COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

In compliance with the law the County Commissioners of Coos County respectfully submit their report for the current year, and also a statement of receipts and expenditures for the various purposes coming under their care and control in the County, together with the reports of the Superintendent of the County almshouse, Treasurer, Clerk of the Court, Solicitor, Jailor, Sheriff and Auditors.

The County during the coming year will lose two of its most efficient officers, the Superintendent and Matron of the County almshouse, Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Hannaford, as they have fully determined to withdraw from the institution at the end of the present year. They have had the charge at the farm for more than twenty years and it is with great regret that we see their connection with the almshouse broken. Their careful and prudent management of the County property, their firm but gentle control of the inmates of the almshouse, and success in every respect, will make it difficult for the next superintendent to as fully satisfy the tax-payers of the County.

The jail in Coos County is a disgrace to a civilized community and is totally inadequate as a place of confinement. It needs to be thoroughly remodelled, or better yet, to be torn down and a new one built. It is to be hoped that the County delegation will take this matter into consideration at their first meeting and make an appro-

priation for that purpose.

PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

WEST STEWARTSTOWN, N. H., APRIL 15, 1889.

To the Board of Commissioners of Coos County:

GENTLEMEN: - I have the honor herewith to submit my annual report of the Coos County Poor Farm, together with a few remarks relative to the health and wellbeing of the inmates.

The deaths I report are principally among the aged, subjects of chronic diseases, while others are among the recent arrivals (some hopeless) brought to the institution

for medical and surgical treatment.

Mr. and Mrs. Hannaford's able superintendence, still directs, while their arduous duties continue to be performed in the most competent and praiseworthy manner.

I trust their services may long be held by the county which has every reason to feel proud of the model man-

agement of the institution.

At the present time there are none needing medical attendance and sanitary matters are in a very satisfactory condition.

Aug. 12, '88, Mary Hilliard, 45, paralysis of brain. Oct. 21, '88, Ben Frizzell, 25, putrid sore throat.

Nov. 18, '88, Henry Weeks, old age.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

In making this my tenth annual report as prosecuting officer of the county, I have to report no civil cases pending in which the county is interested, except those in which suit was brought by the county to recover the insurance on the court house at Lancaster. The cases have been tried and a verdict for the county found by the jury, and the cases transferred on certain questions of law. No serious crimes have been committed during the last year, but occasional spasmodic and local attempts to enforce the prohibitory law, have produced the usual number of indictments. The following indictments have been found since my last report.

At the October Term 1888, at Lancaster, as follows: State v George LeGro, burglary; sentenced to two years in the State Prison.

State v Charles Horton, burglary; sentenced to three years in the State Industrial School.

State v Carleton W. Muzzy, fraud in disposing of mortgaged property; marked "not to be brought ford."

State v Charles H. Dunning, forgery; respondent out of

the state and not apprehended.

State v William W. Stevens, assault with intent to kill; tried at Feb. Term, 1889, found guilty, and sentenced to two years in State Prison.

State v William F. Bailey, assault; nol pros entered by

State.

State v Fred C. Stevens, violation of liquor law; fine and costs paid.

State v Dewer B. Hatch, assault; fine and costs paid.

State v Charles D. Cates, adultery; nol pros entered by State.

State v Sarah Leighton, adultery; nol pros entered by State.

State v Sylvanus Holmes, assault, fine and costs paid.

State v Frank Wilson, Thomas Collins, Smith and Carroll, burglary; Frank Wilson and Thomas Collins sentenced to six years in State Prison. Smith and Carroll tried, found not guilty and discharged.
