To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for lighting the streets with Electricity.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid Construction, State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 7. To see what action the town will take to suppress the White Pine Blister.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies given to the Town by different individuals, the income to be used for the care of cemetery lots.
- 9. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Evergreen Cemetery.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$250.00 to plow the snow from Trunk Line No. 102 between the Antrim and Hancock Town Lines during the winter 1926-1927.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to paint the Town Hall inside and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Bennington:

The outstanding need of the children is a real playground. Lacking space for such, the school board can consider the advisability of equipping the restricted area now available with simple play ground apparatus, chinning poles, see-saws, basket ball goals, or swings, or horizontal ladders. None of these cost much, they could be installed by a group of public spirited men who remember their own childhood. Bennington is a village, not a rural section, and the children of the town deserve the chance for muscle building play, for competitions of the sort dear to all youth. At present, not even a suitable place is provided for even broad-jumping. Health is the essential for education and for the making of useful citizens. And properly supervised and guided play is wholly educational.

Concerning the buildings that are at present used the school board should consider how far it can wisely go in making them modern, without precluding the possibility of building a consolidated school on some suitable lot. At present the greatest need of the rooms is for adequate light, properly distributed. In a mill town, the question of suitable light needs no plea. Vitally important for work, every means should be used to provide it in proper manner. The almost ideal windows in the large town building are made useless by wrong shades, cutting off top lights. This could be arranged at minor expense, by installing a shade of mill or school type.

More windows are needed. The primary room is not suited for its purpose, when the large number of children at present taught there is considered as a deciding factor. It is so arranged as to force right-handed lighting. New arrangement of desks will assist, and new shades will add to the usable light.

The equipment is in need of changes, particularly is this true in the case of the non-adjustable desks, or those which are so limited as to adjustment as practically to be the same. Movable chair-desks would, probably, save the town money. These could be transferred from room to room as the need arises, and the proper purchase of varied sizes would make it possible to fit the chair desks to the children instead of using the present method of fitting the children to the desks.

Suspension globes are recommended for the two rooms. Bennington can well afford to have a school of which it can be truly proud. Needed equipment can be added from year to year, and especial attention can be given to visual education.

It would be manifestly unfair not to speak in strong praise of the work done by Miss Cashion and Miss Cilley. Survey of the achievement of the children, made in the fall of 1925, proved conclusively that these teachers are constantly keeping alive, and have added to the excellent foundations laid in Reading, Writing and Arithmetic. Very little credit can be taken by any aids that they have had. Without what many would consider a minimum equipment, these teachers have wrought wisely and built thoroughly. Their reward should be great.

Possibly the outstanding feature of supervision in Union No. 47 is the eagerness of teachers and school boards to make the fullest possible use of the available supervision. This splendid, friendly spirit is greatly appreciated by the superintendent of schools, and is a challenge to him to give nothing less than the best possible.
