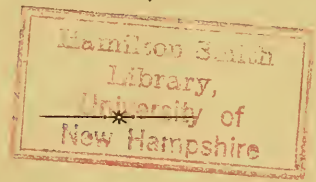

SCHOOL REPORT.

Looking backward over the school year now closed and forward to the year soon to begin, we think it meet to call the attention of all interested in our schools to some of the obstacles which we have to encounter in our endeavors to give our children the best school advantages possible under the circumstances.

Briefly stated, the following are among the greatest obstacles we have had to deal with. The insufficiency of the school fund. In the aggregate the sum doubtless looks large, but when we stop to consider that this sum has to be divided among five schools it no longer looks very large. Then we have one-fifth of the total for each school, and with this sum we are expected to provide for from 20 to 24 weeks school each year. We can't get a teacher boarded for less than three dollars per week and often this is not thought enough. We can't get a teacher with known ability and a reputation established, for less than five dollars per week beside her board, and most such teachers command eight and ten dollars. Then school supplies, wood, crayons, brooms, etc., care of the school house and repairs, have to be paid for, and rapidly reduce what seemed a large sum to no sum at all.

Another obstacle which we have constantly to meet is lack of that coöperation between parents and teachers which is absolutely necessary to success. We need not enlarge upon this but simply entreat parents to take more interest in the schools, and to accord the teachers more sympathy and heartier support, bearing in mind that without this the very best teachers will and must fail to attain any high degree of excellence. The condition of the school houses in the east and west districts is another drawback which cannot be overcome as long as such conditions exist. The bright faces and brainy material that gather at these dilapidated houses appeal for better surroundings and are a guarantee that any expenditure made for this purpose will be an investment that will pay large dividends in the years to come.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Greenfield, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
2. To choose a Town Clerk.
3. To choose three Selectmen.
4. To choose all other necessary Officers.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
6. To vote how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of Schools, in addition to the amount required to be raised by law.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the Town debts and appropriate the same.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing highways and bridges, and appropriate the same.
9. To hear the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Overseer of the Poor, Auditors, and School Board, and act upon the same.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed twenty-five dollars to the Veteran Association of Greenfield, for decoration or take any action thereon.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
