SUNUNU MAINTAINS DOUBLE DIGIT LEADS OVER KELLY AND MARCHAND; HIGH INTEREST IN ELECTION

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
DURHAM, NH – Governor Chris Sununu continues to enjoy broad approval of his job performance and high personal popularity among New Hampshire residents. Sununu currently leads his Democratic rivals Steve Marchand and Molly Kelly. Issues relating to the misuse of drugs continue to be seen as the main problem facing the state.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and one (501) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between August 2 and August 19, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent. Included were three hundred and eighty-nine (389) likely 2018 general election voters (MSE = +/- 5.0%).

Gubernatorial Approval


Nearing his first reelection contest in the Fall, Governor Chris Sununu continues to enjoy broad approval; 61% approve of the job Sununu is doing as governor, 21% disapprove, and 17% neither approve nor disapprove or are unsure. Approval of Sununu's job performance is largely unchanged since April (59%) but disapproval of the job he is doing (21%) has ticked slightly upward since then (16%). This follows a pattern where governors typically see their disapproval increase in the summer before a reelection campaign.


Eighty-six percent of New Hampshire Republicans approve of the job Sununu is doing, the highest level of support he has enjoyed among Republicans during his tenure as governor. Just over half (52%) of Independents approve of Sununu's job performance, a slight decline since April (63%), while 45% of Democrats approve, a slight improvement since April (38%).

On a scale where "strongly approve" equals 7 and "strongly disapprove" equals 1, Sununu's average approval score (4.9) in his seventh quarter has fallen slightly since April 2018 (5.0). His support matches that of Maggie Hassan (4.9) at the same point in her governorship and is much higher than Craig Benson (4.1), but is well below John Lynch's support (5.8) in his seventh quarter.



Favorability Ratings - Governor Chris Sununu

Sununu also remains quite popular personally among New Hampshire adults; 52% say they have a favorable opinion of him, 16% have an unfavorable opinion, 16% are neutral, and 16% don't know or are unsure.

Self-identified Republicans, self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump in the 2016 election, conservative radio listeners, those who attend religious services once or twice a month, and Seacoast residents are most likely to have a favorable opinion of Sununu. Self-described liberals, self-identified Democrats, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, *Boston Globe* readers, Connecticut Valley residents, and those aged 18 to 34 are least likely to have a favorable opinion of Sununu.




Net Favorability Rating - Governor Chris Sununu

Sununu's net favorability rating, the percentage of people who have a favorable opinion minus the percentage who have an unfavorable opinion, is +35%, largely unchanged since April (+38%). His net favorability rating has slightly increased among Republicans (+67% in April, +73% in August) but has decreased slightly among Independents (+46% in April, +40% in August) and Democrats (+9% in April, +2% in August).






Interest in 2018 General Election

Interest in the forthcoming mid-term election has increased since April and is higher than at the same point in the electoral cycle in 2010 and 2014. Four in ten New Hampshire residents (39%) say they are extremely interested in the 2018 general election, 28% are very interested, 22% are somewhat interested, 11% are not very interested, and 1% don't know or are unsure.


Those who have completed postgraduate work, *Union Leader, Boston Globe*, and local newspaper readers, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-described liberals, those who attend religious services once or twice a month, those aged 65 and older, NHPR listeners, and conservative radio listeners are most likely to say they are extremely or very interested in the 2018 general election. Those who did not vote in 2016, those with a high school education or less, Connecticut Valley residents, those aged 18 to 34, and self-identified Independents are least likely to say so.

Interest in Recent Mid-Term General Elections




Nearly two-thirds (65%) of New Hampshire adults say they definitely will vote in the 2018 general election, a slight increase since April (57%). Thirteen percent say they will vote unless an emergency comes up, 9% say they may vote, 3% say they probably will not vote, and 10% say they just don't know at this time.

Democrats (70%) and Republicans (68%) are about equally likely to say they will definitely vote in the 2018 general election, while Independents (55%) are less likely to say so.


Definitely Will Vote in 2018 General Election - by Party



2018 NH Gubernatorial Election

Seventy-three percent of Granite Staters are still trying to decide on their choice for the Fall New Hampshire gubernatorial election. Just over a quarter (27%) are leaning towards someone (15%) or have definitely decided (12%), up slightly since April 2018 (20%).

Definitely Decided on Candidate




Former State Senator Molly Kelly and former Portsmouth Mayor Steve Marchand are the only Democrats who have declared their candidacy for the governor's race, but both remain unknown to most Granite Staters.

Former State Senator Molly Kelly has similar levels of favorability to Marchand while running for state-wide office for the first time. Thirteen percent of respondents have a favorable opinion of Kelly, 7% have a neutral opinion, 5% have an unfavorable opinion of her, and three-quarters (75%) don't know or have never heard of Kelly. Her favorability (13%) is slightly higher than in April (9%). Among Democrats, 22% have a favorable opinion of Kelly, slightly higher than in April (15%).

Despite having campaigned since April 2017, only 11% of respondents say they have a positive opinion of former Portsmouth Mayor Steve Marchand. Four percent have a neutral opinion, 7% have an unfavorable opinion, and more than three-quarters (79%) say they don't know or have never heard of Marchand. Marchand's favorability (11%) is unchanged since April (10%). Among Democrats, 19% have a favorable opinion of him, slightly higher than in April (15%).

Favorability - Prospective Gubernatorial Candidates




Prospective 2018 NH Gubernatorial Matchups

In matchups for the November race, Governor Sununu continues to hold double-digit leads over both potential Democratic opponents.

In a matchup between Sununu and Kelly, 48% of likely voters would vote for Sununu, 32% would vote for Kelly, and 20% are undecided or would vote for another candidate. Support for Kelly in this matchup (32%) has increased since April 2018 (24%). Fourteen percent of self-identified Democrats say they would vote for Sununu over Kelly while less than 1% of self-identified Republicans would vote for Kelly over Sununu.

In a matchup between Sununu and Marchand, 48% of 2018 likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 33% would vote for Marchand, and 19% are undecided or would vote for another candidate. Support for Marchand (33%) has slightly increased since April (27%). Fourteen percent of self-identified Democrats say they would vote for Sununu over Marchand while 1% of self-identified Republicans would vote for Marchand over Sununu.




Conservative radio listeners, self-identified Republicans, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016 or did not vote, self-described conservatives, and Seacoast residents are more likely than others to say they would vote for Sununu in both of these matchups.


Self-described liberals, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-identified Democrats, NHPR listeners, Connecticut Valley residents, and *Boston Globe* readers are more likely than others to support Kelly or Marchand over Sununu.

Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

Just under half of Granite Staters (48%) believe the drug crisis is the most important problem facing New Hampshire, a slight decrease from the previous five quarters. Ten percent of respondents cite jobs or the economy, 7% mention education, 4% cite healthcare, 3% mention taxes, 1% cite the state budget, 22% cite another problem, and 6% don't know or are unsure.


Concern over the drug crisis remains bipartisan: 53% of Republicans, 44% of Democrats, and 40% of Independents feel drugs are the state's most important problem.





NH Heading in Right Direction or On Wrong Track

Optimism about the state's outlook remains high and is virtually unchanged since April. Seventy-two percent of Granite Staters say things are generally going in the right direction in the state, 18% say things are seriously off on the wrong track, and 11% don't know or are unsure. Optimism about the state's future is bipartisan: 78% of Republicans, 70% of Democrats, and 63% of Independents feel the state is headed in the right direction.




NH Right Track - Wrong Track

NH Legislature Approval

Forty-eight percent of Granite Staters say they approve of how the Republican-controlled State Legislature is doing its job, 28% disapprove, and a quarter (24%) neither approve nor disapprove or are unsure. Approval of the state legislature is largely unchanged since April (49%) but remains below its all-time high in February (56%).





Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and one (501) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between August 2 and August 19, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent. Included were three hundred and eighty-nine (389) likely 2018 general election voters (MSE = +/- 5.0%). These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.3%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers. When a landline number is reached, the interviewer randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equal chance of being included in the survey.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
