### Commissioners' Report.

To the Inhabitants of Sullivan County:

In compliance with the laws of New Hampshire, it becomes the duty of the Commissioners as well as other officers of the County, to present to the people statements of what has been done.

#### COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin A. Herrick the first day of May, 1889, entered upon the fifth year of continuous labor as Superintendent and Matron of the institution. To those acquainted with its management nothing need be said. To the unacquainted it is sufficient to say, so far as its sanitary condition is concerned, that a Physician has been called to it but twice, to attend the County's indisposed, at an expense of \$2.70, and the entire bill including office calls, amounts to only \$12.70 for the year ending April 30th, 1889. A condition of healthfulness we doubt not, without a parallel in the history of such an institution anywhere, and contrasts favorably as against the large amount paid by a small town in the County for medical attendance for resident paupers for thirty-two weeks, which exceeded \$300. While humanity demands and the Commissioners of Sullivan County are willing to pay for a reasonable amount of medical services for the indisposed poor, we are of opinion that the Overseers of Poor of some of the towns of the County should look after this part of the expense, a little more closely than has been the custom.

#### FINANCIAL CONDITION.

The \$25,000.00 raised by the County Convention of 1887, for the year 1888, has proved insufficient to meet the current expenses of the County, and retire \$5,000 of its indebtedness, contrary to expec-

tation at that time. The treasury is now nearly empty, the County is owing two notes of \$5,000 each, bearing interest at five per cent., one of which becomes due sometime in October next and the amountis included in the assessment of the county tax upon the several towns of the County, to be paid to the treasury the first of September next, and will be paid at maturity. The County will be obliged to borrow some \$2,500 to bridge over to the first of September. One reason of the shortage is the large expense of re-copying records of Register of Deeds office, the county having already paid \$6,969.58 an amount much greater than has been appropriated, and the register represents that \$3,000.00 more will be needed to complete the same. It seems to us that \$20,000.00 should be sufficient to meet the ordinary demands of the County for one year. We are also of opinion that \$12,432.49 is quite a liberal amount to pay for support of the destitute not at the Farm, for the small County of Sullivan, an amount considerably larger than any other County of the State in proportion to its population; and yet some of the good people of the County, many of them large tax-payers, think we do not pay enough.

The County is paying for no person at the Industrial School, and for only one at Asylum of Insane, and that one was quite recently committed, and may not prove to be chargeable to this County, When we commenced the year's duties, we expected to be able to reduce the expenses of the County somewhat, but have been unable to do so. We believe that one item of expense is somewhat less than in former years, and perhaps the only one that is less, namely, services and expenses of Commissioners.

Respectfully submitted, hoping the people of Sullivan County will approve that part of what has been done by us, which seems to them deserving.

#### Physician's Report.

The health of the inmates at the County Farm during the year ending May 1st, 1889, has been exceptionally good.

Only slight indispositions have occurred which soon yielded to treatment, notwithstanding that many were over 80 and many were small children. There have been no epedemic diseases of any kind. Entire freedom from Scabies and kindred troubles has prevailed.

A mild winter with the late improvements in the Sanitary condition of the house, with a careful supervision and plenty of the necessaries of life, have reduced sickness to a minimum. Only three deaths to report and all of these due to diseases incident to old age. One was insane, one deaf, dumb and idiotic, and one an old hermit who was brought there in an almost dying condition.

### Chaplain's Report.

I have been acting Chaplain of the Sullivan County House for the poor and for the insane since the 9th of September, 1888.

Two or three services have been missed on account of sickness or bad traveling, having something more than twenty miles to travel. Our services have been very interesting and I trust profitable. Many of the inmates seem to appreciate the services and I think they have been attended with good results. I have been surprised to see the good order and close attention in service time, with very few exceptions. At our last service twelve to fifteen hands were raised in testimony that they were Christians, and living by faith on the Son of God and in good hope through Him of eternal life. Others also by hand vote, manifested their desire to become Christians.

It is not to be expected that *all* in such a congregation will appreciate religious service. But where little is given, little will be required and little expected.

Special attention has been given to singing, which the inmates have seemed to enjoy very much. In most congregations in these days, the organ is considered necessary and almost indispensable. This would be gratifying if we could always have a good Organist at hand, and yet it is a question whether on the whole it would be an improvement. These

people love the spiritual, stiring songs coming right up from a full heart, sung with the spirit and in full sympathy with the sentiment of what is sung and they reach the heart and make it glad.

I have been surprised and my heart has been made glad as I have passed through the wards and from room to room in seeing the clean rooms and the comfortable beds, and so many things that express care and thoughtfulness for the inmates, especially for the sick and the helpless. These things speak much for your excellent superintendent and thoughtful matron, and we pray that they with the Commissioners may at last realize the saying of our Lord when He said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

I feel called upon to rejoice and praise God that we have a government that makes such provisions for the poor and unfortunate, instead of sending them into the street to beg them. I am but little acquainted with such Institutions. But the fact of finding this one so far in advance of what I expected, leaves me but little chance to suggest improvements. Yet probably there may be some things yet to be perfected.
