# TOWN WARRANT

---

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Stratham Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at eight of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to allow one percent discount on such property taxes as are paid by August 15th, or within 30 days from the day upon which the tax warrant is committed to the collector, whichever is later, the date to be printed on the tax bills.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred thirty four dollars and three cents (\$234.03) against the State's fifteen hundred sixty dollars and twenty two cents (\$1,560.22) for State Aid Construction.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to gravel the west end of River Road and build a turn-

around and small parking area on the Town Landing at the end thereof.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to install accoustical treatment on the ceiling and the walls of the Town Hall.

8. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning and Land Use Ordinance, adopted at the annual town meeting June 10, 1959 and as it may have been amended by subsequent town meetings, as follows:

(A) To amend Article II by omitting after "agricultural", the word "commercial", and by adding after "industrial district", the words "commercial district", so that it will then read:

1. Residential-Agricultural District
2. Industrial District      3. Commercial District

(B) To amend Article IV, the name of the district, by omitting after the word "agricultural", the word "commercial", so that the title will read: Residential, Agricultural District.

(C) To revise Article V, Section A, by omitting after the word "Agricultural", the word "commercial" so that it reads "Residential, Agricultural District".

(D) To revise Article VI, Section A, paragraph 1, by omitting in two places after the word "Agricultural" the word "commercial" so that it reads "Residential, Agricultural District".

(E) By adding after Article IV, Article IVa and the following new section to read as follows: Article IVa. Commercial District. (a) A building may be erected, altered or used and a lot may be used or occupied as provided for under Article IV within the

Commercial District and may be used for commercial uses that meet the following requirements: 1. The building be located at least sixty (60) feet from the edge on any right of way and not less than twenty (20) feet from each boundary of the lot. 2. Provide adequate parking facilities to accomodate (a) freight and delivery trucks, (b) employee parking, (c) vehicles of business invitees. 3. Shall conform to all the sanitary provisions of Artcile III, Section F.

(F) By adding after Article XIV, sub-paragraph H, the following new paragraph entitled "I": 1. Commercial Uses. A commercial use shall include wholesale or retail trade, restaurants, hotels, or motels, gasoline stations or office buildings.

(G) To amend Article IX by omitting the word "commercial" in Paragraphs B and C so that it reads: Residential-Agricultural District and by striking out sub-paragraph 3 and by adding in place thereof: 3. Shall conform to all the sanitary provisions of this ordinance Article III Section F.

(H) To revise the Stratham Zoning Map so as to show the new commercial zone which shall be a shaded area more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Exeter line at Portsmouth Avenue; thence running notherly along Portsmouth Avenue to a point five hundred and fifty (550) feet from the center line of Bunker Hill Avenue on the easterly side of Portsmouth Avenue and to a projection of the center line of Bunker Hill Avenue on the westerly side of Portsmouth Avenue, to carry a depth easterly and westerly of the center line of Portsmouth Avenue of four hundred (400) feet and the easterly and westerly bound of this district to be parallel with the center line of Route 101 at all points. Also a commercial zone starting at the junction of Winnicut Road

with Portsmouth Avenue and thence running in a westerly and southerly direction along Portsmouth Avenue, to the Southerly point of the Circle and said Commercial District to have a depth on each side of the center line of Portsmouth Avenue and the Circle of four hundred (400) feet.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to revalue the Town.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy five dollars (\$75.00) to install and maintain street lights at the Community Church.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

(The polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6 P.M. at the Lower Town Hall to elect Town Officers. The discussion and action on the articles in the Warrant at 8:00 P.M. in the Upper Town Hall.)

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

---

At last year's annual Meeting the district requested that two separate budgets be drawn up for next year: one budget to include the teaching of 7th Grade in Stratham and one to include the teaching of 7th Grade in Exeter. This has been done.

The most significant differences appear in the items of teachers' salaries and elementary tuition. By sending the 7th Grade to Exeter we save one teacher's salary but we pay a very large sum for tuition. Costs for transportation will not change significantly. Sending the 7th Grade to Exeter would cost about \$5,100 more for the next school year.

This extra cost for next year is unusually high because next year's 7th Grade is the largest grade in our school and numbers 28 pupils. The average size of the next succeeding four grades is 22 pupils. To send 22 pupils to Exeter would cost \$3,000 extra per year. It is perhaps fair to guess that for the next 10 years (the term of our contract with Exeter) our 7th Grade will average 25 children and the cost of sending a grade of this size to Exeter will be about \$4,000 a year or approximately \$160 per child per year.

Will the 7th Grade curriculum in Exeter be enough better than our own curriculum to make this investment worth-while? The Exeter Junior High has a two year coordinated program for 7th and 8th grades. All teaching is departmentalized. In each subject taught there are separate classes for the hard working and more talented children who are able to go ahead faster than the average. Exeter offers a physical education course, a shop course, and a home economics course in 7th grade.

These are real educational advantages. The town must decide whether to have them or not.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the District will vote to accept the form of contract agreement with the Exeter School District

for Junior and Senior High School tuition pupils as it is printed elsewhere in this report.

10. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

**(RSA 194:22 and 194:27)**

WITNESSETH: That

WHEREAS said \_\_\_\_\_ School District does not maintain a high school and is desirous of having (    ) all (    ) some of its pupils grades \_\_\_\_\_ through 12 attend the high school in said Exeter School District and has authorized its School Board to make a contract for such high school education: and

WHEREAS, said Exeter School District maintains a high school approved by the State Department of Education of the State of New Hampshire, and through its School Board is willing to receive said scholars and afford them the complete course of instruction now given in its high school

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED that the \_\_\_\_\_ School Board will send (    ) all (    ) some of its high school pupils to the high school of said Exeter School District and the said Exeter School Board hereby agrees to accept such high school pupils for the intervals as set forth in subsequent paragraphs.

AND IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the tuition rate for the scholars shall be as set forth by the terms described in the following paragraph:

Separate tuition rates shall be established for grades 7 and 8, and grades 9 - 12. These rates shall be established for each school year before December 15 of the preceding school year. Throughout the duration of this agreement, which shall begin July 1, 1961, and continue through June 30, 1971, the tuition rates shall be based upon the estimated average per pupil costs of grades 7 - 8, and grades 9 - 12 in the public schools of Exeter for the school year preceding the year to which the tuition rates are applicable; plus a rental charge of two percent as provided under N.H. RSA 194:27. Such expenditures as are reimbursed by State or Federal aid programs shall not be included in the estimation

of per pupil cost. Each tuition rate and rental charge shall be submitted to the State Board of Education for approval prior to being made a part of this contract. The tuition rate and the rental charge adopted for each year shall be made binding upon the parties of this agreement by means of an appropriate memorandum to be signed by the school boards of each school district and approved by the State Board of Education, and then made a part of this agreement.

AND IT IS FURTHER AGREED that the high school maintained by the School District known as Exeter High School will continue throughout the contract period to maintain a program of studies at least comparable in quality and variety to that which exists at the time that said parties subscribed to this agreement.

IN WITNESS THEREOF, said parties to this agreement have by their school boards respectively hereunto set their hands and seals on the day and year first written.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board of Stratham:

The school year 1960-1961 opened with the following teaching staff.

This is the same conscientious and experienced staff which taught last year and I believe Stratham is fortunate to have them again furnishing the educational training for the boys and girls.

The problem of housing the junior and senior high school pupils was resolved when the Exeter School District voted to build an addition to its high school building. This action was followed by the vote of the Stratham School District to enter into an equitable contract agreement with Exeter for tuition pupils to attend Exeter High School for a period of ten years subject to approval of the form of the agreement at the annual district meeting this year.

The form has been prepared and approved by the State Department of Education and by the Exeter School Board. The tuition rates and the rental fee for the year 1961-1962 have been announced as \$352 for senior high pupils. The estimated per pupil cost for

junior high students for 1960-61 is \$330 plus the rental fee of \$22; the estimated per pupil cost for senior high students for the current year is \$407 plus the rental fee of \$22 resulting in these rates. The average cost per high school pupil as announced by the State Department for tuition pupils for next year is \$436 so that the Exeter rate even with the rental fee continues to be below the state average.

In estimating the per pupil costs the following current expenditures were not included: tax for state wide supervision, transportation, salary of the Helping Teacher, hot lunch programs, reimbursement from the National Defense Education Act, tuitions and capital outlay items.

Also, in determining the per pupil rental fee instead of using the actual number of pupils which is estimated as 900 for next year at the junior-senior high school, the Exeter School Board voted to use the number for the capacity of the building which will be 1200 pupils. This decision reduced the amount of the rental fee by about eight dollars per pupil.

I believe that the above action indicates that the Exeter Board has tried to be very fair in preparing the contract agreement and in its attempt to keep the tuition rates as reasonable as possible.

The addition to Exeter High School will provide improved and enlarged facilities for science, shop courses, commercial subjects, music and cafeteria services. It will also provide a Language Laboratory, a library which is separate from the study hall, an improved guidance area and eleven classrooms. This will complete a modern school plant of which Exeter and the districts which send their students to this school can indeed be proud.

Mr. Donald Elsemore was elected to the Helping Teacher position last January. I would like to devote a part of this report to his statement of some of the work

which he has been doing especially as his role is that of Supervisor of Elementary Education which gives him the opportunity to work with the elementary teachers and to assist them in their teaching.

He reports as follows:

“Parents of elementary school children have certainly been aware of a new pupil report card this year. Its adoption was the result of much work on the part of the teachers under the guidance of the Helping Teacher. Part of this work took place during the summer vacation months. The Report Card Committee carefully studied a large selection of sample cards from all parts of the country. They read the latest educational research on the subject. From this material and from the many personal thoughts and opinions of committee members came the present report card. Each portion of the card evolved only after much thought and deliberation, discussion and revision. The new card attempts to grade the child in two ways: (1) According to prescribed grade standards — this appears necessary if pupil marks are to have definite meaning to parents, teachers and school officials. (2) According to the ability of the child — we all know that children differ in their ability to learn. It is quite impossible for all children to achieve at the same level regardless of effort. Thus a mark based on individual ability and effort seems in keeping with sound principles of child development.

“The combination of these two marks gives a much clearer picture of each child than did the former undefined single mark.

“The purpose of marking is to help each child achieve to the very best of his ability. It also serves to help parents better understand their child’s school progress so that they may offer the right kind of parental assistance. This card attempts to fulfill

these objectives. Although the perfect report card may never be invented, we feel that this new card is certainly a step in the right direction in the evaluation of pupil progress.

“Another project now in progress under the direction of the Helping Teacher is the development of a curriculum guide for the elementary arithmetic program. This is a year-long project which involves a great deal of work on the part of all participants. The purpose of the guide is to outline the arithmetic concepts to be taught in each grade and to offer suggestions for improving the quality of its teaching. Mr. George Cunningham, N. H. State Director of Mathematics, is serving as the mathematical consultant to the group.

“The result of this work should serve as a valuable aid to both old and new teachers in their arithmetic teaching. It should also help to standardize instruction throughout the supervisory union so that all youngsters may enter high school with the benefit of a common mathematical background. The group work involved in the formation of the guide has also been of great value in the coordination of teacher thinking.

“These two projects have been given as examples of the type of work done by the Helping Teacher. Daily work is greatly varied and includes many other activities. Any task which might serve to promote the highest of educational standards in the community might well be tackled by the Helping Teacher.”

As a matter of public information on days when there is to be no school due to inclement weather an announcement will be made over the Dover radio station WTSN, 1270 on the dial, starting at 6:45 A. M. and over the Portsmouth radio station WHEB, 750 on the dial, starting at 7:15 A. M. during December and Jan-

uary and at 6:45 A. M. during the other months of the year.

The Parent-Teacher Association deserves credit for its contribution to the educational needs of the school.

Mr. Peter Houghton as janitor has been conscientious in the work of keeping the school building neat and clean.

Mrs. Naomi Beairsto and Mrs. Ruth Young continue to provide good meals for the Hot Lunch Program.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

I am glad to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens, the members of the school board, and the teachers for their continued support and cooperation.

School health services comprise those procedures designed to determine the health status of the child, to enlist the child's interest in protecting and safe-guarding his health, to help parents to understand their children's health needs, and to take the necessary steps to provide suitable treatment for disease and correction of physical defects.

It is recognized that the school provides only a part of the total experience of the child. He lives in a home in a community and has a multitude of daily experiences, not directed by the school, which affect his health behavior. The cooperative action of the school, home and community is essential if the most effective type of health direction is to be developed.

Communication with communities through PTA's and other civic organizations has ignited an interest in our children which continues to grow. We look ahead and continue building a healthier future and improved living for our children.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISORY UNION RETARDED CLASS

---

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The Supervisory Union Class went into its second year last September with an enrollment of fourteen children—8 boys and 6 girls. The chronological age range is 11 to 16, and the physical size, needs, and abilities show a like span.

The practical approach to all subject matter is used continuously. Where it is at all feasible, we experience personally the problems we are studying. Real money is used, trips are taken, kitchen duties are performed. Government in action has a new meaning, because Governor Powell himself has welcomed the group and has kept in contact with the class.

This is a year of great academic achievement. There are four major groupings in the room in the areas of reading and arithmetic. Teams are used and child helps child. As in the preceding year, we use frequently class time for oral discussions. We have in common the need to talk and express our thoughts and feelings.

The life of the Union Class is very busy and full. We are fortunate to have the Supervisors of Music, Art, and Physical Education with us each week. Their interest and understanding is commendable. We are enjoying and deriving great benefits this year from the Television lessons which we attend. New Hampshire History is coming alive to us and Natural Science is a fascinating course.

Boy Scout Troop 322 and Girl Scout Troop 588 are very active this year. Each group meets weekly on different days with their leaders. The boys are working on their First Class Badges and the girls are working on their Good Grooming Badges.

The children and I gratefully acknowledge the interest shown and opportunities afforded us. This is a good year.
