STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, ROCKINGHAM, SS.

To the Inhabitants of Little Boar's Head District, a village district in the Town of North Hampton organized under provision of Chapter 196, Session Laws of 1905, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Stotts' house in said district on the first Tuesday of September next (the 4th day of the month) at eight o'clock in the evening (8.00 P. M.), to act on the following subjects:—

1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose all other necessary district officers.
3. To raise such sum of money as may be needed for sidewalks, hydrant service, fire protection, street lights, policing, and all other district expenses.
4. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Commissioners' Report

I. *Sidewalks.*

For the first winter in several years, we have had no break in the walk along the top of Bass Beach. This has meant a substantial saving of expense.

The old iron-pipe guard rail along the walk by Lewis' Cove had become rusted so badly that several sections had broken down. We have had installed in its place a 4 by 4 inch wooden guard rail supported on concrete posts, reinforced by pipes running down into the breakwater. We have also had the breakwater here pointed up as a protection to the posts.

Other work on sidewalks has included the usual clearing of the walks in the spring, cutting away of weeds by the sides of the walks, and a few minor repairs.

II. *Street Lights.*

At present all the street lights in the District are maintained by the Town of North Hampton.

III. *Hydrants and Fire Apparatus.*

The District maintains nine hydrants from the Hampton Water Works Company at the cost of \$100.00 a hydrant a year.

The District now has 500 feet of hose, with its fire extinguishers, in the Boyntons' barn. The other 400 feet of our hose have been loaned to the Town, to be kept on its fire engine, as voted at the District meeting three years ago.

IV. *Policing.*

The Town assumes full responsibility for policing, and has kept two policemen along the waterfront every Sunday. The District has co-operated in picking up the rubbish on the Beach Hill Monday mornings, the Town attending to emptying the rubbish barrels.

The loam along the Boulevard south of the Fish Houses was put in by the Station to prevent cars from getting stuck in the sand.

V. *District Tax Rate.*

The District's tax rate this year is \$2.00 on \$1,000.00 valuation. We hope to reduce this slightly for another year.

VI. *District Dump.*

Effort is now being made to obtain at a reasonable price a suitable piece of land for the District dump.

VII. *Annual Meeting.*

This year the innovation is being made of holding the annual meeting in the evening rather than in the afternoon. It is hoped that this will result in a larger attendance on the part of the property owners of the District.

As the question of mosquito eradication is of vital interest to residents of this district we believe that it would be desirable to co-operate with the Rye Beach District in an attempt to alleviate this nuisance. The Rye Beach Commissioners have already obtained the services of an expert and the report of a survey will be made at their next meeting to which any interested parties from Little Boar's Head are invited. After the reading of the report the meeting will be open to general discussion. We believe that it is to the interest of residents of Little Boar's Head to attend this meeting which is to be held Tuesday evening, September 4th, at 8.30 p. m., Eastern Standard time, in the Hall over the Rye Beach Post Office.

The Little Boar's Head District Meeting at Miss Stott's will be called promptly at 8.00 p. m., Standard time and an attempt will be made to complete the business by 8.30 o'clock to allow those who desire to attend the Rye Beach meeting.
