



TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote tn town offairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Eighth Day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

ART. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day, ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to be applied on the salary of the District Nurse.

ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on Holman St. from Henniker St. to a point opposite the residence of George Barrett, raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on Jackson St. from the end of walk at point opposite the residence of W. C. Dennison to Cross St. and a sidewalk on Cross St. from Depot St. to Henniker St., raise money for same or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mrs. Hattie E. Gilchrest the sum of \$100.00, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the William Merrill lot in Maple Avenue Cemetery.

ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept from Mrs. Josephine McNeil the sum of \$200.00, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of her lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.

ART. 13 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to contract with the New Hampshire Power Co. to light the streets for a period of three years or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 00 for the support of band concerts the coming season.

ART. 15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the purpose of cooperating with the state and federal government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to buy a tractor snow plow, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the salary of a Day Police Officer for traffic and regular police duties during the months of June, July, August and September.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$300.00 or any part of it to be expended under the direction of the Publicity Committee of the Hillsboro Business Association during the season of 1927 toward advertising the natural advantages and resources of the town

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Estate of the late Emma E. Smith, the income to be expended in the care and maintenance of the Ammi Smith burial lot in the Deering Cemetery, so called, and of the stones, monuments and markers therein.

ART. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to increase the salary of the judge of the municipal court or take any action relating thereto.

REPORT OF FULLER PUBLIC LIBRARY

For the fiscal year ending January 31, 1927

At a special Town Meeting held July 30th, 1926, it was voted to accept the gift of the John B. Smith house and barn, the house to contain the Fuller Public Library and certain organizations. As soon as possible, work was begun to prepare the house for the above purposes and it is now expected that the library rooms will be ready for occupancy early in March.

We greatly appreciate the generous gift of books by George W. Lincoln, Mrs. Sarah A. White, Prof. Petrunkavitch, Clarence H. Wilkins, and others.

We are especially grateful for the bequest of the late Mrs. Sarah A. White, who in addition to the books mentioned above, bequeathed the sum of \$12,000 to be held by the Trustees and kept intact; the net income, or as much as the Trustees may deem advisable, to be used for the purchase of books and periodicals.

TOWN SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board of the Hillsboro Town School District:

Hereby is respectfully submitted the seventh annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Mrs. Paul Evans, a New Hampshire University graduate, came to the Bear Hill School. At the Upper Village School, where we had two teachers last year, Mrs. Belle C. Ball, a teacher of considerable experience, was selected. Mrs. C. E. Barker at the Center, Mrs. Georgianna Gile at the Merrill, Mrs. Gladys Murdo at the Flat, Mrs. Nellie Mellen at the Goodell School all returned to their former positions, and Miss Elmar Shedd took the Lower Village School.

All our teachers have had some previous experience, averaging 9½ years instead of 8 years as was the case last year. Three of our teachers have the highest form of State Certification, in place of two as last year. Mrs. Barker, our teacher with the least amount of experience, was increased from \$600 per year to \$648, other teachers, except the Lower Village teacher, received \$720 each; and the Lower Village teacher received \$900.

Enrollment for the past three years shows a slight increase for this year.

The tardiness record this year was 197, which was a great improvement over 295 for the previous year. But when we learn that 144 out of the 197 cases were in the Upper Village School we see that a much better could and should have been made. Last year 233 of the 295 cases of tardiness were in the Lower Village School. This was brought forcibly to their attention, and this year they stood second with only 27 cases, a vast improvement, for which they are congratulated, and we believe a like improvement will be seen in the Upper Village School in the coming year.

The attendance this year has improved and each school had more than 90% attendance, with the Flat School leading as it did last year.

Dr. Kelso again acted as Medical Examiner. Whereas a decided improvement was noted in the condition of the pupils last year over that of the previous year, we do not now have as favorable a report. There were the same number of cases of defective vision, three more cases of hypertrophied tonsils, and seven more cases of defective teeth, 34 in all. More children now have defective teeth than at any time for the past three years, and as this has been brought to the attention of the parents we trust they may take prompt steps to remedy this condition.

The teachers' reports credit the school board members with six visits, and the Superintendent with 149 visits. The number of visits by parents and friends for the past three years has been respectively 260, 210 and 340. The 340 for this year ranging from 32 at the Center School to 77 at the Merrill School. Each school had more visitors than during the previous year, and the Merrill School has been the banner school in this respect for the past three years.

The Maine Club of Hillsboro offered their annual prize to the eighth grade pupils in both Hillsboro districts for proficiency in Arithmetic, and for the second time all prizes went to pupils in the Town District. Proficiency was judged by the ranks obtained in examinations given by the Superintendent. In the first test eight pupils received 100%, and according to previous arrangements, those eight were given another test which resulted in the following awards:—

SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

We present herewith reports for school year ending June 30, 1926.

The new High School has been erected and has been occupied since Jan. 1st. Although the cost of the building has been very close to our estimate, the expense of clearing the lot, grading, etc., and equipment was more than anticipated, and fearing that more expense might be incurred than the appropriation would cover, the Building Committee decided to omit finishing the Gymnasium and Manual Arts Room until all other work was completed.

With some items under discussion for adjusting, the cost so far has been approximately as follows:

Further adjustment may add something to this amount, but probably there will be about \$500.00 available toward completing the work.

Financing for the new building was provided by borrowing on notes at the Hillsborough Guaranty Savings Bank as the money was needed. When the borrowing was completed, these notes were exchanged for serial notes, dated Jan. 20, 1927, of which \$73,000 are outstanding, payable \$4,000.00 each year. The cost of insurance on boiler in the old school house has been increased very much on account of age and crackage risk. Within a few years, we must consider the replacement of this boiler with a new one.

On account of this extra insurance cost and certain extra expense in connection with the new school, it is necessary to ask for an emergency appropriation of \$1,000.00 to be used during the balance of the present school year, ending June 30th.

In connection with the above recommendations, it may be of interest to state that according to a report furnished by the State Department, out of 250 School Districts the expense per pupil in our elementary schools was the next to the lowest in the state.

In September the School District suffered a severe loss in the sudden death of Mr. Delmont E. Gordon, who had been a member of the school board for years. Extremely interested in the schools, and a man of good judgment, he held the respect of the community and proved himself of invaluable assistance to the other members of the board.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education of the Hillsboro Special School District.

The report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year 1925-1926 is herewith respectfully submitted.

There were no changes or additions to the grade teaching corps. First and second grades, Mrs. Cora Scruton began her 16th year in our schools; third and fourth grades, Miss E. Estella Shedd began her second year; fourth and fifth grades, Mrs. Emily K. Flanders, her 13th year; sixth and seventh grades, Mrs. Eva Doble, her 13th year; seventh and eighth grades, Miss Grace Crosby, her second year. The High School faculty consisted of Mr. Harold C. Bowley, who began his third year with us; Miss Myrtie K. Brooks, of the Commercial Department, beginning her fifth year; Miss Marjorie Hutchinson, last year's graduate from the Keene Normal School, succeeded Miss Gertrude Sampson as teacher of Domestic Science and French, who resigned to continue her studies elsewhere; Miss Mabel Shaw, a graduate of Bates with twenty years' teaching experience, succeeded Miss Esther Lord, who also resigned to continue her studies. The high school teachers averaged ten years teaching experience, and the grade teachers averaged 17 years. Miss Lena Conant began her fifth year as our supervisor of music, and Miss Edith Messer her fifth as supervisor of drawing. Seven of our teachers have the highest form of State Teachers' Certification.

Our total enrollment increased from 285 in 1923 to 303 in 1924, and 320 this year. An increase this year of 28 in the grades, but a loss of 11 in the high school.

There were 51 resident pupils in the high school and 32 tuition pupils. Throughout the state 8.8% of the high school pupils are tuition pupils while 38.5% of ours are tuition pupils.

The percentage of attendance was the same as last year, 96.4%; varying from 95.6 in the lowest grades to 96.9% in Miss Shedd's room. We are well above the state's average of 94.6%, for even our lowest record was 95.6%. Teachers, parents and pupils are to be congratulated on the decreasing number of cases of tardiness. There were 190 cases in 1923, 239 cases last year and only 139 cases this year. Last year's record of 239 cases was good, so this year's record is excellent. Throughout the state there were .86 cases per pupil in high schools and 1.3 cases per pupil in the grades, while our record was .6 cases per pupil.

Last year there were 17 names on the Honor Roll of Perfect Attendance, while this year there are 33 names. If we had nineteen names on this list we would equal the average for the state.

The teachers' records of visits show two visits by the Board of Education, 252 visits, or 7 per week by the Superintendent. and 544 by others. Visits by parents and others increased from 300 last year to 544 this year.

The scholarship was awarded to William Landon, who entered Dartmouth College.

Miss Mary A. Currier, a registered nurse, recommended by the State Dep't of Education, conducted the medical examination. which was carefully followed up by Miss Gile. The largest number of defects were as follows:—Malnutrition 47 cases, defective vision 14, defective teeth 103, hypertrophied tonsils 50, adenoids 20. Each parent was notified of his children's defects, but as treatment is not compulsory, far too small a number had the defects treated.

The graduation exercises of the Grammar School were held in the High School room at 2 P. M. Friday, June 18th. There were 16 graduates and the honor pupils were, Dorothy J. Parker, D. Virginia Temple and Barbara A. Hall. The High School graduation exercises were held in Child's Opera House on Thursday evening, June 17th, with 23 graduates. This, I believe, was the largest high school graduating class we have ever had. Dorothy Gregoire was the Valedictorian, and William Landon, the salutatorian.

The school year for which this is a report closed June 30th, 1926, but it seems fitting to mention at this time a sad event which happened in August, just before the schools opened for the school year of 1926-7. I refer to the death of a member of the school board, Mr. Delmont E. Gordon. He was always a sympathetic listener to the troubles of the teachers, or the complaints of parents, ready, willing and able with kindly advice and help, interested in everything that was for the good of the schools and the town. Besides being for a term of years a school board member, he had many other interests and had only recently retired as President of the Business Association. We appreciate his work, and miss his help and advice.
