

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and take any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class IV and V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$342.27 the State to contribute \$1,657.73.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.
 - 9. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to change the location of any existing street lights or make additions to the number of street lights now in use, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of trees.
- 12. To raise and appropriate money for town welfare, old age assistance and soldiers' aid.
- 13. To raise and appropriate money for parks and playgrounds, including band concerts.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$118.19 for the White Mountain Region Association.
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the benefit of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Hall and Municipal Building.
- 17. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 20. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing beano be adopted in Town.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

- 22. To see what action the Town will vote to take in planning for the bi-centennial celebration of the Town in 1963, and appropriate money for said purpose.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1963, and determine the date and percentage of the same.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

LOCAL CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

There is a widespread misconception amongst the general public that the Civil Defense will get first chance on any surplus property. This is not the case. Other governmental departments such as Education, Public Health and Forestry have first choice.

It seems to me that everyone wants the same things, and they are good and useful things. But as you can see, by the time the State takes what they want, there's nothing left that we can use.

This year I am going to try a different approach. I have enlisted the aid of our Representative in the General Court, Mr. Fayne Anderson to see what can be done by the direct approach.

There were no State Wide drills this year, but I believe there is one being set up for next year.

There are only two simple rules to follow: that is; if you are in a car, stop, when a Civil Defense policeman stops you and stay in your car until the all clear sounds. If you are walking on the street, find shelter in the nearest place or house and keep off the street until the all clear sounds.

By a vote of the meeting March last, any funds unexpended in this department in the future were to be put aside for the purchase of major fire equipment as circumstances may warrant. Therefore this year there will be \$332.38 to place in this account.

The department is still considering the purchase of a second tank through the Civil Defense or other channels, as they are still exploring the possibility of securing two-way radio equipment.

The department made a record of sorts this year, having only four calls, these being all chimney fires of small consequence. However the entire town was called out about 4:00 a. m. to search for the small Baldwin child, who in her sleep had walked from the home. This small child had walked from the Studio Road to a point near the Health Center, in near freezing weather. She was returned home with no ill effects.

Preventing Forest Fires Is Our Responsibility

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In spite of the fact that payments exceeded the amount of receipts last year, our financial condition is better than we might have anticipated. The payments on improvements and new construction represents costs of materials and labor connected with the changes made in the highway. The total cost was far less than might have been expected had we not had excellent cooperation with the highway engineers and Warner Brothers Construction Company. While the work was forced upon the precinct by the highway construction, the results are certainly worthwhile and we have gained some protection against freezing as well as a means of easily flushing out both branches of the system. The service boxes now make digging to gain access to shut-offs unnecessary.

Our bills were all paid at the end of the year but no payment was made on the loan made in February, 1961. The Concord Savings Bank has agreed that this can be paid as the precinct is financially able to do so. However the amount of uncollected water rents, if collected, could pay more than half of one year's installment on this loan. It should also be noted that our payments under Improvements and Construction will probably be unnecessary in 1963 and this amount may be available to reduce our indebtedness.

The matter of uncollected water rents grows more serious and some solution should be found. We have only nineteen regular full time users plus five part time or reduced rate users. This makes it imperative that payments be kept current.

The following is a report of the activities conducted for the town of Warren, by the Bureau of Public Health Nursing Division of Public Health, for the year 1962.

There was a series of eight clinics held at the Mooselaukee Medical Center from March through November. Dr. Nicholas Deely gave medical assistance at these clinics. The following immunizations were given:

At the above clinics 10 children received physical examinations.

In April, due to considerable measles in the town, gamma globulin was obtained from the State Office and Dr. Deely administered same to four small children as peventative measure against measles.

COMMENTS

A few years ago we were reminded that in 1963 the Town of Warren would celebrate the 200th anniversary of its founding. At that time the date seemed to be so far in the future that little interest or enthusiasm was generated. However the year is now at hand and this year's Town Meeting should be concerned with plans for that celebration.

The work of your Bi-Centennial committee has progressed during the past few months to a point where it is both necessary and desirable to involve the citizens of the town. By now many of you may have been asked to serve on some committee. If you have not been asked and wish to be active in carrying out many of the details of this celebration, it is suggested that you volunteer for some committee assignment or suggest an individual task which needs to be done, and could be done by you. This may be done at the Town Meeting or by contacting the planning committee. This invitation applies equally to our summer residents and it is hoped that they will write to the celebration committee and make suggestions or volunteer for some active part in the planning of this event. The dates of our celebration are July 12, 13, and 14. This event should involve every interested citizen in some capacity to the end that this Bi-Centennial celebration will be the success which it justifies and deserves. There is an appropriate article in this year's warrant under which planning may be done and money raised to defray the expenses which will be incurred.

A glance at the balance sheet will show that a sum of money is available for highway use and it may be wondered as to the source of this money. It is made up of an amount which was left over under the Beech Hill T. R. A. project, plus the amount raised in 1962 towards our T. R. A. commitment for 1962. Again it is up to the Town to decide how this money is to be used and it is now pointed out that it may be used for any desired highway work.

In conjunction with the survey of Mount Moosilaukee as a possible ski development site, the latest information available indicates that it has been determined as not suitable for a large scale, State operated facility but may lend itself to the smaller family type recreational skiing area. Whether we can expect any development or not remains to be seen but the State Recreational Division has recently stated that it is under consideration for some future use. Probably the State would rather this site be developed by private interests.

The U. S. Soil Conservation Service has completed its survey of possible flood control sites in the Baker Valley, and there is some reason to believe that one, and possibly two sites may receive Federal approval for construction of structures which will create small bodies of water and these may be further developed for recreational use by State Agencies.

The proper application forms have been forwarded by your Fire Chief and the Selectmen to the State Forestry Department in the hope that an additional piece of Fire apparatus will be stationed in Warren. This program is a benefit to the Town and to the Forestry Department and has been followed by several Towns in this County. We do not know how soon a piece of equipment may be available but when it comes it will represent a low investment to the Town.

The Warren Village School enrollment remains static at 94. The secondary school enrollment continues to rise. A total of 35 puils are attending four high schools for the 1962-1963 school year. This number will be increased to 46 for the 1963-1964 year if all of the 16 eighth graders go on to high school. This item will reflect a tuition increase of \$5,250.00 in the budget.

Fifty percent of the teaching staff in the building changed positions for this school year. Mr. Hagner moved out of New Hampshire and Mr. Swanfeldt moved to Berlin, New Hampshire.

They were replaced by Mr. Raymond Burton as building principal and teacher of the junior high school room, and by Mrs. Mildred Kern who teaches grades V and VI.

Principal Burton, a resident of Bath, N. H., and graduate of Woodsville High School, is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1962, holds a Bachelor of Education Degree and practice taught at Littleton High School. He resides in his home at Bath.

Mrs. Mildred Kern graduated from Keene Teachers College, Class of 1944, also has a B. Ed. degree. She has additional graduate credits from Indiana University and has eight years of teaching experience. Rev. and Mrs. Kern reside at Warren.

The educational experiences of the pupils are well administered by the four dedicated teachers of the Warren staff.

Education is designed to improve the intellectual quality of human behavior.

The world is nothing more than what it means to the individual at any given time. What he does in response to events is a measure of his intellectual acknowledgment of these factors. In other words, for the individual, thinking about something makes it so. Without the act of thinking, the individual experiences nothing, and for him, nothing exists. When he is faced with a problem, the intelligently behaving individual applies mind to its solution. If he does not, his response is to a high degree non-intellectual, or irrational, or insignificant. The problem remains the answer is unavailable, and the effect of this is harmful to the individual and generally to others with whom he associates.

Consider two illustrations:

- 1. The tenth grade boy, influenced by a desire for status with his crowd, left school to earn money. His first job was working as a laborer on a construction crew. With his first earnings he bought a pair of \$30 shoes, a status symbol of great importance to his group. Soon, however, he tired of the work he was doing, became irregular in attendance on the job, and finally was dismissed. When the foreman fired him, the boy's anger flared up, and he assaulted his boss, injuring him painfully.
- 2. While on playground duty one noon, a teacher was forced to break up a fight between a girl and boy, both in the fourth grade. As she kept the straining hard-breathing children apart by grasping a wrist in each hand, the teacher asked, "Why are you so angry at each other?"

The boy answered, "She said my mother drinks. She doesn't drink any more."

The girl said in tearful anger, "He said my mother drinks. She doesn't either any more. She spends her money for new clothes for me now."

Behavior is usually not either altogether intellectual—that is, built on thought processes—or entirely below the level of consciousness, prompted and guided exclusively by feeling. Thought and feeling are only rough designations of the origins of human behavior, there being something of both in varying proportions whenever the individual acts. The object of education is not to rule out feeling as the source of purpose but to increase the influence and quality of mind as a guide to action.

Appreciation is again expressed to the teachers for their loyalty to their dedicated task, to the school board for each member's effort to serve the school, and to the citizens of Warren for their continued support.
