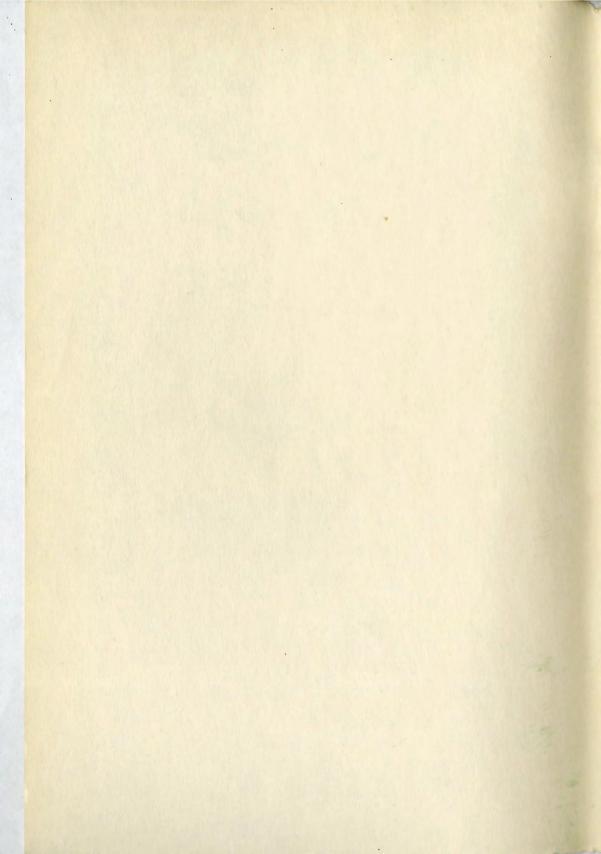

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Windham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town

[L. S.] Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Windham on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To hear the reports of Auditors, agents and other Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any votes relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Tax Collector's deed.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' salaries.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' expenses.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Election and Registration.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Dog Officer and Damage by Dogs.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Vital Statistics.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lighting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Damages and Legal Expenses.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for Interest owed by the Town.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building and Zoning Ordinance as submitted by the Town Planning Board, or take any action relating thereto.

PROPOSED BUILDING AND ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF WINDHAM, N. H.

In order to promote the health, safety, convenience, prosperity and general welfare of the Town of Windham, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the said Town, pursuant to the authority conferred by Chapter 51, Section 50-71 of the Revised Laws and Chapters 110 and 128 of the Laws of 1949, of the State of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE I

Establishment of Zoning Districts

Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance, The Town of Windham is divided into two zones as particularly defined on a map known as the Windham Zoning Map, dated March 9, 1954, filed in the office of the Town Clerk by the Town Planning Board and which is made a part of this ordinance:

Zone A, shall comprise the Recreation Zone which shall include all land within one thousand (1,000) feet of the shore of any body of water over five (5) acres in area.

Zone B, shall comprise the whole Town with the exception of Zone A, and shall be known as the Rural Zone.

ARTICLE II

Building Regulations - Zone A

The Recreation Zone shall enjoy the following provisions:

Section 1. The size of a building lot in this district shall be a minimum of seventy-five by one hundred (75x100) feet for each family unit.

Sec. 2. All buildings will be set back a minimum of six (6) feet from side lot lines and fifteen (15) feet from the shore of the pond.

Sec. 3. Every dwelling shall have a minimum ground floor area of four hundred (400) square feet, for each family unit. This section does not apply to transient accommodations, but they shall comply with State Laws relating to same.

Sec. 4. Foundations shall be constructed of concrete, brick, cement block or stone and may be constructed in the form of piers of proper size and distance placed on suitable footings below the frost line.

Sec. 5. The roof of every building hereafter erected or recovered shall be covered with non-combustible or fire-resistant materials.

Sec. 6. Buildings must be framed according to good building practices and outside walls shall be suitably finished in a permanent manner.

Sec. 7. Chimneys shall be constructed from the ground up with flue linings properly installed.

Sec. 8. Every building must be completed on the outside within eighteen (18) months after issuance of permit.

Sec. 9. All electric wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property.

Sec. 10. Sewage disposal systems for new dwellings shall consist of an approved septic tank and will follow the requirements of the Health Laws of the State of New Hampshire. The disposal area for effluent from any septic tank shall be no nearer than seventy-five (75) feet of a public body

of water, except where special permission is granted by the Town Health Officer.

Sec. 11. Minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 12. No owner or occupant of land shall permit fire or other ruins to be left but shall remove the same within one (1) year.

Sec. 13. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land or buildings.

ARTICLE III

The Rural Zone shall enjoy the following provisions:

Section 1. All lots intended for residential purposes shall be at least fifteen thousand (15,000) square feet per each family unit and shall have an average minimum width of one hundred (100) feet.

ARTICLE IV

New Developments

Section 1. The owner of any plot of ground intended for development or subdivision into two or more building lots shall file with the Planning Board a plan or map of the proposed subdivision, and shall obtain the approval of the Planning Board thereon before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in said subdivision.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Planning Board to inspect the site of such proposed subdivision and to require such roadways and other areas of common use as may eventually be acceptable to the Town for maintenance by the Town, and to approve the same when satisfied that such proposed plans are in harmony and conducive to the general welfare of the Town and the neighborhood, and not detrimental to existing property values, but in no sense shall this be deemed an acceptance by the Town of the street, streets or other areas dedicated to public use.

ARTICLE V Enforcement

- Section 1. Enforcement shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- Sec. 2. The Board of Selectmen shall issue any and all building permits requested when such permit is in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance.
- Sec. 3. Permits. After passage of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any dwelling or alter the bulk of any dwelling or relocate any dwelling without first obtaining a building permit from the Board of Selectmen. Permits will also be required for small accessory buildings in Zone A.
- Sec. 4. No permit shall be required for remodeling or repairing where the total cost of such work, including material, will not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) and the purpose for which the building is to be used is not changed.
- Sec. 5. A permit will be required for any construction or development of a commercial enterprise within Zone A. Applicant must secure permis-

sion from abutting property owners, or failing to do so, may request a public hearing and must receive a favorable decision before receiving permit.

Sec. 6. There shall be no charge for permits issued for the erection or alteration of buildings or structures.

Sec. 7. No permit, however, shall be issued unless the proposed structure will present a reasonable appearance and will be in keeping with the neighborhood and unless the building is to be finished on the exterior in a permanent manner and is to be suitably painted on the outside wherever the same is of wood or a material customarily painted. This is intended to eliminate the erection of structures obviously out of place for the neighborhood where they are to be located and which may have a detrimental effect on the property values and neighborhood character. When an objection on the account of the appearance of a proposed structure, as above dictated, is raised by a majority of the families residing or owning property within a radius of one thousand (1,000) feet of the property in question, the Board of Adjustment shall hold a public hearing to receive the evidence on both sides and shall have the authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.

Sec. 8. Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other legal action.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Adjustment

Section 1. After the adoption of this ordinance, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to a Board of Adjustment of five members, conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Chapter 51 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended. This Citizen Board shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this Ordinance, where it can be shown that unnecessary hardship would otherwise result and where such decision would not be contrary to the public interest.

ARTICLE VII Amendments

Section 1. The provisions of this Ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by Public Laws.

ARTICLE VIII

Penalties

Section 1. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished upon conviction, by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each day of violation in accordance with Public Laws, Chapter 42, Section 67.

ARTICLE IX Saving Clause

Section 1. The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

ARTICLE X When Effective

Section 1. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to apply for T. R. A. for

Class V. roads.

16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for tar for Town roads.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate to sand Class V. roads.

18. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to

raise and appropriate for winter road maintenance.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of spraying elm trees along public roads in the Town of Windham.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the Town Hall, or to

take any action relating to the rent of same.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair the first floor ceiling in the Town Hall.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to place a hardwood floor on the second floor of the Town Hall.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the grounds around

the Town Hall, Fire House, and Library.

24. To see if the Town will vote that the Superintendent of Police shall not be elected by vote of the Town, but that he shall be appointed by the Selectmen, under the Provisions of Chapter 422 of the Revised Laws; this vote to take effect upon its passage.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate

a sum of money as a salary for the Chief of Police.

26. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

27. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise

and appropriate for the Fire Department.

28. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of

money to be matched by a like amount from the State, for fire fighting equipment.

29. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of

money to be used for the Town Dump maintenance.

30. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of needy persons and old age assistance.

- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Library maintenance.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for care of Cemeteries.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$150.00 for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to quiet the title on the residue of land of Lake Shores Development Trust.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in trust, the income to be expended for the perpetual care of the James and Ann Bradley lot.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in trust, the income to be expended for the perpetual care of the Fred C. Noves lot.
- 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) in trust, the income to be expended for the perpetual care of the Caleb B. Clark lot and the William B. Hanson lot.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As an innovation to our Town Report, the selectmen, this year, wish to submit an account of some of the past year's departmental activities and recommendations for future planning. The purpose of this report is to explain the reasons for some of the overdrafts and to suggest policies which will help the Town to operate economically and efficiently in the future.

The expense of maintaining the Town Hall approximated the amount of the appropriation, however it is felt that a reduction in fuel cost may be achieved. The thermostat settings should be reduced to a minimum when the hall is not in use. Those who use the hall should be sure to check this before leaving. There are two special articles in the warrant which continue a renovating program for the Town Hall. The need for a first floor ceiling is obvious. A hardwood floor for the second floor hall has become a definite need with the additional use of the hall for social activities. The fire insurance coverage on the Town Hall has been raised to cover costs of recent improvements. The three-year policy, coming due this year, will cause a substantial rise in the Town Hall budget.

Our winter highway maintenance for 1953 resulted in a sizable unexpended balance—due mostly to favorable weather. Town Road Aid from the State this year will amount to \$4,133.20, of which \$539.11 will be the Town's share. This year it is planned to expend this account on those sections of town roads which are unimproved and are used primarily by our summer residents. These funds are controlled by the State Highway Department and may be applied only to those roads which meet the approval of their engineers. One important factor that they consider in choosing roads for this aid is the amount of taxable property served by the road. The road must also be a public way belonging to the Town.

Our Police Department now has a Ford Cruiser which greatly aids this section in a more efficient service. With

more and more police calls coming in every year, it has become apparent that the Town should have a salaried Police Officer. We recommend that the Superintendent of Police be appointed rather than elected, and that he receive an annual salary of \$1,000. This would increase the Police Department budget only slightly.

Our 1953 Dump expenses well exceeded the appropriation. One of the principal reasons for this overdraft was the cost of fire control. At one time during the summer, the Proctor Road dump burned continuously for nearly six weeks and required frequent attention from the Fire Department. The use of the dumps seems to build up each year and lack of cooperation from both townspeople and campers in dumping over the bank has cost the Town much more for maintenance than it should. It is contemplated, during this year, to keep the Proctor Dump closed except for two days a week, Wednesday and Sunday, and have part-time supervision on those days. This should make maintenance easier and less expensive.

A 1953 appropriation for the purchase of land for a new dump site has been carried over. In view of the fire problem that we had last year, no suitable dump site has been found to date. The site must be near an adequate water supply and definitely not in an isolated spot where an unnoticed fire might gain headway before an alarm could be sounded. We realize the shortcomings of the present dump site and will welcome any ideas for improvement of our rubbish disposal system.

The appropriation for last year on Old Age Assistance and town relief also showed a serious overdraft. The expenses in this department are difficult to control, but we may still consider ourselves fortunate when we compare our Town Poor situation with that of surrounding towns.

The Fire Department, having had a good year, shows an unexpended balance from their 1953 appropriation. It is contemplated to ask for less money for the maintenance of this section for the coming year. During the past two years, funds have been expended for the installation of six waterholes at strategic locations throughout the Town. There are at least two more places in Town where water holes are

critically needed for adequate fire protection of nearby dwellings. One spot is on Range Road near Maple Street, and the other is near the Robin's Nest on Route 28. Repeated attempts by Town Officials to get permission to install water-holes at these locations have met with no cooperation from property owners.

At the present time, the Fire Department has two trucks, both Fords—one of 1938 vintage and the other a 1949. It is planned at a future date to convert the older Ford into a fire truck solely for the purpose of fighting woods fires, and purchase a new truck to replace it. In order to build up a fund for the purchase of this new truck it would seem advisable to set aside a sum each year for the next few years, said sum to be placed with the trustee of trust funds.

Our cemetery expenditures also exceeded the receipts, but for the first time in several years complaints about cemetery conditions have become almost nil. Much of the work went into hitherto neglected portions of the cemeteries, and maintenance costs should be less this year. The grading on the Plains has been completed and will require only seeding in

the Spring.

Recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development will be introduced at Town Meeting by the Planning Board. In order to sustain a high standard of property values in our recreational areas, controls of future land development are necessary. We sincerely hope that these recommendations will be favorably met by the Townspeople.

In conclusion, we wish to acknowledge the complete cooperation of all Town Officials, and the general interest of

Townspeople during the past year.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Windham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1952—December 31, 1953: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1952 and December 31 1953, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$3,043.79 during the year 1953.

ANALYSIS of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net revenue surplus of \$1,369.32, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,649.47, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,018.79.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1953, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Surety Bond:

It is recommended that the surety bond of the Town Clerk be increased from \$500.00 to \$1,000.00 in 1954, in order that it may be more proportionate in amount to the total funds handled by the Clerk.

Conclusion:

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Windham for their assistance during the course of the audit.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the school district in the town of Windham, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 6th day of March, 1954 at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following:

By vote of the School Board, the polls for this meeting will remain open from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the School District, at the opening of the meeting may vote.

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
 - 6. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.
 - 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
 - 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600 to take care of the deficiency in the building account and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for roadway to Searles School and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for classroom exit at Searles School and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for basement exit at Searles School and pass

any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money—said sum to be placed with the trustees of trust funds to be in addition to the fund to be used for hot lunch equipment and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 13. To see if the voters of the district will authorize the school district to use the money in the amount of \$1,500.00, which has heretofore been raised as a capital reserve fund for the purpose of the hot lunch program, and to use same at the present time to reimburse the district for money expended to pay for an overdraft in alteration of the Searles School as voted at the last district meeting and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 14. By petition—To see if the district will vote to instruct the School Board to have a detailed statement of payments included in the School Report as printed in the annual Town Report.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Sec. 47-Budget. At a meeting held before January first of each year the supervisory union board shall adopt a budget required for the expenses of the supervisory union for the next fiscal year, which budget may include the salary and expenses of supervisors of health, physical education, music. art and guidance, and any other employees, and expenses necessary for the operation of the supervisory union. The Supervisory union board shall apportion the total amount of the budget among the constituent school districts on the following basis, provided that each district shall be required to pay for only those services in which they share. The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous school year and one-half on the last assessed valuation of the district. Prior to January fifteenth in each year, the board shall certify to the chairman of the school board of each constituent school district the amount so apportioned. Each district within a supervisory union shall raise at the next annual district meeting the sum of money apportioned to it by the supervisory union board for the expenses of services which each district receives in connection with the union office.

The Supervisory Union Board voted to appropriate \$18,078.62, including \$2,275.00 as the State's share of the Superintendent's salary, for the operation of the Union. The distribution of the Union's share of \$15,803.62 among the constituent districts is indicated below:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as superintendent of schools of Windham.

STATISTICAL REPORTS

Enrollment

The total enrollment for grades one through eight for the period ending January 31, 1954 was 181 as compared to 182 for the same period last year and 152 two years ago.

The enrollment figures show no change over last year in the overall total. The enrollment in the lower grades 1-4 shows an increase and the upper grades (5-8) a decrease. The enrollments in grades 1-3 are sufficiently high to warrant a teacher per grade. On the basis of the census report a first grade in excess of 20 is indicated for another year. If the trend continues, the district will be faced with the prospect of providing a room per grade. The prospect for next September would seemingly indicate grouping grades 5-6 and 7-8 with single grades 1-4. The enrollment would then be:

Grade 2 3 4 5-6 7-8 26 27 28 32 34

Such a grouping might result in a transportation problem to Searles but it would be the best arrangement for the educational interests of children.

Instruction

There was only one change in personnel. Mrs. Pauline Medico, a teacher of several years experience in the schools of New Jersey was engaged in Mrs. Smith's place. The new room required an additional teacher. Miss Areadne Katsakiores was engaged. She had several years experience. It can not be stressed too strongly that geographic location has enabled the district to fill existing vacancies with trained, experienced personnel.

The progress of pupils is apt to be better with stability of staff. The fact that 4 of 5 teachers returned to the same position enables them to make maximum use of the facilities of the school and community. It also enables the teacher to have a fuller knowledge of the strengths, weaknesses, aptitudes and interests of the children. The parents and teachers can work together to provide the maximum opportunity for the children of the community.

The music and handwriting program continued. The work in both areas was well worthwhile. The increase in enrollment has necessitated some change in the program for next year. The handwriting service has increased slightly in cost. This is due only to the increase in enrollment and the addition of a teacher. The music program will also be restored to its former status. The services of Mrs. Kelley will be utilized by the towns of Auburn, Chester, Londonderry and Windham. The increase in enrollments in all towns has resulted in the number of classrooms in the four districts now being 2 greater than it was when Mrs. Kelley began her work.

The teachers are constantly trying to improve their techniques and the service they give to children. Attendance at summer schools and enrollment in extension courses is proof of this.

Book purchases have continued under the same policy as before. The aim of the educative process is to prepare children to meet the problems of a complex society. This involves a changing and expanding curriculum while at the same time the fundamental educational processes are met. To meet these two objectives the teacher needs tools in abundance and books are one of the more important tools. Books along

with supplies are areas where spending within reasonable limits pays tremendous dividends.

The program of maintenance has been one of improvement and preservation of our present plant. The funds expended in this area are sound economy and represent a small percentage of the capital investment in school plant. Improvement of plant facilities results in greater operating efficiency and in improvement of educational opportunity. Attractive, well lighted, and well cared for classrooms are conducive to better work and healthier children.

The capital reserve fund created for the development of a hot lunch area is nearing the point where plans can be developed to determine the costs of alteration to offer this service. The necessity of using the area originally planned for hot lunch as classroom space has resulted in a situation that requires a change in planning. The kitchen area required and the area for serving can possibly be housed in the present basement area. It involves long range plans, however, that should be based on careful consideration of the future program of expansion.

Finances

The proposed school district budget exclusive of special articles shows an overall increase of \$9,201.48. An analysis of the budget reveals that nearly all areas are increased.

Auxiliary Agencies

This area again is responsible for the greatest amount of increase. The increase is wholly confined to the items of tuition. The legal responsibility of the district for High School tuition is \$290 per pupil for the current year. The potential high school enrollment is 60. The result is an increase of \$5,030.00. Elementary tuition is also increased. The residences of some elementary children are such that it is more economical of time and expense to have children transported and educated by neighboring districts when possible. These items are statutory in nature and must be met.

Debt and Interest

An increase of \$2,212.50 is noted in this area. This also is statutory and is in accord with the vote of the district meetings of 1953.

Instruction

The increase in this item \$1,287.12 is entirely in teachers salaries. The reorganization of music instruction and increases for teachers are in accord with the situation on a state and national basis.

Operation of Plant

The next largest increase is in plant operation. This reflects the additional room now considered in the regular budget rather than in a special article as it was last year. All the items are increased slightly with the total increase \$550.

Fixed Charges

One item on this area is increased, teachers' retirement. An increase in rate of the district's payment plus an additional teacher is responsible for this increase.

Administration

The items in this area reflect the increased enrollment. With virtually no increase in estimated expenditures on a Union basis the increased enrollment results in a greater share of the cost by the district. Per capita tax alone increased \$56.00 This is based on enrollment. The state has also provided a helping teacher for the area. The local share of her salary is included in this area.

Special Articles

The special articles with the exception of the deficiency appropriation to complete payment of the new room at Searles are all presented to the district in the interest of greater safety and health for children.

The district can determine whether the expenditures are wise and expedient at the present time.

State Support

The need for financial support of education at a state level is increasingly apparent. The whole burden of supporting what is constitutionally a state function has been, in the local situation, assumed by the community. Enrollments have increased at a more rapid rate than has the value of real estate. Thus the support of education has become a major portion of the tax load. Some alleviation of this load should be the major consideration of the forthcoming session of the General Court.

I am appreciative of the opportunity to serve the children of a district where cooperation of all is the usual attitude in connection with the progress of pupils.

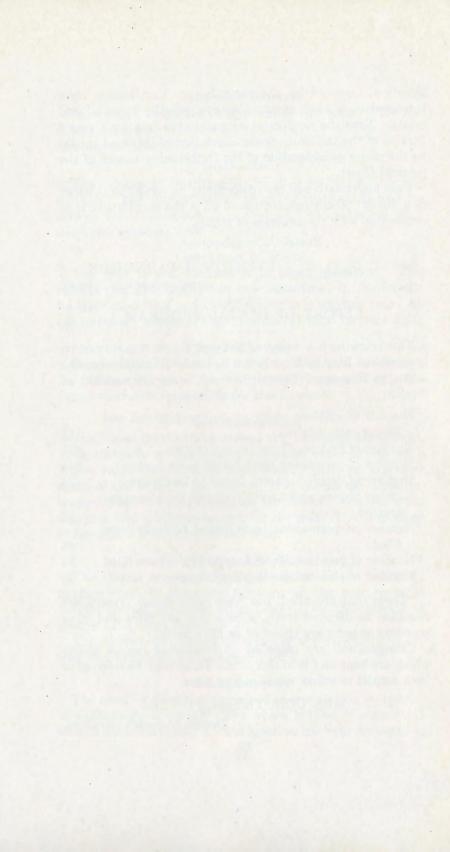

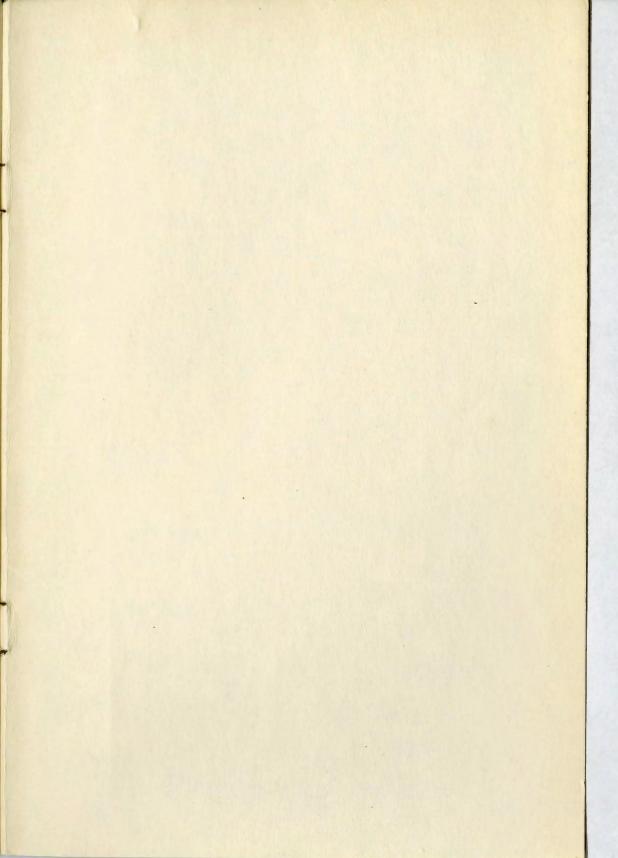
