner. A breakfast and luncheon have been served this Fall. In the Spring they will assist in cooking and serving the banquet for the basketball boys.

The work in sewing has recently been started. The girls are making undergarments, dresses, or blouses for their first projects.

Grades V and VI receive elementary training in cooking and sewing. This teaches them the importance of good health rules, the cooking of simple dishes that are particularly beneficial, the fundamentals of good manners, and how they can be most helpful at home.

In sewing they are taught the hand sewing which includes simple mending. The use of the sewing machine is started in Grade VI. These girls are just beginning their sewing project.

The teaching staff gratefully acknowledge the cooperation of the Superintendent and townspeople in making our work successful.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. C. D. Dalzell, Supt. of Schools, Walpole, N. H. Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report to the town of Walpole.

The same schedule is followed in Walpole and North Walpole as in previous years, but the school in Drewsville and the Number 14 school have been added. In these rural schools the pupils are divided into younger and older divisions. The first, second and third grades make up the younger division and fourth, fifth and sixth grades are in the older division. In the younger division we have worked with the child voice. At the beginning of the year we had seven monotones and at present there is only one child classified as a monotone. In the older division the pupils have begun the study of note reading, instrumentation and lives of the composers. Fifteen minutes is given each week to each division. This is not enough time but with the splendid co-operation of the teachers in these two schools very satisfactory results have been obtained.

The daily time schedule in North Walpole has been changed this year, making it possible to hold special rehearsals the last period in the day. A sextette has been organized and we hope they will be able to represent their school at music festivals.

The orchestra in Walpole has added three new members. The orchestra attended a music festival held in the Vilas High school auditorium January 23rd and they are planning to play in the Kearsarge festival which is to be held in Henniker in the month of May. Miss Toby has given lessons to the violin pupils and they have made fine progress under her supervision.

The Walpole chorus class have begun work on an operetta which they plan to present in the spring.

I wish to thank Mr. Dalzell, Mr. Cotton, Mr. Russell, Miss Toby and all the teachers for the many things they have done to help the music department.
