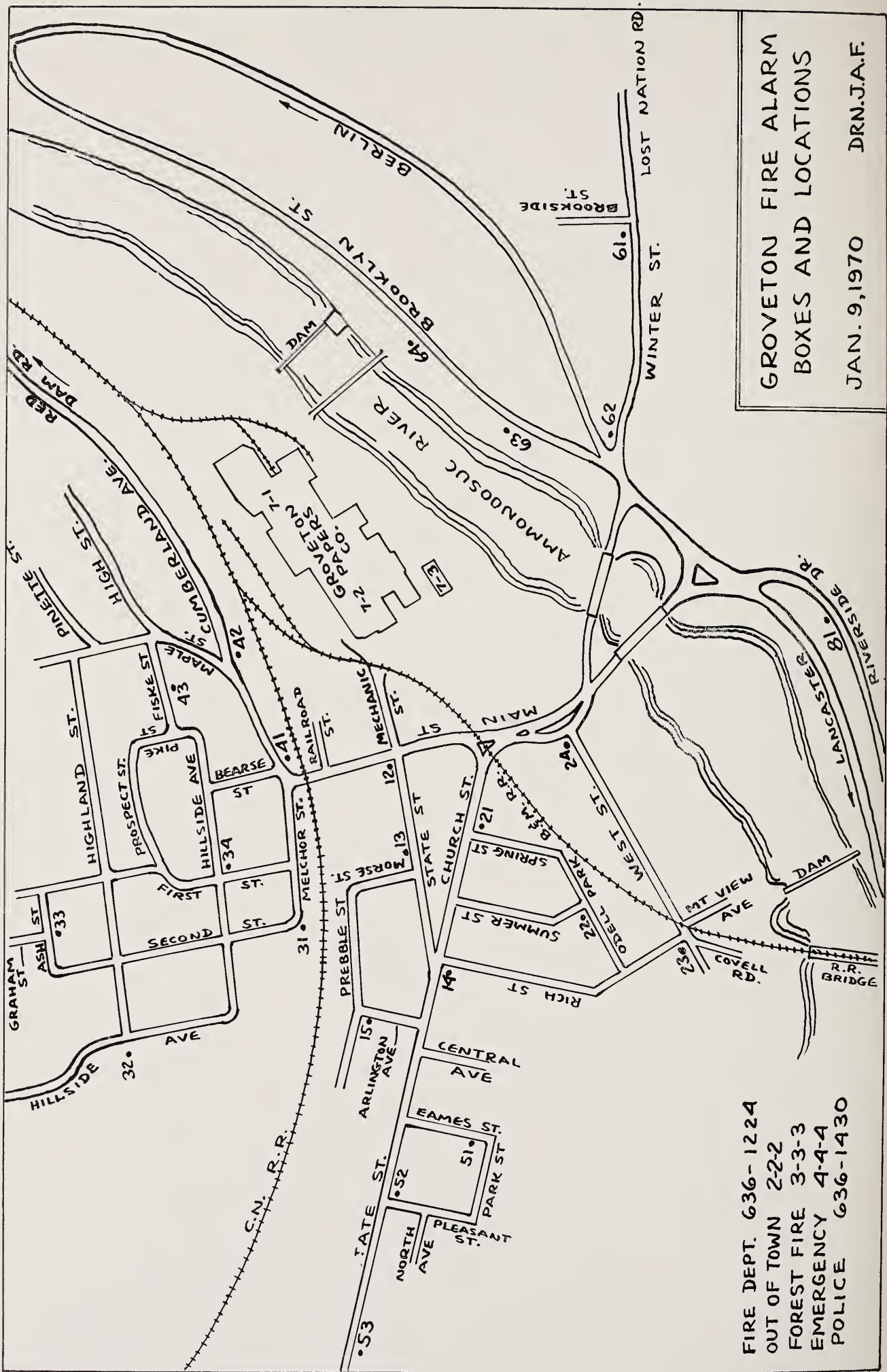

Members of the Board have served over four years, giving their time and efforts without pay, in order that a plan would become a reality and we would have complied to the letter of the law to qualify for Federal assistance.

We now ask your cooperation in attending meetings to make the Plan's acceptance, with your suggestions, a reality.

THE ENABLING ACT
Conservation Commissions

36-A:1 Method of Adoption. Any city by vote of its city council, and any town at any duly warned meeting, may adopt the provisions of this chapter.

36-A:2 Conservation Commission. A city or town which accepts the provisions of this chapter may establish a conservation commission, hereinafter called the commission, for the promotion and development of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of said city or town. Such commission shall conduct researches into its local land areas and shall seek to coordinate the activities of unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes, and may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which in its judgment it deems necessary for its work. It shall keep an index of all open areas within the city or town, as the case may be, with the plan of obtaining information pertinent to proper utilization of such open areas, including lands owned by the state or lands owned by a town or city. It shall keep an index of all open marshlands, swamps and all other wet lands in a like manner, and may recommend to the city council or selectmen or to the department of resources and economic development a program for the better promotion, development or utilization of all such areas. It shall keep accurate records of its meetings and actions and shall file an annual town or municipal report. The commission may appoint such clerks and other employees as it may from time to time require.

36-A:3 Composition of Commission. The commission shall consist of not less than three nor more than seven members. In cities the members shall be appointed by the mayor, subject to the provision of the city charter, and in towns they shall be appointed by the selectmen. When a commission is first established, terms of the members shall be for one, two or three years, and so arranged that the terms of approximately one-third of the members will expire each year, and their successors shall be appointed for terms of three years each. Any member of a commission so appointed may, after a public hearing, if requested, be removed for cause by the appointing authority. A vacancy occurring otherwise than by expiration of a term shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as any original appointment.

36-A:4 Powers. Said commission may receive gifts of money and property, both real and personal, in the name of the city or town, subject to the approval of the city council in a city or the selectmen in a town, such gifts to be managed and controlled by the commission for the purposes of this section. Said commission may acquire by gift, purchase, grant, bequest, devise lease or otherwise the fee in such land or water rights, or any lesser interest, development right, easement, covenant, or other contractual right including conveyances with conditions, limitations or reversions, as may be necessary to acquire, maintain, improve, protect, limit the future use of or otherwise conserve and properly utilize open spaces and other land and water areas within their city or town, and shall manage and control the same, but the city or town shall not have the right to condemn property for these purposes.

36-A:5 Appropriations Authorized. For the purpose of establishing and maintaining a conservation commission to promote the development and better utilization of our natural resources, as authorized by section 2, a town or city may appropriate moneys as is deemed necessary. The whole or any part of money so appropriated in any year may be placed in a conservation fund and allowed to accumulate from year to year. Money may be expended from said fund for the purposes of this chapter.

36-A:6 Commissioner of Resources and Economic Development. The commissioner of the department of resources and economic development may establish a program to assist, at their request, the cities and towns which have adopted the provisions of this chapter, in acquiring land and in planning of use and structures as described in section 2.

You are hereby notified to meet in Groveton High School Gymnasium in said district on Saturday, March 13, 1971, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. The polls will be open at said place and date from 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon until 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots under the non-partisan ballot system; furthermore, you are hereby warned that on said date and place, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following district officers for the ensuing year; a moderator, a district clerk, a district treasurer, two auditors, and two members of the school board for the ensuing three years.

2. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Groveton High School Auditorium in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, March 9, 1971, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. You are hereby warned that on said date and place the polls will be opened at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots under the Australian Ballot Laws. (Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7.) You are also hereby warned that on said date and place that at 7:00 o'clock in the evening the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

ARTICLE 1.* To choose by ballot two Auditors for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2.* To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing three years: One Selectman, one Library Trustee and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 3.* To see if the Town will vote to construct a new Town Garage and for this purpose to authorize the Selectmen to borrow upon the note of the Town a sum not in excess of \$43,500 at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place in accordance with Chapter 33 of the 1955 R.S.A. and amendments thereto, "Municipal Finance Act," as the Selectmen shall decide.

ARTICLE 4.* To see if the Town will vote to construct a sewer line from its present end opposite the Thomas Styles property on Route 3 in Northumberland, proceeding north on Route 3 a distance of approximately 2600 feet; and for this purpose to authorize the Selectmen to borrow upon the note of the Town a sum not in excess of \$30,000 at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place in accordance with Chapter 33 of the 1955 R.S.A. and amendments thereto, "Municipal Finance Act," as the Selectmen shall decide.

ARTICLE 5.* To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system as provided by Chapter 59 of the Revised Statutes Annotated. (Inserted on petition of 11 voters.)

ARTICLE 6.* To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in Chapter 36-A of the Revised Statutes Annotated. And further that the Selectmen shall appoint said Commission within thirty days from the date of the Annual Meeting and that a temporary chairman be appointed to call the first meeting of the Commission. (Inserted on petition of 18 voters.)

ARTICLE 7.* To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution: That there is a need for a Housing Authority in the Town of Northumberland.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the following Town charges for the ensuing year: (1) Town Officers' Salaries; (2) Town Officers' Expenses; (3) Election and Registration; (4) Municipal Court; (5) Town Hall and Other Town Buildings; (6) Police Department; (7) Fire, including Forest Fire; (8) Blister Rust and Care of Trees; (9) Planning and Zoning; (10) Insurance; (11) Civil Defense; (12) Health Department including Hospital and Ambulance; (13) Vital Statistics; (14) Sewer Maintenance; (15) Dump Maintenance; (16) Highways and Bridges; (a) Summer Maintenance; (b) Winter Maintenance; (17) Town Road Aid; (18); Street Lighting; (19) General Expenses of Highway Department; (20) Tarring Streets; (21) Sidewalk Maintenance; (22) Public Library; (23) Old Age Assistance; (24) Town Poor; (25) Band Concerts; (26) Youth Center; (27) Water Maintenance; (28) Cemeteries; (29) Damage and Legal; (30) Advertising and Regional Associations; (31) Retirement and Social Security; (32) Interest; (33) Long Term Notes; (34) Interest; (35) Principal.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2300 to purchase a ½ ton pickup truck for the water and sewer departments.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a schedule of user charges to cover the operation and maintenance costs of the water and sewer departments. Said schedule of charges to be on a flat rate basis.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6600 to extend the Town water main on the Lost Nation Road from its present end opposite the Aime Goulet property, proceeding with a six inch main on the easterly side of said road for a distance of approximately 1200 feet. (Inserted on petition of 15 voters.)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000 to extend the Town water main on the Lancaster Road from its present end opposite the William Sheltry property, proceeding with a six inch main in a southerly direction approximately 500 feet.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate taxes and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 the amount estimated will be allowed in discounts in 1971. The scale of discounts to be as follows: 3% if paid on or before June 1, 1971; 2% if paid on or before August 1, 1971; and 1% if paid on or before October 1, 1971.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts in anticipation of taxes of the financial year such debts are incurred, in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses, and to issue notes therefore in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 33:7.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 20. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or other officers hereto chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof showing streets, or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon the adoption of this article, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Coos a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Section 19, and Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. If this article is adopted, it shall further be the duty of the Town Clerk to issue all certificates of failure when the Planning Board shall fail to take action as provided in Chapter 36: Sections 19, 20-29 inclusive.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Northumberland School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and School Lunch Account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1969, and June 30, 1970, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the District decreased by \$12,749.67, from \$94,075.21 to \$81,325.54, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1970.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Last year I mentioned the strengthening of the elementary program by the addition of personnel as well as new programs. This plan has taken another step forward by the addition of a public kindergarten, the introduction of an "Early Childhood Class," a Language Arts program under Title I and a greater utilization of teacher aides in the instructional program.

The early childhood class is a project under a Federal Grant from the University of N. H. involving 6, 7, and 8 year olds. It is staffed by graduate fellows from the university and serves as a demonstration class for the area. The program is involved with individualized and activity centered learning.

With the introduction of kindergarten it was necessary to lease two classrooms at St. Francis Hall. We are also still renting two rooms at the Methodist Church and these arrangements seem to be working out quite satisfactorily.

The Special Education Program under Title III has drastically changed its program from a self-contained class of approximately seven students to an itinerant teacher program providing specialized services for a large number of children in the union. Emphasis has been focused on speech and hearing, and children with learning difficulties who are now programmed in their respective schools by bringing the specialists to each school. North Country Education Services with the cooperation of the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center and the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation has

made is possible to include additional children for speech and hearing therapy. These children are being helped by the speech therapists serving the seven Northern New Hampshire school unions. This is a cooperative project crossing union lines.

The hiring of an Elementary Consultant at the union level has made it possible to take some positive action in preparing for the new elementary school standards which go into effect in the fall of 1972. Mr. Flight and Mr. Monahan have been instrumental in arranging several elementary workshops and have a curriculum revision committee organized.

At our last annual school meeting an AREA Study Committee was authorized to meet with a similar committee from Stark to investigate the feasibility of forming an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area. This committee has carried out its work and submitted a plan to the State Board of Education. The plan was approved by the State Board at its January meeting and will be voted on at this annual district meeting in both Stark and Groveton.

In addition to the Elementary Consultant at the union level we also hired Mrs. Peter Elliott as a secondary English teacher to serve both Stratford and Groveton High students. This plan has worked well during this first year of operation and present plans call for continuing this arrangement.

During the summer of 1970 we had two Federally funded programs in operation. Under Title I a group of Title I children participated in a Language Development Project. There was also a continuation of the

Handicapped Children's Project providing Speech and Hearing therapy and activities for children with learning difficulties. This same project also made it possible to test all incoming first graders before school started.

I am sorry that the school calendar for 1971-72 doesn't appear in this year's report. The school unions in the North Country would like to have their calendars coincide as closely as possible and we hope to develop one together. As soon as it has been determined copies will be made available to anyone who would like one.

There are many more topics that I would like to report on but space is limited so I must omit some.

I personally would like to take this opportunity to thank the school board, the staff, and the citizens of Northumberland for the excellent cooperation and support which I have received during this year.
