Cheshire, ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Alstead qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on the 8th day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a town elerk, town treasurer, selectman, tax eollector, overseer of poor, one or more road agents, auditors, constables, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, fence viewers, sextons, sealer of weights and measures, measurer of wood, surveyors of lumber and such other town officers as voters may direct.
- 2. To see if town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 for ordinary town charges and \$900 for the support of town poor.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise \$3,500 for town highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,450.00 for state aid maintenance, \$900 for trunk line maintenance, \$750.00 for state aid construction and receive state aid.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 to oil village streets.

- 6. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to buy snow fence.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$830.00 for street lights.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00 for cemeterics.
- 9. To see what action the town will take regarding white pine blister control.
- 10. To see what action the town will take regarding a storage building for tractor and road tools, and raise money for same.
- 11. To see what action the town will take regarding purchasing one new road scraper and raise money for same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to Gates and Bars, the road leading from John P. Kemp's house to the Aeworth town line, said road is known as the Partridge Hill road.
- 13. To see what action the town will take regarding allowing non-residents to take up cemetery lots.
- 14. To see what action the town will take regarding the report of executors of will of Mr. Charles N. Vilas as printed in report.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to allow Sunday sports, according to Chapter 155, laws of 1931.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ESTATE OF CHARLES N. VILAS. BOARD OF SELECTMEN. Alstead.

New Hampshire.

Gentlemen:

As the attorneys for the United States Trust Company of New York and Mrs. Vilas, the executors of the will of Mr. Vilas, we sent you a few days ago two copies of the will of Mr. Vilas. We are now giving you a further explanation as to our procedure, the condition of the estate, and the provisions of the will as they relate to the Town of Alstead. You will, of course, appreciate the fact that an estate will be in the process of administration for some time after death and the New York rule will probably not be very much different than that in other states. In this State the executors are not obliged to make distribution before one year after they qualify which will be October 1, 1932. The exact time of payment in any event will depend on the condition of the estate as to the character of investments and the ability of the executors to sell the property and obtain the cash necessary to pay first the debts, inheritance taxes, expenses of administration and then the legacies.

Mr. Vilas made his will in May, 1929, at which time values were very high so that as we understand it he had a substantial estate. Since the time he made his will and up until his death there had been a very substantial reduction in values of securities which as you probably know have since continued and we might say that it is now doubtful if the amounts specified by Mr. Vilas can be paid in full unless there is a very great change in the security market. You can readily see that if the payments provided by the will cannot be made in full there would be no residuary estate which otherwise would be payable to Mrs. Vilas under the Eighteenth paragraph of the will.

In any event it is quite proper that you should know that the estate must go through a certain process of administration, with taxes to be adjusted and paid all of which will take time. The executors in the meantinme will use their best efforts to dispose of the securities at a favorable time which it is not possible now to determine.

The interest of the Town of Alstead as stated in the will is as follows: Under the Third paragraph \$400,000 is set aside to pay the income to Mrs. Vilas and on her death the income will be paid to the Town for the reduction of taxes. There, of course, can be no benefits to the Town under that paragraph for some time.

The Town is given under the Ninth paragraph the income from \$100,000 to be

applied to the general purposes for which the taxes levied by the Town are used. The Town is also given \$1,000 for care of the Cemetery lot under the Twelfth par-

By the Thirteenth paragraph it receives the 12 acre plot including "Vilas Pool" and the income of \$75,000 to maintain the pool and buildings and to employ

necessary caretakers, labor and music in connection therewith.

Under paragraph Fifteenth the sum of \$175,000 is bequeathed to be used for the erection of a High School. It is also provided that the income from another \$125,000 is to be paid to the Town to be used for the maintenance of the School building and the school conducted therein. It is to be noted in connection with this bequest that by the Twenty-third paragraph the executors are authorized to make payments upon certificates of architects or engineers satisfactory to them directly to the contractors or builders instead of paying the amount provided for the school to the Town. Notwithstanding the discretion to pay the above amount bequeathed for the school to the Town, the executors will make the payments direct to the contractors and builders which contemplates that the architects, contractors, and builders will be satisfactory to the executors and that the plans will be subject to their approval as well as to your Board or its duly constituted representatives.

In addition to these bequests there has been given to the Town the so called llot Green" now used as a play ground which will be used by the Village as "Millot Green"

a recreation park.

We think the above is a full outline of the Town's interest under the will and may be so incorporated into your Town Report which you contemplate making at

your annual meeting.

We have not examined into the laws of New Hampshire governing Townships which we may do at some later convenient time. We assume, however, that there is ample authority to have the interest of the Town under the will of Mr. Vilas presented at its meeting and to have that meeting designate your Board as such or in co-operation with any other person or persons to confer with the executors and make agreement with them for the carrying out of the provisions of the will including the adjustment of any problems which may arise and particularly as to the manner of carrying out the provisions for the construction of the High School. Your Board or any other duly constituted authority should be clothed by your Town Meeting with full power and authority to determine the needs of the Town for a High School and to conclude with the estate all negotiations including the amount within which the expenditure for the School will be made according to the needs of the Town and its ability to support the school outside of the maintenance fund established by the will. This should also take into account the possibility of the full amount not being available because of the security market conditions. If there should be any question of the power of your Board to conclude negotiations it might be well to consider at your annual meeting the calling of a special Town meeting to ratify what your Board or its representatives may agree upon. Perhaps after the Town meeting it might be well to arrange a conference between the representatives of the Town empowered to discuss these matters and the executors at which time the situation may be gone over thoroughly to ascertain how and when it may be possible to consider the various matters particularly the school construction, but which may well consider the question of the management of "Vilas Pool" this coming summer.

Mr. Vilas in the past paid for the operation of the Pool but because of the condition of the estate the executors will be unable to do so this year and some consideration may have to be given as to whether or not "Vilas Pool" can be opened by the Town the coming summer and if opened how it will have to be main-

There are other problems which will have to be considered in connection with the school such as the site which will have to be furnished by the Town itself as that will have to be provided outside of the provisions of the will. Unless it has already been done it appears to us that the needs of the Town should be considered by your State Department of Education whose opinion in the matter may be very valuable in case there should be any differences as between your views and that of the executors. We refer to the above matters on the question of the school as of special importance as it seems to be very desirable that before any meeting with the executors is held, and certainly before architects are engaged, a well thought out proposition should be presented to the executors which should cover the points to which we have referred.

Another problem must be kept in mind, and that is the fact that the payment of the money legacies, are made a direct charge on all of the real estate in Alstead under the Twenty-first paragraph of the will, which may require the

sale of those properties if the money legacies cannot be paid in full.

We have gone into the matter quite at length first to give you the facts as they exist today and to anticipate future negotiations and conferences looking to carrying out the problems and if there is anything more we can say and you will let us know what it is we shall be very glad to supplement what we have already written as we wish to make this situation clear to you and desire to co-operate in the matter as fully as we possibly can.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I submit herewith my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

The beginning of school in September found but one new teacher in the Alstead schools, Miss Bennett at Alstead Center being replaced by Miss Minnie Smith of Cornish, a graduate of Keene Normal school, class of 1931. In March, 1931, Miss Webster resigned at the Village primary school. She was succeeded by Miss Margaret Schnare, of Southboro, Mass., a graduate of Framingham Normal school in the class of 1930. As was the case last year, the Rhoades school is taught by cadets from the Keene Normal school.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

In accordance with the vote of the district a new furnace has been installed at the Village school. This is giving very satisfactory service in heating the rooms of that building.

Alterations made at the East Alstead school have resulted in improvement in the toilets and dressing rooms and have provided a much needed storage closet for books and supplies. The chemical toilets there have been repaired, and the stove jacketed, The ceiling and walls have been refinished. The entrance hall is furnished with a new ceiling.

Sanitary conditions in the boys' toilet at the Alstead Center school have been greatly improved. The walls and ceiling of this school also have been renovated.

The stove at the Mica Mine school has been equipped with a jacket.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

As new books are purchased to replace those worn out in service, an attempt has been made to follow a definite adoption in the various subjects. Each year finds more of the same books used in similar grades of the different schools. This makes for greater economy in the purchase and use of books. Unused books on hand in one school may be transferred to another school where there is a shortage, thus obviating the necessity of buying new books. Children transferring from one school to another find the same books in use. Such adoptions have been made in the text books in the following subjects: Basal readers, spellers, arithmetics, geographies, histories, and language books.

 - 7 pupils showed a slight degree of anaemia.
- 68 pupils were in need of dental care.
- 15 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.
- 10 pupils had enlarged glands.
- 8 pupils were unvaccinated without proper excuse.
- 67 home visits were made.
- 56 school visits were made.
- 33 pupils had their teeth cared for, 15 pupils were accompanied to the dentist by the nurse.
 - 2 pupils were accompanied to the tuberculosis clinic at Keene.
 - 1 pupil was accompanied to the oculist.
 - 2 Tonsil cases were treated.

An underweight clinic was held May 28, 1931, 23 pupils were examined.
