

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of East Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said East Kingston on Tuesday, the twelfth (12) day of March next, at (1) one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust and make appropriation for same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance, and make appropriation for the same.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, as payment on 1927 construction, from Tilton's Hill to Kensington line.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the up-keep of Union and Old cemeteries.

7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to insuring Town Hall.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for the Library and make appropriation for the same.



9. To see if the Town would sell the piece of property known as part of the Parker farm, for its taxes, interest and costs to Mrs. L. Iwanicka of South Hampton.

10. To see if Town will vote to sell a tract of land between the home of Albert J. Derby and Earl Stewart.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

February 5, 1929

To the School Board and Citizens of East Kingston :

I herewith submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

Your schools were opened September 4, 1928 with Mrs. Clara Merrick in the Brown Grammar School and Mrs. Eva Philbrick in the Pound Primary School. Mrs. Merrick, a graduate of Lowell Normal School class of 1918, has now taught 11 years, eight of which have been in your schools. Mrs. Philbrick has been a teacher for better than 18 years, more than 11 of which have been in your district. A total experience of 29 years for your teachers speaks well of your retaining power as well as the interest of the teachers in the work of your community. It is extremely pleasing to me to know that East Kingston's schools are in such capable hands.

The records of the tests given last May to every Eighth Grade in the Union reveal that your graduates attained the highest rank as a group of any grade in the Union. They held 3rd, 4th, 7th, and 11th positions in the ranking—an excellent accomplishment.

That 100 % of your graduates are entering high school is truly a noteworthy achievement. For some years every graduate, or almost every graduate, has entered secondary school. The value and well-nigh necessity of high school training is evidently being recognized. I congratulate the parents of these pupils for their sacrifices in order to send these young people on in their education.

Frequently we note the names of some of these pupils on the Honor Rolls of their respective schools. This speaks as well of their preparation as of their own interests and abilities. I urge you to commend these young people and encourage them in their efforts.

In reading this report please examine the attendance statistics which appear on another page. The record is very commendable in spite of the serious epidemic of whooping cough which seriously interfered with school operation. The number of visits by parents and citizens shows a decided loss. I hope that the records of this year will show that you have more than made up for this loss. Some parents make it a practise to visit their schools at least once a week. I urge you to think seriously of adopting the above practise. The tardiness record is superb, a reduction in number being made last year over the

record of the previous year. If no epidemic breaks out anew, we should be able to report a longer list of perfect attendance for another year. However, I commend the two whose names appear in another column.

In the interest of Safety for every child in East Kingston, I ask your co-operation in the elimination of every possible danger to the children while on their way to and from school. The National Council of Safety recommends that school children be taught to walk on the left hand side of the road where there are no sidewalks. The reason for such procedure are that autos approaching from the front can be seen and a move made to step aside if necessary while autos approaching from the rear pass on the right hand side of the road with consequent less danger of striking a person in case he did not hear them. I urge your assistance in this respect toward the instruction of your boys and girls.

One of my fondest hopes is that every district in the Union shall organize a Parent-Teacher Association. Some in my position oppose them; others encourage. I am pleased to be counted among the latter. As the stimulus for a successful organization must come from the outside, I await any interest that this suggestion may arouse. Other groups around you are doing splendid work. Certainly, a live, active Parent-Teacher Association can do much for the interests of your children.

In closing this report, I take this opportunity to thank the School Board, teachers, and citizens of East Kingston for their co-operation with me during the trials of my first year. It has been splendid. I trust in its continuance.
