COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

TO THE CITIZENS OF CARROLL COUNTY, N. H.:

Agreeable to the requirements of the laws of the State, the Commissioners of Carroll County submit the following report for the year ending May 1st, 1887.

The Finances of the County are in a good condition, and its credit is equal to the best in the State.

Every proper demand has been paid as presented.

The County debt on May 1st, 1887, is as follows:

The debt, less note of A. H. Rust, and Cash in the Treasury, is \$80 072 08, and the reduction of the debt for the year, is \$8 731 34.

The debt of the County except the \$13,700 of 4 1-2 and 6 per cent. bonds bears a rate of interest of 4 per cent. only.

No bonds will be due for the five years next ensuing, but

the \$26,201.76 of four per cent. notes are subject to call, and may be paid at any time.

We estimate money necessary for the current expenses of the County for the year 1888, and a like sum for 1889, as follows :
