





WARBANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

)L.S.(STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeborough, qual= ifted to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Brewster Memorial Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :---

- ART. I. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Fish and Game Warden for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose a Collector of Taxes, Treasurer, and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to defend or settle any damages occasioned by taking water from Beach Pond.
- ART. 7. To choose a Superintendent of its Water Works for the ensuing three years, and fix the salary of the same.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town expenses.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on its indebtedness.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for breaking roads the past winter.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the highways the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay each fireman, legally returned for the year 1893, in addition to that required by law.

- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay to James R. Newell Post, No. 61, G. A. R., of said town, to assist in defraying the expenses of decorating the graves of deceased soldiers, and other necessary expenses of Memorial Day, May 30, 1893.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 79, of the Public Statutes, relating to sewers.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to lay out and build a new street, for which a petition is now before said selectmen, beginning on the north side of North Main Street, near the Thomas Rust house, (so called) running northerly, by the houses of Henry F. Libbey, to Mill Street.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation, for a period not exceeding ten years, the Tannery Buildings and Machinery of William H. Varney, upon the condition that the same be put in operation.
- ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to lower the grade of the Dudley Chamberlain hill, and raise the grade of the road at the foot of the same.
- ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to procure a lot, and build a receiving tomb, and raise money for the same.
- ART. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to macadamizing South Main Street, from Green Street to the easterly boundary line of the homestead lot of Dr. H. I. Berry, and raise money for the same, agreeable to a petition signed by John H. Rust and others.
- ART. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To Stephen W. Clow, Charles E. Stackpole, and James E. Gridley, Selectmen: —

GENTLEMEN :—In submitting our financial report, we would preface it with a few remarks as to the condition and working of the system.

During the past year, the excellent and satisfactory working of the system has continued. No serious or expensive breaks have occurred. The gate at the pond has never been closed from the day that water was turned on, to the present time. Every blow-off, valve, air-cock aud hydrant, as far as is possible to know, with a single exception, is now in perfect condition. There is an abundant supply of water in the pond, and at no time since the construction of the works has there been less than four feet of water over the intake. There has been some inconvenience and damage to surroundings caused by water pressure through the embankments of the reservoir. As an experiment, we caused a shallow ditch to be made on the lower side of the same, which we think may, if carried to a proper depth, partially obviate the above trouble, but will not in any way prevent a waste of water. We are fully satisfied that the only sure remedy is to cement the reservoir to the high water line

During the past year, and more especially through the winter months, the water has been drawn from the reservoir to an alarming extent. With the amount of water that is constantly flowing through the 4-inch pipe from the pond, there is only one conclusion to which we can possibly arrive as regards the low stage of water in the reservoir, and that is, that water takers are using and allowing to run to waste more than they contract for.

The past winter has been very severe, and trying to service pipes. The long and continuous cold weather, with but little or no snow on the ground, frost has found its way to the depth of from three to four feet, and the result is, that some thirty services are frozen on the outside. Water takers should attend to this matter early in the fall, and see there are no places where the cold can get to the pipes, and to fill all depressions over the same.

Twenty-three services have been added within the past year, making a total of three hundred and thirtyseven.

Fifteen leaks have been found, and repaired at a cost of about ninety-five dollars.

We are free to admit that the rules governing the water system have not been so strictly enforced as they should have been, and we are also aware that some persons are ready to take advantage of any laxity or oversight on the part of the superintendent, and we would say to our successor, that a *strict* enforcement of the rules will bring him less trouble than it will for him to be lenient in the least degree.
