You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Memorial Day.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for lighting the streets with electricity.
6. To see what action the Town will take with regard to State Aid Construction, State Aid Maintenance, and Trunk Line Maintenance.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Evergreen Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for Sunnyside Cemetery.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars to plow the snow from the Trunk Line during the winter of 1928-1929.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to have old trees removed and others trimmed up on the school grounds.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to put a suitable fence around the school grounds.

12. To transact any other Business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Bennington, N. H.:

Bennington has maintained, for the past two and one half years, a full accounting system dealing with both costs of operation and maintenance of its public school system, and with the actual return from this expenditure in terms of standard education. By so doing it has had, for guidance, the expectation of costs per pupil not only in New Hampshire, but over a far larger area, and can and does know that the per pupil cost is extremely low. It has also had complete, detailed proof of the adequate return from this low expenditure. It knows that on ratings which are country-wide, its children have arrived at more than the average educational training both for the age of the children and for the grade in which they are taught.

By its cost accounting it assures itself against over-expenditure per pupil. By its pupil-accounting it assures the parents of the children that the low per-pupil cost is not arrived at by skimping education.

Excellent teaching, and an increasing realization of the needs for widely varied reading material, are the simple explanations for the superior standards reached.

Continuous survey of the pupils is maintained by as loyal and faithful teaching staff as Bennington can ever hope to have. This makes possible the fitting of educational material directly to the needs of the individual children, rather than forcing stale and outworn books and methods upon eager childhood, with the subsequent lack of interest and resultant loss of learning.

The policy of maintaining a full year of 180 days assures Bennington that its children are having full opportunity to make use of the excellent schools maintained by the School Board. It also reduces the financial loss inherent in failing to make use of all the time which has been contracted for, or for which expenditure has been entered into.

The new heating plant in the intermediate grades provides adequate warmth and superior ventilation at moderate costs, far less than that of heating by inadequate stoves. The upper grades are working in a room that at present cannot be adequately ventilated in cool weather. The same criticism can be made of the lower grade room, but the extreme size and height of that room correct, in some degree, the inadequate ventilating system. The light is still a problem, as part of the children must work in their own shadows. There is no possible correction for this condition except expensive remodeling.

In spite of exceedingly troublesome conditions of public health during the last fiscal year, closing last June 30th, 1927, Bennington maintained a per cent. of attendance of 93.6. There were 40 cases of tardiness. Only two children, however, were neither absent nor tardy during the year. The enrolment was 87. Eight meetings of the School Board were held. The superintendent of schools made 68 visits.

The insistence on the part of everyone connected with the schools of Bennington, that the children shall have every possible opportunity within reasonable costs, has made supervision a distinct pleasure. In behalf of the Bennington children the superintendent returns appreciative comment for the support given.
