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In accordance with a vote of the town last March, a free Public Library has been established in which the people seem interested. We received one hundred dollars worth of books from the state and have purchased one hundred standard books at a cost of about thirty dollars. We thought best to learn the needs of the people before investing all the money in books.

We now have in the three agencies two hundred and forty-five volumes.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

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On the whole, your committee can give a favorable report of the schools the past year. The money received from the State, together with the increased appropriations of the District, has enabled us to have a larger number of weeks and on an average to increase the wages of our teachers. It is not an easy matter to procure first-class teachers in a small town like this and not until the pay can come up to that of other towns can we hope to be successful.

Although we have not been able to engage Normal school teachers or college graduates, we think that those whom we have employed have tried hard to make the schools a success.

### WOODMAN DISTRICT

The spring term was taught by Miss Phœbe Brown. The school was pleasant and successful in every way. The fall term was taught by Miss A. Lillian Stevens. Miss Stevens is faithful and conscientious in her work and the school was a success.

### MORRISON DISTRICT

Both terms were taught by Miss Helen Morrison. These were the first terms taught by Miss Morrison, but she showed herself to be well adapted to the work. Her aim was not to see how many pages she could go over in a term but how well it could be done. Some scholars in the school showed very plainly they were governed at home, hence it was very much easier for the teacher.

When pupils are in the habit of having their own way



at home it is exceedingly hard for teachers to govern a school. Some of the scholars in the District are quite young, yet are as forward as many that have greater advantages, and the school showed marked improvement in all the studies pursued.

#### DALTON DISTRICT

The spring term was taught by Miss Edith M. Mitchell. This teacher has been employed in this town before with marked success and tried to make this school a profitable one; but there were so many that stayed away from school that it disheartened the teacher and with all the persuasions your committee could use she could not be prevailed upon to keep the second term. The progress of the school was as good as could be expected under the circumstances. The fall term was commenced by Josephine V. Mathews, a teacher of large experience, and gave good satisfaction; but after five weeks her nerves gave out. The scholars in this District seem to have depended on the teacher to do the work and not on themselves. The remainder of the term was taught by Mrs. Addie G. Morse, a teacher that loves the work and is well known as an old teacher in this town, and at the closing exercises showed good improvement. There are some bright young scholars in this District. One boy, in his eighth year, deserving special mention would imagine what the next question would be and would give the answer before the teacher could ask it. Your committee thinks his equal can't be found in town.

#### CLEMENT DISTRICT

Both terms in this district were taught by O. E. Kingsbury of Bristol. Mr. Kingsbury is an old teacher of large experience and we could not expect to pay him in this

school what he was really worth as a teacher, but as it was near his home so that he could spend a part of the time with his family we were enabled to employ him the past year. Careful and conscientious in his work, he realized that a teacher's work is to train his pupils for lives of usefulness. We were obliged to cut the fall term short on account of sickness and death in Mr. Kingsbury's family.

#### TURNPIKE DISTRICT

The spring term was taught by Miss A. Lillian Stevens. This was her second term of teaching and she tried hard and labored faithfully to make the school a success. The fall term was taught by Katie B. Drake of North Sanborn-ton. She had a pleasant school and won the love of her pupils.

#### NICHOLS DISTRICT

Both terms were taught by Miss Ethel Carpenter of this town. This was her first attempt at teaching but she easily and quickly adapted herself to the work and soon won the love of her pupils.

The scholars in this school are bright, intelligent pupils, and at the closing exercises showed they had been well drilled through the term. The teacher had specimens of map drawing, one of which was the finest the visiting committee had ever seen.

We are glad to learn that Miss Carpenter intends to attend the Normal School at Plymouth.

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Your committee would recommend that an appropriation be made to build suitable cupboards in each school house, in which to keep the text books, and buy record books for the teachers so that a strict account be kept and returned

to the School Board at the end of each term of all the books in their hands.

In closing we would thank you for the appropriations for repairing the Turnpike school house. Neat, comfortable, convenient school buildings are indispensable to successful schools.
