Report of the School Board.

The School Board would respectfully submit the following report for the year ending March 1, 1892.

EAST SCHOOL.—This school was taught during the year by Miss Mary W. Carter, of Antrim, N. H., a graduate of the Salem, Mass., Normal school. Miss Carter was admirably fitted for the business of teaching, and entered upon her work with great energy, which was maintained throughout the year. She had an easy and practical method of imparting instruction and was in our opinion a first-class teacher, whose labors we should be glad to continue.

WEST SCHOOL.—This school was taught during the year by Miss Edith S. Brown of this town, to the satisfaction of the Board. So far as we were able to judge, good progress was made and the relations between teachers and pupils were of a pleasant character.

NORTH SCHOOL.—The spring and fall terms, which comprised the greater portion of the school year, were taught by Miss Annie L. Sanborn, of this town. The school made satisfactory progress under her care. Her method of teaching was characterized by thoroughness, and a correct and perfect understanding of the ground gone over. There was nothing of the superficial in her manner of teaching. We much regretted that circumstances beyond control compelled her to close her labors before the end of the year. After Miss Sanborn withdrew, a short term of six weeks was taught by Miss Gertrude B. Smith, of Amesbury, Mass.

SOUTH SCHOOL.—This school was taught by Miss Edna M. Hardy, who has had charge of the school for several years past. This is the largest school in the town in point of numbers. During the past two years which have come under the observation of the writer, great progress has been made in the condition of the school and in its scholarship. In the latter respect it is not exceeded by any school in the town. We hope this improved condition of things will continue in the future. While the condition and progress of the schools during the past year have been quite satisfactory, there is

still room for improvement. In our last report we had occasion to call attention to irregularity of attendance. There was some improvement in this respect during the spring and fall terms. Owing to sickness the winter term has not shown as well. The carelessness and neglect on the part of only a few will make a bad showing for the entire school. The registers show altogether too many instances of tardiness, and this it is the duty of the parents to correct. The government of the school should be vested in the teacher, who should lay down reasonable rules and see that they are obeyed. The school board should sustain the teachers in doing this and protect them from all meddlesome and disturbing influences from outside which injure the discipline of the school. Where children are made to obey at home, and have proper home training, they cause little trouble at school. Where this is neglected, or they are encouraged to resist the proper authority of the teacher, the case becomes different, and must be remedied by heroic treatment, on the part of the teacher and the School Board.

During the year the several school rooms have each been supplied with a set of outline maps and with the required amount of supplies. In this respect we feel that our school rooms are as well furnished as any in the state. Although it has been attended with considerable expense, it has cost much less than under the old system, when they were purchased in small quantities by individuals.

Miss S. Abbie Gove kindly contributed enough numbers of "Black Beauty" for the use of each school, which have been used for supplementary reading, and for which the Board tender their thanks.

We have since introduced the information readers to be used for the same purpose, which contain a great amount of useful information about common things, which is of great value, and could not be got easily by the pupil in any other way.

While we spare no pains in obtaining the best teachers we can command, and who are generally capable of teaching the more advanced pupils in a satisfactory manner, we have cause to regret the removal in some cases of this class of pupils at a time when they would receive more benefit from the common school than at any previous time, beside adding much by their presence to the good appearance of our schools.

Our school houses and surroundings are in a very good condition, yet some annual repairs are always needed. The out building and fence at the North School should receive immediate attention and some little work is needed about the other houses. An appropriation for this purpose would not be out of place at this time.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools; for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, and for other necessary charges arising in said town; for laying out and repairing highways and sidewalks, and building and repairing bridges; for the maintenance of the poor; for school houses; and to establish and maintain public libraries, cemeteries, and parks or commons, and to improve the same; to prepare and publish the early history of the town.
5. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditors; the reports of the Auditors, agents, committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
