



Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years and two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote \$200 and appropriate the same for the use of the Laconia Hospital Association.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to

cover the expense of such an audit.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to make any change in the established amount raised for Hall Memorial Library.
- 8. To determine the salary of the Treasurer of the Trustees of Trust Funds as provided for in Chapter 70 of the laws of 1943, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see what amount of money if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for war emergencies.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$232.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78.98 to procure Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$315.92.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for recreational purposes in this community, to be expended under the supervision of the Tilton and Northfield Chamber of Commerce, provided the Town of Northfield raises same amount.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for all purposes for the ensuing year.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 16. To choose any other officers or agents for the year ensuing.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters of the Tilton-Northfield Union School District:

The war effort last year caused many changes in our school life but it has now settled into a pattern in which we can devote most of our energies to educational endeavors. In this report information from the high school headmaster and the school nurse are combined with the comments of the superintendent.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT, MAINTENANCE, OPERATION, REPAIR

1. Union School.

New curtains to replace shades sorely needed for several years have been installed in all classrooms.

Lighting experts have submitted an estimate on satisfactory illumination of the classrooms at limited expense.

2. Unused Schools.

Both the Oak Hill and the Lochmere schools have been closed for more than two years. With lumber at premium prices, it may be wise to sell these unused buildings while there is a satisfactory market.

3. High School.

A low-water cut-out has been installed on the

Smith boiler, thereby preventing its loss through failure of the electric water pump on the return line.

The red barn on Winter street is to be placed on a foundation behind the high school auditorium, where it will be inconspicuous. When remodeled by the boys in the shop, it will serve as a repair place for farm machinery and large equipment.

A new commercial gas stove has been purchased for use in preparing noon lunches.

Five typewriters from the commercial department of the high school were sold to the Federal Government when machines were urgently needed for the armed forces.

Boys in the shop constructed crude outdoor coal bins at the Union and High School buildings to store a soft coal supply purchased early last spring for the present school year. Accepting temporary unsightliness we are assured of having well-heated school buildings, warm places for boys and girls.

4. N. Y. A. Equipment.

Prior to the dissolution of the N. Y. A., December 31, 1943, several schools in the State were loaned equipment for vocational departments. In Home Economics, dishes, cooking and sewing equipment has been made available. In Agriculture, a 21-passenger bus has been loaned to carry boys on excursions or to work on farms.

TEACHERS AND SUPERVISORS

1. High School.

On March 15, 1943, Mr. Willard H. Smith,

headmaster since the opening of the high school in the fall of 1939, left to become principal of the Concord, Massachusetts high school. Mr. Smith, with the teachers on the staff during the four-year period, developed a very good school and his leaving during the year was regretted.

For fourteen weeks following Mr. Smith's departure, the high school was operated without a fulltime head. Late in the spring, Mr. Donald F. Piper, an excellent teacher on the staff, with previous experience as an elementary principal, was elected. He took office during the last week of the school year, signed diplomas, and presided over graduation exercises. Mr. Piper gives promise of being an outstanding school executive.

Mr. Ernest Peltonen, submaster for four years, accepted a position in Hampstead. There is no immediate prospect that the submaster's position will be filled.

Mr. Ernest F. Fiske became the headmaster in Belmont. To teach some of the classes in English, Miss Rosalie Rushlo wof Concord, with experience in Bethlehem High School, was selected.

Mr. Ramon Martineau was given a leave of absence to enter the armed forces. His work in Aeronautics is being taught by Mrs. Amy Seaver Tibbetts of Bristol, recent graduate at the Plymouth Teachers College, with high ratings in Aeronautics.

To handle social studies, Mr. Sherburne M. Buckler, experienced teacher from Newmarket High School, was chosen. Mr. Buckler also coaches boys'

athletic groups and directs the physical fitness drills for older boys.

Miss Margaret M. Thompson, a teacher in Tilton and Northfield for several years, accepted a position in Lebanon. Miss Elaine L. Roy of Berlin came here after the opening of school to teach some of Miss Thompson's classes.

The staff at the Tilton-Northfield High School has been reduced from fifteen to fourteen members.

2. Union School.

In the Union School, the staff is very stable and exceedingly efficient, due to infrequent changes in personnel. After Mrs. Bertha McLoy McClorey joined her husband in Alabama, Mrs. Ilene S. Whicher substituted. During the summer Miss Mary H. Devens of Ryegate, Vermont, with teaching experience in Bristol, became one of the teachers of middle grade pupils.

At the Union School, Mrs. Ilene S. Whicher is bein gemployed to teach two hours per day while the principal directs the new arithmetic program.

10. War Savings Stamps and Bonds

During the school year 1942-1943, pupils in the Union and High Schools purchased about \$2400 in War Savings Stamps and \$8575 in Bonds.

From the opening of school in September 1943 to the anniversary of Pearl Harbor on December 7th, the pupils purchased:

11. Health Work

Mrs. Lurline H. McCook, School Nurse, reports on the school nursing program from June 30, 1942 to September 1, 1943 and it is gratifying to see the progress which has been made under her direction and by her active participation. She says that during the school year the school dental clinic completed the work found necessary at the dental inspection of Union School pupils made in May 1942, and in April, 1943. Of the 366 children examined, 165 had treatments completed, 9 were partially done, parents of 45 promised to have the necessary work done, and the parents of 12 others received No response was received from 17. children were transferred to other schools and 60 others needed no dental care. The average bill was \$2.34, the highest \$6.20 and the lowest 60c. Parents paid 40 per cent of the clinic fees, the Tilton Trust Fund took care of one, and the Tilton and Northfield Woman's Club financed the rest. Too much cannot be said for the patience and generosity of Dr. E. D. Forrest and Dr. J. E. Nordholm in promoting this work.

A tuberculosis skin testing clinic was conducted for all Junior High School pupils and a few others. Seven of the 128 tested showed a positive reaction and were later x-rayed and examined at the tuberculosis clinic.

Clinic and specialists care in other towns were furnished for 8 tonsillectomies, 2 eye, 2 x-ray, 2 mental hygiene, 1 ear, 1 heart and 5 orthopedic examinations and treatments.

The school nursing program necessitated the use of approximately 560 hours.

- $181\frac{1}{2}$ hours clinic work
 - 15½ hours home visits
- 1151/4 hours routine inspection and first aid
 - 25 hours medical inspection with school physician
 - 83/4 hours inspection of heads
 - 431/4 hours vision testing
 - 171/4 hours posture exercises
- 153½ hours interviews, business calls, paper work, programs and weighing and measuring.

At the Union School, one-half pint bottles of pasteurized milk costing 4c each are purchased by

pupils either during the morning recess or at noon. Of this cost the Federal Government provides half and pupils in the "2-penny milk" program pay the balance.

At the High School, full meals are served for 20c and "2-penny" milk can be purchased to supplement lunches brought from home.

Through the cooperation of the Agricultural and Home Economics departments considerable food was provided for the school lunches.

A little over one-half acre was under cultivation at a total cost of about \$60. This produced 25 bu. potatoes, 15 bu. carrots, 7 bu. beets, 5 bu. turnips, $1\frac{1}{2}$ bu. parsnips, 5 bu. tomatoes, 3 bu. green peas, and an unmeasured amount of Swiss Chard.

During the summer, girls under the direction of Mrs. Florence Nudd and some local women, canned 250 quarts string beans, 74 qts. corn, 50 qts. carrots, 40 qts. tomatoes and 40 jars of green tomato pickles.

RELATED AND SPECIAL ACTIVITIES, AND SERVICES

High School

Mr. Donald F. Piper, new headmaster of the Tilton-Northfield, has submitted some interesting facts about the school.

Junior High School Library

For the first time it has been possible to develop a separate library for Junior High School pupils. One of the rooms on the basement floor has been equipped with shelves, books, magazines, and newspapers especially for these younger pupils.

2. Activity Program

All extra-curricular activities, including athletics, are supported by the pupils. A weekly collection of 10c is made from each pupil and this money goes into a common fund to buy all athletic equipment, finance trips for the teams, provide special assemblies, purchase records for dances, assist classes in their meetings and parties, help defray graduation expenses, and provide any other benefits.

3. The Patrol

A group of boys and girls from all classes has been organized into The Patrol. This group has been very helpful in keeping good traffic conditions, and in assisting with the supervision of activities.

5. Activities

The following activities are functioning Older Boys' Physical Fitness, Junior High School Sports Club, Bachelors' Club, Dramatic Club, Treble Clef Club, Orchestra, Student Council, Girls' Sextette, Future Farmers of America, Home Nursing and Telegraphy.

Many of the boys in the service have written to commend some of these activities because they obtained valuable experience which has proven very useful in the armed forces.

Services

1. Rationing

Townspeople and teachers have worked as registrars in the insuance of rationing booklets as requested by the Office of Price Administration.

War Ration Book No. 2, Commercially Processed Fruits and Vegetables, Feb. 22-24, 1943 at the Union School with Willard H. Smith as school site administrator.

War Ration Book No. 2 was issued from the Concord Office of Price Administration during the summer months and the schools were not asked to

assume any responsibility for these.

War Ration Book No. 4, General ration book, was handled at the Union School on Oct. 20-22, 1943. Mrs. Lulu J. Meserve served as school site administrator for Northfield; Mr. Donald F. Piper, for Tilton; Miss Emma Sanborn at Tilton School for those enrolled or employed there.

2. Adult Classes in Agriculture

An O. S. Y. A. course in "Increasing Milk Production" has been taught by Mr. Donald C. Taylor, Teacher of Agriculture, during the fall and winter. This course was sponsored jointly by the Chamber of Commerce through Mr. Russell McCleery and the High School Department of Agriculture. There were 15 enrolled.

3. Support of Agriculture in the War Effort

Pupils in the high school have worked on farms at times during the year to assist in the planting and harvesting seasons. 47 boys and girls agreed to accept farm work on a part-time basis last spring and 195 youngsters promised to plant, care for, and harvest a "home garden".

4. Lawnmower Repair Work

With the removal of Mr. Fred L. Morrill from town and the temporary closing of the Granite State Garage and the storage of machinery to grind lawnmowers, Tilton and Northfield lacked repair and grinding service for mowers. The Shop Department of the high school purchased Mr. Morrill's equipment and has efficiently serviced over 80 lawnmowers this season at a standard charge of \$1.50, plus

cost of repair parts and labor installing them. FINANCES

1. State Aid

Financial facts in the Tilton-Northfield Union School District were presented to the State Board of Education last spring with an application for an allotment of State Aid. On December 15, 1943, a grant of \$776.34 was received, to be applied towards elementary school costs in this district.

2. School Budget for 1942-3

As of January 1, 1944, the School Board has no outstanding bills for fuel, school supplies, or school services. The 1942-3 school budget appears to be sufficient to pay all normal charges and have enough ready to purchase the coal in the late spring for next year.

3. School Expenses

School expenses must rise to some extent. Salaries of teachers and other workers are higher, the cost of scholars' supplies has advanced, the local transportation expense will be more, fuel bills are going up, and minor items entering a school budget call for increased amounts. However, the total costs of schools locally has not risen in proportion to industrial and commercial budgets and every attempt is being made to keep the increase to a low percentage.

CONCLUSION

The schools of Tilton and Northfield function efficiently without much publicity. Excellent work is being done by the steady staff at the Union School.

Though the high school is in a transitional stage due to recent changes in staff, it is effective in its work with pupils.

In submitting this fourth annual report, I wish to thank the parents and voters for their support, interest, and cooperation, the school board members for establishing sound policies and for critically judging our results, the teachers and school nurse for their hard work, constructive criticisms, and excellent achievements.


