PIRC In The Spotlight: On the Road . . .



PIRC's Executive Director of Research **Sharyn Potter** and Project Manager **Rebecca Ludecke** have been traveling around the country with the National Science Foundation's Innovation Corps Program. I-Corps supports academics in applying their research to the development of commercialized products. The Prevention Innovations team was awarded this grant to conduct nationwide in-person interviews about research-based **uSafeUS®**, a smartphone app that puts sexual assault prevention and response resources in the hands of users. This program has been invaluable in helping identify the value that a smartphone application could have in helping high school and college students get connected to resources before and after sexual violence.

Bringing in the Bystander® continues to be a go-to curriculum for universities, colleges and community partners looking for an evaluated and researched curriculum to change their college culture. BITB has been shown to increase college students' knowledge related to sexual assault and relationship abuse, while also increasing college students' bystander efficacy and self-reported positive bystander behaviors. Positive bystander behaviors are a critical component of transforming community norms to be intolerant of violence and to reducing rates of violence.

Our BITB family of products grows with a high school curriculum (BITB-HSC) out this summer. Comprised of seven interactive modules and meant to fit into a high school class schedule, each module is co-taught to a co-ed group of participants and uses various teaching methods to actively engage participants. Preliminary evaluations suggest the program is well-liked by students and school staff and effective in leading to attitudinal and behavior change.
