The town has reached a settlement with the International Paper Co.; they having agreed to pay the sum of \$400, and it is understood (although there is no writing to that effect) that they are to keep the dam, which they have built above G. A. Clark's, in good repair so long as they use the river to drive logs; if they do this it will protect the highway to some extent.

There is a note of \$1,500 against the town, which is not put under the head of notes, but is included in orders outstanding; it is put in this way, because I have an order from the selectmen to pay it, and shall do so as soon as there are sufficient funds; have no doubt but what it will be paid before the annual meeting

in March.

Trust Funds.

The town has three legacies which it holds in trust; the Hutchins legacy of \$1,500 is invested so that the town gets an income of four per cent interest; the Hibbard legacy of \$1,000, and the Simonds legacy of \$500 the town pays four per cent interest on; this interest is used according to the provisions of the wills, which were accepted by the town.

All of which is most respectfully submitted.

The balance in the hands of trustees will be paid out for re-

binding of books and a book-case this spring.

There has been 118 volumes added this year, making 908 volumes now in the library. In our last lot of books we have added complete works of Victor Hugo and Alexander Dumas, so have 5 volumes of Hugo's and Dumas' works, (duplicates) to be disposed of, as we had those 5 volumes in library before this last order, that is why our total number of volumes is only 908.

These books were all furnished the library by the town, ex-

cepting one volume given by John L. Bedell.

The circulation is steadily increasing each year. The whole number of books taken out of library for the year was 2,548 volumes. This is a circulation of 416 volumes larger than last year.

The largest number taken out any one week was 68 volumes, and the least number any one week was 30, and the average num-

ber each week was 49.

The circulation at the distributing agency at Swiftwater was

364 volumes, the largest of any past year.

The books have been well used, and are in good condition. We have quite a number of volumes to be rebound now, but this will be the second lot since the library was started. There are a number of library fines that we have been unable to collect, from people who ought to pay, and are able to pay. These several people have been refused the use of the library until the fines are paid. Our last order of books contains a good many of the later books, and we have added a good Eneyclopædia, so our library is still "up to date."

We would recommend the town to vote to raise \$50, or more, to buy books with this coming year. We have now a nice little library of over nine hundred volumes, all of which has grown in the last five and a half years, by the tax payers' generosity, and with the aid of the Young People's Dramatic Club of Bath. We have a library now so let's keep it growing. You will never miss the money raised, for it only amounts to a very little to each tax payer, but its means much to the library. What better cause is there to work for than a good moral library to educate your boys and girls?
