STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookfield, qualified to vote in
Town affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

ART. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year and three years ensuing as the law requires.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for breaking the roads for the year ending February 15th, 1902.

ART. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for repairing highways in summer the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town officers the ensuing year.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate any money the ensuing year for schooling above that required by law, and if so, how much.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for decorating Soldiers' graves the ensuing year.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to have the town accounts printed and furnish each legal voter with a copy of the same, and if so, how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for the same.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Week, agreeably to chapter 17, laws of 1901, and if so, how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the expense of the same.

ART. 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR 1901.

In submitting our report to the town for the past year, there are some special things to which we wish to call the attention of the legal voters and tax-payers of Brookfield.

More than \$500.00 has been expended the past year for the instruction of fifty-seven pupils, which is the average attendance including Mr. Harmon's children who have been schooled in Wakefield. We submit that this is a very large sum for a town of our size and means.

\$172.50 was paid for instructing forty-three pupils registered in the Churchill school, and \$310.50 for the remaining number, in all registered twenty-three; that is to say, \$13.50 has been paid for the instruction of each of the twenty-three; while but four dollars each has been paid for the instruction of the other forty-three. This seems a very unequal manner of expending our funds and ought in some way to be remedied, or improved, if possible.

Whole number of school children enrolled in town April 1, 1901, 66; average amount expended for each child, about eight dollars.

We have brought these statements before you for your careful consideration. This town as you all know, is one school district of which your Board of Education are simply agents for the disbursement of your appropriated funds; but as the matter now exists, as we have endeavored to set before you in this report, there seems to be great need of change for a more uniform method of distribution of our school appropriations. Perhaps there may be some man in town wise enough to make some needed suggestion in the matter, or perhaps our State Superintendent, to whom a copy of this report will be sent, can lend some helpful advice.

Three female teachers have been employed during the year, all from the state of Maine; the same teachers employed for the spring terms taught the fall terms also. Twenty-three weeks in all for the year. The registers show a good many marks of absence, for which perhaps parents are largely responsible. At a public examination of the Churchill school, taught by Mrs. Quimby, an experienced teacher, the school made a fine appearance and showed marked improvement.
