The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, polls to close at 6 P. M. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for interest on same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Recreation, Parks and Playgrounds.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Band Concerts.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to remove the street lights from poles numbered 86-4, 86-10, 80-18, 8-15, 8-153, 87-3, 8-187, 8-184, 8-188, 8-196, 8-208, 8-215, 8-222, 8-235, 820-19, 820-10, 8-249, 8-92, and 8-151. (Recommended by the Woman's Club.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$312.00 for the purpose of installing 3500 lumen Mercury Vapor lights on poles numbered 820-10, 8-188, 8-153, 8-92, 8-246, and a new pole in the Town Hall Drive and one 7000 lumen Mercury Vapor light in the Chesley Library yard. (Recommended by the Woman's Club.)
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,130.00 for street lighting.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$621.78 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State share to be \$4,145.19.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be used in addition to the joint T. R. A. fund.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$675.00 for the Concord Hospital.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for ambulance service. \$50.00 to be payed to Ernest Pinkham, \$50.00 to be payed to Barnstead Center Fire Department. (Requested by the Budget Committee.)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,526.25 to pay one note with interest charges thereon, for the fire truck purchased in 1965.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of installing toilets at Mary Waldron and Morse Beach.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of reconstructing the Town Hall toilets to include a fire-proof vault for Town records.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust.
- 20. To see what action the Town will take relative to the compensation of the Tax Collector.
- 21. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.



Gentlemen:

A set of plans of the Northwood Elementary School, dated July 22, 1960, was received from you at Northwood, March 10, 1966. A copy of the Specifications and the construction Contract was received at Durham, March 16, 1966. This construction contract included Addendum No. III a list dated September 6, 1960 of the deductions allowed for construction Alternates.

Inspection of the building was made March 10, April 25, and April 26, 1966.

From the study of the original plans and the deductions made to bring the Construction cost within the limits of an inadequate estimate, it was evident that the construction, in general, followed the plans, as amended by the accepted construction alternates.

On June 22 we were advised that contract had been arranged for repairs of the East wall and roof contract to start at once.

We inspected the job on June 23rd, 24th, 29th and July 1st.

When the East Wall was taken down it was found that the Vermiculite concrete fill in this wall was water saturated in places for its full height. We believe that the rebuilding of this wall as constructed should be adequate to avoid the difficulties formerly encountered.

The Vermiculite fill was omitted but this does not do away with the necessity of proper maintenance of the roof and edge strip above.

It is noted that the Roof Framing Plan Sheet S2 calls for a low point along the middle of the building and the roof pitching six inches (6") from this point up to the north and south walls. This matter of grades and pitch of the roof does not appear to have been followed in the original construction of the roof.

We believe that the replacing of the rotted edge strip and the addition of a fiberglass fabric edge strip as done by the roofer is the best that can be done without entirely removing and replacing the roofing and insulation. It must be remembered that this does not avoid the necessity of proper maintenance of the roof.

If we can be of further service in regard to this matter please advise us.

Dear Sirs:

At the request of the Board of Selectmen, the undersigned inspected Northwood Elementary School on April 25, 1966. At this inspection was Mr. Robert Parker, Registered Engineer, and members of the Board of Selectmen.

Available at the inspection were certain plans and specifications dated July 22, 1960, and a written agreement dated September 6, 1960. These documents apparently being those used at the erection of reference building. It would appear, in general at least, that the building was constructed in accordance with the basic documents as revised in the agreement dated September 6, 1960, in so far as it is possible to ascertain by viewing the building and not opening up walls, etc., to examine the exact details. These documents were sealed as follows:

- A. All plans and documents sealed by a registered architect.
- B. Structural drawings sealed by a registered engineer.
- C. Mechanical drawings sealed by a registered engineer.

At the time of inspection the following conditions existed:

- 1. Borings on the drawings indicate that if the foundation was of proper design and carried to proper depth, the soil is suitable to properly carry all loading imposed on it by the building.
- 2. The Southeast end wall; substantially deteriorated, cracked and bulging. The pre-stressed roof decking shored up next to the deteriorated wall.
- 3. Substantial water was standing on the roof and not draining normally to the roof drains.
- 4. Water penetration of the structure was indicated by stains and deterioration on the various materials used in the construction of the exterior walls in many areas.
- 5. The rear wall (Southwest) shows sufficient movement as to create binding of exterior doors, one of which was almost inoperative. Covers of certain joints in the curtain wall had moved sufficiently as to be open to weather.
- 6. Some cracks exist in the interior masonry wall construction.
- 7. No expansion joints or "control" joints were found in the building.
- 8. Construction of the building appears in general to be pre-stressed roof decking resting on eight inch (8") cement block walls with the exception of the activity room.
 - Theoretically these walls properly layed on a sufficient foundation should support the roof and its loading providing the strength of said block meets the code requirements for structural loading. However, we would hesitate to recommend such construction as being the most desirable.
- 9. The roofing in the basic contract, calls for a twenty (20) year bonded Barrett Black Diamond, Coal Tar Pitch and Tarred Felt Roofing, specifica-

tion number 220-G or approved equal, installed under manufacturer's specifications. Such specifications call for the manufacturer to inspect the application of the roofing materials at the time of installation. We do not know whether or not a Barrett roof or equal was accepted, however, the inspection would apply in either case. It should be noted that manufacturers do not quarantee metal drip edges or metal flashings. There appears to be a weakness in the design of the drip edge. We believe this edge should have been raised and a suitable cant strip installed to keep any water that might collect on the roof from coming in contact with the joint between the metal drip edge and the built-up roof materials. There is always a movement of metal due to temperature change and even though manufacturers have attempted to produce a sealant against this condition there is always a possibility of a leak at this point.

- 10. The basic specifications of the building call for concrete block reinforcements. (See Para. C-30). The written agreement calls for a change from the basic documents of a substantial number of items, including among these, the type of foundations, change in strength of concrete, type of concrete block, the omission of certain roof drains, granite facing, etc. There are other items in said changes that do not necessarily affect the structure of the building.
 - 11. It is noted that figures in said documents indicated that the building originally bid for One hundred and eighty-nine thousand, nine hundred and fifty-seven dollars and no cents (\$189,957.00) and that the Owner, through his various representatives, negotiated a reduction of costs through changes in the specifications, said changes being noted in the written agreement totaling Twenty-

eight thousand, two hundred and eighty dollars and no cents (\$28,280.00), leaving a contract sum of One hundred and sixty-one thousand, six hundred and seventy-seven dollars and no cents (\$161,677.00). Naturally in many instances these negotiations resulted in changes in the quality and type of construction in certain areas. Whether all changes were acceptable would appear to have been already determined by the various parties to the agreement.

It is recommended that the Architects and Engineers of record for this building be requested to perform such service as necessary to process the following work.

- a. Remove and replace the existing end wall, properly reinforcing the same in a suitable manner.
- b. Redesign and install new drip edge as set forth in Item 9 above.
- c. Remove roofing, installing suitable cant strips to pitch water to drains.
- d. Install expansion joint in roofing from South corner of the intersection of roof and Auditorium wall, perpendicular to the Southwest exterior wall.
- e. Reassemble curtain wall, properly anchoring mullions in such a manner as to eliminate the build-up of movement in and around door openings, properly sealing units as reassembled.

It is our understanding that some of the work herein recommended has been completed prior to this date. In making these recommendations we do not necessarily indicate that they will alleviate all the difficulties encountered now or in the future in regard to this structure, however, if the building is properly maintained it should protect the same from the weather.

It is presumed that in the final analysis many people are trying to place responsibility of the various conditions on personalities associated with the project. In doing so, consideration must be given to the fact that the basic documents were substantially revised in order to reduce the price in the amount of Twenty-eight thousand, two hundred and eighty dollars and no cents (\$28,280.00). Some of these reductions have a tendency to contribute to some of your present problems, while others do not. We do not know on whose advice the various decisions were made and therefore are not in a position to place responsibility. It must also be considered that the district saved a substantial amount of money. Apparently the over-all budget for the project made changes in the basic specifications necessary even though they produced a building of high maintenance cost. It is impossible for us to comment on other changes made for which we have no record.



These are changing times in educational circles, and signs point to growth and innovation in the immediate future. The AREA Concept and Co-operative School Districts will receive much attention in the wake of recent State Board of Education pronouncements concerning secondary school enrollments. There will be a continuance of Federal programs which will affect education in one form or another. We should be watchful and informed so that our decisions, concerning the education of boys and girls will be based on facts rather than emotions and hearsay.

Throughout these days ahead we will appreciate, as in the past, your continued cooperation in the best interests of boys and girls.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of School:

It gives me much pleasure to present this report of the health program as carried out in the towns of Barrington, Epsom, Northwood, Nottingham and Strafford during the school year of 1965-66. I feel this has been a very successful year with complete dental health programs being carried on in the towns of Epsom and Northwood, plans being made by Barrington for such a program in the coming year, and a full-scale tuberculin testing program with follow up x-rays having been completed in all of the schools except Epsom. Here again, arrangements have been made for Epsom to participate in 1966-67.

Each school has had its share of the various contagious diseases and skin eruptions, but these were well controlled and presented no major problem. The parents were most cooperative in this matter, as well as in obtaining professional care and treatment for any reported physical defects. Such cooperation is a necessity in carrying out an effective school health program, and I wish to express my sincere appreciation for it.

The following is a brief summary of the health services provided in each school during this past year:

During this school year, glasses were provided for one child by the Concord Lions' Club, and the New Hampshire Sight Conservation Program provided eye examinations and glasses for four more children.

Preschool clinics for registering children for Grade I were held during the spring of 1966, and were attended by 24 children at Barrington, 30 at Epsom, 24 at Northwood, 12 at Nottingham and 12 at Strafford. These clinics were conducted as in previous years except in Strafford. There, the children were accompanied to school by one or both parents. Registration was done by the principal and the nurse checked vaccinations and discussed with the parents any health problems which the child might have. Each child and parent was given an opportunity to visit in the first grade classroom.

The Heaf Tuberculin Test was administered in four of the schools with 255 students and faculty members taking advantage of this service in Barrington. 194 in Northwood, 122 in Nottingham and 137 in Strafford. Later an x-ray clinic was held at the Northwood Elemen-

tary School. The necessary equipment and technicians to run it were provided by the N. H. Tuberculosis and Health Association. Chest x-rays were taken of 48 people at this clinic.

Dental programs for cleaning teeth and receiving applications of topical fluoride (this solution is known to reduce decay in the teeth) as well as programs to provide fillings and/or extractions were organized in both Epsom and Northwood.

The Epsom programs were jointly sponsored by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health and the Epsom Parent-Teachers Organization, while those in Northwood were sponsored by the New Hampshire Bureau of Dental Health, the Harvey Lake Women's Club and the Northwood Parent-Teachers Association. Contributions were also received from numerous organizations and businesses in Northwood. The dental health committee members in both towns should be commended for the services they performed in setting up these clinics, keeping records, and in providing transportation when needed.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Martineau, Mr. Houghton, members of the School Boards, the teachers, the parents and the children for their consistent helpfulness.
