### Town Warrant.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.



TO THE INITIALITY OF THE TOWN OF CLAREMONT IN THE COUNTY OF SULLIVAN, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

YOU are hereby notified to meet at the lower assembly room in the Town Hall in said town, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay incidental expenses.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the year commencing February 15, 1905 and ending February 15, 1906.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the year commencing February 15, 1905, and ending February 15, 1906, and determine how it shall be paid.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the debts of the town.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town's poor.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for the use of hydrants.
- $10. \ \,$  To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for expense of Memorial Day.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the American Band.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the Board of Education.

- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in aid of the Cottage Hospital.
  - 15. To choose a committee for Stevens High School for the ensuing year.
- 16. To determine the rate of discount the town will allow persons paying their taxes within such period as the town may designate.
- 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to having two regular policemen, one for day and one for night work.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Tree Warden, and raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the purpose of preserving trees and shrubbery, and planting more where needed along the streets and highways of Claremont.
- 19. To choose three members of the Board of Trustees of Fiske Free Library to serve for the term of three years.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the support of Fiske Free Library, to be applied agreeably to the contract with Andrew Carnegie and Samuel P. Fiske.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-six hundred and sixteen dollars (\$2,616.00) to apply on payment of notes given to raise money for building North Street School House.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue town notes to the Trustees of Tappan Fund and Fiske Fund for money belonging to said funds now in Treasury.
  - 23. To see if the town will vote to establish a Police Court.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to adopt chapter 105 of the Session Laws of 1901, entitled, An Act in relation to political caucuses and conventions.
- 25. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to place an arc light at the junction of Hanover and Eastman Streets.
- 26. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint three Commissioners who shall have charge of Mountain View Cemetery.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to improve Mountain View Cemetery and the entrance to the same.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation, for a term not exceeding ten years, the following described manufacturing establishment proposed to be erected or put in operation and the capital to be used in operating the same to be constructed by A. Roberts and Company and the Claremont Woollen Company, on Sugar River in said Claremont, a short distance west of the present woollen mill of said A. Roberts and Company, to wit: A dam across said Sugar River for the purpose of creating a water power and a two story brick building connected therewith about one hundred and forty feet long, the same to be used for the purpose of manufacturing woollen goods.
- 29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out a highway from Eastman Street so-called across lands of W. H. Ayer, William Duncan, J. C. Timson and Louis Tebo to Barnes Street.

- 30. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main from Draper's Corner, so-called, along Maple Avenue to and including the Sullivan County Fair Association Grounds and Pinehurst, so-called, during present year of 1905.
- 31. To see if the town will vote the Fire Department the free use of the Town Hall, one such night as they may desire to hold their annual Firemen's Ball, when the hall is not previously engaged.
- 32. To see what action the town will take in regard to putting in hydrants at West Claremont and in regard to a supply of water for their use.
- 33. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee to re-appraise the real estate in town during the coming year.
- 34. To see if the town will vote to unite with the contiguous town of Weathersfield, in the State of Vermont, for the building of a free bridge over the Connecticut River agreeably to the provisions of sections 12 and 13 chapter 67 of the Public Statutes and

To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to unite with the Selectmen or other proper officers of said Weathersfield and contract with them for the purchase of any real estate or franchise if in their opinion the public good requires a highway to be laid out over such property or so near thereto as seriously to affect the value thereof and to agree as to the proportion of expense to be borne by each town in the construction and maintenance of such highway including bridge piers, abutments and approaches and the proportion that each shall pay to third persons as damages subject to the approval of the town agreeably to the statute in such ease made and provided.

- 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purposes mentioned in the last preceding article or to see in what other way the town will vote to provide therefor and to take any action necessary to carry out the purposes of this article by borrowing money and giving notes or issuing bonds of the town therefor.
- 36. To see if the town will vote to give the free use of the Town Hall at three different times during the year and of the Opera House once during the year, when not otherwise in use, to the Ladies' Union Aid Society for the benefit of the Claremont Cottage Hospital.
  - 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE STEVENS HIGH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

At the beginning of the present school year the courses of study were somewhat re-arranged. A regular two-years' "Commercial Course" has been added and those who complete this work will be given a certificate to that effect. The required and elective studies have been so grouped as to assist the pupil in his choice of a course, and to limit him to appropriate electives supplementing the required studies in that course. These changes have resulted in a more systematic choice of electives, with less erratic special courses. The courses for which diplomas are awarded are the Classical, Scientific and English courses.

Graduates of the school are now allowed the right of admission by certificate to all New England colleges repre-

sented by the Central Certificating Board.

The corps of teachers includes the principal, Mr. Dewey, and four regular assistants, Misses Lewis, Dennett, Durward and Forsythe, the latter filling the place of Miss Parsons, who resigned at the close of last year.

There has been a further increase in number of pupils as compared with the number reported last year, the entering

### Funds.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PARAN STEV-ENS FUND AND THE HELEN R. HEALEY FUND.

Since our last annual report the Fiske house has been sold to Mr. Burt Chellis for the sum of \$5,000.00. There has also been received from the selectmen, from the sale of western lands the sum of \$840.91. These sums amounting to \$5,840.91 have been invested in Claremont Water Supply bonds. These additions to the bonds previously held, and reported one year ago, make the amount of the Stevens fund, now in our hands \$83,900.00, in water bonds, and \$45.47 not yet invested. There has further been received from the rents of lands belonging to the Stevens bequest \$57.92, which is added to the income from this fund, and applied for the support of Stevens High school.

The Healey fund remains substantially as reported last year, no real estate having been disposed of during the year. There is now held by us from the Healey bequest, \$56,000.00 in Claremont Water Supply bonds; \$47.29 cash, not invested; three houses and five vacant house lots on or near High St. Thus we have a total, from both of these bequests, in water bonds \$139,900.00; in cash, to be invested in water bonds,

\$92.76, and the Healey real estate mentioned above.

These bonds bear interest at 4 per cent. per annum, hence may be expected from this source the coming year, for the current expenses of Stevens High school \$5,596.00, and this sum is likely to be increased by income from further additions from both the Stevens and the Healey bequests and from the sale of real estate and rents.

We have received as income the past year the sum of \$5,500.92. There was a balance of \$1,484.60 in the treasury at the opening of the year. This balance and income together make the sum of \$6,985.52 for the support of Stevens High school. There has been paid to the Stevens High school committee, since Feb. 15, 1904, the sum of \$5,394.00 leaving

a balance of \$1,591.52 in the treasury for the remainder of the school year which ends in June, of the present year.

In calculating upon the figures in this report, it should be borne in mind that the town's fiscal year ends Feb. 15, while

the school year ends in June.

That the high school committee and the voters of the forthcoming town meeting may more easily comprehend the financial conditions, and the needs for the coming year, the following summary is added:

## Carnegie Library.

#### REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

CLAREMONT, N. H., Feb. 1st, 1905.

Following is the report of the committee appointed at the adjourned town meeting, March 11th, 1903, "to receive, expend and duly account for the fifteen thousand dollars(\$ 15,000), given by Andrew Carnegie for the erection of the pro-

posed Library building."

Organizing shortly after appointment, the committee proceeded to the selection of an architect and the preparation of plans and estimates. The letting of the contract was somewhat delayed owing to revision necessary in order to keep the cost within the donation; and other delays due to weather, difficulty of obtaining materials, and other conditions beyond our control, made the progress of the work somewhat slow. The building has been completed according to the plans and estimates, and was dedicated Nov. 3rd, 1904.

The building as constructed provides ample space for the present number of books and for convenient service. By adding book stacks as needed, four or five times the present number of books can be accommodated. The heating and electric wiring installations have sufficient capacity for ex-

tensions to attic and basement if needed.

The committee hopes that a large room left in the basement for the purpose of equipping it for a mens' evening room, may be equipped by the town within the next year or two, believing that a room of this sort is much needed as an attractive place for many of our young men who have no equally satisfactory place to spend their evenings.

## Report of Chief Engineer.

During the year ending Feb. 15, 1905, there were 8 bell alarms of fire, as follows:

Feb. 20, 3.15 a. m., box 14, Putnam house, Hanover St. April 5, 2.30 p. m., box 15, grass fire, Spring St. April 7, 1.15 p. m., box 21, Messer barn, off Central St. April 16, 11.10 a. m., box 14, Tear house, Dexter St. July 31, 7.35 a. m., box 25, Brown's house, Chase St. Aug. 9, 12.45 a. m., box 22, Jondro barn, Main St. Nov. 30, 3.30 a. m., box 17, Townsend house, Baker St.

Nov. 30, 3.30 a. m., box 17, Townsend house, Baker St. Dec. 15, 9.18 p. m., box 13, Heywood block, Pleasant St. Still alarms 21; brush fires 10.

There have been unusually for

There have been unusually few bell alarms of fire during the past year, but an increase in the number of still alarms. In several instances the still alarms have come in in time to prevent disastrous fires, notably at the Sullivan House, and in Freeman block, where, in either case few minutes' delay would have resulted in great damage to property.

The brush fires were less in number than during the preceding year, and not of nature nor location to result in

serious loss.

During the year there have been added to the Department one thousand feet of new hose, and three new ladders, and a new alarm gong of improved make and large size, at the hose house, that greatly facilitates getting the alarm at headquarters, with promptness and accuracy.

The electric fire alarm system has been increased by the addition of box 26, at the intersection of Main and Central Sts., taking the place of box 21, now a private box owned by

the Sullivan Machinery Company.

A hydrant has been located on Franklin St., at the head of Trinity St. This was a long and expensive job, but provides

protection where it was imperatively needed.

The Department equipment has been kept up to standard in every respect. In case of the electric fire alarm, a heavy storm early in the winter did damage to the system that necessitated a general overhauling, when occasion was made to use new and heavier wire in several instances, and make other changes that may be classed in the line of permanent improvement.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

I would recommend the purchase of a set of swing harness for use on the hook and ladder truck. The present harness has been in use about ten years, and originally cost \$27.00. It is essential that the ladder truck should respond to an alarm quickly, and with the least possible risk of accident. New harness, with quick-hitch, will make this possible.

There is always opportunity to extend the protection afforded by additional hydrants and alarm boxes, and it is recommended that property owners consider these needs in

as liberal a spirit as possible.

In conclusion I earnestly recommend one or more dry hydrants at West Claremont, so located that the best protection may be afforded. These hydrants, connected with the modern and powerful pumps available in the mills at West Claremont, and used in connection with the hose kept there, would prove great safeguards, and make possible an early attack on any fire breaking out pending the arrival of the steamer and other apparatus.

The several companies are filled and well manned, good discipline prevails, and good work has been done whenever and wherever the Department's services have been needed.

Thanking Department members and brother officials for co-operation and good will, I respectfully submit the foregoing report.

### Water Commissioners.

The undersigned Water Commissioners of the town of Claremont met on the 20th day of March, 1904, and organized by the election of A. C. Stone, as chairman, John M. Whipple, as secretary, and Charles A. Fisher, as treasurer. James L. Rice was appointed superintendent, with a salary of one thousand dollars per year.

Extensions have been made during the past year on Myrtle, Pleasant, North, Elm, Franklin, LaFayette, Eastman, Mulberry and Pearl streets, details of which will be found in the

Superintendent's report.

The extension of Franklin street was mostly through a ledge, which was found to be very difficult to excavate, making this a very expensive job. The cost of the extension

of 326 ft. being \$1,298.13.

An agreement has been made with Rossiter and Quimby for the extension of water pipes westerly from Mulberry street, on to their lands, which have been laid out as an addition to the village. They agree that until the water rentals amount to 8 per cent. of the cost of such extensions that they will make good the deficiency to the town.

### Board of Health.

We have had reported to us during the past year the following cases of contagious diseases: Diphtheria, 4; Scarlet Fever, 5; Measles, 8. All of these cases ended in recovery.

The past year has been remarkable for the small number of cases of contagious diseases reported, not only in this town, but through the entire state. The biennial report of the State Board of Health shows a large decrease in the number of cases of illness that come under the laws of auarantine.

In former years when there was nothing done about it, a single case of diphtheria, or scarlet fever, would be likely to cause a large number of cases in any locality, while now, if such a case can be properly quarantined as soon as it is possible to determine the character of the case, there is a much less probability of the disease spreading.

We find as a rule that people are quite reasonable about being quarantined, we always find everyone perfectly willing, and sometimes quite anxious to have their neighbors quar-

antined.

It is always inconvenient, and often quite a hardship for a family to be in quarantine, but as we become better educated along these lines, and more fully understand the importance of drawing a line around every case of contagion, the easier it becomes to enforce such laws.

We have expended about twenty dollars for assistance of people in quarantine, and for supplies to be used in fumigat-

ing.

## Police Department.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN:

I have the honor to submit the report as Chief of Police for the year beginning March 9, 1904, and ending February 15, 1905.

The force consists of chief, 1 patrolman and 4 specials. The chief is the only officer on duty during the day, being on duty from 12 o'clock m. until 11 p. m., and the patrolman from 6 p. m. until 4 a. m.

The total number of arrests were 181, 4 being females. Of those convicted 102 paid their fines and costs; 23 were taken to Unity, in the house of correction; 9 to Newport jail, and 48 had their cases put on file or were put on probation.


