

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To bring in your votes for the election of delegatesat-large, alternate delegates-at-large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for president and vicepresident of the United States.

4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.

5 To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.

6. To see if the Town will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$553.97.

7. To see if the Town will vote to co-operate with the State to rebuild the road leading from Route 12 past Lawrence A. Leach's to the state road. And raise and appropriate or borrow the sum of \$1,500. (The State to appropriate \$3,000).

8. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of highways and bridges.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair or rebuild the bridge on the river road near the John W. Atherton place so-called.

10. To see if the town will vote to conform to the provisions of Chapter 89, Public Laws as amended by Chapter 118, Sessions Laws of 1935. And take any actions relating thereto and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see what sum of money if any the Town will raise and appropriate for upkeep of cemeteries, etc.

12. To see if the Town will vote to apply calcium chloride to part of the E. R. U. section of the town road known as the River road and Spofford road, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$350 to buy or build two snow plows. One of said plows to be used in the East Westmoreland section.

14. To see what action the Town will make relating to a discount on taxes if paid before certain dates.

15. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jothan Lord fund.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$100 for the support of library. 17. To see what action the town will make relative to the property acquired by the town through taxes.

18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue furnishing free rental of hall. Or charge from all societies and for all gatherings.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my third report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Changes in the teaching positions were made as follows:

Miss Laura Edney was transferred to the Corner school. Miss Emily Atherton was elected to teach the upper grades at East Westmoreland. Miss Atherton graduated from Keene Normal school in 1934. Miss Lois Morrison, Keene Normal school, 1935, was elected to fill the vacancy which was caused by the resignation of Miss Gordon.

Standard achievement tests in all the fundamental subjects were given to the pupils in grades five to eight inclusive. Standard graduation tests were administered to the eighth grade pupils previous to graduation. The results of the tests were tabulated for purposes of comparison and indicated that the pupils generally were doing satisfactory work for their grades.

The testing program this year is principally diagnostic in nature. The purpose is to diagnose difficulties and weaknesses which may occur in fundamentals. The results are to be used as a guide to instruction and as a basis for remedial work. In each school a program for remedial work will be developed in accordance with the needs of the pupils as indicated by the results of the tests. Attention will be given to individual as well as to group needs.

The teachers attended the sessions of the State Teachers' Convention and at the Institute for Rural Teachers held at Sullivan. General letters containing specific suggestions in class and school management have been issued. A professional library of fifty-eight volumes is being circulated from the superintendent's office. The library consists of books dealing with class management and teaching problems.

I wish to express appreciation to the several Parent Teachers Associations for their continued interest manifested in contributions to the work and equipment of the schools.

Hot lunches are being served during the winter months in all of the schools.
