

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.
- 4. To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.
 - 5. Is it expedient to revise the constitution?
- 6. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of highways and bridges.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to apply calcium chloride or any other dust laying material to any of the gravel sections of the Class V roads. And raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid for State road construction and raise and appropriate the sum of \$834.00 (State's contribution \$1,668.00) or vote for Class V

assistance for Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum \$523.24 and the State will contribute \$2,092.97. (If State Aid is desired money must be expended on the County Farm road).

- 9. To see what sum of money if any the Town will raise and appropriate for upkeep of cemeteries, etc.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a public dump. Said dump to be under the supervision of the board of health.
- 11. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for painting the Town Hall.
- 12. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote raise and approproate to pay on the Town debt or into a sinking fund.
- 13. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and use in order to obtain State or Federal funds.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain electric lights not exceeding 6 in number in Westmoreland village and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jothan Lord fund.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$100 for the support of Library.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control in cooperation with State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my fourth report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

I am pleased to report that no changes were made in the teaching positions. The advantage of retaining the services of qualified and interested teachers has been apparent.

The program of standard diagonostic tests which was begun last year will be continued with a few changes. In accordance with the program as outlined every pupil will be thoroughly examined for deficiencies in silent reading, fundamental processes in arithmetic, and language usage.

A grade standard has been established for each subject tested and the tests are especially designed to point specifically to types of deficiencies.

The real value of the testing program depends upon the thoroughness of the subsequent corrective work which is done by the teachers. Retests were given last year in several schools of the union after a period of remedial instruction. The results indicated a very fair percentage of correction.

The continued use of a testing program of this nature will influence the efficiency of instruction and will indicate where emphasis should be placed in teaching the fundamentals.

Standard tests however, are only rough estmates of the effectiveness of the general education of our pupils. We are primarily interested in the growth of our young people in ideals, attitudes, and habits. These traits are not measurable by any tests now in use, but we know from experience that they are developed by a good teacher in a well-conducted school.

Forms of the following tests are used according to the grades for which they are especially designed.

Haggerty Reading Examination

Shank Test in Reading Comprehension

Spencer Diagnostic Test in Arithmetic

Gregory Diagnostic Language Test.

Metropolitan Achievement Tests

A standard graduation test is given each year to all pupils in the eighth grade.

An attempt has been made to unify the text books in use in the schools of the supervisory union. For several years a definite program of text book adoptions has been followed. Books are selected which are adapted to the grades for which they are intended and which are in accordance with the material outlined in the State Program of Studies. New books are purchased, as far as possible, according to this standard with the result that the pupils in the various schools will eventually be using the same material. This will be an advantage when children transfer from one school to another.

The teachers are making very good use of the excellent workbook material which has recently been made available in the different subjects. This material when carefully selected and correctly used has much value. The better workbooks are prepared by recognized authorities. In rural schools the use of workbooks has helped to solve the problem of organizing the work of the study groups.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following repairs and improvements were made during the year:

Village:

Repairs were made to the foundation around the cellar window frames. A blind drain was built to take care of the water from the eaves. A bulk head was constructed over one of the basement windows. Storm windows have been provided.

East Westmoreland:

Twenty single unit movable desks were purchased for the advanced room. The interior of the building was refinished throughout. The desks in the primary room were varnished.

Depot School:

The entire interior of the building was painted. A new fence was built along the front side of the school property. The front yard was graded. The well has been topped with a removable iron cover.

Corner school:

All the walls and ceilings were painted and the furniture was varnished. Repairs were made on the roof, the doors were fitted, and a new sink was installed. Repairs were made on the tank and bowl in the boys' toilet. New fence posts were set up and a wire fence attached. The old teeter board standards were replaced. A sand box was constructed.

16 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Dental clinics were held during April and May 1936 for the Depot pupils, this clinic was entirely managed by the Depot Parent-Teachers Association. At the South Village May 20 and 21, 1936, Westmoreland Point Nov. 28 and 30, 1936. Dr. J. Harvey Grimes was the dentist for these two clinics.
